Fatal accident near Riverside

Van D. Tidmore age 21, an Airman at Holloman AFB, and his wife Carolyn age 19 and four months pregnant, left Oklahama City about 9:00 a.m. the morning of August 7 driving back to Holloman.

At approximately 11:50 p.m. that evening their car ran off the right side of Highway U.S. 380 four miles west of Riverside in Lincoln County.

Tidmore suffered minor injuries. His wife was taken to Walker AFB Hospital where she died early the next morning.

Coach Laabs and two assistants, Darrell Pearcey and Ed Davis will handle the chores, each coach working all over the field.

The Grizzlies play Ruidoso there on September 2, then Vaughn, Capitan, Tatum, Corona, Cloudercroft, Dexter, Melrose and Hatch.

LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY... By Walter Henn



Old Pokey at Corona

Some structures become landmarks for the simple reason that they were built solid and the passing of time fails to destroy them... such as the Corona jail built of solid concrete in 1930 by Crystano Torrez on the east side of the tracks.

It sobered up a lot of drunks was the way Cleve Brown, longtime Corona mayor, put it.

Corona had its days of being a real lively town, especially

when a bean crop was in the making and population of the town was around 500. On the Saturday nights when there was a dance in the hall built by A. W. Colbough the Corona jail would do a lively business.

Colbough sold his dance place to Elwood Bond who ran it quite a spell, then later Lonnie Atkinson built a dance hall over his blacksmith shop.

This old jail withstood the uprising of most all prisoners.

but one time three wetbacks were in one of the cells and the Lincoln Co. sheriff was called to come get them. By the time he got there the three men had sprung and left.

Take a look over on the east side of the railroad tracks when you're in the Corona area. The jail will be there, unused for the past 20 years but still standing and liable to be there for years to come.

After Corona was incorporated three jail cells were built as part of the town hall. Since that time a lot of new things have been built, most recently a new school, before that a new postoffice, recreation hall, business places and some new houses.

Corona is right on the north Lincoln County line at the junction of U.S. 54 and Highway 42.

Jimmie Thornton seriously injured

Jimmie Thornton was coming toward Carrizozo on U.S. Highway 380 last Thursday evening when about 3 1/2 miles out of town the lights of an oncoming car blinded him causing him to lose control of his car. The car ran off the road on the right side then on the road, then off again on the right side, rolling over three times.

Everesto Baca of Carrizozo came upon the accident about 30 minutes later and reported it to State Policeman Frank Knoblock.

Jimmie is in the local hospital with severe bruises and chest injuries. His car, a 1961 Pontiac Tempest was a total wreck.

Artist making dream come true

As the popular song runs, "If you ain't got a dream, how you gonna make a dream come true?" When Walter Henn met Lincoln Town, it was love at first sight and a dream began to form. That was a dozen years ago, but the dream persisted, of a quiet life of painting and depicting the graphic history of Lincoln. Vacation after vacation in Lincoln County served only to confirm that dream.

During this time he was already established as the Art Director of a thriving advertising agency in Dallas, Texas. Soon after he became Production Manager Art Director for the Dallas branch of Grant, a large international agency headquartered in Chicago. He worked on such accounts as Dodge-Plymouth - Motors, Dr. Pepper and Comet Rice. He painted in his spare time, exhibited occasionally in local Dallas galleries, generated some nice write-ups, frequently sold paintings or drawings. For nearly eight

years before that, he had taught either full or part time at the Ed Young Art Center schools in Dallas, and lead a busy, happy life in general. But then Walt had always been a happy, easy-going individual. One of those lucky persons who had always known what he wanted to do, and luckier still, could do it.

He was born in Rochester, New York in 1916. His first art training was at Rochester Art-henaeum and Mechanics Institute - now the Rochester Institute of Technology - and he studied under instructors as Clifford Uip and Ralph Avery. Then came five years in the army during World War II; the last year spent as an art instructor in the Army Air Force Rehabilitation Center in Santa Ana, California. During that time he exhibited in an army group at the Cabildo in San Francisco and his entry, an oil portrait "The general" was sold to a major. In march 1945 he

met Nora Johnson of Dallas and they were married in June. Discharged from the army in November 1945, first Rochester and then Dallas became home.

The dream finally came true in July of last year when Lincoln became home. The Henns bought the old Baca house and restored it with great taste and charm. Here they will live and help establish a center of interest in all arts. Walter will continue to paint, make a few advanced pupis and he and Nora will open a small art gallery in an attractive L-shaped room. Here the visitor can browse, gossip about art in general and perhaps purchase one of Walter's drawings or paintings. It is a well-deserved gesture that his first local exhibition will be held in the Old Courthouse Museum. A group of ink and wash drawings, it is entitled "A Walking Tour of Old Lincoln" and will open on August 14th and continue for three weeks. (Continued on back page)



FARM NEWS

Lincoln County 4-H members won five blue ribbons and five red ribbons at the State 4-H contest held last week at New Mexico State University. The livestock judging team, composed of Pete Gnatkowski, Joe Cooper, Tom Straley and Dan Knight won a blue ribbon. Jud Cooper won a blue ribbon with his speech, "The Challenge to Agriculture." Jane Dean won a red ribbon on her party dress, and the range plant identification team composed of Bill Hightower, Scott Shafer and Randy Kirkpatrick won a red ribbon. Arturo Pacheco won a red ribbon on his demonstration, "The Automated Orchard."

Reports of fall contracts for fall delivery of cattle are beginning to start. Last week some prime 350-425 lb. calves sold for \$30.00 for the steers and \$27.00 for the heifers. Some 650 lb. steers sold for \$25.00. In the west Texas, choice 650 lb. steers contracted for \$26.00.

Ed Foreman, Las Cruces businessman and former Congressman from Texas, told New Mexico 4-H delegates here that for every right they enjoy they have a responsibility.

Speaking at the 42nd annual 4-H Conference of the New Mexico State University campus, Foreman said, "You can't vote yourself equal results, you must earn them. You can't vote yourself equal equality, you must earn it."

"We have an obligation to ourselves, an obligation to distinguish the difference between rights and responsibilities. We have an obligation to ourselves and to others, especially to our young people, to fully understand and appreciate the meaning of self-reliance, individual responsibility and in the miracle of the free market, personal property, and limited government principles."

"If America ever falls, it will not be because the world has developed a hydrogen bomb, it will be because we have developed a false philosophy, a philosophy that says the individual is no longer economically responsible for his own welfare, or morally responsible for his own conduct," he concluded.

Otero County Electric Cooperative will soon run power up Bonito Canyon

REA Line will soon go up the Bonito Canyon. For five years this rural area has needed electricity and deposits were made by real estate owners.

The snag has been that the city of Alamogordo does not want more people on the watershed, but they traded land to the U. S. 



It might seem that Lincoln County would not particularly care to have a nursing home in Carrizozo. Such an institution would cost money to build, either county or federal and maybe some state money.

However, after people first consider the proposition, and maybe look beyond their immediate needs of the day they might figure out that: 1) A nursing home in Carrizozo would bolster up a county institution (the local municipal

hospital) in a way that is much needed. 2) A nursing home in Carrizozo would insure continued doctor care in an area more than 100 miles across. 3) A nursing home would put the local county hospital in a position to program for medicare, like it or not, such a program is going to become necessary.

There are other minor reasons for a nursing home in Carrizozo. The three factors cited above would benefit the entire county.

\$75,000 offered

in open livestock

ALBUQUERQUE — Premium offerings totaling almost \$72,000 in the seven open livestock departments at the 1966 New Mexico State Fair are the highest ever in the fair's history, Fair Manager Finley Mac Gillivray announced.

Total premiums offered surpass even last year's record of \$68,791 — a near \$6,000 boost over 1964 due to the National Hereford Register of Merit Show held here. The offering this year is \$71,976, more than \$3,000 above last year's record high, Mr. MacGillivray said.

A big boost in total premiums this year comes from the American Dairy Goat Association sponsoring the National Dairy Goat Show during the 11-day New Mexico State Fair. As a result, premiums amounting to \$5,000 are being offered in the dairy goat competition this year.

Premium offerings of \$27,960 in the open dairy cattle class have been boosted by a new \$500 premium for the best herd in each of the six breeds in competition.

A new breed of cattle — the Brangus — will be in competition this year, bringing beef cattle premiums to a record high of \$21,646.

Open sheep classes this year will be competing for \$7,698, up \$450 over last year.

Entries in the swine department are being offered \$8510, the same as last year. Angora goats premiums remain at \$672 and premiums in the wool department are the same as last year — \$490.

Deadline for filing entries in all livestock departments for the 1966 State Fair is Thursday, August 18.

The 1966 State Fair, billed as "The Biggest Show in New Mexico," will be held in Albuquerque September 15-25.

ern end of the little town, was known as the "Big Store" when L. G. Murphy operated it. He had it built in 1874, and it served the southeastern portion of the state as a general merchandise store and center of trade. Murphy went bankrupt as a result of his involvement in the Lincoln County War, and so Lincoln County acquired the store for \$15,000, turning it into the county courthouse in 1880. It was the center of activity for thirty-three years, until 1913, when the county seat was moved to Carrizozo. For a while after that the building was used for classes and the former courtroom saw many activities as an auditorium. In 1937, the State of New Mexico decided that the job of restoring the old courthouse as a museum should be undertaken, and this was begun under the direction of J.W. Hendron, under the auspices of the Museum of New Mexico and School of American Research. The Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission was created to administer the building in 1949, and has since done much to restore other buildings of historical significance in the town.

When Lincoln Town became the county seat of so large a county, it became the focus of Lincoln County activities. The many visitors to Lincoln usually stayed at the Wortley Hotel, known as the La Fonda originally, and built in 1872. L.G. Murphy first operated the hotel, and it became known as "Murphy's Mess". Later, it was known as the Wortley, taking its name from the cook, whose name was Sam Wortley. At the Wortley stayed the lawyers, judges, and others who had business at the county seat, and almost everyone, did on occasion. In 1934, the hotel burned, and so in 1960, the present building, which is a near replica of the old hotel, was built, and continues to furnish the traveler with an old fashioned atmosphere as well as excellent home cooked meals which are served family style. The bedrooms and other rooms in the Wortley are finished with antiques, and only the kitchen is quite modern. A fireplace in each bedroom helps to emphasize the warm, friendly atmosphere which one feels at the Wortley; and which in fact prevails all over this scenic little town.

West of the Wortley is the La Paloma Saloon and Museum, which is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Ramon Maes. They have collected quite an extensive display of antiques in their museum which is just behind the old saloon. The saloon itself is interesting, being furnished with an old player piano, a nickelodeon, and other objects commonly found in the old saloons. In the yard behind the La Paloma, the Maes have a collection of old wagons, farm equipment, and cars from another era. A scaffold, similar to the one which formerly stood behind the courthouse across the road, has been built to intrigue the visitors, who may never have seen one before. Mr. and Mrs. Maes are descendants of early settlers in Lincoln County, and Mrs. Maes' mother owned the old Montana store building for many years.

The old courthouse Museum across the street from the La Paloma and located at the west-

original appearance are too numerous to relate here. However when this had been done, the historical monument was painted in a more sedate brown with white trim, rather than the original red barn paint.

The museum abounds in historical objects, and the wide gamut from women's both plain and elaborate dress to cap and ball muskets and muzzle loading double barreled percussion rifles, gives the visitor a good idea of life in the West during the last century. The tools and other articles of that area illustrate most graphically the day to day living in the last century and before.

The old vault is still part of the old museum, and the safe of the "Big Store" is on display. In addition to these relics, there is much to be found of interest to the persons who have been fascinated by the Lincoln County War and its principles. There are portraits of many of the leading characters of the war, such as Murphy Dolan, Riley, Tunstall, and McSweeney, and the stories which accompany them. Letters from Governor Lew Wallace to the "Kid", and from the "Kid" to Wallace, are on display. In other rooms are to be found muskets, rifles, charcoal Indians artifacts, a Sharps Breach Loading rifle, Model 1869; and many other items typical of frontier life, such as the clothes which the women of that period wore.

Recently, enough memorabilia has been collected to create a Governor McDonald room in the museum. Williams C. McDonald was an able governor, and the first governor after New Mexico became a state. He was quite prominent in Lincoln County both before and after his five year term as governor.

A pioneer room has also recently been added to the collection at the museum and is furnished with lovely old furniture of the last century. Such rooms always help us to visualize more truly life as it was then.

Directly across the road from the Tunstall - McSweeney Building is located the old Dolan home, which was built in 1888 by J. J. Dolan, a partner of L. G. Murphy during the Lincoln County War. The Dolan home was constructed by two prominent men of Lincoln, Eugene W. Dow and "Dad" Peppin, who were a carpenter and a mason respectively. The Dolan home was later known as the Bonito Inn, and was used as an inn for many years. It is now the home of Lincoln County Representative and Mrs. W. G. Shrecengost, who have done much to restore the old place.


A little farther west of the old Dolan home is a little white trimmed community church. This building was the first formal school in Lincoln, and was
