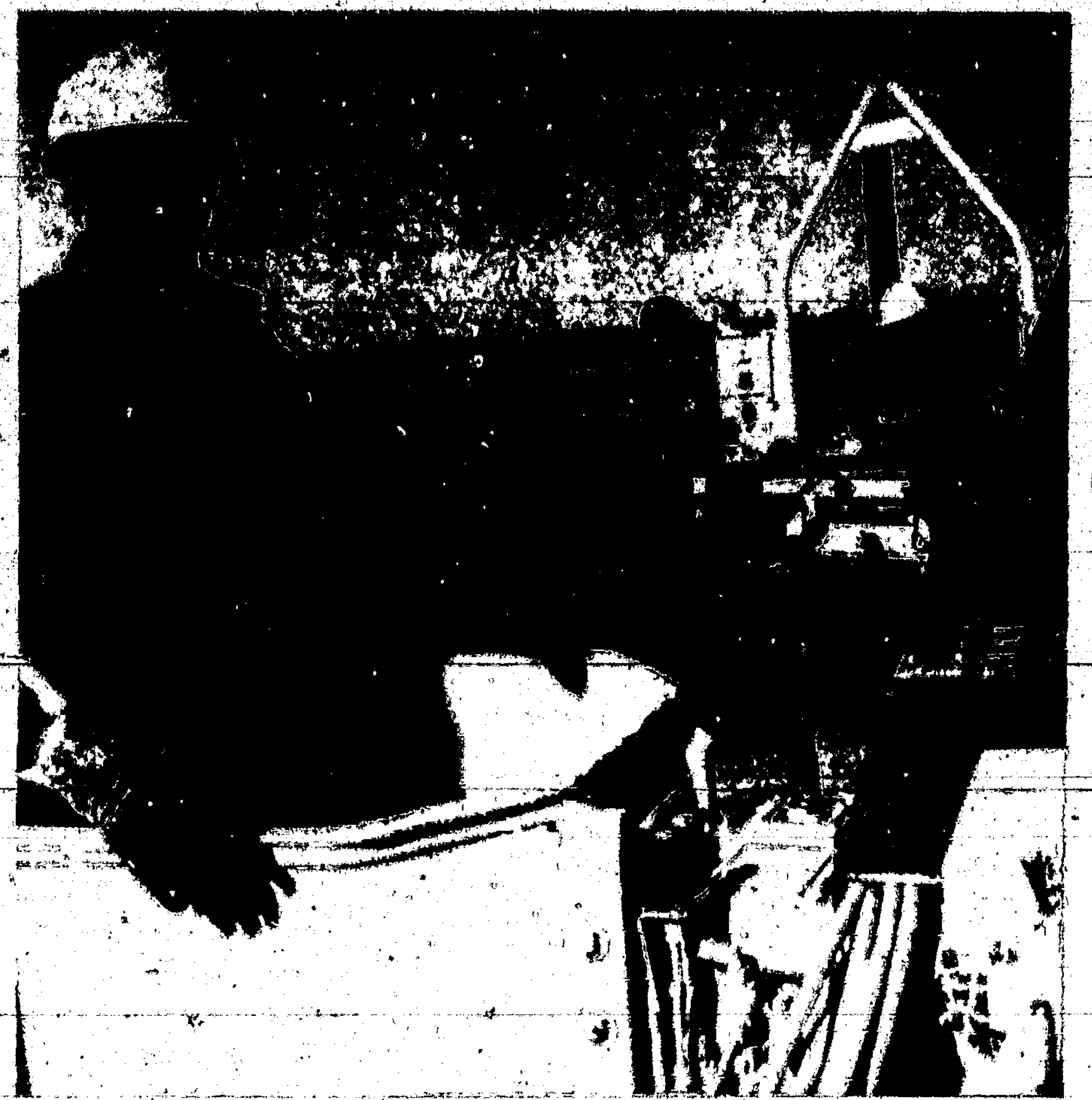

COMMISSIONERS NAME NEW BOARD MEMBERS

An action of Lincoln County commissioners Bob Shafer, Max Oliver and Joe McKnight in their first meeting of the new year was to appoint board members to both Ruidoso and Carrizozo municipal hospitals.

Les Crews will serve until 1972 as the new member at Ruidoso. Other board members are C.L. Wright, Gerald Dean, Robert McDaniel and George White.

A.P. Sifton was re-appointed to serve until 1972 with Dinnitt Bond, Mrs. A.M. Spencer, Johnson Stearns and William J. Edgar on Carrizozo hospital board of directors.

County asks for bids

Lincoln County will ask for bids to supply diesel and gasoline fuels with tanks, and vehicle insurance all bids to cover period of two years.

After a morning of organization business where R.M. Shafer was elected chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, Shafer, Max Oliver and Joe McKnight entertained a room full of ladies right after lunch. The ladies came to ask the commissioners for their support in getting a home demonstration agent in Lincoln County.

Nisa Nelson opened this part of the meeting, saying they wanted an HDA not only for us but for our 4-H members.

Clara Snow said we have been working to get Extension Clubs organized (2000 now has 25 members) so our county would become eligible.

Commissioner Shafer stated that all three commissioners were willing to help, it was a matter of the county having the money and the state being able to match funds to pay costs estimated at around \$8,000.

Commissioner Oliver said the county would have to notify the state in advance, Commissioner stated that the county had its share when this request came before the board two years ago, but that the state did not have funds.

Ruth Armstrong said that an HDA working in the county does much to raise the standard of living.

Chairman Shafer remarked that his boy, a 4-H member helped him a lot.

Mrs. Joe McKnight asked, who do we see at State College. Our Extension Club members have no voice at state conventions because we do not have HDA. Two mothers of 4-H girls called me and said it was really sad that we have to get help from Chaves County for our 4-H girls. Oliver commented, the commissioners will have to govern our budget which will be by July 1, at that time State College will

have representative here.

Mrs. Ray Province said that all we get now are old materials for our 4-H girls.

Mrs. J.G. Harris said, we're representing the whole county, we want progress for our county. Mrs. Gerald Dean spoke for Captain, folks are very interested up here.

Mrs. N.E. Britton suggests that committee be appointed here and now to meet with State College representative. Shafer said there should be chairman from each community.

Mrs. Harris stated that there was a time when we received literature from State College, not so now. We love to go to meetings -- we want voice.

Mrs. Bud Bagley asked the commissioners if they would get letter off to State College -- answer yes, Corona is well represented here, she said.

Committee members were appointed as follows: Mrs. D.W. Garcia, Corona; Mrs. Walt Jones Caplan; Mrs. C.A. Snow, Carrizozo; Mrs. Joe McKnight, Hondo; Mrs. Jim Gibson, Ruidoso Downs-Glencoe; Mrs. Clyde Burns, Ruidoso. These ladies will be notified when State College representative will be in Lincoln County for meeting with the group.

The Ruidoso - Hondo Valley Extension Club is having its 25th anniversary in April of this year.

Lewis Farris does not want to go out-of-town

Mr. Lewis Farris, an 88-year-old resident of Carrizozo suffered a heart attack on January 1 while attending Trinity Methodist Church. Following his attack he was hospitalized in Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo.

Mrs. Farris says their friends are all here, she can be with her husband in the Carrizozo hospital, and they cannot afford to go to a hospital in Roswell or elsewhere.

Under present circumstances there will be no help from the Medicare program for the Farris family.

Possibilities are good that the people who draw up the Medicare law do not realize that distances from Carrizozo to other hospitals run from 75 to 150 miles, that a good many small town hospitals are isolated in the same manner.

The trouble is in the section of the Medicare program which decides Lincoln County Municipal Hospital certification because this hospital does not have 24-hour nursing service, PL89-97 is the law.

This means that to qualify its patients for Medicare a hospital have a licensed practical nurse or registered professional nurse on duty at all times.

Does anyone know where Carrizozo hospital could hire a couple of professional nurses? J.T. Clegg, hospital administrator, says they are willing and eager to secure such services. The licensing committee of the department of Health will be in Carrizozo on January 17 to inspect the physical plant, Mr. Clegg told the News that he thought the hospital would meet all requirements, other than the nurse deficiency.

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14,400 VOLTS IN HAND — Not many people would hanker for this sort of job. Billy Petree is holding hot line where he takes off defective wiring and ties new wire which hold line to insulator. There's not problem so long as Billy avoids touching two hot lines at the same time, or touches one hot line and any part of the pole or crossarm at the same time.

Petree handles 14,400 volts

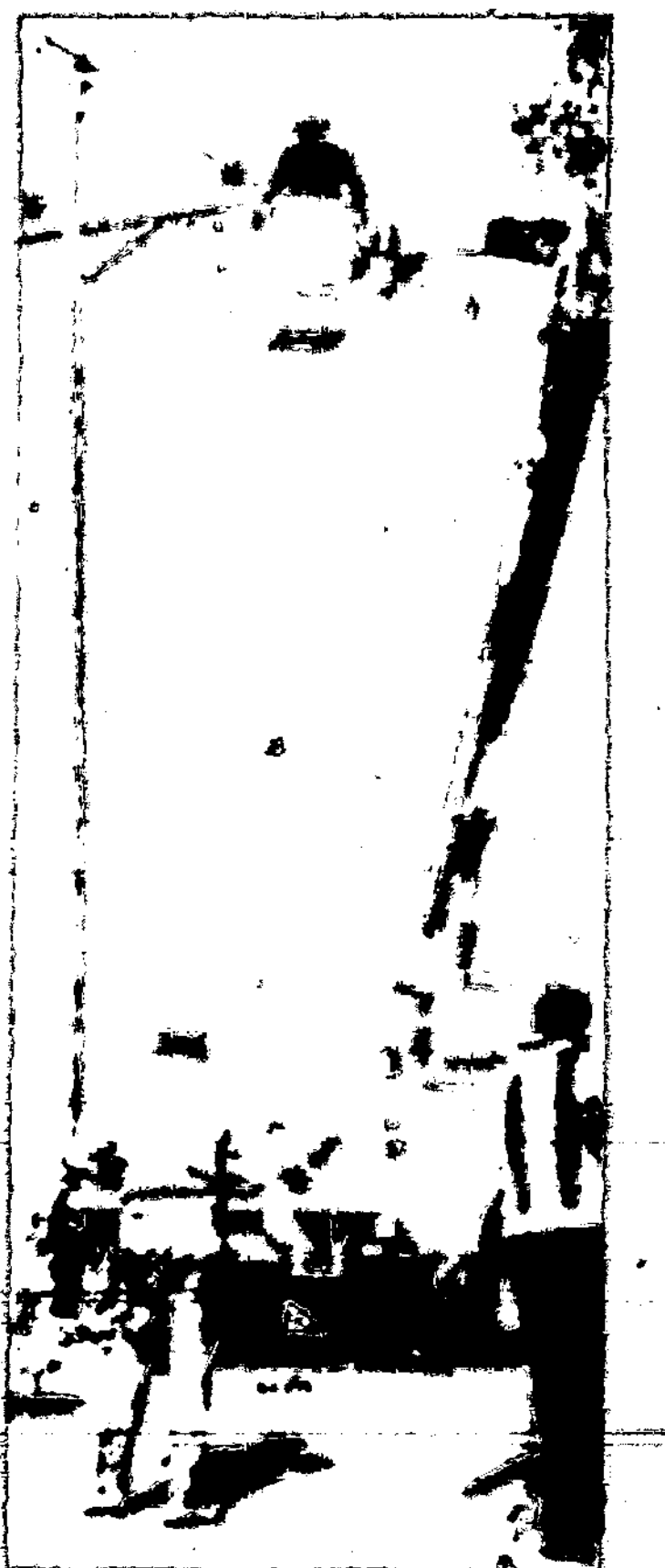
The wires installed in 1954 on power lines that serve Carrizozo have come loose and worn to the point they constitute a noise hazard particularly for color television.

To eliminate this noise source and yet keep power coming into the area requires some doing on the part of an entire crew of Otero Electric Cooperative workers.

Cargo proposes conflict law Tuesday

SANTA FE -- Republican Gov. Dave Cargo encouraged Democratic state officials to follow his lead and issue executive orders banning employees and their families from doing business with the state but got a cool reception.

Democratic state officials endorsed the principle of avoiding conflict of interest but all said they will not issue a formal order to their staffs.

Atty. Gen. Boston Witt said: "We have never permitted people in our office to do business with the state." In addition lawyers on Witt's staff were prohibited two years ago from

engaging in private practice. Prior to the 1965 order the state attorneys were banned by a policy of the American Bar Association from handling cases involving state agencies as private counsel. Witt has 25 employees.

State Land Commissioner Gayton (Sheep) Hays said: "I wouldn't go with this policy encouraged by Cargo." Hays said the state business ban covering families to state employees is too broad.

"I don't think my employees should do business with the Land Office," Hays said, "and I would

rather my employees wouldn't do business with other state agencies." Hays has 106 personnel. Hilario Archuleta, a clerk on Hays' field staff, services voting machines for Santa Fe County.

State Corporation Commissioner Floyd Cross said of the 90 SCC workers: "I don't know of any where an employee is in conflict at present. Up to now we have not had any serious difficulty on this. We're going to try to avoid conflict of interest."

John Peko, an administrative officer in the SCC's Franchise Tax Division was a major issue in the last general election cam-

paign. Peko formerly represented Automatic Voting Machine Corp. which sold virtually all of the voting machines in use in New Mexico to the state.

Corporation commissioners required Peko to drop his affiliation with the firm. Records show Peko had serviced Otero County voting machines while he was on the SCC payroll.

Secretary of State Ernestine Evans said she would tell her eight employees not to take any action that might be conflict of interest. "I believe very strongly in a conflict of interest law."

Mrs. Evans said.

Mrs. Virginia Duker, a \$280-a-month secretary on Mrs. Evans' staff, is the wife of Carl Duker, secretary-treasurer of Healy-Matthews Inc., Santa Fe office supply firm which does much business with the state.

If the secretary of state applied Gov. Cargo's order to her staff Mrs. Duker could not stay in her job.

The governor's directive, first to be issued in his young administration, prohibits officials and employees of the executive branch of state government from "any direct financial interest in any transaction with

any federal, state or local public agency." The order also covers members of immediate families of employees--parents, brothers and sisters and children.

Direct financial interest means the employee or members of his immediate family owns more than one per cent of a business or receives more than \$1,000 a year from the business and the business deals with a federal, state or local public agency.

Cargo also forbade any indirect financial interest by a state official or employee unless the interest is disclosed in writing and filed in the governor's

office prior to a transaction. The order applies only to state officials and employees under Cargo's control. The other nine elected state officials set policies for their staffs.

State Treasurer Ed Thomas, a Republican, said he strongly favors avoiding conflict of interest but has not decided whether he will formalize his stand. Thomas has 16 employees. State Auditor Harold Thomas, also a Republican, was unavailable for comment.

Cargo will also propose a conflict of interest law to the legislature starting its 90-day session next Tuesday.

Danny Cummins has been on the sick list for awhile. I wish you a speedy recovery, Danny. He is at home.

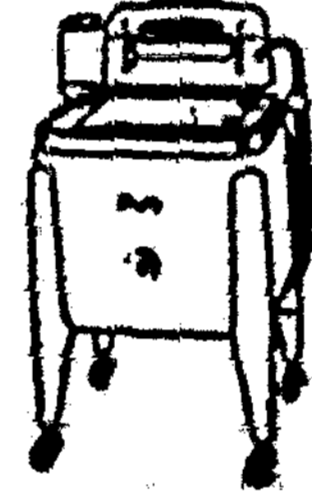

The trees, the well-kept grounds and air of peace and quiet at Fort Stanton today do not reflect its early quality, established in 1855 to quell Indian depredations and to serve as a supply point to provide for those same Indians.

The fort was named after Capt. Henry Whiting Stanton, killed by Apaches in the Sacramento Mountains January 19, 1855.

The history of Fort Stanton has been unique in that it was not abandoned and left to decay after it had served its purpose as a fort, but has been in constant use since its inception.

Fort Stanton has been a vital influence in the story of Lincoln County. It knew its share and

more of bloodshed, violence and intrigue. While a frontier fort William Wilson Kit Carson, Col. Dudley Wallace, Murphy, Fritz, Baca, Brady, Dowlin, and later a young lieutenant named Pershing all wrote their names large or small in the saga of their country.

The last commander, Edmund Setton Wright, found it was his duty to close the post -- he wrote the adjutant general in Washington, "I have the honor to report that the detachments at this post are withdrawn today and therefore no further returns will be received." It was dated August 17, 1899. A small house-keeping force was left to care for and protect the properties,

On April 1, 1899, President McKinley reserved and set aside the 27,727 acres of the Fort Stanton Military reservation for use of the Marine Hospital Service. It became the first federal hospital exclusively for the treatment of tuberculosis. From 1899 until 1953 some 10,000 men of the Merchant Marine came here for rest, fresh air and medical attention Fort Stanton afforded.

With the establishment of more and more veteran hospitals as a result of World War II the United States government felt it was no longer necessary to operate Fort Stanton as a Marine Hospital. The State of New Mexico took over the build-

ings, grounds and equipment worth over a million dollars and opened a state tuberculosis center which was operated as such until 1966.

Fort Stanton is now engaging in a new and most worthy cause -- the care and training of retarded children.

A turn off Highway 380 about nine miles west of historic Lincoln Town, or east of Smokey Bear's home town of Capitan, and a few pleasant miles of driving through the Fort Stanton meadows and you come to an example of what man can accomplish -- an installation of forces and power gracefully changed to one of mercy and care -- that is Fort Stanton.

Theater: Republic of Vietnam Reason: For heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force: Private First Class Hernandez distinguished himself by heroic actions on 23 October 1966, in the Republic of Vietnam, while serving as a grenadier with Company A, 2nd Battalion, 27th Infantry, on a battalion defensive perimeter near Ap Tho Mo. At 0230 hours, a reinforced company of Viet Cong attacked the perimeter, of which one platoon was deployed against Private Hernandez's position. Realizing the great importance to gain fire superiority, he immediately returned suppressing fire into the lead elements of the insurgents. Disregarding his personal safety, he advanced through the withering enemy fire to vantage points on the forward edge of the perimeter where he could increase the maximum effectiveness of his weapon against the Viet Cong. Private Hernandez's devotion to duty, aggressiveness, and personal bravery contributed immensely in routing the Viet Cong and undoubtedly prevented many friendly casualties. His outstanding display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty, and personal bravery is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, the 25th Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

Lincoln County won't always have boom times, but Carrizozo can always do well simply by working at the job of being a friendly progressive and attractive town.

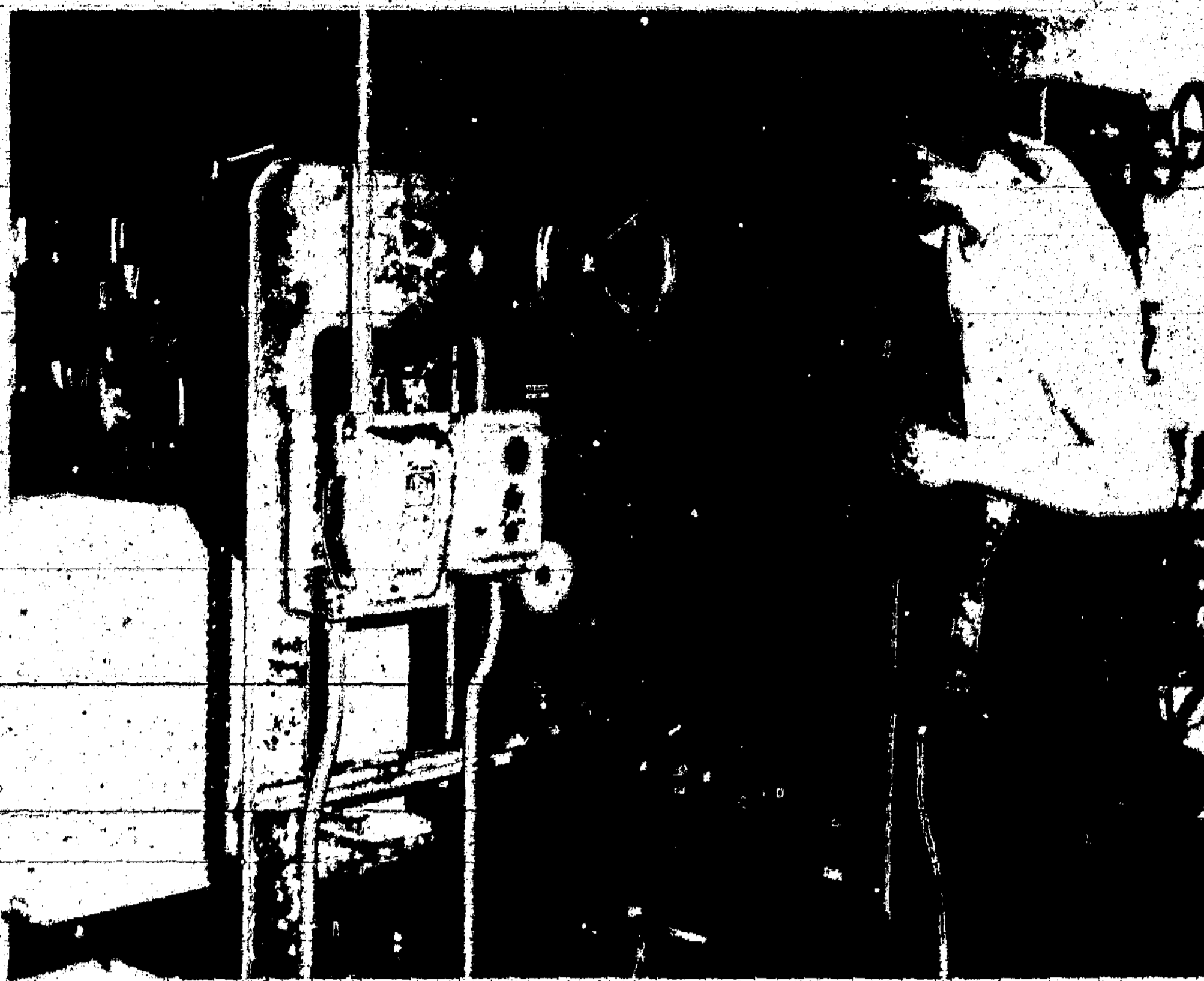
One came to play

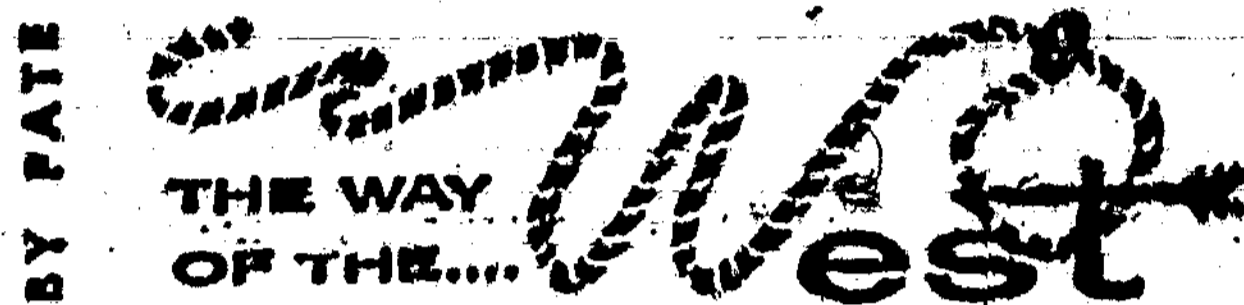
Bernie needed an explosive charge on at least two occasions during football season. Now basketball is here and

The text of that 20-year-old speech was able to anticipate "orbital space flights," "distant listening devices," "color TV," "instant cooking, electronically," "highway travel without stoplights," "garage doors with electronic ears," "spare parts for human bodies."

So, based on today's research, you and I can now take a sneak peek at what life will be like in 1987.

It took man 4,000 years to learn to move faster than 35 miles an hour. In one lifetime, he has learned to move 17,000 mph.

Discoveries beget discoveries. Before long our supply of "new ideas" will double every two years.

So today, through the eyes of these visionary men, let us look ahead to 1987 and look around and see what we shall see.

Hardly any American will ever use cash or anything in 1987. Money will be transferred from your bank account to theirs -- by computers.

Much of your clothing will be made of paper, disposable. Your automobile will be "disposable." It will skim over land water -- say terrain -- but mechanically so simple and with so few moving parts that it will be more economical to throw it away than to repair it -- in 1987.

Subway travel will consist of a capsule full of people shooting through a tube buried in the ground -- on a cushion of air. You'll get to the airport in a minute, be able to commute from Boston to New York... if you want to.

By 1987 the congested metropolis will have begun to disintegrate. Americans will redistribute themselves. The southwestern United States their water problems solved by desalination, will boom.

Skin divers will be fitted with artificial gills permitting breathing like fish.

And with a teeny radio receiver in the ear -- to receive voice commands from headquarters -- a hunter will bug -- his bird dog.

In 1987 -- millady, to color her hair -- any color -- will simply swallow a pill.

Some will color their teeth to match their fingernails. No baldness remedy yet.

But hairpieces for men will be so commonplace nobody will care. And cosmetics for men will include hair tinting, eyebrow and eyelash grooming, rouge and lipstick.

You may, if you choose, have Christmas dinner on your outdoor patio... protected by curtains of heated air.

Snow falling on your heated driveway will melt instantly.

Computers, home size, will be used for homework and for planning budgets, planning menus, figuring income tax, making family policy decisions.

Quick-frozen, precooked meals, opened and exposed to the air, will chemically reheat themselves.

Or... the housewife, in her computerized kitchen, will have only to select the menu. And press the corresponding buttons. The computer thus programmed will move the food selected from storage to the stove to the table all automatically.

The walls of the modern home of 1987 will have walls which are as movable as furniture is now... accommodating redecorating. And doubtless husbands will usually end up getting that wall back where it was in the first place.

Food stamp program discussed January 17

Grocers and other food retailers in Lincoln County will discuss the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program at a meeting scheduled January 17, 1967.

The meeting will be held at 8:00 p.m. at the American Legion Hall in Ruidoso. If you sell groceries, meats, fruits, vegetables, bakery goods or dairy products you will want to attend this meeting.

The purpose of the meeting is to explain the Food Stamp Program to retail and wholesale grocers. The success of the Food Stamp Program will depend largely on the understand-

ing and cooperation of the grocers.

The Food Stamp Program will be operated jointly by the New Mexico Department of the Public Welfare, the County Welfare Office and USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Under this program eligible families can use USDA food coupons like cash to buy food. They must buy coupons equal to the money they normally spend for food. Then, they receive additional coupons without cost. The amount is determined by the size of the family, its income, resources and other factors.

Loan limit increased

The maximum amount of loan which can be received under Title III of the Economic Opportunity Act has been increased from \$2500 to \$3500. The first year and a half of the program's operation indicated that many low income people need more than the \$2500 figure to become soundly established in income producing agricultural or non-agricultural enterprise so it is believed that this increase of \$1,000 will provide more capital goods and income producing investments for the states low income people. In reviewing this new enterprise would be established with the \$3500 than previously under the \$2500 limit.

It is expected that there will be some loans of the additional \$1,000 to presently indebted borrowers to place their presently operating enterprise on a sound footing.

The \$3500 maximum will more soundly establish new non-agricultural business as well as agricultural enterprises.

Progress of the EO program in Chavez County has been amazing. As of this time only

22% of this type loan made in this county are delinquent. As of December 1st, 30 loans for \$43,570 had been made. Some of these loan funds are: welding supplies, purchase of truck for hay hauling, supplies for construction of trailers and taxidermy supplies, purchase of livestock and gardening equipment. Experience with this program to date indicates that poor people actually will make good use of such funds if given the opportunity.

Don Perkins of Albuquerque, the Dallas Cowboy star running back named by the governor as state sports of entry director at \$11,400 a year, is the first Negro to hold an executive job in state government in New Mexico.

Perkins will also be chairman of the governor's committee to push New Mexico as the site for 1968 Olympic training and trials and will seek invitational sports meets for this state.

Cargo said ports of entry in his administration will emphasize distribution of tourist literature. Also stressed will be hotel and motel distribution of tourist information. Carlsbad Caverns National Park will furnish material that the state will circulate.

A joint meeting of House and Senate Democratic policy committee was held in Santa Fe last weekend on the Democratic legislative program. House and Senate Democrats will caucus separately next Monday, the night before the legislative session begins, and adopt a Democratic legislative program. If Cargo's legislation has meet Democratic will back it, caucus leaders declared.

Zip Code speeds mailing

Use of the ZIP Code will make it easier to mail packages after Jan. 15.

New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on Sept. 20, 1966. The rate increases will average about 10 cents a parcel.

Use of ZIP Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all post offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numbers of the ZIP Code represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the Nation's 33,000 post offices.

The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,600 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post Catalogs, and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

All parcels mailed between post offices within the Carrizozo Sectional Center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 35 post offices within the Carrizozo Sectional Center.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the post office department and help keep the Department within the 4 percent of costs on parcel post as the law requires.

FARM NEWS

On January 19th the Fruit Growers' Short Course will be held at New Mexico State University.

Several out-of-state speakers are featured on the program, which will be devoted to fruit marketing. E.W. "Pete" Lins, vice-president of the Blue Goose Growers, Inc., Hagerstown, Md., will explain methods used in marketing the nation's annual 150 million bushel apple crop.

Maurice Sanders, Emmett, Idaho, an apple grower, will outline the principles that growers must follow to establish and maintain a good "image" in the marketing of an apple crop. Sanders is past president of the National Apple Institute.

John J. Snyder, president of C & O Nursery, Wenatchee, Washington, will discuss the influence that new apple varieties are expected to have on future markets.

Are you providing a sumptuous feast for rodent boarders at your farm?

This is the prime time of year to declare war on these expensive intruders.

A rat around the farm can cost you \$10 to \$25 per year. Feed and grain storage areas are the main targets of rodents.

For best results, use an anti-coagulant for killing rodents. Rodents do not develop bait shyness to it, so pre-baiting is not necessary.

Anti-coagulants are safe because of low toxicity to humans. If it is accidentally taken internally by people or pets, use a vitamin K injection as the antidote.

The county agent recommends a three-pronged defense against rodents:

1. Use bait for two to three weeks to reduce the rodent population.
 2. Clean up and rodent-proof the damaged areas, and 3. keep a persistent effort.

It's easier to rake up the leaves if you know they are good for something besides burning.

The perfect answer to "What am I going to do with all those leaves?" is put them on a compost pile. Or use them as mulch around trees and shrubs where you have cultivated the soil.

As a compost, leaves decay during the winter. Then use them in the spring to build up the organic content of the soil. But don't use leaves to mulch perennial flower beds. Straw or some other light litter should be used as it allows air and moisture to penetrate the beds. Leaves are too heavy and pack too closely.

If you're determined to burn the leaves, make sure to burn them well away from trees and shrubs. Even the heat from burning leaves rises and damages the branches. And, to get a little more fire than smoke, keep the fire small. A small fire always burns faster and is a lot easier to control.

But remember, in some towns and cities, there are regulations against such burning unless you get permission.

State Mobile Dental Unit Here This Week

The mobile dental unit set up at the school grounds last Friday to be ready for business Monday morning and will be here all this week.

This project was started five years ago in Carrizozo, sponsored by the Carrizozo Woman's Club who have been aided financially by other interested organizations.

The program this year will include 45 first graders of the Carrizozo and St. Rita schools 24 second graders, 24 from third grade, 21 fourth graders and 16 fifth grade pupils. A total of 124 children examined and treated.

Dr. Taylor and Dr. Gordon of the Dental Health Division of the Department of Public Health, Santa Fe, are the dental clinicians in charge with Mrs. Alma Bradley, county health nurse assisting.

Mrs. Robert Shaker is chairman of the project for the Woman's Club this year and has enlisted the help of other women of the community.

The worth of the project can be measured by the percentages of completed dental work. The first year there was 47% completion, second year 40%, third year, 76%, and last year 80%.

The program emphasizes the importance of yearly dental checks and alerts parents to dental work the child needs.
