You heard Senator Robert, Kennedy say he authorized no-FBI wiretap recordings "except in nation security cases."

The fact is that Robert Ken--nedy, in an-official communica-

tion over his own signature. August 17, 1961, directed the FBI to increase the use of such surveillance "in security and major criminal cases."

Also -- you have heard

 Senator Kennedy disassociate. himself rom any bugging done by the FBI, insisting that any such work while he as Attorney General was done without his knowledge.

The fact is that Kennedy, as attorney General, listened personally to the results of microphone surveillances. I know of one to which he listened in Chicago on March 19,1963.

I expect Sentor Kennedy will seek to focus your attention -elsewhere, thus to avoid any closer congressional scrutiny of administration of the office of Attorney General from 1961 to

J. Edgar Hoover, with a lifetime record of immpeccable integrity and unimpeachable veracity was particularly careful in those days to get written orders for any FBI assignments which he found repugnant:

Kennedy, December 11,1966, suggested that Director Hoover. "Make this entire file available."

The Senator is entirely aware the Director Hoover would protect the sanctity of those files with his life, that innocent persons might not be embarrased or endangered.

Kennedy, as Attorney General did-some personal eavesdrop-

ping on conversations not involving national security. Further, he was aware, as Attorney General, that the Internal Revenue Service, the Secret Service and other agencies were using electronic and other equipment for this purpose.

He attended a meeting on February 16, 1961, at the Treasury Department at which time "bugging" by Treasury investigative agencies was fully outlined and approved by him. He was handed a memorandum at that time outlining both "bugging" and "personnel" training plans," He gave his

approval to this memorandum. In other words, in addition to urging the FBI deeper into this" practice, he also sought to involve other agencies in it. Why does he, as Senator, now seek

to leave others holding the bag? Understand, there were many times during Kennedy's tenure as Attorney General when J. Edgar Hoover refused "requests" from his superiors office. "We can't do that, Generall" was often the Director's decision on some "request" during those deplorable days when the Justice Department was a shirtsleeve part-time

-kennel, --part-time nursery,

part-time touch-football play-

The FBI's use of bugging deyices has always been carefully controlled and always only with the specific authority of the Attorney.General, Kennedy, as Attorney General, insisted that such surveillance be increased, urged by the FBI to obtain better equipment for the purpose.

And enough confirming files will be presented to any interested congressional committee to disintegrate the Bobby Kennedy fan club . . .

Unless, again, he manages artfully to deivert the public and officals to other matters.

At the time of bid opening the two bids went way over engine. er's estimates and cutbacks had to be made. The main feed line from El Paso Natural to Capitañ was cut down from 61 2 to 41/2 inch line, the feed line from this trunk line to Carrizozo was cut down from 4 to 2-inch line,

El Paso Natural Gas people have told the News, prior to this town meeting, that tow,inch line was adequate to serve Carrizozo for many years to come. Three engineers say the same. It should interest Carrizozo people to know that the metropolitan area of Albuquerque is served with only three 4-inch

An added comment from Urban Dovelopment people, doing the financing, was that if Carrizozo ever grew enough to need more gas the town could cortainly afford to installa larger line.

State highway tax revenues reported by AAA

Total state taxes to be paid by highway users in New Mexico during 1966 are officially estimated to total approximately \$45,081.00, according to Harry B. Mallory, New Mexico AAA Manager.

Of this amount, \$30, 210,00 represent motor fuel gallonage gallonage tax, \$10,350.00 registration fees, \$1,199.00 other motor vehicle fees, \$1,277.00 motor carrier fees, and\$2,045. 00 miscellaneous fees.

"For the country as a whole," Mallory sald, "State highwayuser tax revenues are expected to total nearly \$7.5 billion in 1966, an increase of 6,3 per cent over 1965. The estimate was made by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads on the basis of available figures and trend data."

"The reported revenues do not include tolls or any taxes or fees -- such as parking meter revenue -- levied by local governments."

close to last year's prices or slightly lower. Feed prices will average

higher this spring as domestic use and export will reduce the supply. Prices the last half of the year will depend on the feed grains produced:

Apple prices in 1967 will be good for a high quality product. Wormy apple will generally be lower in price in 1967, If you are

considering raising wormy lowquality apples, you had just as well pull out the orchard.

To many livestock owners, the price of the animal is much less important than the amount of moisture. Good moisture conditions will generally offset any price drop. Let's hope that Lincoln County gets plenty of moisture but not all at one time.

. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Adminstration is better equipped to handle the housing credit needs of low and moderate income. Lincoln County families

Floyd said the Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act, signed last month by President-Johnson, makes itpossible for a broader range of Lincoln County families to qualify for housing credit under expanded housing loan-authorities of the Farmers Home Adminstration.

The new legislation Floyd continued, makes more mortgage credit available to low and. moderate income families in Lincoln County by increasing

the level of the activity of the agency's rural housing loan program.

'Here are some of the other changes in the rural housing loan program administered by Lincoln County Farmers Home Administration:

Many Lincoln County families who had to go the long route of planning, contracting and building a house can now buy newly -constructed buildings. Before the new legislation, these families could only purchase previously occupied buildings.

Qualified low - income families can now obtain housing credit from Farmers Home Adminstration on the basis of a cosigner.Previously, only those rural persons 62 years and older qualified for this assistance.

The new legislation increases from \$1,000 to \$1,500 the maximum amount of assistance the agency can make for emergency repairs to improvements to owner - occupied rural housing or farm service buildings. This credit is designed to upgrade a building but only to remove hazards to the health and the safety of the family and the community.

There have been "Do it yourself" guys through all ages, the ones who could do'a creditable job of building their own cave or house of logs, stone or glass, and later came the craze for "do it yourself kits!" which attempted to put everyone in the act of fixing plumbing, lights, walls, or the family car.

The next big craze was the "let Unele Sam do It" jazz which is just now beginning to recede a bit, we hope. Big towns (Roswell closest to home) are expecting Uncle Sam using your tax money to pay for their blunders and to ball them out of the frying pan into the fire where downtown business is drooping ... end result is a lot of sharp operators making money from local government fiddling around.

We are recommending to Carrizozo (and all of Lincoln County) that we take a run at doing a job durselves . . . that of reversing the trend of loss. of population, loss of business resulting in accumulation of empty buildings, vacants lots, and hazards of junk and weeds where there should be beauty. We think most Carrizozo

people want more jobs in our town -- how about this for a do - it - yourself starter: Our local hospital has 20-bed capacity, average of 7 beds being used each day which does not generate enough business to pay three registered nurses,a

requirement of any adequate hospital, and a requirement of medicare. We think it possible -that; a nursing home could be constructed here, after wading though a yard of medicare red tape, that would generate enough business to pay for three registered nurses who could serve both the nursing home and the hospital--and "do-it-yourself" more jobs.

The same small town of 800 people whose band marched in the Rose Bowl parade Monday also recently bonded themselves to build, a nursing homewhich has staff of 40 people -that's 59 jobs total.

The extra jobs developed by a nursing home would be welcome in Carrizozo as well as solving a bad problem at the hospital. The only kit you need right now is one called "desire to help your home community."

Joy-Ha's youngsters will recognize an older person, speak to them, In general be on working terms; with the world. A large number of teenagers locally are in a world of their own.

Our only thought about them , the jolt will be much more severe for the youngster who learns late in life that other people have all the things he wants in this world and hedoes not even know how to approach them.

It came as aguit of shock when two of these young people spent time in our home without even so much as a "Howdy Paul", or "Thank you Eleanor for the lovely dinner". We don't know where their world is but they managed somehow to stop this one and get off, Too bad the day will come when they need friends.

Food for thought

We honestly do not known many of the answers . . . as to where money can be saved, or whore money should be spent in doing the best job of operating a state penitentiary,

Nor do we pretend to know much about the operation of a state hospital for mentally III. When should those people go back into life's stream, when should they have more hospital-Ization, We don't even give modern medicine credit for knowing even half the answers in this field.

Ask yourself, what do you know, or think you know about the operation of a hospital for erippeld children, a girl's welfare home, a boys home where It's hard just to keep the boys at home, Or, what are your thoughts about alcoholics, how much state money should be spent on them.

That's to much thinking to

load on the average person -yet that is the load a Board of Institutional Finance would have to carry -- board members would need to obtain u comprehensive education in fields of knowledge that are difficult even for the experts.

State Rep Bill Shrencengost intends to introduce legislation proposing a Board of Institutional Finance to handle budget matters for state hospitals and other institutions.

We believe such legislation would be a detriment to the State of New Mexico, that power now spread over a wide area would be put in the hands.of a few people, that the two-party system would suffer a severe setback, that wo'd beller suffer along with some of the faults In the present system than to compound problems by making them state-wide.

SANTA FE--Gov. Dave Cargo invaded a highly sensitive area with an executive order and a legislative program on conflict of interest and lobbying.

His executive order bans officals and employes of the executive branch of state govern= ment from any direct financial interest in any transaction with any federal, state or local public agency.

Direct financial interest is defined as ownership by an employe or members of his immediate family of more than one per cent of a business or receipt of more than \$1,000 a year from a business that does business with a lederal, state or local public agency.

The order also prohibits any indirect financial interest in any transaction with a political subdivision unless the interest has been disclosed in writing and filed in the governor's office prior to the transaction.

Cargo said he will recommend legislators pass a conflict of interest law covering them. selves. He will also ask lawmakers to enact a conflict of Interest statute covering agencies of state government not affected by his executive order. This would embrace the State Land Office, State Corporation Commission, Highway Department and others.

 Cargo will further request the legislature to approve a code of ethics covering legislators and the legislature as a whole,

in addition, he will seek lobbying legislation. "I see no reason why New Mexico should be one of three states which has no legislation whatsoever on lobbying except what's in the constitution." Cargo said.

The new governor would outlaw contingency fees in connection with lobbying. "A legislator.

who is a lawyer should not be a paid lobbyist," he said, Cargo estimated "a very high percentage" of attorneys in the legislature are employed by industries interested in legislation but noted there are few lawyers in the legislature.

An attorney himself, Cargo said he received many offers while he was a legislator to represent groups but added his type of law practice, mainly in personal injury suits, exculded hom from consideration by many groups.

Cargo was reminded his conflict of interest and lobbying bills were battered in the 1963 Legislature. He pointed out the legislature has changed and many members have been retired voluntarily or involuntarily.

His legislation ib bound

His legislation is bound to bump into stiff resistance in and out of the legislature but his goals are commendable. Cargo hit hard at conflict of interest and favoritism in the election campaign.

He says he does not plan wholesale employe turnover at New Mexico State Hospital and Meadows Home for the Aged at Las Vegas, "If anything, I would like to stabilize employment," he says, "The hospital needs some changes."

"I want to see if we can raise their pay and attract more competent people to some positions. I would like to generally upgradethe personnel situation in the hospital. But I don't intend to hire any of them on a political

"Unfortunately, some of them were pressured in the last political campaign. They can vote anyway they want to, It doesn't make any difference to me."

* * *

Legislative expenses will jump sharply in the session starting Jan. 17. A big increase in staff will be made. Offices are available for legislators in the new capitol building and they are so far from the legislative chambers that additional secretaries will be needed.

Secretaries will probably be provided for legislative committee chairmen and vice chairmen and for other legislators in groups, Besides, each chamber has six doors, compared with two to the old House and Senate chambers, and more door attendants will be hired.

There are also 10 more senators and this means more correspondence. The "feed" bill for legislative expenses will be the first business considered and the cost will increase substantially.

Gov. Cargo met last week with former Rep. J.B. McCoy of Albuquerque and other membersof organized labor in Santa Fe. Cargo fragmented organized labor's support of Democrat Gene Lusk in the general elec-

He has an obligation to labor and has received some recommendations from sources other than his recent visitors. A tussel is under way to determine. Cargo's appointments in the

labor field.

Frank McGuire, who has agreed to remain until Jan. 30 as state director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, cited OEO achievements. McGuire sa: recorded juvenile crime dropped 7.9 per cent in 1965 in New Mexico and 400 persons have been removed partly or fully from welfare rolls.

More than 1,000 New Mexico residents have become literate in adult basic education programs in the last two years McGuire said, and 630 rural families increased their average annual income 12 per cent.

More than 180 groups of substandard neighborhoods and communities have been organized to solve local prolbems with their own resources and enrol-

led in the State Boys School at Springer and the Girls Welfare Home at Albuquerque has dropped by 92 in the last year.

A Headstart program sampling showed the number of school children who had to be kept behind to repeat the first grade has been cut by an average of more than 25 per cent, McGuire reported.

U.S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson predicted OEO spending will be pared to relieve the pressure on large dederal expenditures which include huge outlays for the war in Vietnam.

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

Electric and telephone systems financed by the Rural Electrification Administration helped create 31,000 new jobs in rural America during fiscal 1966, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

The figure, released following a survey of REA borrower rural areas development activities, brought to 182,00 the total number of jobs created with the help of REA borrowers since the department's rural areas development program began in mid-

A USDA official said the employment, opportunities stem from "commercial, industrial, and community facilities projects undertaken with the assistance of the REA-financed rural electric and rural telephone systems."


REA borrowers since the start of the rural areas development program have worked with other Federal agencies and local organizations in launching new rural businesses and in expanding existing ones, the spokeman said. He Added:"Besides providing electric and telephone services in areas where there weren't any, they have given help to communities in obtaining water and waste disposal systems, hospitals and other community facilities,"

The official said rural electric and telephone systems have helped to lift the standard of living for millions of rural people, to increase farm efficlency and income, and to create a vast new market, estimated at more than \$1 billion a year, for the products of industry.

These systems play an important role in the life of their respective rural communities, he said.

Included in 443 rural areas development projects undertake during the last fiscal year were 41 in agriculture, 37 in forestry, 78 in recreation, 156 in community facilities, and 131 for purposes including commercial and industrial. These brought to almost 2,100 the total number of projects launched with the help of REA borrowers since the RAD program began, In addition to stimulating the economy of their areas, the prjects help to boost sales of electricity and telephone revenues -- thereby increasing the ability of rural electric and telephone systems to fulfill their service and community responsibilities.

The more than 1,900 rural electric and telephone systems financed by REA served nearly 7.3 million electric consumers and telephone subscribers in about 2,700 of the Nation's 3,100 counties.






