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Turner going to Samoa

Dr. J.P. Turner who started practice in Carrizozo in July of 1937 and has practiced medicine here for nearly 30 years, will leave the middle of March for Pago Pago, Samoa, a protectorate of the United States, where he will have charge of the outpatient department of Hospital American Samoa. This is a brand new \$3 million hospital, completely modern in every respect. He will work under civil service. The Island of Samoa is administered through the Department of Interior.

Dr. Turner stated that he felt he could be useful there for a while, it would be a type of work he enjoys. The island is approximately 30 miles long, and is populated with 25,000 people, most Polynesians, natives of that island. The temperature never goes below 70 or over 90 degrees year around. They have lots of rain, as much as 200 inches a year. The new hospital is only a block from the bay.

Dr. Allen C. Service, formerly a pediatrician in Roswell, has been in Samoa for two years and is now director of medicine for the entire island.

Supervisor Sease said there is a strong demand for credit to improve dwellings by adding bathrooms, roof repair, and adding rooms as well as loans for new construction.

Commission would control surface and ground water

SANTA FE -- Bills to create a governor-appointed state water commission with authority to hire the state engineer will be introduced in the legislature now in the second week of its 90-day session.

A bill by Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry, calls for a seven-member commission with each area of the state and stream and underground irrigation interests represented.

Pattison, an agricultural engineer who is cool toward State Engineer Steve Reynolds, will talk with Republican Gov. Dave Cargo about the measure.

The proposed commission would set state water policy, exercise general jurisdiction over all surface and underground water, negotiate contracts with other states and initiate programs for federal matching funds.

Water bills will flood the legislative session. Another bill would create an interim legislative committee to study administration of state water laws and New Mexico's long-range water needs. A \$10,000 appropriation would finance the study.

Pattison says the study is needed so New Mexico water users can have a voice in the proposed North American Water and Power Alliance project. This would bring water from Alaska, Canada and the Pacific Northwest to the Southwest and other sections of the nation. Federal agencies are studying the project.

A proposed constitutional amendment will be introduced again, calling for trials anew in district court on appeals from state engineer's decisions. A similar amendment was defeated

ed narrowly in a 1965 special election.

Pattison introduced a bill exempting military personnel from the law which revokes water rights not used for four years. This bill and most other water legislation in the House will be handled by the Natural Resources Committee headed by Rep. Walker Bryan, D-Eddy. Another bill would exempt wells drilled for mineral baths or other health purposes from metering by the state engineer. Pattison said this type of water corrodes meters.

Other legislators especially interested in major water legislation include R.C. (Ke) Morgan Portales, Senate president pro tempore; Rep. George Blocker, D-Lee; Rep. Lee Coker, R-Catron; Sen. William Schauer, R-Chavez; Rep. Fred Foster, D-

Grant, and Rep. Alfonso Vigil, D-Taos.

A key bill will be submitted requiring a person, who holds water rights, to obtain consent of the owner of property where he wants to drill a well before the state engineer can issue a drilling permit.

This point is a key element in the controversy between groups of farmers and ranchers east of Portales. Part of this issue is pending in the State Supreme Court.

Salt water pollution of fresh water supplies and salt water disposal is a major problem in southeastern New Mexico. A bill may be introduced requiring oil companies to drill and put salt water back into the ground.

Oil firms are required now to put salt water in pits. Reportedly some pits have been dynamited, causing salt water to contaminate

fresh water supplies.

Also in southeastern New Mexico scarce fresh water is reportedly being used in secondary recovery operations by oil companies, depleting the supply. The Lea County legislative delegation is studying area problems.

Irrigation farmers in the Glenwood area of Catron County face the loss of water and a metering requirement as a result of federal court decisions favoring Arizona. These farmers apparently are losing water rights which they believed for years were their own.

Pattison said appellate procedures provided for the proposed state water commission would aid these farmers. He said the state engineer printed his regulations in 1966 for the first time since 1951 after it was disclosed in the 1966

legislature that rules are not available. "We need legislation," he said, "requiring that any rule of the state engineer in any water case should be published 60 days before the effective date." Pattison believes New Mexico needs a clearly defined water administration code.

Rep. Vigil is concerned with problems on dams serving many small water users in northern New Mexico. Rep. Severino Martinez, D-Rio Arriba, introduced a bill authorizing repair of Rio Arriba County ditches and drains.

Pattison would make computer facilities available to farmers and ranchers to process their accounts. A five-year state sales tax exemption may be proposed for data processing companies providing this service or an appropriation to

New Mexico State University at Las Cruces.

Rep. Ernest Miera, D-Sandoval, proposes to outlaw trading stamps. Similar legislation was defeated in 1965 in the Senate. Sen. Jerry Apodaca, D-Dona Ana, would remove New Mexico from the new federal requirement to put daylight saving time into effect in this state later this year. Apodaca's bill is in the Public Affairs Committee.

Legislators introduced 106 measures the first week of the session. Introduced were major proposals to repeal the unpopular pre-primary nominating convention law, provide a four-year term for state officials exempt drug, doctor and hospital bills from the state sales tax, prohibit straight ticket voting and submit calling of a constitutional convention to voters.

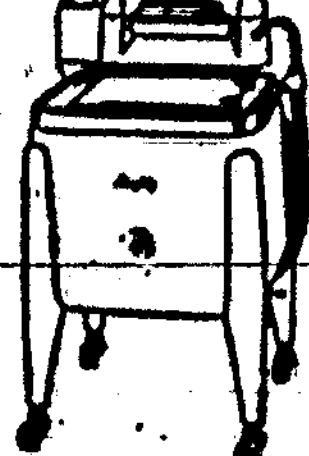

Cloud-Climbing Railroad

By Dorothy Jensen Neal

For people who enjoy true and romantic experiences this is the book to read about an unbelievable railroad. In addition to the historical background a graphic account is given on its construction and operation. Technical details, explanations and illustrations on

the great engineering feat make very interesting reading. The illustrations are beautifully done and the photography is excellent.

From the spring of 1899 when the dream railroad reached Cloudcroft until its end in 1948 the history of the town and the people is closely connected. Their personalities are woven into the story and it makes very pleasant reading.

The ending is in keeping with the story book style in which it is written--According to the author "Old-timers like to imagine that it just climbed a last cloud and, with it, floated away."

FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

A Farm Management School will be held February 1st at the Hondo School starting at 7:30 p.m. Livestock on farms will be one of the major topics to be discussed by Gene Ott and Bobby Rankin.

The costs to be considered in raising livestock and different management systems will be discussed.

Anyone interested is urged to attend.

The Lincoln County Fruit School will be held at the Hondo School on February 9th starting at 7:30 p.m. Marketing and insect control will be the main topics of discussion.

Maury Sanders, Idaho apple grower, visited in the Hondo Valley briefly last Friday. He gave a demonstration on the "mold and hold" type of pruning being used in his area. This type of pruning allows for closer planting of the trees and tends to make a stiff branch that will hold a full crop without breaking.

Mr. Sanders is an enthusiastic apple grower and feels that there is a tremendous future for the apple industry.

Wool growers are reminded to get their applications for wool incentive filed before January 31st, in the Lincoln County ASCS office.

A three-year study of grazing habits of Hereford and Santa Gertrudis revealed that:

1. Herefords spent more time grazing.
2. Santa Gertrudis walked more but did not walk farther from water.
3. Herefords walked an 81% call crop as compared to 73% for the Santa Gertrudis.
4. Santa Gertrudis calved 31 days later.

The results of the study reveal no tremendous advantage for either breed.

The armed services are buying ten million pounds of lamb from Australia and New Zealand during the coming year. This will be used in the far East and Pacific areas.

Many sheep raisers remember the fiasco when service men were served lamb and mutton. Growers shudder to think what will happen when the Armed Forces try to handle this much lamb in a short period of time despite the constant efforts of the American Lamb Council to acquaint them in the proper methods of handling and preparation. Sheepmen remember the fiasco of World War II when the military attempted to serve a large amount of lamb and mutton in the Pacific front regions and because of the climate and inadequate knowledge of the product adverse reactions were tremendous and, in fact, are still felt. Apparently domestic growers are being set up for a re-play of that situation which, even today, continues to plague the U.S. sheepmen who had nothing to do with it.

Good lighting around the farmstead can provide farm families year around benefits. These include keeping wild animals and prowlers away, preventing falls and accidents, saving time in farmstead night work and making activities in the building area easier.

The new mercury-vapor yard light is one of the best lights available. Located near the middle of the building area it provides enough light to adequately cover the entire area. The 850-400-watt size lamps are rapidly gaining in popularity over the 175-watt size.

The fixtures have a built-in photoelectric control to automatically turn the light on at dusk and off in the morning. The mercury bulb has a rated life of 18,000 hours. This would be about four years of operation under automatic control.

Local electric power suppliers have a rental plan by which these lamps can be installed and permanently maintained for a small monthly charge.

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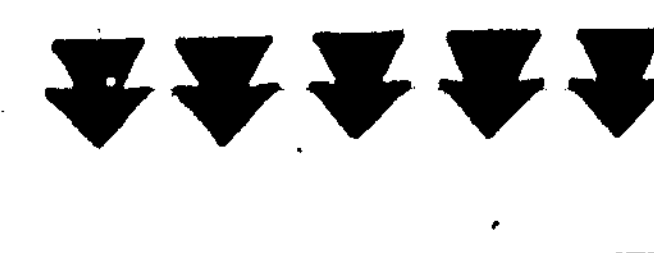

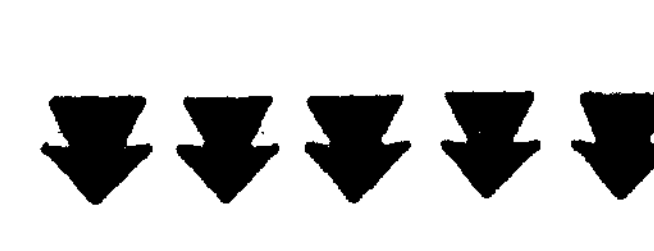


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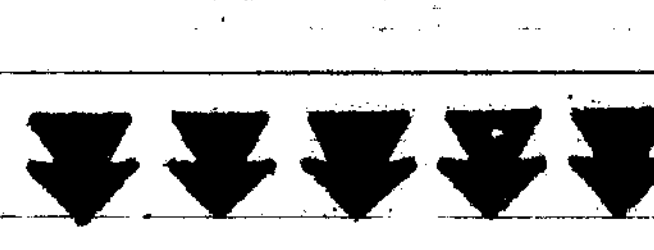

Library letter

Dear Friends of the Library:

The limited space of a bookmobile library is sometimes an advantage. When a patron comes in he immediately has a view of the whole book collection. If he is not interested in the so called "peace of mind books" right by the door he only has to turn his head to face the "BATTLE Stories of World War II". Between those extremes he may have spotted his favorite subject. The long and treacherous walk from section 100 to section 900 in a regular library is eliminated. You don't get lost. If "fact books" have no appeal, turn and you have all the fiction from A to Z at a glance. Still, the Southeastern Regional Library needs a larger bookmobile. The average daily circulation rose to 408 books in November while the average daily driving was 57 miles. Space for more fiction and non-fiction is required. Workspace for the three persons it takes to efficiently serve the growing crowds is needed too.

In Hondo we again had good help from the school librarian, Mrs. Dorothy Ree and student, Melvin Montoya, who checked in a few hundred books for us. We made it on time to the next stop, Lincoln, where quite a committee was on hand to assist in selecting books to be placed in the community library.

From Lincoln to Capitan is not very far. We arrived there ahead of our schedule and so did our patrons. They appreciated it that we had brought enough science - fiction along this time. Some sorority requests for books on anthropology and religion were also filled. Christmas books with decorations carols, recipes, came in and went back out. At 5-P.M. we could look back on a not altogether wasted day.

Lea County Library Association called on our staff for a program at the meeting in Hobbs on November 17. We accepted this opportunity to tell some forty other librarians about how we operate our traveling library, which is the first one in this part of the state, and was started in December 1964.

New Mexico State Library has moved into a new, one million dollar building in Santa Fe. At the dedication ceremonies we were very much impressed by these words by Governor Jack M. Campbell:

"The stretching of an ambition the awakening of a mind, or the explosion of an idea may not merit any headlines in tomorrow's newspaper, but they can revolutionize an individual life or an entire nation."

Expiration nears for mining act

If you have been living on a mining claim for years, but do not own the land, you may be able to get title to it if you act within the next ten months, for at midnight October 22, 1967, a special law will expire. This law, known as the Johnson-Church Act (PL 87-851), was enacted in 1962. It is designed to help people acquire title to unpatented mining claims on which they have been living. The law says, in effect, that until October 22, 1967, persons who meet certain terms may buy or lease up to 5 acres containing their improvements from their claims if the claim has been their "principal place of residence" since July 23, 1955. If these

persons bought their homes after that date from persons who were living on the claims in July 1955, they still may qualify.

A number of applications have been received by the New Mexico Bureau of Land Management office, but W. J. Anderson, state director of the Bureau, said that a number of other persons may be living on mining claims in the mining areas of New Mexico and in some of the National Forests, who are not aware that they are squatters. These persons may obtain further information and complete details as to the terms of the law at all Bureau of Land Management Offices. District offices are located in Albuquerque, Socorro, Las Cruces and Roswell. The State Office is in the Post Office Building in Santa Fe. Requests for information may be made by mail or in person.

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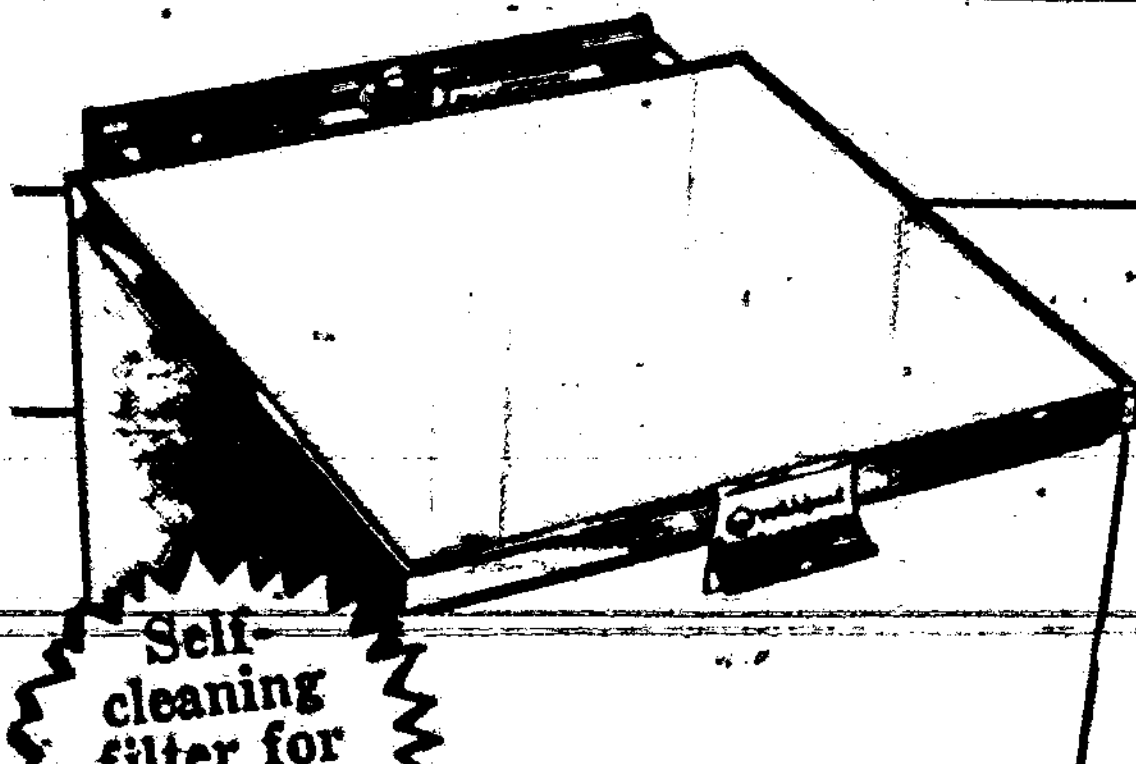


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
