

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W. O. Jay Willingham, Corona grad killed when helicopter is shot down

Word has been received that Warrant Officer Wilmer J. Willingham was killed in Viet Nam on October 30.

He was a pilot of a resupply helicopter. Wilmer Jr. or Jay as he was called in Corona left the States on the 5th of October. He had just finished his officers training in Fort Rucker, Alabama the 13th of September. He had served 4 years and 9 months in the Air Force previous to going into the Army Officers Training School last August.

Willingham was in Korea one year during the time he was in the Air Force. He leaves behind his wife, Linda, and one son, Kenneth Wayne A. in Monroe, La.; his father, Alton Willingham of Corona; his mother, Shirley Jennings of Fairbanks, Alaska, three sisters and two brothers, Vivian, Roxie, Nancy, Ronnie and Scottie Jennings all of Fairbanks, Alaska; his grandmother, Mrs. Bessie Miller of Socorro; also the following aunts and uncles, Helen Potter of Los Lunas, Johnnie Fay Brown of Corona, Juanita Welch of Alamogordo, Billie Jo Butler of Needles, Calif., Jean Closs of Albuquerque, Vashlie Regson of Ft. Worth, Bert Minor of Salinas, Calif., Dean Minor of Nacogdoches, Texas, Phillip Minor of Martinez, Calif., Volney Minor of San Diego, Calif., and Aileen Roper and Gertrude Allen of Corona, also many other relatives and friends.

Wilmington was born in Corona December 3, 1943. He made his home with his aunt, Mrs. Gertrude Allen in Corona from the age of seven until he finished high school at Corona in 1959. He was married to Linda Young of Monroe, La., in September, 1961.

News of Wilmer's death in Viet Nam saddened the whole community. His father, Alton Willingham of Corona first received word that his son was missing in action, late word was

May Billy's bones rest in peace

RE: Re-Interment, remains of Billy the Kid

Dear Paul:
Probably you may recall my efforts in your State several years ago in my attempt to locate a judgment rendered in the purported death of Billy the Kid. Failing in this, the next thing was to prove up a lost instrument and subsequently file a court action to have it set aside for legal reasons available to a client.

Since competent witnesses were not available to offer testimony sufficient to substantiate either purported, or any verdict, and no other legal cause of action appeared, I filed a petition for re-Interment on November 18, 1966. It was unable to obtain this judgment by reason of the fact that the remains of Billy the Kid have been located.

I have mentioned the above facts to indicate that we were attempting to accomplish the end you are advocating now.

Mr. Chester Choche of El Paso Herald-Post had informed me that a report emanated in Ruidoso on the above styled subject. Then I read your editorial on April 14. Quote: Let's settle this matter for all time," with which I agree, from the standpoint of a historian.

Of course, I cannot agree that re-interment of the remains of any, or all three buried there, would accomplish this end.

It was our intention to exhume the three and obtain anthropologist reports to determine which, if any, actually represented the cadaver of Kid. Also, we hoped to obtain ballistic reports in case of the Kid to determine whose pistol fired the lethal lead to accomplish the act.

At the time of purported demise of Kid, and ever since, reports were made that Kid was not killed as alleged; the two purported coroner verdicts have been, and always will be, highly controversial issues, until the purported death can be established with legal evidence, and there has been evidence that Kid lived for many years after the purported slaying.

Historians believe that Pat Garrett filed certified copy of a judgment, which was not true. Pat never claimed that he did. He merely stated in his petition to recover the reward money that he was attaching a copy of the coroner's report, the original of which was in the office of the Prosecuting Attorney for the First Judicial District.

That Prosecuting Attorney's Office reported that "such a record is not now, and never has been, among the records of this office . . . such a verdict, if it existed, should have been filed in the office of the County Clerk," in an opinion furnished the undersigned.

Likewise, after a diligent search, Clerks of the various counties carved out of the Original San Miguel County, as well as the San Miguel County Clerk, reported that they had searched the records and failed to find anything pertaining to the Coroner's Jury Verdict in the case of Billy the Kid. Also, the Secretary of State reported the same.

Garrett's attorneys were very astute and cautious in their efforts to have the Kid declared legally dead. You can rest assured that if a legal judgment had been rendered they would have seen to it that it would have been recorded among the legal records.

At the time of the late Oscar Garrett, son of Pat, threatened to file a suit against the petitioner for pardon, he was unable to produce a certified copy

of this very important judgment. In fact, being unable to offer legal evidence that his father had killed anyone, he would not have been in a position to successfully prosecute a suit against Roberts, or anyone else.

After advising Pat's son that were in a position to successfully defend any action and we could definitely establish that Pat had not killed anyone that time, as well as establishing the true identity of the man killed with testimony of nearest of kin, now deceased, no action was filed against Brushy Bill Roberts.

Now I am ready to dispose of the Legislative Act, which had adequately disposed of both purported coroner verdicts within a few weeks after they were purportedly rendered. This act sets out very distinctly that the Kid was killed in the month of August instead of Garrett's certain July 14, which date all of you still use. I wonder why you do?

Probably, none of you have heard of this Legislative Act. I can furnish a photographic copy of the original instrument.

Legal Authorities held that the Legislative Act, within itself, did not constitute a legal declaration of death sufficient for instituting an action at law to have it set aside for reason that the purported deceased had made an entry of appearance and asserted his legal rights. In all probability the attorneys of the late Oscar Garrett arrived at the same conclusion.

Consequently, in the absence of a judgment in purported death of Kid; our inability to establish a lost instrument at the time; and the failure of the late Oscar Garrett to enforce his threat to sue our client after the show in Santa Fe, Roberts was not able to get into court, as desired, in his attempt to resolve the issues "for all time."

From the recent publicity you have given the subject it is apparent that the Chairman of the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners has established the heirship of Kid from Thomas Bonney, a common ancestor of Miss Low H. Telfor, who came to America in 1634; or that Miss Telfor, can establish the fact that she is nearest of kin of Kid. However, I hope that they have not resorted to that fraudulent full page photographic copy of the New York time announcing the purported birth of William Bonney in that City on November 23, 1650.

Any interested persons are welcome to the original letter I received from Mr. Ben Dalgin, Director of Art and Reproduction for the New York Times, under date of July 14, 1950, wherein it states, Quote: "We have gone through the issue in question and cannot find any birth announcements. Our re-

searcher claims that there are announcements of marriages and deaths but none of births."

After conferring with the late Colonel Maurice Garland Fulton, Curator and Insisting on meeting with the Historical Society Commissioners, in order to prove their display announcement was a fraudulent document, it was removed from display to the public at that time without further question. I am interested in knowing if this fraudulent display document is back on display to the public.

It appears that the next step will be to prove that the Kid was killed as claimed. In the absence of an adjudication that he was, it is my belief that exhumation and re-interment of all three cadavers would not "settle this matter for all time" to which I believe you will agree. Of course, the burden of proof of death of Kid and proof of heirship of Miss Telfor falls on the moving party — in this case it is the Lincoln County Commissioners.

However, after the establishment of these issues through court proceedings, I may be willing to enter into negotiations with them to defray all costs of proving heirship of O'Bohland and Bowdre; obtaining permission from their nearest of kin to exume and re-interment all three in a location to be designated by them.

Provided, however, that permission be granted to me to continue my scientific investigation as previously outlined herein.

In this manner, and this only, can the matter be "settled for all time," as advocated in your editorial.

To indicate I am as anxious as anyone in New Mexico to see that future historians have access to the truth, I want to correct the mistaken contention of your Lincoln County Commissioners in their resolution that Kid "was sentenced to hang for the murder of Sheriff Brady in Old Lincoln County (Continued on back page)

Letter to the new governor

Editorials in the Lincoln County News are written Monday and sometimes Tuesday. This writing was roughed out Monday and completed Tuesday about the time the election was getting underway.

We are writing particularly for those people who registered and voted, regardless of political party. People who did not vote show little concern for the welfare of New Mexico and deserve small voice in future actions.

Our major concern is that our new governor provide more jobs for people of New Mexico, the ones living here now, without all those jobs being concentrated in one metropolitan area.

Secondly, that New Mexico young people be prepared to hold down a job where qualifications more than shovel ability are necessary.

Third, that we make the best use of our natural resources, water of greatest importance, recreation, hunting and fishing areas, mining, lumber, for the benefit of local residents as well as tourists.

Fourth, that a reasonable check be kept on taxation, primarily by getting full value for money spent, a full day of work from each employee paid with state funds, and by making the best use of present facilities.

Fifth, that continued growth and development of our state be maintained as the only possible state of affairs, as opposed to deterioration of our resources.

Our new governor will have a multitude of housekeeping chores. There will be a continual power struggle going on around him, office holders seeking personal gain more than state good, and personalities to deal with at all levels of government.

How does a governor provide more jobs? He does not start out by going to Washington asking for more government projects, nor should his first move be that of adding a couple of hundred politicians to state payrolls. A favorable tax climate, no protective trade barriers such as the one just struck down by N. M. Supreme Court, a right to work when and where the worker chooses, are some of the desirable factors contributing to more jobs. A department of development responsible for long-range development would be a big help.

Some vision and break-away from tradition is needed in preparing our young people for a good life in New Mexico. Hardly another state has the same language problems as in New Mexico, and social backgrounds are different. Educational standards of the North Central Association can hinder as much as they help in New Mexico. The many government programs now pouring money into our schools would not be needed if leaders in education had been responsive to state needs over the past one hundred years.

New Mexico has the most, and the best of state resources — everything but water. Red Cloud Canyon is a real good sample right in our backyard of need for watershed control. New Mexico should not leave its natural resources to control of federal government any more than is absolutely necessary. Development should continue, new parks and lakes staked out about as fast as money becomes available. The one thing we can't duplicate by artificial methods is the grand job mother nature did in forming the hills, valleys and plains of New Mexico — preservation is in order.

It is human nature for some people to work hard, regardless of boss or job, and other people will loaf in spite of the best pay and best job opportunity. A job of state government is to see that work is done and value received in full measure for state money spent. Our form of government will always have some fast operators getting their hands in the state's pocket — fight them at every opportunity is the only protection. Use of present facilities is a wide open field in education, in hospitalization, all fields of government. For instance, why build more hospital space in Bernalillo County (only place where hospitals are crowded) when hospitals in all other counties are only half occupied.

People want more and more, and are becoming used to more and more services of all kinds from government. Such a situation makes the job of governor doubly tough. In some states they turn more and more to federal help, and in the process give-up states rights. We hope New Mexico, under its new

governor, continues a pace of growth and development that is within our means. Being governor is a full-time job. We extend our wish for lots of good luck and are reminded of a remark by Harry Truman, "If you can't stand the heat you should stay out of the kitchen." We hope our new governor can stand some heat.

Among the committee chairmen in the House who were unopposed for re-election Tuesday were the following Democrats: Reps. Bobby Mayfield, Mesilla Park, Dona Ana County, head of taxation and revenue; Walker Bryan, Carlsbad, natural resources; Fred Foster, Silver City, education; Robert Martin, Red Rock, Grant County, privileges and elections; Finis Heidel, Lovington, judiciary; George Blocker, Jal, transportation; John Mershon, Clouderoff, Otero County, appropriations and finance; and Alva Parker, Elda, Roosevelt County, agriculture.

Most represent lightly populated areas and their influence will be considerable in the next legislature in representing the areas.

The incoming governor faces a thorny problem in dealing with a new legislature that may be difficult to organize and to persuade to support administration bills.

At least two-thirds of the newly reapportioned Senate will be freshmen. A maximum of only 14 incumbent senators could return to Santa Fe in January. Sixteen other Senate candidates had served in the House including 9 incumbent representatives.

But the new Senate will be one of the most inexperienced in New Mexico's legislative history and this could spell trouble for the new governor.


In addition, several incumbent Democrats, who are chiefly independent of the state administration, are likely to be the Senate leaders in the coming session. They have fought key administration legislation in the past and they are likely to be in controlling positions in the new Senate organization.

Sen. Harold Runnels of Lovington had no general election opposition. He is expected to be the new chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee although he may be opposed by

Inside the Capitol

There is a pair of child's glasses on the editor's desk. We'll keep them for about a week. Owner welcome to them.

SANTA FE — Lightly populated counties in New Mexico probably will retain a strong voice in the new legislature meeting in January despite major Senate reapportionment and another redistribution of some House seats.

Swiped from Duffy — If you think you're going to be happy and prosperous by sitting back and letting the government take care of you and your family — just look at the American Indians. See Dudley Seryus: "A friend indeed is one who takes you to lunch even though you are non-deductible." A prominent psychologist claims that one trouble with the world today is that the stupid people are no care of things, and the intelligent people are so full of doubts.

Most leadership posts are likely to be manned by senators and representatives from sparsely populated areas, a situation that also has prevailed in past legislatures.

Bill Ranson, editor of Hardware & Farm Equipment, speaks out about newspapers as follows: "The morning newspaper could very easily lead me to believe that the world is a dark and dismal institution, intent on destroying itself and everyone in it . . . about the only part of the newspaper that is light and entertaining is the classified section."

Bernalillo County received 10 Senate seats under reapportionment, a whopping increase of 9 members constituting nearly one-fourth of the Senate. But all 10 Bernalillo County senators will be freshmen with no prior experience in a body that places much emphasis on seniority.

We are in agreement with Ranson's thinking around the Lincoln County News and do attempt to lighten out reading material with trivia, features, pictures, corny jokes, and even headlines over routine news. There is too much serious stuff even in the small towns where arguments can flare over fence lines, leader of the band, head deacon in church, main bread in the club, etc. etc.

Only 3 of the 20 candidates for the Senate from Bernalillo County in the general election had served in the House of Representatives.

No more than four Democratic incumbents from Bernalillo County will serve in the new House of Representatives. Five incumbent Republican House members ran in the general election from populous Bernalillo County but the House will be Democratic again and GOP representatives will not hold key positions.

Sparsely populated counties elected about one-third of the new Senate Tuesday. Two senators each were chosen from new Rio Arriba - Sandoval and Lincoln - Otero districts.

The following new districts elected one senator each: Taos - Mora; Union - Harding - Colfax; Quay - DeBaca - Guadalupe; Curry - Roosevelt; Catron - Torrance - Socorro and Hidalgo - Sierra - Luna.

The effect of reapportionment on the less populous areas of the state will be watched closely in the coming legislature. Many observers of national politics and state government predict legislative reapportionment throughout the country will produce more liberal legislation geared to needs of large cities.

This trend is not likely to develop in the New Mexico Legislature next year.

Rural area representation in the House will also be sharply changed in the next session. Twelve counties, which formerly elected one House member each, chose a total of seven state representatives in the general election.

This resulted from additional reapportionment passed by the 1965 Legislature. The House also had undergone a major reapportionment of seats in a special session in 1963. The new districts with each to be represented by one member, follow: Union - Mora - Harding; Torrance - Guadalupe - De Baca; Lincoln - Sierra; Catron - Socorro and Hidalgo - Luna.

The number of House seats was trimmed from 77 to 70 for the coming session. Senate membership was boosted from 32 to 42.

At least 36 House members will be freshmen when lawmakers meet in January, slightly more than half of the total. A 50 per cent turnover in the House in each election is normal.



Only about 65% of the people have been contacted and if the other 35% continue to give as freely as the first ones contacted Carrizozo should make a good showing. There was \$1,385,000 paid and pledged. Aren't we proud of the workers and donors?

In some portions of the lower Pecos River.

The Sacramento perch, numbering close to 5000 and measuring up to three inches in length, were released in a small lake near Santa Rosa. The marine fish from the Salton Sea were released in a small salt lake near Roswell. Billy's bones

My investigation should have settled this issue for all time. I furnished the record of Sentence from Page 409, District Court Minutes, Dona Ana County, New Mexico, on April 13, 1881, in my book, *Alvin* Billy the Kid. Apparently, this little book did not receive wide distribution in your State. However, archival researchers of other States, including Frazier Hunt in his Kid book, have used my information without hinting their source. None of them prior to my appearance here, including your historian, Mr. William A. Keleser, attorney, were able to find it. Oh yes, I failed to say that Judge Bristol imposed the Sentence on Kid in Old Dona Ana County Court House at Old Mesilla, many miles from the place designated by your Commissioners.

Now I believe it is my duty as a historian to dispose of the various contentions made in your editorial above referred to.

I have disposed of the contention in paragraph four, wherein you claim Kid was, Quote: "shot down at Fort Sumner by Sheriff Pat Garrett in July 1881," end quote, with my preceding statements.

Recently, we have been considering filing a petition for pardon posthumously; wherein evidence would be incorporated to prove beyond doubt, among other things, that Kid performed his contractual objections to the letter; and that Governor Wallace refused and failed to perform his, especially to pardon the Kid if convicted.

This petition will dispose of the issues raised in paragraph seven, wherein you contend, Quote: "The Kid would have accepted the pardon offered by Governor Lew Wallace had he not known for certainty that if he laid down his arms he would have been shot by his enemies before the next sunset," end quote.

Immediately following our public show in Santa Fe, Governor Thomas J. Mabry promised to grant us a hearing on the law and evidence in our first petition. However, after a private conference with Garrett faction led by Patrick J. Hurley, he changed his mind in an open announcement to the press. Consequently, Roberts had his day in Santa Fe, but none of you, including the Governor, examined our evidence, nor offered any to disprove Roberts' claim.

Certified copies of legal records would be included in this petition, the same as before, to prove, among other things, that:

Kid submitted to arrest; was placed in jail by Lincoln County Sheriff George Kimbrell, who produced him in Court where he testified before the Grand Jury, as promised, that voted indictments on April 28, 1879, against enemies, including, among others, J. J. Dolan and William Campbell for murder of Houston I. Chapman; and

Dolan was acquitted by defense attorneys of the Santa Fe Ring on trial on charge of venue without attempting to shoot the Kid for offering testimony against him.

I agree with the remainder of your paragraphs. And I especially agree with paragraph three, wherein it is contended that Fort Sumner is claimed to be the home of Kid.

Of course, evidence and legal records are extant, and always have been, to substantiate the claim that Kid's home was in Grant County, New Mexico; that he was never known at home by the name of Bonney, which alias he assumed in 1877 when he went to Lincoln County; that Mrs. Antrim departed this life in 1874 before Kid left for Lincoln County where he told them he had trouble with a blacksmith in Silver City and that his mother was still living there, when, in fact, she had died some three years prior.

My investigation disclosed that is was common occurrence

for people, including Garrett and Upson, to enter Lincoln County without disclosing their past offenses.

Diligent researchers, as well as armchair researchers and charlatans, have been taken in by distorted facts and not extant records purportedly, but never made in matter of Kid. Therefore, I believe this lengthy communication necessary to convey the true facts. However, due to our existing friendship, I know you will accept this in the spirit in which it is given.

I hope that you can assist in arranging a conference with interested parties for a full discussion with me on the issues raised.

Since Senator M. P. Carr of De Baca County has expressed deep interest in this matter, a copy of this letter is going to him.

Let me know your feelings on the petition for pardon. I am ready to proceed as soon as I hear from some of you.
