

### County commissioners make appointments

Lincoln County Commissioners have appointed Leandro Vega, Jr., as custodian of courthouse and purchasing agent for the county. Moises Sambrano was appointed janitor, Edward D. Lane appointed as constable for Precinct 19 at the first commissioner meeting in the new year.

A resolution was passed by the commissioner to employ the firm of Parsons & Hughes (providing district attorney consent) at no cost to the county to represent Lincoln County in condemnation suit on County Road 115, old Fort Stanton - Tularosa wagon road crossing property owned by Pat Dunning Turner and recently in dispute for being closed.

## Nogal Fire Department first to be gassed

The job of laying gas lines for Capitan natural gas system was started Monday. Juan Jiron of Carrizozo utility department is staking water and sewer lines so contractors will know where they are and Johnnie Hayes, Carrizozo natural gas manager, is staking out natural gas lines in Carrizozo now.

Fire Department building, inspected by Lonnie Parks, state gas inspector, and was given approval tag, the first to be issued on the Capitan - Carrizozo Natural Gas system.

Johnnie Hayes is the master gas fitter handling gas hookups in Carrizozo, Fred McDaniels is manager and master gas fitter at Capitan. They suggest that husbands leave word at home about

where gas meters should be installed. In most instances the meter can be set where LP gas lines came into the house. Mr. Hayes has bought land back of phone building and will move to Carrizozo from Nogal.

All lines on east side of tracks will be finished first in Carrizozo and a digging crew will move in Monday.

## Capitan ministers ask bible credit

### Zozo school will hire additional teacher

The board requested Mr. Wilson to study possibilities of hiring an additional first grade teacher to take the load of Mrs. Catherine Eaker who presently has 38 for one half day. Sixteen of the students are with Mrs. Sherrill one half day. The school will probably attempt to set up a new teacher for the 16 Mrs. Sherrill works with and Mrs. Eaker will probably hold the 23 all day.

### Don Harris starts work

Don Harris, a graduate of Carlsbad high school and Eastern N. M. University will move with his wife, the former Maryann McKnight of Capitan, to Carrizozo this weekend and take up the duties of English teacher in Carrizozo schools.  
The vacancy was created when Tom Kelly did not return to teach after the Christmas holidays. Mrs. Harris is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy McKnight of Capitan.

The Capitan Municipal School board of education at its last meeting instructed Supt. Duane Darling to write the State Board of Education for permission to offer credit for bible study course. The State Board meets February 6-7, but Supt. Darling does not know whether or not the Capitan request will be on their agenda.

This request developed from community meeting where the matter was discussed and later a meeting of preachers on Capitan with the Board of Education.

Only two churches were not represented at the meeting with the school board. Catholic church was not represented but reported favorable to the action. Jehovah Witness church had indicated it would not participate but was not opposed to the action.

As the Capitan preachers outlined their project the study course would be conducted as night classes with the preachers doing the teaching in their respective churches.

Whether or not any preacher in Capitan can meet standards of teacher certification as set by the State Board of Education is not known.

A two-hour night class held once each week during the school year would earn one-half credit for those completing the course. The bible study course if installed, would be an elective above the 17 required units.

Wayne Hubbard, principal of Springer Boys School, and Jack Schuster, director of Sierra Blanca Boys Camp at Fort Stanton, have made a request to Capitan board of education that Capitan school administer an educational program at the camp, providing one or ten teachers, whatever is needed.

## Boys Camp asks education help

The camp officials met with the Capitan board of January 9, when the school board asked that Harry Wogalter, state public school finance director, be contacted about the matter.

Supt. Duane Darling went to Santa Fe on January 10 and talked over the request with Wogalter who has taken the matter under advisement.

At the time of the request there were 37 boys at Sierra Blanca, probably 25 eligible for education classes. The Capitan board indicated it was in favor of helping the boys camp if this is the way it should be done.

## Federal food stamp plan starts March 1 in Lincoln

Preparations will be started here soon for inception of the federal Food Stamp plan in Lincoln County as of March 1. Sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the stamp program will replace the monthly distribution of surplus food commodities to poor families.

The Food Stamp plan will be administered by the Department of Public Welfare, as has the free commodities program. Food Stamp eligibility interviews will begin early next month at the county welfare office here.

Needy families can be certified to participate in the Food Stamp program on the basis of two principal factors--family size and net income.

As determined on those factors, each eligible household will be certified to purchase a certain amount of the stamps every month. Plus which, the family also will receive a set amount in "bonus" stamps free.

On the average, the bonus will amount to approximately 75 per cent of the purchase price of the stamps which must be bought, as explained by Mrs. Irene Lindsay, county welfare director.

"For example, as in case of partial employment, a six-member household with income of \$135 monthly would purchase \$60 in stamps and receive \$44 worth of additional stamps free."

"The amounts may vary in every instance on the basis of family size and net income." The distribution of surplus commodities to needy families will end here in February and the Food Stamp program will begin in March.

The stamps will be sold in Carrizozo one day early each month, the exact date yet to be determined. The stamps also will be sold the following day every month at some community in the Hondo Valley, the same to be announced shortly.

The Food Stamps can be spent at any grocery store for food for human consumption only, excepting certain foreign food items. However, coffee, tea, cocoa and bananas can be bought with the stamps, Mrs. Lindsay said.

Non-food items cannot be purchased with food stamps. Neither can liquor of any sort, tobacco products, or pet food.

All sorts of human food can be bought with the stamps, including bakery and dairy products, all meats and vegetables, canned goods, cereals, frozen foods, candy, cookies and even carbonated beverages.

Mrs. Lindsay and her staff were briefed earlier this week on operation of the plan, at Alamogordo. Those attending the conference included representatives of the Department of Agriculture and the State Welfare office at Santa Fe.

All food dealers in this county are to be contacted personally within the next three weeks by representatives of the federal agency regarding the plan.

The program already is in operation in 15 other counties of the state. Participants include over 1,800 families not on welfare, as well as 2,800 who also receive welfare financial assistance.

## Goodloes arrived in Kenya January 7

### Police Report

They were returned to the institute the same day.

Jesus B. Trajillo, 47, Ruidoso Downs was arrested Jan. 12 and charged with tampering with a motor vehicle belonging to Earl Prior of Ruidoso Downs. Subject also charged with drunk and disorderly conduct. He was taken to Ruidoso Downs Monday for a preliminary hearing before Judge Alton Gray.

On Jan. 8, an accident 1.7 miles west of Capitan involved Evelyn D. Smalles, Ruidoso, driving a 62 Volvo and

Albert Sidney Goodloe of Capitan, N.M., has begun a two-year assignment as range management adviser to Kenya, East Africa, for Near East Foundation, America's oldest private organization in "helping people to help themselves" overseas. Kenya is the most recent addition to the 10 African nations where Foundation specialists are at work.

Near East Foundation's highly trained specialists assist rural people of developing nations in finding practical solutions to their problems of poverty, ignorance and disease. They help farmers improve crops and livestock. They prepare boys for good jobs and train girls in home economics. They help construct roads and buildings. They train teachers and launch disease-control programs.

Three-fourths of the land in Kenya, a former British crown colony, is semi-arid range land,

suitable only for livestock and game production. Mr. Goodloe will introduce proper methods for developing these vast range resources and will train a local staff in this work. Emphasis will be on such problems as the development of water resources, bush control, range conservation, and livestock breeding and marketing.

Mr. Goodloe's assistance was requested by the government of Kenya and is contracted with the United States Agency for International Development (AID). The appointment will be coordinated through the agency's Agricultural Division, Bureau for Africa.

Near East Foundation is currently serving nine African nations besides Kenya--Cameroon, Central African Republic, Dahomey, Malagasy Republic, Niger, Sudan, Tanzania, Togo and Upper Volta -- under contracts with AID. Mr. Goodloe is the first Foundation technician to enter Kenya. The non-profit Foundation's largest current

projects are in Iran and Jordan. Since 1956, Mr. Goodloe has been owner and operator of the Mountain Top Angus Ranch near Capitan. Experienced in cattle raising in a high altitude area, he hopes to be stationed in the central Kenyan mountain town of Nakuru.

He was manager of the Fort Stanton Range Research Station of the Department of Animal Science of New Mexico State University from October 1965.

Mr. Goodloe, 36, was born and graduated from high school in Abilene, Texas. He is the son of Mrs. Wally Akin of Abilene (725 Lexington St.).

He received his B. S. degree in animal science in 1952 from Texas A&M University, College Station. While in college, he was on the baseball team.

He was until his recent appointment a member of the Board of Directors and of the State Marketing Board of the New Mexico Farm Bureau; a


member of the Lincoln County Fair Board; a director of the New Mexico Angus Association; and a director and member of the Forest Committee of the New Mexico Cattlegrowers.

He was also a member of the Capitan Board of Education, the F.H.A. County Committee and the Forest Service Advisory Board of the Lincoln National Forest. He has been active in the Capitan Methodist Church, of which he was a director, and in the Capitan Lions Club. He has been an announcer at rodeos throughout New Mexico.

Mr. Goodloe is accompanied to Kenya by his wife, the former Shirley Ann Scott, of Buna, Texas, and their five children, Floyd Hardy, 13; Cindy Ann, 12; James Law, 9; Sherry Lynn, 5; and Sidney Richardson, 1. The older children have all been active in school activities, rodeos and 4-H club work.

They arrived in Nairobi, the capital of Kenya, at midnight, January 7.

## Pack of bills will attempt compliance with federal standards

SANTA FE--A major package of traffic safety bills will be introduced in the legislative session that began Tuesday to bring New Mexico into compliance with federal standards.

The penalty for noncompliance is loss of 10 per cent of federal highway funds. The deadline is later this year.

The legislation calls for a Traffic Safety Commission amendment designating the governor as coordinator of New Mexico programs. Helmets for motor scooter operators would be required. Another bill provides for an alcoholic test on dead bodies. An interim committee on traffic safety would be created.

Regulation of private driving schools would be enacted. A state fleet safety program for state-owned vehicles would be implemented. Proposals also prescribe eyesight and written tests every two years on renewal of drivers over 65. Inspection of used motor vehicles before sale is also established.

The standards are the first set by the federal government. Additional regulations will be adopted later and New Mexico must comply with them. The State Motor Vehicle Department already follows some of the new federal requirements.

The 10 per cent penalty is severe and it is imperative that the state avoid loss of further federal funds. A 17-1/2 per cent cutback of Bureau of Public Roads money is in effect now and is bound to hurt the Highway Department's program. The funds slash is an anti-inflation measure.

Running against Republican Gov. Dave Cargo may not be popular among Democrats in 1968. A top Democrat says Cargo has a "fair" and may become one of the best liked governors New Mexico has had. Weighing prospects for Democratic gubernatorial hopefuls next year, he said the national political situation will be a key factor. The picture may indicate no Democrat can win, he said.

Other major elements are the ability of New Mexico Democrats to agree on a candidate and the need for a major fund

to finance a campaign.

Cargo's status can be measured more accurately after the legislative session. The governor has many programs but his ability to win legislators' acceptance is in the balance.

The honeymoon between the Republican governor and the Democratic legislature is not likely to last long. Democratic leaders have carefully laid plans to enact party legislation with a positive approach instead of taking the position of turning down administration bills.

Former Democrat Anderson Carter of Lovington, a Republican since 1961, became deputy director of the State Finance Department Monday at \$15,000 a year. Carter is a former chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee and the House Appropriations and Finance Committee. In the 1957 Legislature he introduced the bill creating the State Finance Department.

Albuquerque Attorney Willard Kitts obtained a postponement of a hearing before the State Personnel Board on the firing of Robert W. De La Rue of Santa Fe from his job as administrative engineer in the Highway Department. Kitts asked for postponement "until our course becomes more clear in the criminal proceedings in Santa Fe," a reference to a grand jury investigation.

There are 10 attorneys in the new 42-member Senate. Six insurance men, three contractors three real estate men, two farmers and one rancher are also among senators. There is one liquor store operator, one engineer, one Indian trader and one publisher.

The House roster lists eight ranchers, five farmers, four attorneys and two insurance men. House membership was cut from 77 to 70 for this session.

Earl D. Bush, Carlsbad Democrat resigned from the board of the State Boys School at Springer, effective Jan. 1, for health reasons. Bush is an elementary school principal. Gov. Cargo may designate Alvin Stockton, Raton Republican, as new board chairman, replacing Fred Macarod, Springer Democrat. Stockton is secretary-treasurer of the board now and

a former chairman, Spence Hall of Clovis is the new Revenue Bureau district manager at Clovis, replacing Austin Brooks, Curry County Democratic chairman.

Officials of the Molybdenum Corporation, which operates a large mine near Questa, met last week with Cargo and assured him the problem of releasing damaging tailings from the mine into Red River has been solved. Some months ago tailings from the mine flowed

through the state's Red River Hatchery and killed many fingerlings.

A bill will be introduced in the legislature to prohibit use of fresh water for flooding for secondary recovery in oil production. The legislation is backed strongly in the Jal area. Rep. Milnor Rudolph, Mora Republican, will sponsor a bill to survey Mora County. Land titles are in hopeless confusion in the county because an official survey has never been made.

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



## FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

Leaky turnouts account for half the water loss in many ditch systems. Plants to improve your turnout so that it will reduce this loss.

You can accurately estimate the water in the soil by feeling the soil with a little practice. If you compress a ball of soil in your hand you can tell if it is too dry, moist or wet by the way it acts.

This method was found to be as effective as the new soil testing methods using tensiometers and other devices.

Using livestock effectively on the irrigated farm, will be one of several topics discussed at the Farm Management School being held at the Hondo School on February 1 starting at 7:30 p.m. Plan to attend.

If you're thinking of raising livestock on a small farm, get a copy of Farmer's Bulletin 2224, entitled "Raising Livestock on Small Farms" from the county extension office in Carrizozo.

This bulletin describes proper care of sheep, dairy cows, hogs, goats, chickens, turkeys, ducks, geese, rabbits, and pigs. The bulletin also advises:

Before you decide what livestock you are going to raise, get the facts on the initial cost of the various kinds of animals - how much it will cost to feed and house them, how much time and labor they will require, and what equipment and fencing will be needed. Consult your county agent and competent farmers in your neighborhood. This is particularly desirable if you and your family are inexperienced in handling livestock.

If you want livestock to provide income you will need to find out what projects have proved profitable in your area and whether there is a market for your products at satisfactory prices.

While your large trees are bare of foliage during the winter, it is a good time to prune them.

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
Well known commercial photographer coming to Carrizozo

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
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# CUSHIONFLOR
