Theft of purse leads to runaways

Tuesday when Mrs. Edna Littleton was washing her car she noticed that two strange boys watching her from a distance but went on with her work and forgot about them. On returning from the house later she found that her purse which she had left in the car had been rifled and a pocketbook containing \$52.00 was missing.

On reporting it to the police a search was started and after an all night and early morning search two boys, who were later identified as escapees from Sierra Blanca Boys Camp were located in a vacant house west of the school owned by Ernest Keyes. Although the boys had no money when they left camp they had been in several stores in Carrizozo buying ice cream and other food. They had no money on them when arrested.

They were charged with the theft of the purse, breaking and entering, and running away from camp.

Sheriff Leandro Vega wishes to express his appreciation for the cooperation of Carrizozo citizens who helped by their interest and information in apprehending the boys. Without their help the job would have been much more difficult.

BURGLARY AT GAMBLE'S LAST SATURDAY NIGHT

Thieves gained entrance to the Gamble Store Saturday night and took pistols, rifle, radios, and other items valued at approximately \$600.00.

The burglary is under investigation by the sheriff's office, state police and city police, but at the time the News went to press no arrests had been made.

A late model, 1964 or 1965, white Plymouth was seen parked across the street from the Gamble store, in front of Carrizozo Hardware at 7 p.m. Saturday evening and the same car was seen at 2 or 2:30 a.m. Sunday morning parked in front of the welfare office. Two young persons, one much shorter than the other and wearing a light color short sleeved shirt were seen coming from the vicinity of the Gamble store after dark Saturday night carrying a new tire. They crossed the street and went in the entrance to the apartments above the Carrizozo Hardware.

Anyone having seen a car of this description or persons answering this description is asked to contact the sheriff's office.

Pekney C. McKesson was returned from the penitentiary for violation of probation. His hearing will be October 10 in District Court.

Two runaways from Sierra Blanca last Saturday, Ray Gallegos and Frank Galvan were apprehended. Two more are still out.

Capitan School completed its new library, building late in the summer at a cost of \$19,000 to the school district. Mrs. A. N. Spencer added \$10,000 which money is being used to equip the library with carpeting, bookcases, electronic aids, furniture, file cabinets and many books.

The library is unusually well equipped with teaching aids. There are individual booths where students equipped with

headphone sets, record players, records, for study of language and reading. There are film strip machines, and stereo hi-fi, tape recorders, and tapes to round out a complete facility.

The library is stocked with 75 volumes for each child in the Capitan school, or about 7,500 books. It is kept open Monday and Wednesday nights from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. for use by the community as well as students. Plans are to have the library

open three days a week in the summer.

Capitan school got a nice break on purchase of band instruments. Title I money amounting to \$1,530 was budgeted and bid was very favorable so the school purchased 12 instead of 8 instruments, getting an oboe, two clarinets and flute.

In addition, Mrs. Spencer is buying the school a set of drums four snares, tenor and bass to


match the new uniforms, which makes a total of 18 new instruments acquired by the school this year.

Future plans include an open-house when school patrons may view the library, and other new additions at Capitan school. Date will be announced later.

Dr. Bonner Crawford, professor at University of New Mexico, also state representative for the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges accrediting agency, was a recent business visitor at Capitan School. He met with the school board, administration and faculty in helping set up guide lines for current self-evaluation program being carried out by the school.

The program is designed to show where the over-all program may be strengthened. In February 1967 a team of ten educators will visit Capitan school, spend several days there working as a team to make recommendations for future programming.

This self-evaluation was started last year.

LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY . . . By Walter Henn



Goat Camp in the Mal Pais

This land mark is not so accessible now as it was in the days when Orville Smith who worked for the sanitary board had around 1500 head of Angora goats in the Mal Pais and an old fellow for herder, living in the rock house about a mile out in the black rock.

There was a road in those days that could be traveled by wagon and later by pickup truck, which road still exists but is now too rough for any type vehicle.

The old fellow according to Lester Greer whose brother later had the place, once shot himself in the head accidentally with a blackpowder gun but he survived. Lester said they made 'em tough in those days. Another source of information about the goat camp is

Truman Spencer whose folks were here before the camp was built. Truman recollects that a homesteader named Old Swede built the place, and was the first goat herder in the area he knew about.

Lora Mangum Shields, has this paragraph in her article "Exploring the Bad Lands": "Approximately a quarter mile within the lava flow west of Carrizozo, Bill (her son) and I came upon a dirt road which leads to the north of Highway 380 for several miles terminating at a roughly circular dipouze beside a deserted one-room malpais cabin on a lava hill. Constructed as a Civil Conservation Corps project in the early 1930's, the road is much too rough for travel by rubber-tired vehicles. The malpais ca-

bin, according to local legend, was built by a rancher in the 1920's for one of his herders."

Goats were money makers for Jim Greer and later for Fay Harkey who now owns seventeen sections of black-rock country, including the cabin site. Irv Crockett was the last man we knew to have a herd of goats and he finally got rid of them because herders were so hard to get and keep.

Lester Greer, who ranched in the San Andres until the Missile Range moved him off and he settled in Nogal, said there was a spring at the goat camp in early days, one of the reasons for it being a headquarters.

This spring attracted another type of business in the prohibition days. The goat camp be-

came a notorious headquarters for bootleggers, Blondie Evans probably being the best known, later got in trouble with the law for reasons other than bootlegging.

Fay Harkey has owned the place since 1952, and says he used to travel the road to the goat cabin in his pickup but hasn't for years. Too many varmints in the Mal Pais and too few herders for goats. Lots of ringtail, cats and skunks out there.

With the coming of the Valley of Fires State Park, there will be trails out in the Mal Pais from the park some day, and those venturesome people who want a longer walk can take the trail to the goat camp, built solidly of black rock, it will be there for years to come.

New Mexico physicians and dentists request the usual and customary fee

SANTA FE — You'll find growing concern on the part of state chiefs over the urgency of initiating Title 19 of the Medicare Plan in New Mexico.

At the last session, legislators directed Welfare Department Director Leo Murphy to get the job done. As such, the duo plans for the federal matching funds were made.

Murphy, however has hit severe money problems and has made more than a few trips to the office of Gov. Jack Campbell in an effort to get those problems ironed out.

The official date for beginning the program has been set back twice, and now it's a gamble as to whether it can be started before next session.

There was one big problem in rushing the state into the Title 19 plan, and it involved the fee to be paid to physicians and dentists as well as hospitals until ample federal money becomes available.

By way of brief history, Murphy wanted the doctors and dentists to back prices to a "welfare level" at least until the first of the year.

But the doctors and dentists, who have never wasted any love for the Medicare situation, say they want their "usual and customary" fee for all work done.

I mentioned this "usual and customary" situation in a recent column and a quick answer from Dr. Tom Carr, who is president of the New Mexico Medical Society.

Dr. Carr says he can't speak for the dentists or hospitals, but is authorized to speak for the members of the N.M.M.S., which represents 93 percent of the physicians licensed to practice in the state.

Dr. Carr says he wants to clear up any confusion regarding "usual and customary fees." He says "usual" relates to the individual physician and the charge which most commonly establishes as fair recompense for specific services.

He says "customary" relates to the range of usual charges made by physicians of similar ability and experience for the same service within the same specific and limited geographic area.

This explains except to say that if New Mexico takes on the Title 19 plan, then the Welfare Department will pay the same fee for treatment that any other patient pays.

"Any other patient" would agree to this, until he considers that it'll be his tax money going for the bill.

It will amount to a great enlargement of welfare in the state, and simply will demand a much greater amount of money.

Main difference will be the addition of all persons in New Mexico who would qualify for welfare except for technical reasons. This would be tenure of residence in the state, etc. It seems the doctors and dentists will draw their usual and

customary fees. It's a wild guess as to where the money will come from.

Gross a locomotive fireman with the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad Company transferred from Alamogordo to Carrizozo; however there were no houses in Carrizozo, so the Railroad Company stopped their regular construction work for one full day, and erected a house for us, using railroad ties.

One week later, on June 28, 1904, my second son, Harry W. Jr., was born in this tie house, the first white child born in Carrizozo.

In September, 1906, my oldest son, Emerson, entered the first grade of Carrizozo schools, held in a large tent.

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



Bow and arrow hunters are a special breed

By Paul Payton

To be a successful antelope hunter with bow and arrow a person first learns to handle a 150-pound bow that will deliver an arrow with killing power for distances up to 200 yards. Then one should develop a love for the great outdoors (hours of it at a time because antelope hunting is a waiting game).

A successful antelope hunter has a bit of ham actor in his system which comes out in the makeup he puts on for the hunt. The main aim is to costume out so the hunter looks as much like a cholla cactus as possible. Obviously, this costuming is easier for the thorny types than for the roly-poly hunters.

Another desirable characteristic of a successful antelope hunter is patience. You don't so much stalk antelope as you stash yourself behind a cactus or cholla and wait, wait, maybe two hours, wait, wait, maybe longer. The battle plan made with aid of game officials, was to stash hunters in most sections of a large pasture, maybe eight sections of land, which plan is intended to keep the antelope on the move and hunters get their shots as the swift animals come by.

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A strong back really helps when a hunter goes after antelope. Vehicles are used only to get to the area. If a hunter bags his antelope six miles from the vehicle area, that is the distance he walks packing his game. A good sized buck can weigh up to 100 pounds.

From several sources we heard, antelope hunters are "special" in another way—they don't bother or destroy property where they hunt, nor do they leave any litter on the grounds. More power to them.

SWCD reports on

'66 fiscal year

Following is the annual report of the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District for fiscal year 1966.

The Carrizozo SWCD was organized October 11, 1965. There have been 6 additions to the District since that time. There is now a total of 1,004, 217 acres in the District, with 80 operating units, all classified as ranches.

The general purpose of the District is to promote soil and water conservation through a long range program. Landowners or operators are encouraged to cooperate with the District toward soil and water conservation through a written plan and to apply these plans as rapidly as possible.

Listed below are some of the major accomplishments of the District during Fiscal year 1966:

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New Great Plains Conservation Program Contracts, 7.

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Acres of Range Deferred Grazing recorded, 30,000.

Acres of Brush Control, 13,500.

Stockwater Pipelines (ft) installed, 80,000.

Stockwater Ponds and wells (no.) installed, 10.

The 2nd annual Bankers Award program was held in September with Truman Spencer Jr., receiving the award for outstanding conservation on his ranch.

The District participated in the County Fair and contributed to 4-H club members from the District who exhibited livestock.

Two board members attended a workshop to better acquaint themselves with conservation problems and solutions.

The District entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Interior to provide closer cooperation between agencies.

A work agreement with the Bureau of Land Management was completed on the Payne ranch.

Soil Stewardship Sunday was observed and material made available.

Twelve regular meetings were held with 83% attendance.

The District makes heavy equipment available to District cooperators for installation of conservation practices. This equipment consists of a D&C Caterpillar tractor with dozer, carry-all, and ripper. The ripper is adapted to lay plastic pipe. The equipment is managed by a full time operator. Books and accounts are kept by the secretary-treasurer who is bonded. The books are audited annually.

The Board of Supervisors meet the first Wednesday of each month. Anyone interested in soil conservation is invited to attend.

The Carrizozo SWCD has Memorandums of Understanding with the Soil Conservation Service, Bureau of Land Management, State Department of Forestry and cooperates with AS-C&S and Extension Service. These agencies assist the District to obtain their objectives.

The Board of Supervisors wish to express their appreciation to these agencies and to the District Cooperators and others for their support of the District program.





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George Hanson of the Game Department was in charge of the hunt, with Phil E. Freeman, southeast area supervisor, and Charles Cockrell, warden, assisting. A briefing session was held prior to the first hunt, which was in a six-section pasture.

In the early part of the hunt the antelope are frisky, probably excited also and tend to move around so the best hunting and most action comes early in the day. As hunters keep moving around the pasture, to find a better location along a natural lane of travel the antelope will take they tire their game as well as making them wary so the animals tend to keep out in the open and move very little.

Antelope hunters come from all over the state. Groves told the News there were 3000 archers in New Mexico and more people taking up the sport all the time. His bows won first, second and third in the national field matches last year.

There have been hunts on the Lovelace ranch for many years, intended to keep the antelope herds in balance with range conditions. Four years ago there were 150 hunters and 58 antelope taken. A drought following 1962 cut down on the activity.

The Game Department set the number of permits available at 125 this year, 108 were taken. Timing of the hunt is right be-

fore the state fair, starting at noon Saturday.

Mrs. W. R. Lovelace and Holt Lovelace, owners of the ranch, were around during the two days of the hunt, making the hunters feel at home. Holt showing a few how the game of pool was played Saturday night. They are concerned that the antelope herds be kept under control and welcome the bow and arrow hunters to their ranch.

Lots of campers, station wagons at Baker Well in north Lincoln County, hunters from all over the state converge for two days of excitement and weary muscles, during an annual event that is good all the way around.

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

Don't panic if you find meat from your freezer has a brownish discoloration on the surface. The meat is not spoiled. Though it may not be as flavorful as it should be.

This discoloration is called "freezer burn." It is caused by a loss of moisture from the surface of the meat. It is an indication that the wrapping has been punctured, or that the material used to wrap the frozen meat was not moisture-vapor proof.

One of the most important ways to protect the quality of the meats you put in the freezer is with a good wrap. Be sure the one you select is both moisture and vapor resistant. Then be sure you seal the package tightly.

Reading the law

A letter this week from G. D. Ortega is not complimentary to the community. The message from Mr. Ortega is that local people are careless of public property to the point of abuse, particularly the younger age group which reflects as much on parents as on the youngsters.

The editor is sure that a lot of local people take a great deal of pride in the new Valley of Fires State Park, but this attitude does not stop the beer can littering and messing up this beautiful area.

Section 4-9-21, Chapter 98 of the Session Laws of 1963, reads

as follows: Each person who shall: 4. Willfully mutilate, injure, deface, or destroy any guide post, notice, table, fence, enclosure or work for the protection or ornamentation of any state park or recreation area— shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined \$5 to \$100, or imprisoned up to 30 days.

The only thought in this editorial bit is to remind people at home, in public office, in Chamber of Commerce, to preach "concern" for public property and the beauty of our town and surrounding area. It can be a full time as well as worthwhile occupation.

History repeats

It is not big news that the United States is following a course parallel in many ways to that of ancient Rome—a country that was ruined by its actions. However, this parallel is presented in an interesting and well detailed manner by Robert Burnham Watts, writing for the El Paso Times.

The Roman Senate used inflation much as our government does. Welfare was a serious factor in Rome's downfall, funny money, disregard for law, are some of the damaging parallels. There are many more.

We hope people are reading the articles by Watts. What do we do now? Many is the time we've heard it said "My generation does not have to worry, national disaster won't happen in my time." That's exactly the same attitude that lets tank weeds, fire and health hazards collect on the

lot across from your house—"It won't happen to you." What does one lone citizen, with one lone vote in millions, do for a nation he loves and reveres, especially when he thinks a growing crime rate, a willingness to freeload, a desire to be a world bigshot, are factors that bring only ruin.

One can pray, at least get a little peace of mind from this recourse. One can talk to "Ev-er" anything is fine, government will solve all problems" people and maybe get the feeling good until next tax time or your neighbor's boy is killed in Viet Nam.

Maybe prayer is the best recourse. If one were to pray for a leader who will put his country, the United States, above political party warfare, or personal glory. Along with these two attributes be a leader capable of courageous action and also capable of generating respect for himself and for government.

We keep thinking that maybe in our lifetime conditions will become so bad, (for one example there will be more people freeloading on welfare than there are doing productive work) that resentment will show at the polls and maybe our leaders will get the message. This situation is not going to happen that soon, if at all.

We keep thinking that maybe a political party will come along that will put "America first" above and beyond perpetuating itself in power. Neither the Democrats or Republicans show any signs of such action.

Our last thought goes like this: be a good American, do your duty as best you can, enjoy life each day because life was intended to be good—and don't try to stop the world so you can get off.

Dear Glen,
Recently a number of people have asked me if I intended to run the Ski Club this year. They have expressed the fear that if I don't sponsor it, there won't be a Ski Club. As you recall, at Awards Assembly last spring I announced that I would no longer be in charge of it—that it was now completely under your responsibility as school Superintendent, as it should have been last year. The only reason I sponsored the club last year was that I felt compelled to keep my promise to the children that I would do all in my power to see that they would again have a skiing program. Since you refused to do your part there is absolutely no reason why you can't give children the same Ski Club I did if you want to. I've given the money necessary, the buses, the new Club badges, the whole successfully worked out program. I'm sure you remember the many hours we spent together winter before last working it all out. We even took a trip to Ruidoso to see how Superintendent George White manages his winter program with the able assistance of his two fine Principals and his Coach, Ken Newton. Another day, you will recall we took a trip to Sierra Blanca so that I could introduce you to Roy Parker, park manager, and Jim Elisham, Ski School Director. Roy was kind enough to turn on the Gondola especially for us so that you could become acquainted with all the park facilities. My purpose in giving all this time to you was to prepare you to eventually take over the Ski Club without me.

Since I am no longer a member of the School Board and my children are no longer in the Carrizozo School, I have very little concern about your program other than to see that the money that Dr. Spencer and I gave is spent in the way we intended. Soon after the Budget hearing last spring, I was told by several people that you were boasting around the school that you intended to kill the ski program in order to get the \$2-500,000 back to pay for some Junior High football equipment you had already ordered—equipment you intended to pay for out of the Ski Club money. This puzzled me as you were the one who suggested to me the idea of having skiing for the children when you first came to Carrizozo. I well remember the School Board meeting last October. When I suggested improving the Junior Varsity football program, incorporating the ninth graders so that they wouldn't have to compete with the big boys, you and several Board members reminded me quite emphatically that we already had a suitable program, and I was made to feel quite foolish suggesting such a thing. Therefore, I would rather have our remaining gift money spent for something needed in the capital asset department rather than an operational gift, if it is not used for skiing. Please let me know if you decide not to give the children their Ski Club again this year so that I may reallocate the fund.



ZIMMERMAN TRIMS THIRD DISTRICT COURT SALARIES

District Court Judge George Zimmerman said Friday he has adjusted court employees' salaries in his district at an annual savings of more than \$20,000. Zimmerman took charge of the Third Judicial District - Dona Ana, Otero and Lincoln counties - after Judge William Scoggin retired Sept. 6. He said court costs in the district have averaged \$53.22 per case compared with a statewide county average of \$45.41.

The salary adjustments and assignment changes, Judge Zimmerman said, would trim \$11,000 from the court's Dona Ana County payroll, \$6,000 in Lincoln County and \$3,200 in Otero County.

Salary Changes Listed
The salary and assignment changes include:

Lincoln County - court clerk Eugenia Vega, from \$7,200 to \$6,000; R. H. Hedgecock, juvenile probation officer, from \$7,800 to \$6,000; Edward Penfield was dismissed as deputy clerk at \$5,400 a year but then was appointed as an assistant juvenile probation officer at \$2,400 a year.

These and other Lincoln County adjustments, the judge said, pared the county's share of the court payroll from \$20,400 to \$14,400.
