## Reappraisal underway

### soon in Lincoln County

Mr. Lon Nelson of Lon Nelson Associates, Santa Fe, the firm that has been retained to make the reappraisal of Lincoln County, was in Carrizozo Wednesday and told the News that the planning and background work on reappraisal had been going on for the past month, that the first stage of reappraisal would be tax mapping of Lincoln County which he expects will be underway within the next two weeks.

A local office will be opened in Carrizozo around the 20th of this month with Mr. Harvey Cornell, reappraisal supervisor for Lincoln County in charge. The field work and reappraisal will be done by Lincoln County residents, eight to ten people will be hired for this purpose. Announcement will be made in the local paper as to time and place of hiring which will be sometime after August 1st. Only qualified persons will be hired, who have been cleared by the sheriff's office.

Carrizozo town council met Tuesday night to dispatch routine business and had it all wrapped up by 9:30. Minutes of June 20 special meeting were read, Section 8 of Recreation Ordinance revised, Apparation for sewer which work will be done, Rerlands liquor license approved at this meeting, minutes approved.

This. The Mayor is also going to talk to the official dog catcher and see if some catching can take place.

Council approved purchase of new dump truck, which item is in the new budget. Town budget was approved by state department Wednesday. General fund total of \$2,400, which is \$10,295 less than last year due to expected help from federal government on airport lighting.

Application for occupation license and check for \$31.50 received from telephone company approved. Antonio Luera has informed the town that he has been missed for three weeks on garbage service and wants discount on his bill. Council thought it would be setting poor precedent to discount, asked Wayne Withers to find out the details and see that service was maintained.

## 2 positions open in Zojo school

Mrs. Darrell Pearce, language arts teacher was rehired by Carrizozo school as language arts teacher but did not choose to teach in the 66-67 school year which vacancy is yet to be filled.

Manuel G. Camin, Spanish and social studies teacher, has resigned to accept a similar job at Ruidoso, this vacancy not yet filled. Jerry Durham, native of Floyd, and graduate of Eastern University, has been employed as basketball coach and will teach social studies and math. Mr. Durham has had one year of valuable experience at Capitan and is acquainted with District 5B, and the material he will have to work with in Carrizozo. He is helping with the Carrizozo recreation program this summer.

Supt. Glen Ellison said he is real concerned about situation involving federal money. No school in state knows what amounts will be available under Title I, or what other vocational programs will be financed. School starts in six weeks. Carrizozo received \$22,000 last year and plans for coming year cannot be completed until some information is available about money for the new year.

The night of June 28 the Tinnie Mercantile, the Silver Dollar, and Tinnie postoffice were burglarized. Twenty-four cartons of cigarettes were taken from the Mercantile, 20 fifths and quarts of liquor from the Silver Dollar and the post office was burglarized and \$37.40 taken. Entry to the safe was made by the punch method.

Roswell city police were alerted to the fact that a 1960 Buick had been seen in the vicinity of the Silver Dollar that night. Car was located and subjects put under surveillance. They were located at 1602 Kentucky where one subject's sister lived. The two suspects attempted to escape this residence dressed in women's clothes. They broke into a vacant building. They were then picked up and charged with vagrancy and criminal damage to property. One of the subjects managed to shuck his feminine attire but the other was hauled into court in a floor-length pink formal. After leaving the house at 1802 N. Kentucky the sister was charged with possession of stolen property and the D. A. authorized a search warrant. He then authorized Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. to file two charges of burglary, one at Tinnie Mercantile and one at Silver Dollar and Judge R. L. Sherrill set bond of \$3,500 on each charge for each subject making the bond \$7,000 on each.

The D. A. then authorized the Roswell police to release the subjects, Thomas H. Campos, 21 and Robert Thomas, 20, both of Albuquerque, to Sheriff Vega to be arraigned before Judge R. L. Sherrill.



## Courthouse at Old Lincoln Town is exhibiting group of silk Chinese robes

The Courthouse Museum of Lincoln is currently exhibiting a group of Silk Chinese Robes, some from the former Royal Palace of Peking.

Silk is one of the strongest fibers, a thread of it is two-thirds as strong as an iron wire of equal size. It is very elastic, so smooth that dirt or dust does not cling to it. The so-called worm that produces the fiber is a caterpillar of a distinct moth. The worm feeds only on the leaves of the mulberry tree and after eating its own weight in leaves for about five weeks, it attaches itself to some twig and begins to spin a cocoon about itself. The cocoon is made of a fluid that hardens in the air and later becomes the thread of silk, which is unwound by a very delicate, lengthy process.

Silk was first developed in China perhaps a thousand years before Christ. The secret was jealously guarded in China and the penalty to attempt to smuggle any cocoon out of the coun-

try was death. China developed a vast world trade in silk and it was always so expensive it was called the "cloth of kings." About 500 A. D., two Persian monks smuggled the precious silk worm eggs out of China in the hollow of bamboo staffs they carried and the culture of silkworms and their silk spread later all over the Western World. It is still one of the most prized of fabrics as pure, unwelghed silk will last for years and will never crack or crease. The Chinese first used silk to fashion the robes of the Emperors and other royalty. Later it was developed as a fabric for upholstery, curtains, etc., but to wear a robe of pure silk in China was always a badge of royalty. The robes on display in the Courthouse Museum date largely from the 19th century and were collected in Peking in the 1930's. The colours are rich and varied, brilliant cherry red, plum, gray or yellow, this last a colour which could be worn only by the royalty of the Manchu Dynasty. The silks are heavy, all hand woven on a loom much wider than that of Europe, many are of a satin or brocade weave and have a contrasting thin silk lining, with blue a favorite colour.

The robes are floor length, usually with a double front that buttons across the chest and fastened with intricate brass or gold buttons. The sleeves are all long and several have the distinctive Hoof Cuff that could be worn only by a Manchu. Very interesting is a rich yellow outer coat, edged with white rabbit fur and with brocaded medallions of dragons with seven claws, again an attribute of royalty as common people could display a dragon with only five claws. Outstanding also is a brown brocaded winter coat, lined with white, un-born baby lamb fleece.

The exhibition is part of the new educational program of the Courthouse Museum. It will open on Sunday, July tenth and continue for three weeks. The robes are augmented by two pieces of 18th century Chinese furniture: one an ancestor chair of very heavy Nan-mu wood and the other a very rare red and gold painted laquer chest. The laquer is applied to leather and the chest has intricate brass fittings. The exhibition has been placed on a larger Chinese rug of the 19th century in the typical deep knotted pile. The orange-red center is a rare colour for such rugs, as are the scattered designs of butterflies.



Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Louise Samelson; one son Chris, both of Ruidoso, and one sister, Mrs. Esther Christian.


Funeral mass was held Friday with Father Robert Kirsh officiating. Rosary services were held Thursday night. Burial was in Forest Lawn Cemetery.



Lincoln County 4-H members will compete in the District Contest held in Fort Sumner, Friday. Barbara Knight, John Davis, Dan Harkey, and Leland Jackson will compete in the Livestock Judging. Cristina Pacheco, Cecelia Pacheco, Judy Provine, and Gloria Zamora will compete in the Dress Revue. Rebecca Sineros, Lorena Torres, Christie Sineros, and Helen Fresquez will compete in the Home Economics Judging. Carol Cooper and Betty Torres will give demonstrations.

If your lawn and ornamentals are not looking too well these days, perhaps they're lacking in nutrients. They may need nitrogen in particular, or phosphorus, and sometimes potash, or minor elements.

How can you tell what your plants need? Try a soil test. The Extension Service soil testing laboratory at NMSU analyzes soil samples for home owners—for a nominal fee (\$2.50). The soil test report will give the fertility status of the sample—the amount of nitrogen and phosphorus present. It will also give the pH, or soil reaction, the total soluble salts, exchangeable sodium, organic matter content, and texture of the sample.

Included with each soil test report are fertilizer recommendations, which tell what kind of fertilizer and how much should be applied for 100 square feet of lawn, per 100 square feet of flower beds, or per tree.

Soil sample boxes and information about taking accurate samples are available at the county extension office or from the Soil Testing Lab, Extension Service, New Mexico State University Park, New Mexico 88-070.

Farm flock owners should worm their breeding ewes before moving them to fresh pas-

ture. This improves their vitality and vigor.

Do not skimp on medicine. The efficiency of most drugs drops drastically when slightly less than the prescribed dosage is given.

Fine particle phenothiazine in the correct dosage eliminates up to 95% of certain mature blood-sucking worms. Thiabenzazole, a new worm medication has an additional advantage; it destroys worms, too.

September and October are not far away, and many livestock breeders have already selected their beef cattle, sheep, and swine to be fitted for showing at county and state fairs.

Livestock shows are an educational program in themselves. The breeder likes to compare his cattle, sheep, and swine with the stock of other breeders, and everyone interested in the industry learns something from the show.

Fairs—whether county, district, or state—are made successful by those who will take the time and make the effort to prepare and show stock. Here are a few pointers for choosing livestock for showings.

Select cattle that are thick-bodied—of medium type, with good depth in the body, and get them in good flesh. They need not be overly fat.

Select sheep for the breeding classes that have good size for age, that are open faced, and that have a uniform fleece in length, grade, and covering. Breeding sheep should not be excessively fat. They should have enough flesh for good appearance.

Select breeding swine that conform in type to the present idea of the meat-type hog. The short, dumpy, hard-type hog cannot place very high, if there is any competition at all. Breeding swine should have a thrifty and healthy appearance, but should never be overly fat.

## Rattling around in a great barn

Tony Payton, son of the News editor, is partner and editor of the Record-Courier at Gardnerville, Nevada, a town in an area that has been warned, "You're next for population boom."

Orville Freeman, secretary of agriculture, is urging big business to locate new factories in the fields and small towns of rural America. Said Freeman: "It's folly to stack up three-fourths of our people in the suffocating steel and concrete storage bins of the city, while a figurative handful rattle around in a great barn full of untapped resources."

We should enjoy our rattling around in Lincoln County while we can. It won't always be this quiet and small-townish.

We could easily resist any growth and act like other residents who want no change of any kind. If it were not for the

erosion of time, the gradual tumble down of old adobes, the gradual clutter of deserted lots and buildings, the gradual departure of families needed to make up a first-class school, loss of any youthful spark in churches, loss of business to point that such as dental, shoe, repair, jeweler, vet, etc and etc. services are not available here.

We can build monuments of this kind, like new courthouse, new school, new church all over town but if we don't take necessary steps to provide 25-100 more jobs that "rattling-around" Freeman speaks of will be just what a handful of 60-70-80 year olds will be doing in the monuments.

As a town we have only two choices — we either head for the graveyard or we head in the direction of a growing community.

## Inside the Capitol

**POWER STRUGGLE IN AUDIT GROUP**  
SANTA FE — One of the more unique power struggles in New Mexico politics may reach some sort of a climax today when the new Audit Commission has its July meeting.

Currently it's probably one of the wildest situations the tax payers have yet supported. The odd part is that State Auditor Alex Armijo is now serving as the newly appointed "Legislative Auditor." This appointment was made on a slim majority vote.

But here's the real kicker and the outcome could be almost laughable if it didn't cost so much money. Chairman of the Commission is State Sen. Earl Parker, a Demo front Torrance, who won't be back to the Legislature next year. Two other leading members - State Sen. W. C. Wheatley of Union and State Rep. Alex Martinez of Santa Fe - won't be back either.

This alone would represent a bulk of the vote on the commission for naming its "Legislative auditor" and the new gang that comes in after Jan. I could go any direction as far as their favorite is concerned on the "Legislative auditor" affair.

Armijo, however, has a big club in the fact that if he isn't named to be continuing Legislative auditor, then he can file a suit asking that the entire commission be declared as unconstitutional.

Since New Mexicans liked the idea of doing away with an elected auditor, the question has remained as to whether the Audit Commission is, in fact, a legal group.

It's interesting to think, however, that the Commission would have to regulate its selection on the basis of whether or not they'll be abolished.

Should the case ever reach the courts, it might well be that all the actions and business done by the Commission will be declared null and void. And there's a lot of money being spent.

Maybe now is the time to ask for a legal opinion.

**Two Reports To Be Considered**

So long as the Audit Commission is functioning in an alleged legal position, they are going to consider two reports from "interim" committees that should be interesting to note.

Sen. Wheatley and Rep. Martinez are going to give their opinions on audits made on the State Highway Department and the State Purchasing Agent's office. Rep. John Eaves of Bernalillo will report on auditing the justices of the Peace in New Mexico.

It's doubtful that Wheatley and Martinez will come forth

with anything of value. Neither are experienced in the particular field. Wheatley has done too much business with the state to be critical with the purchasing agent, and Martinez is running for the Senate and doesn't want to hurt anyone's feelings.

Eaves might provide something on the JPs, but the Demos haven't held a platform convention and until this happens his report might be weak.

Either way, the "current" Audit Commission won't be the "next" Audit Commission and about the only benefit will be the enhanced legislators who drew \$25 per day and mileage for attending the meetings.

But we'll have to wait and see if they have more luck with their conventions than Cargo had with his.


