Rev. and Mrs. James Wells and Mrs. Ora Johnson, Claunch and also Jack Wells of Alamogordo attended the services.



LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY . . . By Walter Henn



St. Anne's Chapel at Glencoe

Across the road from Bonnell's Ranch, a stopping place for many early-day travelers in New Mexico Territory, and at the mouth of Devil's Canyon "Where it can checkmate any evil influence of his satanic Majesty" is the quiet chapel which has served Lincoln County Episcopallians since June 19-34. Highway 70 goes right by the chapel.

Edna C. Schlerenberg has been collecting materials on St. Anne's and has almost enough for a book. An excerpt from H. S. Hunter's column "Around Here" in the El Paso Times says, "There are only two or three families of Episcopallians around here but they are pretty numerous families, with their in-laws and all, and we believe Mr. Tully told us there were 14 confirmed persons ready to start the chapel off with a congregation."

St. Anne's chronicle of incumbencies, as kept by Edna Schlerenberg, dates back to 1912-14 when the Rev. E. N. Bullack was pastor, on down to

the present when the Rev. Luther Pitt serves the chapel.

Charter members of St. Anne's reads like an early history of Lincoln County, families that have been here since statehood days. In 1929 James V. Tully was bishop's warden and Mrs. B. J. Bonnell was chapel treasurer. Gerald Tulley and later Daniel Storm were bishop's wardens. Wilbur F. Coe was treasurer, followed by Kenneth Noeker. Edna Schlerenberg took over as chapel clerk in 1941. Elzy Perry, Jr., William Shrengost, Barton Pavey, Jud McKnight, Mrs. Louise Coe, Mr. Fred Slausen, Mrs. L. W. Storm, have taken their turns as church officers.

St. Anne's chapel was built as a labor of love. A contract was entered into on October 3, 1933, with G. F. Bruns to build the chapel of native stone and native sand, hauling to be done by the committee. The complete contract price was \$1056.00, except pulp and communion rail. Inside dimensions are 15x34 feet.

The name was provided by Mr. J. V. Tully who told H. S. Hunter, "St. Anne was my mother's patron saint. But this is really a memorial chapel to Bishop Howden, who first broached the idea and then carried it through to completion in this, the 20th year of his bishopric. We are truly glad that we now have both our chapel and our Bishop.

James V. Tully came to San Juan County, N. M., with his family in August 1879 and to Lincoln County in 1886. He was warden of St. Anne's Chapel until his death November 1936.

"The Church's One Foundation" is a hymn known to church people of many faiths and this famous old hymn was sung at the consecration services June 3, 1934. The Right Rev. F. B. Howden D.D. preached the sermon.

For the record — The Rev. Frederick Bingham Howden was Bishop of the Missionary District of New Mexico and Southwest Texas 1914-1940. His son, the Rev. Frederick Bingham

Howden, Jr., served as pastor of St. Anne's Chapel from 1929-1940. The Rev. Howden went to the Philippines with the New Mexico 200th Coast Artillery where his fine work as chaplain was noted by his commanding officer. On Bataan he stayed with his men to the last, partly because of his inheritance of splendid devotion to duty from his father, partly because of his own respect for the men with whom he had worked.

There have been glad times and there have been sad times in St. Anne's Chapel. A 1956 picture shows Edna Schlerenberg, Irene Noeker, Helen LaMay, Fred LaMay, Ora Tully, Barton Pavey, Mary Conder, Mary Margaret Pavey, Bette Perry, Elzy Perry, James Conder, Charles Conder and John Conder.

There was a time when the annual barbeque sponsored by the Episcopal Church with Wilbur Coe's famous orchestra providing the music for dancing was a big occasion in the Valley. (Continued on back page)

Grady Eldridge of Capitan is president of the Rifle & Pistol Association, and the man who got the range in condition for the shoot.

Match No. 10 was for the N. M. State championship and was won by David Dyck of Kirtland AFB with a score of 245-20v. Second was James H. McNeil of Ft. Sam Houston with 245-19v.

Winner of aggregate for the first day and the George T. Trimble trophy was W. C. Wolf

of Roswell with a score of 198-17v. Second was Sgt. Robert Powell of Ft. Sam Houston with 196-13v.

The four-man team championship was won by the Fourth Army Blue Team from Ft. Sam Houston, composed of Sgt. James H. McNeil, Sgt. Robert L. Powell, Sgt. Bernice L. Goodwin and Sgt. Clifton N. Bizale. Their total score was 967-65v.

The N. M. State champion team was the National Guard team of Hedgecoke, Penn, Jackson and Middleton. See picture. Their score was 962-67v.

Capt. Wade Hedgecoke and Lt. Emilio Pena won the two-man team trophy with score of 457-38v. In second place were McNeil and Bizale with score of 437-36v.

The high expert team included Tommy Gatewood of Hobbs and Tommy Akins of Farmington, their score was 480-26v.

The sharpshooter team included David Dyck and Edward Hinton of Albuquerque, score 460-30v. The marksman team included Ronnie Lee and W. B. Willbanks of White Sands with score of 459-27v.

Kaiser Cement and Gypsum Corp. has announced that it will construct a multi-million-dollar cement manufacturing plant at Scholle, 13 miles west of Mountainair. The plant will be located on a 1850-acre deposit of cement-limestone ore which was purchased by Kaiser in 1956.

The site is only a few feet from where Valencia, Socorro and Torrance counties come together. Construction is expected to be completed by the end of 1967.

Registration gets underway at 10:00 a.m. and the business meeting starts at 11:00 a.m.


A big part of this annual meeting is the free chuck wagon dinner catered by Jettons of Fort Worth which will be served at noon in the Estancia park.





Highway chiefs are kicking about dwindling funds for road construction

Santa Fe — Highway committee Chairman John Sudderth and other department chiefs have kicked recently about dwindling federal funds for road construction in the state.

Sudderth said contracts through May of this year totaled more than \$30 million, which he says is far less than what could have been if more federal money had been available.

Gov. Jack Campbell was asked last week if the state had any estimate on the future cost of the highway beautification legislation and he said he had no idea how much it would cost. It has been determined that there are some 12,000 billboards and 345 junkyards that will be a problem for the state to deal with.

It will take a few dollars for the state to comply with this situation, even at 75% matching funds from the federal government.

You won't get it from officials, but some sideline experts figure the state will have more trouble after January raising their part of the cash than the federal government.

For what it's worth, Sudderth said highway work in the near future would include completion of improvements on the Pecos-Cowles road in San Miguel. This, by wild coincidence, is the road to Gov. Campbell's cabin.

Admittedly, the Pecos-Cowles project is geared to help tourism. But there's been a village of people in Mora County who have tried for years to get an unimproved road paved. But with no success.

Audit Commission Gets New Assailant

I've had my share in picking on the new audit Commission, which has done little to the present except hold meetings. They've also appointed a Legislative Auditor, who is present State Auditor Alex Armijo.

But will all the ballyhoo, a sneaky legal brain explains that the office of elective auditor - Armijo - was not affected in the slightest.

Most voters were led to believe that voting down the recent Constitutional amendment was a move to avoid abolishing the office of elective auditor. It turns out the amendment

Mrs. Evans said she didn't want to get into "a verbal fight." Mrs. Bundy said she would get into anything to make a strong race. It may be a lively affair after all.

Strange Twist Develops In Race For Governor

There's a strange twist developing in the race for Governor. GOP candidate Dave Cargo has rostered a solid liberal record that will easily match that of Demo candidate Lusk.

If you'll note, there's been little battling in regard to issues because the two men both embrace essentially the same political ideas - from labor to liquor to the Justices of the Peace.

Any in-fighting in the future when the campaigns pick up apparently will have to deal with who can find the most discrepancies in political beliefs they both agree on. It's an odd way to win a ball game.

Cargo's record, incidentally, will make it hard for the Demos to say he'll be fighting a Democratic Legislature if he wins. Any predictable fights will be on Party labels, not proposed legislation.

"A page for independent thought"

First things first

With information floating around that Chevo is going to close his door and move to California we got the urge to make a count of unused business buildings in downtown Carrizozo. It goes like this:

Along 13th Street, the famous old original highway through town and "front street" for the railroad in its heyday — there is one business building we rated in good condition, two in fair condition and nine in poor (should be torn down) condition.

For the minority of our readers who do not know much history of the Lincoln County seat town, as the railroad went down in number of trains, crews stopping here, passengers carried, and local freight carried, much business was shifted to highway vehicles and business places along 13th street started a gradual movement to the highway.

Along 12th street, the street between the railroad and the highway, there are twelve unoccupied buildings in good condition three in fair condition and six in poor (tumbledown) condition. This is further evidence that business in Carrizozo has been gradually shifting from railroad to highway — the ma-

jority of unoccupied buildings on 12th could still be used but are not.

Memories of Zozo residents will not be stretched too much to recall when a lumber yard, television repair, bakery, car dealership, movie theatre, hotel, florist, liquor store, were going businesses on 12th street.

Along Central Avenue (highway 54) there is one good business building not occupied, one in fair shape, two burned out, and three antique places not being used.

Two side streets, "E" Ave. with two and Fourth Street with three unoccupied business places are counted in the total.

Carrizozo has at least 14 buildings in good enough condition to house a business of some kind. There are more than 20 buildings that would add much to the beauty, sanitation and attractiveness of the town if they were torn down.

The old railroad avenue, 13th Street looks as ghostly as Willard, and 12th Street doesn't look healthy at all. There is an answer and quite a few Zozo people could make a resolve to themselves — to be of as much assistance as possible to the industrial development group.

Carrizozo's one greatest need is more jobs for more people.

The second chapter

What would you say to a stranger should he ask, "How do you like your home town of Carrizozo? Do you like to work here, are the people friendly, is it a pleasant place to live? Is the water good, the climate to your liking? What do you think of the schools, is your pastor a good man, is juvenile delinquency a problem?"

Payton likes it here, thinks this the best town of all — even while pointing out things that ought to be changed, we think Carrizozo is an ideal place for people who prefer living in a

small rural community.

The question is — are you a booster or a griper?

When industry decides to move, even some 10-20 job type industries, they like to move to a town where the people are generally happy, willing to make progress, glad to have new people in town, where things are going along reasonably smooth.

You can be an honest booster, one who sees the bad as well as the good, but Carrizozo could use a corral full of boosters in the months and years ahead.
