## Both Demo Gene Lusk and GOP Cargo have said they won't go to Washington

**SANTA FE** — I wrote recently that some young Democrats were upset because U.S. Sen. Clint Anderson is going to take another term in office without really expecting to fill it out. The idea was that some Demos figured Our Clint could have groomed a younger man to beat GOP candidate Andy Carter rather than gambling on a Republican administration. Any incumbent Governor appoints a replacement for a retiring U.S. Senator. The critical remarks aimed at me were based on what past Governors had done in similar circumstances — they appointed themselves. There's some merit to the

speculation, but consider that both Demo candidate Gene Lusk and GOP Dave Cargo have vowed publicly that they won't go to Washington. I'll grant that political promises are soon forgotten, but with the expected heat of the current campaign, this is one promise that will haunt either candidate if they decide to change their minds. You have to realize that Anderson figured a ticket headed by Lusk would be a dead cinch and there would be no worry about arranging for a replacement. It's still true that Lusk may sweep right on in to the Governor's chair, but Cargo has been a real bee in the bonnet

and the shades of doubt are becoming more obvious. If Clint is forced to retire for health reasons, especially in wake of a potential Republican victory, the dissent will no longer be of a semi-silent nature. It may become downright nasty. And the one man most likely to be resentful from a legitimate standpoint will be House Speaker Bruce King. King was bumped from the Governor's race through the high command of Clint, and lost considerable prestige, exposure, and general public notice. So I'll stick to the idea that the Demos may have made a tactical blunder in not allowing some younger member of the ranks to face Andy Carter in a legitimate race for a six-year stint. **What, After All Has Been Happening** In regard to the surprise showing of popularity that Dave Cargo has garnered, you might

ask: what, after all, has been happening to the Demos. Demo Lieutenant Governor candidate Fabian Chavez still maintains that it's been too early a hustle. He says that Lusk will come on strong in the near future and it'll be a brilliant Demo victory. Some disappointed top Democrats, however, have figured that Gene has been too silent and possibly for too long. Fabian, with his ego in full bloom, has carried the bulk of the campaign. This may be well enough, but there's the uneasy feeling that you can't let the second man carry the ball too long and maintain full confidence in the first man. **School Issue Likely To Become Big Topic** Several issues involving New Mexico's schools may become major topics during the Governor's campaign as it progresses. Thus far Lusk and Chavez have spanned the gap by simply declaring a broad support for education. But the New Mexico Education Association is in the process of stirring-up things regarding appropriations for textbooks. They figure the current per-student amount of \$5.80 is low and it's putting the pressure on individual districts to make up the amount. If candidates pledge money for a realistic figure on outfitting kids with texts, than there'll be added problems. First is deciding where the money will come from. New Mexico is pouring out a mammoth amount of the budget on education and any considerable increase will be similar to the blood and the turnip situation. Secondly, when money is appropriated, districts have tended to pump it into teacher pay raises. It's hard to argue against the raises, but it'll be harder to raise the money needed for both students and teachers. The NMEA wants to jump from \$5.80 per student to \$10.00. So if you double the money now being spent, you'll get an idea of the problem involved.

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



## Motivation

The News editor likes all kinds of people for various reasons. Some honest - to John skunks have been good friends, people who work and don't work, people who move forward and some who never move, we count as friends. What motivates people is an interesting subject.

Our high school coach (deceased for several years) was a dandy, not smart but exceptionally aggressive and young enough to physically prove his point. This big bruiser (heavy-weight wrestling champ for three states) shed real tears at the half of a game his team was behind 13-0. We won 26-13 and went on to an undefeated season, only lost one game in two years. Those tears sort of impressed his boys.

Knew a high school music teacher whose personal life was terrible but who had a way of getting the youngsters to sing as a group far beyond their individual ability and far beyond the performance of any other singing groups in the state. He was mean and ornery in a nice way, they did it his way or he threw something at them - but he always came up with a big winner.

We taught in one little Kansas school where football teams always won and did the first year we taught there (eight of those big boys made up the finest singing double quartet in the area). Coach was named Norval Neve, just a no-no player in college, but he knew how to get twice as much out of youngsters as any of the big playing stars. Neve went on through three more high schools always winning, and into college. The coach that followed him at the small Kansas school

had tough luck, his team only scored six points during the season.

Bear Bryant, coach of national champion Alabama team, has some good reading in Sports Illustrated, goes like this, "The greatest technicians I've known weren't always the toughest guys to beat. If you can't get your boys to play any more than 80% of his ability on Saturday, a guy that gets it done will beat you every time."

Bryant sizes up the pros for motivation like this, "Like I tell my kids you watch, and by the middle of the season the contenders are still in, there hitting, but other teams just push and shove and rub bellies."

If room teachers had some way (a few do) of getting their students motivated to the point they thought they had to beat those Tigers at using good English or Spanish, then New Mexico would have students much better qualified to take care of themselves after their football days are over.

Motivation makes the world go as well as the football team or chorus. There is no motivation in a handout from Uncle Sam. Hardly a town will sweat out its own civic problems when they can get Uncle Sam to take over. Hardly a state will take care of its own as long as Federal money is available.

Add motivation to your list of important forces in this world if you haven't already done so. In your personal life, in your relations with other people - the desire to perform well, maybe a little better than you, thought you possibly could, is one of the characteristics that has made America the great country it is.

If you want to see a newspaper printed, using methods at least 100 years old better come visit the News any Wednesday around 5:00 p.m. when our press, folder, miler, and probably line casting machine will be in operation. The new methods we expect to adopt in coming months will not be nearly so fascinating to watch.

The August 1966 New Mexico Business (Vol. 19, No. 8) is devoted entirely to "The Cattleman's future: the view from the barn" by Gaylord Freeman, Jr., vice chairman of the board First National Bank of Chicago and owner of the G Bar F Ranch in Lincoln County. We recommend this article to all Lincoln County livestock people - as a piece you can spend the winter digesting.

The following paragraph is from the Freeman article. "The years immediately ahead may not be our most prosperous. Despite an increased demand for beef, our ranch income may be depressed to keep up with increased costs. But the time will come, now some years away (but not too many), when much of our eastern competition will disappear; then our prices should become more realistic. And I believe that they will then continue that way for decades."

The News editor was out viewing ranch country all day Sunday, not to write up a feature on economics but talking with Frances Lovelace we learned something that fits right in with Freeman's writing. The Lovelace Livestock Co. used to have as many as 100 hired hands helping with the sheep and cattle. Fencing their pastures out the need for hands right down to the nubbin. Frances said that they had a 100% lamb crop this year, fences keep coyotes out, and good moisture has helped. They've seen times up in Jicarilla Country when half their lamb crop would die for lack of water.

Consider for a moment the amount of groceries needed when ranchers of the county employed help in the same proportion to the Lovelace operation and you will soon figure out how come the Corona Trading Co. and other early-day stores were thriving concerns.

Eleanor Payton had been to the Lovelace ranch prior to our trip Sunday. This is how you get there - first drive to An-

cho, then up the Jicarilla Road to the Barney Wilson place where Mrs. Wilson will tell you to go back and take a right on the other side of the tracks. Continue on to the next track crossing and stop in where Geo. Lightfoot lives and he'll tell you you were headed in the wrong direction, go back to the fork and take another right. On up to the next track crossing and take the main road to the right until you pass Jim Miller and his milk truck. Jim will tell you that you took the wrong fork. You might say such a trail is the long way around, but it does lead to the W. R. Lovelace Ranch.

The main business after arrival there will be pictured better in the News next week we hope. In an airplane with Holt as pilot (the rides one of those things exactly like a cowboy on a bronc) we covered a lot of acreage where bow and arrow hunters were hunting, taking pictures on the fly.

Holt uses this plane, equipped with big balloon tires for landing anywhere, to check cattle. Way he does it is fly down low enough to count teats on cow's udder, add 'em all up and divide by four. To count bulls you divide by two.

Gnat Gnatkowski was ready and waiting when we walked in the door. Pate and Gnat always have fine arguments but this time last Sunday night Gnat had been too busy with his house to come to town and was saving up his reappraisal thoughts, fact is he had them all ready. Like - how do you appraise a well, what is a fence worth, how will an appraiser know the worth of a three-wire barb fence and fence with apron. Good questions for sure. We told Gnat our feeling at present was that he was a very lucky guy (hope we don't have to eat those words), one who has been paying his full share of taxes and now he's going to get help from people who have not been carrying their share of the load. Max, Bob and Joe are not going to quit until the job is done right - we think.

Gnat and Janice have their home close to completion. So many unusual features of this new home, couldn't begin to tell all. Only place we've seen where Walt Henn's sketches of Lincoln County landmarks should be put on display. Maybe by this time next year something like a Gnatkowski open-house and art showing of Gnatkowski's work as well as Henn's could be arranged.

ORDINANCE 92-A  
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 3 OF ORDINANCE #92 CREATING A CARRIZOZO RECREATION

PROGRAM AND A CARRIZOZO RECREATION BOARD AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO, that Section 3 of Ordinance #92 creating a Carrizozo Recreation Program and a Carrizozo Recreation Board and providing for penalties thereof shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. The Recreation Board shall establish and operate the Carrizozo Recreation Program and shall have control and management thereof including the powers to:

(a) receive gifts, bequests and donations of all kinds.  
(b) make by-laws, rules and regulations for the operation of said Recreation Program not in conflict with other ordinances of the Town of Carrizozo.  
(c) Approve all purchases necessary to the upkeep and development of the program, but with the definite understanding that no expenditures may be made excepting with the approval of the Board; and to sign and execute all necessary contracts and agreements necessary to the carrying out and development of the program, but with the strict understanding that the Recreation Board may not obligate the Town of Carrizozo beyond the amount budgeted for the Board's operation.
