Brochure committee wants county pictures

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce brochure committee composed of Johnson Stearns, Jackie Spencer, Glen Bradley and Ruth Armstrong, is asking people of the Lincoln County area for color pictures, particularly of the Valley of Fires State Park, or any point in the county — the committee would like to see the pictures.

The Chamber of Commerce is committed to having 50,000 brochures printed at a cost of \$3,000.00, delivery time expected

by early spring before the next tourist season.

Your ideas and suggestions about what ought to go in the brochure will be appreciated. The committee is considering having two brochures printed, one for industrial development and one for tourist business.

The general idea is to promote the welfare of this area and with help of a lot of people the job will be moved along a big step with some extra fine printed matter.

Job preference on natural gas pipeline will be extended to local people

The Carrizozo - Capitan Natural Gas Assoc. is making good-headway with its project of bringing natural gas to the Lincoln County area.

Pipe is being laid now and the contractor, Higdon, Inc., expects to have 50,000 feet in the ground by December 23 when they will shut down for the holidays.

The Association met in Capitan Tuesday at which time plans were made to locate office space in Capitan, to be used by the contractor now and later become headquarters for the Association.

Applications are being taken for manager (must be master plumber), also helper and clerk. Applications for jobs may be addressed to the Association in Capitan. The contractor has stated that job preference will be given to local people and that they will be needing more help right along. The contractor office is in a trailer next to the Capitan city hall.

Clint Branum, field engineer for the Department of Housing and Urban Development, an agency of the Federal Government, is assisting in the project and was at the meeting this week. Arnold Boyce and Jete Voss attended from Carrizozo, Walton Hall and Ray Provine from Capitan.

Jack Copeland files for grazing privilege

Jack Copland of Clovis, New Mexico has filed an application for transfer of federal grazing privileges with the Bureau of Land Management Office in Las Cruces, New Mexico, according to J. W. Young, BLM District Manager.

The application is the result of the lease of ranch base properties owned by Brack Sloan which are located 6 miles South of Claunch, New Mexico. 8,493 acres of public land are involved in the transfer. Fred Wyatt Resources Manager is handling the transfer.

Legislators meeting in January will be asked to fix patch work constitution

Santa Fe — Legislators will be asked in January to submit the calling of a convention to revise New Mexico's badly outmoded and patchwork constitution to a referendum of voters.

Gov.-elect, Dave Cargo of Albuquerque recently called the 55-year-old basic document "38,000 ill-chosen words." A blue ribbon Constitutional Revision Commission, appointed by outgoing Gov. Jack M. Campbell in 1963, is completing four years of intensive work on recommendations to update the fundamental framework of state government.

Campbell has said repeatedly the constitution should be revised so New Mexico can move ahead. The state constitution is loaded with statutory material that makes change to meet current needs exceedingly difficult.

Examples are provisions detailing certain powers and duties of executive agencies and boards and sections on utility regulations, issuance of state highway bonds and establishment of liability of railroads to their employees.

These provisions should be in the statutes, not the constitution, so legislatures could amend or replace them to keep pace with the requirements of a growing state.

The constitution also contains an abundance of detail which was applicable in 1911, but is quickly made antiquated in the face of economic and social change.

The constitution sets pay for the executive and legislative branches, specific mill limits on taxes and bonded indebtedness and exact dollar exemptions from the property tax for veterans and heads of households and lists the names of state institutions.

A constitutional amendment was needed a few years ago just to change the name of a state institution to New Mexico Western University.

The problems go much deeper than names of institutions. Highly restrictive provisions of the constitution have disfranchised thousands of military personnel and their dependents since statehood.

Ten efforts have been made to legalize absentee voting in New Mexico. All have failed because of the extraordinary majorities required by the constitution although voters heavily favored the change.

Tom Donnelly, lawyer for the commission says: "One of the most important things that the commission has come across is the inability of state government to meet growing demands placed on it by local government particularly.

"This has encouraged the offering of solutions to local problems by the federal government. The federal government has stepped in to offer solutions to local problems because of the inability of the states and local government to provide answers and action.

"The trend toward federal action, in effect bypassing the states and local government, has become very marked in recent years. I think the commission feels very strongly that, if the states are to continue to serve a vital role in the federal system, they must have simple, flexible constitutions which will permit them to discharge their responsibilities.

To put this idea into effect the commission proposed a short ballot with only the governor and lieutenant governor elected among state officials. The proposal follows the pattern in federal government. Authority would be centered in the governor who would appoint officials now elected. If the legislature believed it is advisable, officials would continue to be elected.

Donnelly said the commission recommended an integrated state court systems which would

streamline the judiciary and insure selection of the best judges possible. He believes this would reduce case backlogs and expedite judicial business.

Underlining the need for constitutional revision, Donnelly noted the state's constitution has been amended 66 times in 55 years while the federal constitution has been amended only 13 times in 176 years. The first 10 federal amendments were excluded because they were adopted with the basic document.

In the last ten years more amendments to the state constitution have been submitted than in any other 10-year period in New Mexico history. The peace justice amendment added another patch Nov. 8.

The constitutional revision process in New Mexico is deliberately lengthy. If the legislature submits the proposal and voters approve a constitutional convention in 1968, the 1969 Legislature would set up the mechanics of selecting delegates to the convention.

At least 70 delegates, equaling the number of state representatives, would be picked by voters in an election. Then convention delegates would meet and draft the constitution which would be submitted to voters for approval or rejection.



Ye gads, we hope his snoz is like his mother's.


Three friends
