An itinerant traveler who decided to take a train at El Paso and head for Kansas got as far as Carrizozo Tuesday night when he received a severe and sudden fall from mother nature which had to be answered immediately.

The traveler's name was Chas. Foster. Mr. Foster was equipped with a fifth of wine which may have prompted the message. Anyway, he got up to go to the bathroom giving little thought to his whereabouts. The next thing Foster knew he was coming out of a deep fog in Carrizozo Hospital. He had mistakenly taken a railroad boxcar door for a bathroom door and stepped out into outer space — at least it might as well have been for all Foster knew — the re-entry was hard.

It knocked the wine out cold. Train crewmen who were around at the time figured the traveler would have gone when he got the call even though the train might have been highballing 70 miles per hour.

Station helper Owen Simpson called the law at 6:15 p.m. to come pick up the body. State Police Sgt. Melvin West and Town Marshal Choncho Morales responded and when they arrived they thought the body was ready for measurement. However, they did the safe thing and took Foster to the hospital where he finally came around.

His final destination, not the one on ticket he didn't buy at El Paso was Lincoln County jail, a nice new cell, where he is today.

Report shows some rural schools suffering

SANTA FE — A report to the New Mexico Legislature from Harry Wugalter, chief of public school finance, last week showed some of the state's rural school systems still are suffering in spite of the state's new hot school money distribution plan.

Funds totaling \$328,112 had to be scattered throughout the state to systems in addition to the regular money. Among the schools receiving the money were several rural systems:

La Joya, Roswell, Deming, Clouderoft, Dora, Portales, Maxwell, Taos and Questa.

When the Legislature met last year a new cure-all formula was developed. Stubborn State Sen. Albert Greer, D-San Juan, pushed through a plan to compensate schools for extra money they had to pay out for experienced and highly educated teachers.

But what was left out of the measure was a point that has been left out for years — enforcement of the rules laid down by the legislature to return of the old system of letting the schools run their own business.

The problems will continue to exist with school money as long as the state attempts to control it. There exist broad loopholes for wacky superintendents to duck through, and in most cases school boards are doing the same thing.

Take for instance the La Joya school district. In May, Wugalter doled out \$20,068 in a grant of extra aid money. It was to have been on a one-time only basis to clear up shortages.

Behind the shortage was the fact the system couldn't provide the prescribed educational standards without extra money. Who sets the standards? The state education board.

But the fact is the state board sets standards with absolutely no knowledge of what costs might be entitled to forment them. La Joya, stepping out with the excuse it has to follow orders from the state board, just plain overspent last year. But why not? The state will pick up the tab.

It's a wonder other schools haven't caught onto this system. All any school has to do is overspend, site standards set down by the education board and then collect the money.

The education board, meanwhile, continues to listen to its education department officials, men and women who are oriented toward money spending as the only cure-all for educational problems in the state.

Perhaps the Education Board has been setting standards too

high for money. It's fine to set high goals, but absolute standards for some areas of New Mexico are impossible to meet unless the state doles out extra funds.

Then there's Dora. This district received \$9,000 on a one-time basis to cover a drop in the assessed valuation of oil and gas production in the area.

But the district should be sound a year from now, Wugalter told the Legislature. Some lawmakers questioned whether or not Dora school officials anticipated anything ahead of time.

It was another case of a school district setting up a budget without apparent checking but without a worry in the world because it knew the state would come through with extra money in case of a shortage.

With Wugalter outvoted 2-1 at all school budget hearings throughout the state, it's a strange thing more systems haven't set up outlandish budgets for coming years.

The legislature, meanwhile, with all its attempts to solve the formula problem, must some day open its eyes to the real situation — that school systems in this state are operated by people.

These people, historically, will attempt to wrangle every dime into their classrooms. It's a power struggle with children in the middle, an unfortunate situation.

Four SCS districts will make award

Roswell banks are making final plans for this year's annual Bankers Award Banquet, to be held on October 3rd, 7:00 P.M., at the Masonic Temple, in Roswell.

This is the 15th year that the banks and the Roswell, Macho, and Hagerman - Dexter Districts have collaborated to honor farmers or ranchers in each District for outstanding conservation work. Announcement of winners is usually withheld until the banquet, at which time they are presented plaques by the banks. Awardees are selected by their respective Districts.

Invitation will be in the mail shortly, and farm and ranch owners and operators who do not receive an invitation are asked to check with the Macho Soil Conservation District Office, 1009 S. Atkinson, Roswell, 622-3100, as it is possible they do not have all the addresses.

No budget problems in Corona, Zozo schools

At the time when three Lincoln County schools — Capitan, Ruidoso, Hondo — are down in enrollment to a hurting point, the other two county schools — Carrizozo and Corona — are up in good shape with no budget problems.

Ruidoso is down nearly 100 students and expecting state aid to be cut some \$34,000. Much of this loss is due to Tularosa building new school and Indian students shifting in that direction.

Duane Darling, Capitan superintendent, said his enrollment was down about 30 students, and his school will have some loss of state aid but not so severe they can't cope with the problem this year. Picture may be worse for next year.

Bill Hall said he had been beating Pat Casey and Lewis Stratton on the head all week to get them to call (Casey had), also that his school was doing fine, down about five in enrollment, but nothing to worry about. He had just talked to Harry Wugalter, no budget problems at all, Corona budget will cover operations, could even pick up a little money percentage-wise.

Supt. Hall said the safe-harvest factor is not going to let any school get hurt this year, but unless something happens Capitan and Ruidoso could be hurt next year.

Transwestern is building a new installation in the Corona school district. This will add two families by first of year

and more to come, as well as helping the district evaluation.

On request of Corona school the Department of Education survey team visited the new school last week and were very complimentary in their remarks, everything is real fine — "We still have the best school in the state," quote Supt. Bill Hall.

Carrizozo school has a problem of another kind, what to do about an enrollment that is way up when basically the district is a good Class C.

The Board of Education budgeted on an estimated membership of 364, thought to be conservative. The membership is now 387, and should settle out at 380.

Carrizozo's problem is whether or not to move into Class B football. The Afergae Daily

Attendance last year was 154 now the membership is 180, absenteeism runs about 6.7 percent and ADA is up in the Class B bracket.

Past records indicate that Carrizozo school will not continue with over 150 students in high school, but the Zozo Grizzlies cannot compete in Class C next year.

What to do is the question. Carrizozo could compete as an independent for one year. Class 1B and 2B both have seven teams and are growing, no room to get in there.

Class 4B has Jal, Eunice, which consistently beats Class A teams, plus Clayton and Fort Sumner, both larger towns. Carrizozo will not move into 4B.

Presiliano Pino will receive award for outstanding conservation work

The New Mexico Bankers Association and the Citizens State Bank will join with the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District on Thursday evening, September 23, 1966 to make their annual bankers award for outstanding work in the field of soil and water conservation.

The Award for 1966 will be presented to Presiliano Pino who ranches east of Carrizozo approximately six miles and has for many years promoted and put into effect soil and water conservation practices to improve his range and keep it intact for future generations.

Mr. Ted Bonnell, President of the Citizens State Bank and of the Security Bank and Trust in Alamogordo, also President of New Mexico Bankers Association in 1966, will be present to make the presentation. The Women's Club will serve the banquet in their clubhouse and a program has been planned for afterwards.

The Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District was formed

in 1945 and the original members were Walton B. Wilson, Bob Withers, Claud Brannum, Harry Straley and Marshall Atkinson. The present members are Lee Straley, Bill Stephenson, Walton Wilson, W. W. Gallacher Jr., and Johnson Stearns. Howard Harkey is the Soil District Conservationist and Randall Greer operates the equipment.

The Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District has 80 operating units and of these 55 are cooperators with plans for improvements on their ranches. During the past year 80,000 feet of pipe line has been installed on these ranches, ten tanks constructed, 13,500 acres of brush and cactus cleared. This year eleven new cooperator units work and encourages ranchers and farmers to take advantage of the technical aid and equipment to keep their ranches moving forward and being good stewards of the soil.





The Cardinals go to Cloudcroft this week for a Saturday game, September 24, according to our schedule. They must win this week to stay alive in the conference.





Woman's Club and Rotarians enjoy picnic in Valley of Fires State Park

The Carrizozo Woman's Club and the Carrizozo Rotary Club enjoyed a picnic luncheon last Thursday at the Valley of Fires State Park.

Mr. James L. Dillard of Santa Fe, assistant director, State Park and Recreation Commission, talked after the luncheon. He said that there had been more than 37,683 visitors at the park since it had opened last May. He was well pleased with the ways things were shaping up there. However he said that revenue from overnight campers had amounted to only a little over \$263.50 and that since future expenditures at the park were based on revenue from it, it was important that the Chamber of Commerce, civic clubs, etc., publicize the park and its facilities in order to attract more overnight visitors. However, he assured his audience that interest in the park would grow as people found out about it.

"Funds invested in our State Parks have proved to be money well spent," Mr. Dillard said, "for the parks are making a considerable and growing contribution to the local, regional and state economy. Furthermore, in constantly increasing

numbers New Mexico residents and out-of-state visitors alike are enjoying the recreational opportunities these parks provide. Not only does the State Park and Recreation Commission strive to provide satisfactory service to the public by developing additional state parks to a greater extent in response to the heavy demands upon them and those demands are anticipated, or determined by the annual attendance and revenues derived from visitations, overnight camping, concession operations and other activities, which in turn justify future planning for any particular park."

"As of now Valley of Fires State Park has opened being open to the public for approximately 4 months. To this date there has been fairly healthy use of the park by visitors, however the revenues derived from overnight camping is way off in comparison to other state parks of the same category, consequently the State Park and Recreation Commission is not in a position to plan any substantial future developments for Valley of Fires State Park until it demonstrates more justification."

EDITORIAL

"A page for independent thought"

At least 50 years of ignorance

What can be said that is good about a state department that mishandles its affairs to the point that it achieves less than 50 percent efficiency. We'd call such a department a total failure — meaning New Mexico's Department of Education.

The proof is in young men who are drafted, go up for mental examinations and more than half fail this test. Some boys scoring as low as 1 out of a possible 100.

Passing grade was 16, recently lowered to 13 and still the failure ratio is bad enough as to be a state disgrace.

We lay this blame on people who direct the Department of Education. Our schools are largely state supported, the fact that a large portion of the money spent on education is wasted is the fault of people like Leonard DeLayo, superintendent of public instruction, and others who have preceded him in this important office.

The heads of universities in New Mexico should know the

condition of education in New Mexico. Why have they been so lax, except maybe they have a narrow world confined to campus acres with little concern about state pride or welfare?

A state board of education includes eleven elected officials whose tenure in office will be short enough it would be a small miracle if they had much influence on education in New Mexico.

Local superintendents may have good ideas about education, maybe not, but they have little room to maneuver under state guidance and less room to brag about results when a large portion of their students cannot even read fluently.

There is no reason to spend more money trying to pass more boys through a simple armed forces examination. People presently guiding education in this state had best back up and take a hard look at what they are now getting for money spent — both tax payers and parents are being short-changed.

Calling signals on a town

It's just as hard to call the right play to make a town progress, as it was for those two quarterbacks calling signals for the Captain Tigers and New Mexico Lobos. Both had teams out in front of them, ready and eager to go, and even though they called many plays that went nowhere, they both hit on a couple that were winners.

We've never seen a college team display more "desire" than the Lobos did last Saturday against Utah State. We've seen high schools display "desire" but the Captain Tigers were right up among the top in our book. Both teams wanted to move.

Thing about small towns on the down trend is that their people have lost "desire," and a "don't bother me" attitude has set in. They won't risk playing the game of life, even when the odds of making a TD are stacked in their favor.

Lots of fine old timers around who love to talk about the days when there were big parties at the country club, lots of farming in the area, much local trade, the town open for the popular kinds of sin, and those

were really good old days. But what about the 1960's when young people move out to find jobs, leaving only the old-timers and their dreams to call the signals.

Winning football teams don't want many 35-year-olds around. How can an assortment of 40 to 80-year-olds make up a winning team? They can, but it isn't easy. That force known as "desire" has to set in strong. An eager QB is necessary, and a squad willing to accept any amount of gain as progress toward whatever goal has been set.

Calling signals on a town is much the same as quarterbacking the Tigers or the Lobos — how many would like to play on the home team.

Widely-circulated magazine is changing its name

SANTA FE — One of New Mexico's most widely-circulated publications is changing its name and taking on a new look. "New Mexico Electric News," starting with its September issue, will become "Enchantment, New Mexico's Family Magazine." The publication has also made arrangements with printers for more pages of color printing throughout the magazine.

"The change in the name is being made to more adequately describe the function of the magazine," said Carl M. Turner, Executive Manager of New Mexico Rural Electrification Cooperative Assn., the publishing organization.

The magazine goes monthly to some 45,000 families using electricity furnished by rural Mexico. The NMRECA is the trade association of the electric cooperatives.

Publication of the magazine was suspended with the June issue to complete arrangements for the change.

The publication was started 16 years ago as the "Southwest REA News" and was published by the Central Valley Electric Cooperative, Artesia. The tabloid newspaper was distributed to other cooperatives on a subscription basis. Central Valley changed the name to "New Mexico Electric News" shortly before turning the publication over to NMRECA when it established an office in Santa Fe. The publication was changed to a "slick" magazine at that time.

Turner said the old name did not adequately fit the magazine. The objective as present is to have a publication of general, family interest and will include articles for all members of the family.

The September issue will have stories of general interest. Included in this issue is a story on

Fort Sumner and the efforts of the town to restore the old installation. An interview with Rep. John Mershon from Otero County giving his view of re-appointment. Mr. Mershon's theory is that the rural areas

will be gaining more power instead of losing representation.

George Fitzpatrick has an article on the large recreational development, "Angel Fire," in Colfax County.

Editor of the magazine is Jim Colegrove. Associate Editor is Mrs. Louise Berry.
