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Al Seay and Deb Hefner developing local industry

An irrigation system known as "Rolling Rain" can be seen on a lot across from its manufacturing plant, the Carrizozo Welding Shop. After a two-year testing period this system is ready to market and Mr. Seay said they had sales outlets in three states.

The Rolling Rain system of irrigation will stretch for quarter of miles, can be moved with one power unit, and will water any ground, rough or smooth, that can be farmed.

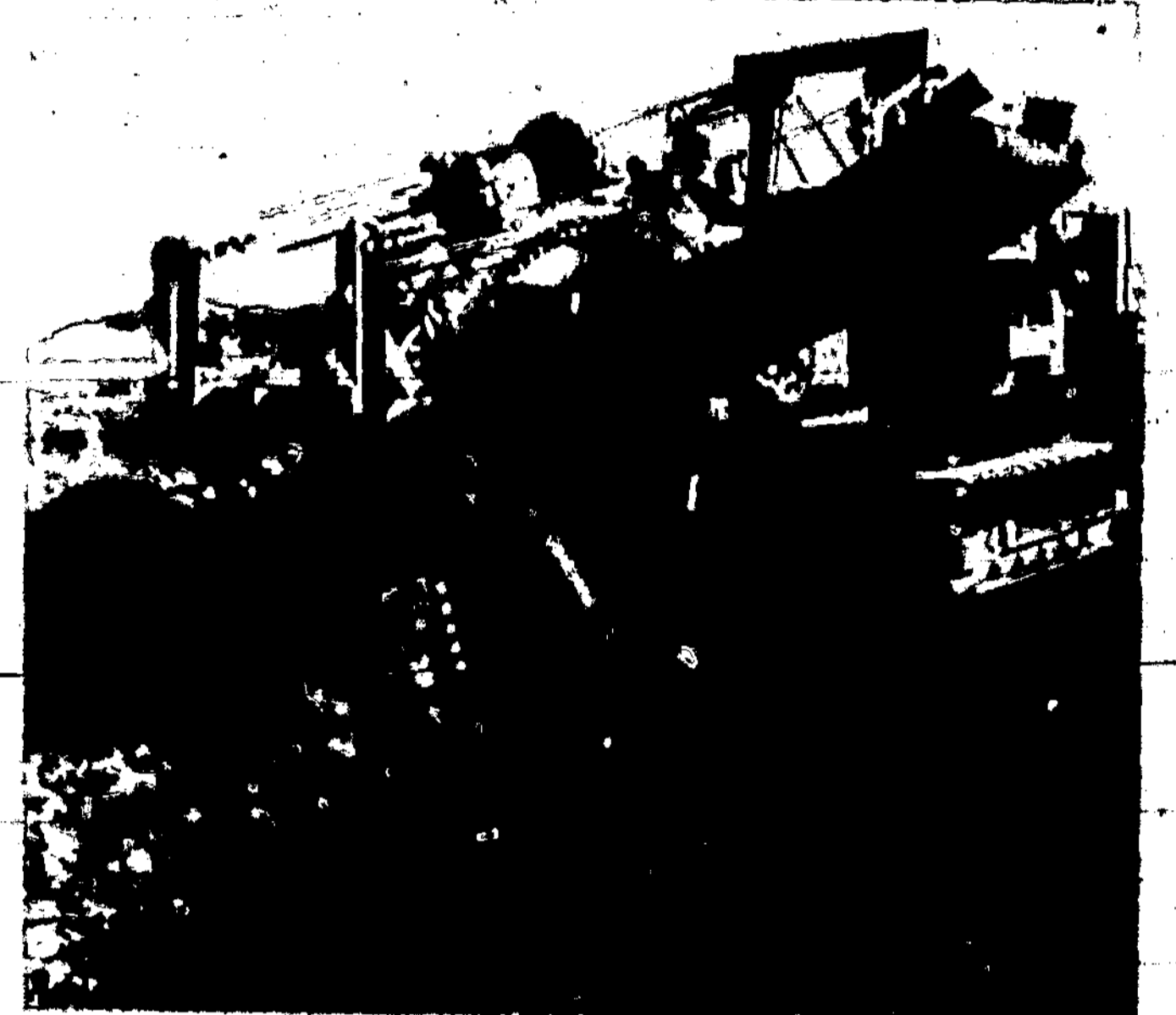
The system is unique in that

it eliminates the necessity to carry a long string of pipe. Rolling Rain is set in position, does its irrigation job in 4-5 hours, water is shut off and pipe automatically drains, the farmer can start up the power unit and in a matter of minutes have the irrigation system in new location ready to go again.

Seay said they are making four types of wheels and four heights of frames. All the work is done locally except for engine and chain.

Paul Harvey Says . . .

Congress is reconsidering the draft and alternatives. Most concede Selective Service will be perpetuated with a few if any modifications.

Senator Ted Kennedy wants to eliminate college deferments which he considers "discriminatory."

But he would revert to a system which historically sent our most promising young men away to war leaving the incompetents behind to prosper and propagate.

Selective Service Director General Hershey preferring more authority to less, favors universal military training; everybody in uniform.

Last year this column urged "drafting us old guys," insisting that if 59 is not too old for an airline pilot, it's not too old for a bomber pilot.

Subsequently the Air Force did recall 2,300 older airmen to active duty. Most of these, 45 and over, are fighting in their third war. Many were prematurely sidelined during the unwise pilot curtailment of 1960 and 61.

But now that we have recovered the fumble--how about drafting the rest of us old guys?

If we intend to continue to fight these wars with the weapons of the last one, most of us have had some experience with those.

The ancient axiom, "Young men for war; old men for counsel" has made no sense since the invention of gunpowder.

Our sons are so much smarter than we ever will be, why stunt their opportunity for future growth? Besides, most of us old guys have enjoyed our nation's most shining hours. We have grown fat on the bountiful fruits of our beloved republic; we owe a debt.

Our school-age generation has not yet harvested the first fruits, has not had time to live a life, to love a wife, or to father children.

Let's give these keen young intellects opportunity to mature and perhaps they, wiser than we, may one day lead us out of the jungle.

Most of the dogfights lost over from our Big War have raised a family by now. Many of us spent such a little while in such safe rear-echelon jobs that we have yet to wade through mud and blood as our young are being asked to do.

Besides, the older men got us into this mess; let the old men get us out. We backed into the fire, it's our rear that ought to get blistered--not our sons!

Also, I have an idea that if the draft should start breathing down the necks of us grownups -- if the safe security of voting-age Americans were suddenly in jeopardy -- there'd pretty-By-George quick be some changes made. You'd hear a grass roots demand to get these dead-center wars over with.

Because I'll tell you something: if there is not stop to this faucet dripping blood, they will eventually get around to us old guys anyway.

ACP payments \$1800 per unit

The county committee, ACP program for Lincoln County, advises all farmers and ranchers that the 1967 ACP program is based on one half of the cost of most all practices in the county handbook carried out under this program.

Payment limitation is up to \$1800 per unit. Request can't be made for payment under the county program any time before work is started on any practice that is approved for this county.

Purchase orders must be requested before work is started on any practice if payment has been requested to go to any eligible vendor.

Those who may have any questions on how the program is operated, or how it applies to individual farms or ranches, are asked to contact the county committee, the community committee or the local ABC county office.

Certification for food stamp program starts February 2

Certification for the Food Stamp Program will begin in Lincoln County on February 2, 1967.

This was announced today by Mrs. Irene Lindsey County Welfare Director.

"If your income is low, or if you are receiving public assistance, you may be eligi-

ble to participate in this federal-state-county program. It enables you to buy more and better food, usually with the same amount of money you have been spending for groceries," Mrs. Lindsey said.

The Food Stamp Program is another means of using America's agricultural abundance

to improve the diets of low-income citizens. It increases their food purchasing power by 10 to 30 percent-sometimes more.

Certification points are being set up in two locations throughout the county. Check with the Department of Public Welfare to find out where they

are located, when you should register, and what information you should bring with you.

The Lincoln County Food Stamp Program is a joint operation of the State Department of Public Welfare and USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

If you plan to landscape home start planning now

What do people think when they see your home? Often you home is judged by neighbors and friends on the basis of its landscaping or the effects that the landscaping gives. If you plan to landscape your home this spring, start planning now.

Several primary points for good landscaping are:

The first thing to consider is the design. A well - designed planting will take advantage of the lay-of-the-land at the site to produce an attractive picture to the viewer.

Secondly, consider planting from the standpoint of comfort and beauty. Adequate shade should be provided at the time of day when it is desired and where it is needed. Flowers and foliage, roses and perennials are there to enjoy. These plants are beautiful to look at outside where they grow or the flowers and cuttings are equally attractive when brought indoors to brighten the home.

As a final reminder, remember that landscaping today requires garden living areas which cater to the needs of the entire family. In any home landscaping, plan before you plant.

Fruit marketing, especially apples, will be emphasized at the Lincoln County Fruit School at the Hondo School on February 9th. The meeting will start at 7:30 p.m.

The program speakers will include: Douglas Bryant on Marketing, John Durkin on Insecticides, and Emroy Shannon on Fruit Tree Diseases.

At the State Fruit Short Course

It was said that: "Selling was getting rid of apples!"

"Marketing was the orderly disposal of an apple crop."

Which do you plan to do? Sell or Market?

If you plan to sell apples, the prospects are dim; but if you plan to market apples, you stand to make a profit. Plan to attend the fruit school and learn the latest in marketing.

Marketing starts at the nursery with the selection of the fruit varieties and continues until the apple is on the consumer's table. The failure to carry out any of the steps toward producing a quality apple will make all the other work useless.

Scientists in Georgia have found that heavy rains washed very little fertilizer off test plots. The researchers applied 200 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer per acre to a fallow plot. Water was turned on the plots one hour after the fertilizer was applied. The water was applied at a rate of five inches in two hours, which was a 100-year frequency for the area.

The falled plot eroded badly but only about two per cent of the applied fertilizer washed away. Apparently, the first few minutes of rain moved much of the fertilizer downward into the soil where it was protected from erosion.

A plot covered with sod was subjected to the same test as the fallowed plot; less than 0.2 per cent of the applied fertilizer washed off.

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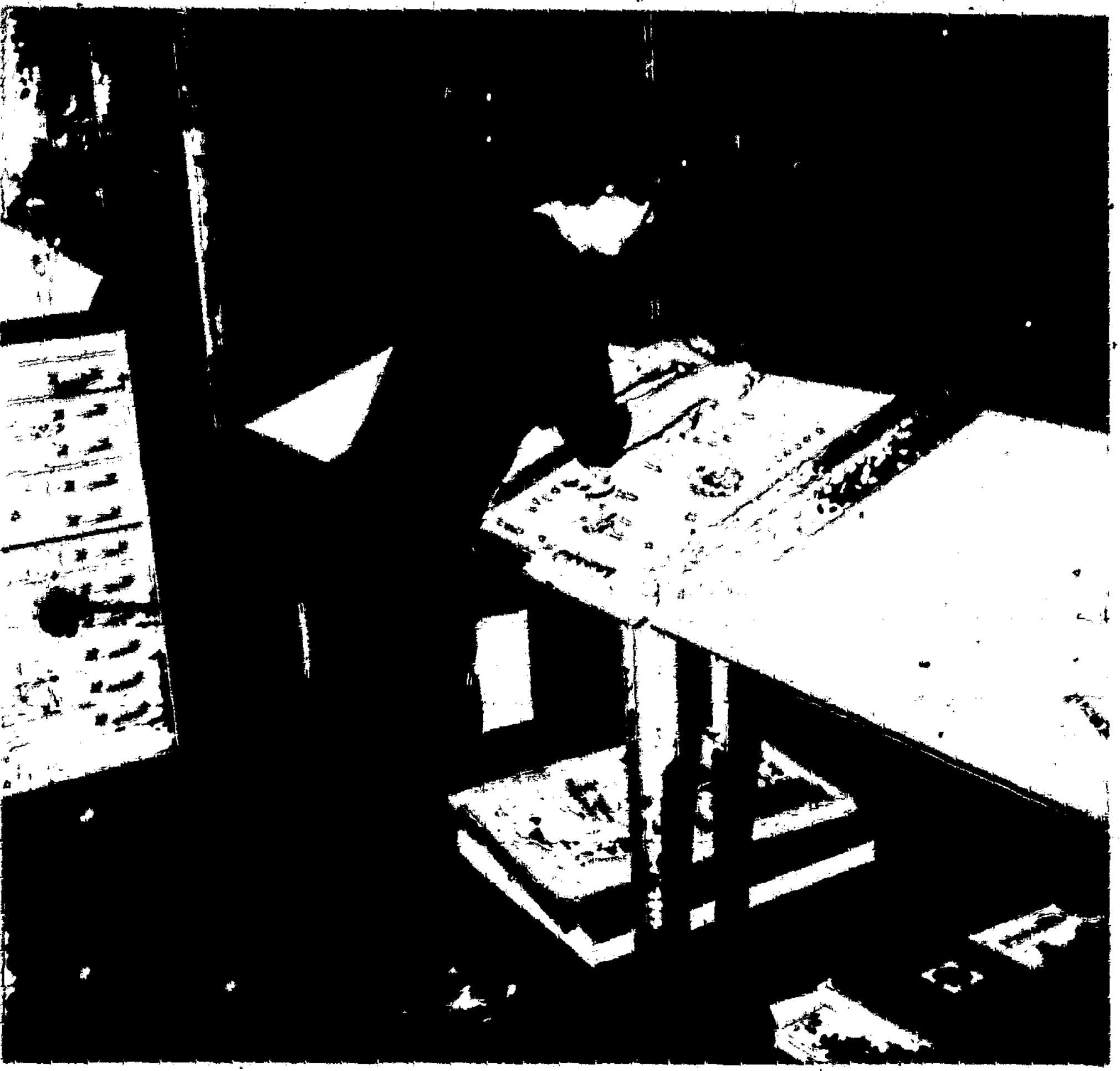

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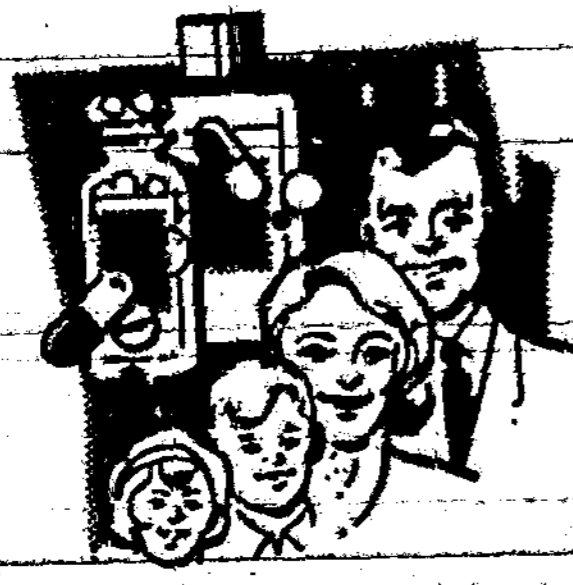

Shrecengost reports from Santa Fe

Lincoln-Sierra State Representative W. G. Shrecengost introduced the following bills this week: House Bill 67, which provides that a board member for Las Lunas Hospital and Training School shall be appointed from each county wherein the institution operates a branch institution. House Bill 68 which is identical except that it pertains to the Boys' School at Springer. House Bill 86 to create a board of institutional finance to deal with the problems of finance for the following institutions: 1. State Special Hospitals Board at Ft. Bayard, 2. Carey Tingley Crippled Children's Hospital at T or C, 3. New Mexico State Hospital

at Las Vegas, 4. Las Lunas Hospital and Training School at Las Lunas, 5. Miners Hospitals of New Mexico at Raton, 6. The Commission on Alcoholism, 7. New Mexico Boys' School at Springer, 8. Girls' Welfare Home at Albuquerque.

House Bill 87 which provides that civilian employees of the National Guard may elect to be exempt from public employee retirement system. House Bill 95, relating to municipalities providing for issuance of revenue bonds for water and natural gas associations.

House Bill 101 which would increase the amount of motor fuels tax deposited into the motor boat fuel tax fund.

a committee of news media representatives was being formed to deal with senators on general press accommodations.

Among senators voting with the majority were Minority Leader Joe Skeen, Picacho, Lincoln County; Raymond Pendleton, Roy; Ernest Hawkins, Moriarty; I. M. (Ike) Smalley, Deming; Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, Belen; Frank McClure, Grants; Aubrey Dunn, Alamogordo; Mrs. Edith Vesely, Silver City; Mack Easley, Hobbs; Harold Runnels, Lovington; James Kirkpatrick and Jerry Apodaca of Las Cruces; Jesse Richardson, Mesilla Park; Odie Echols, Clovis, and President Pro Tem R. C. (Ike) Morgan, Portales.

Sen. Emmett Hart, Tucuman, voted to permit newsmen to work on the floor.

Cattle and sheep industry leaders agreed on terms of a bill creating a New Mexico Livestock Control Commission by merging the State Cattle and Sheep Sanitary Boards. A seven-member, governor-appointed commission would serve staggered, six-year terms. Most members would represent the cattle industry. The commission would appoint an executive director to manage its affairs.

Rep. Bobby M. Mayfield, Mesilla Park Democrat, introduced a bill exempting livestock sale receipts from the state sales tax. Receipts from penning or handling livestock prior to sale would also be exempt. The bill is in the House Taxation and Revenue Committee headed by Mayfield, a farmer.

Sens. William C. Schauer and S. H. Gavin, both Roswell Republicans, proposed a constitutional amendment permitting district court trials de novo (anew) on appeals of decisions by the state engineer in water rights cases. The Conservation and Judiciary Committees will consider the legislation.

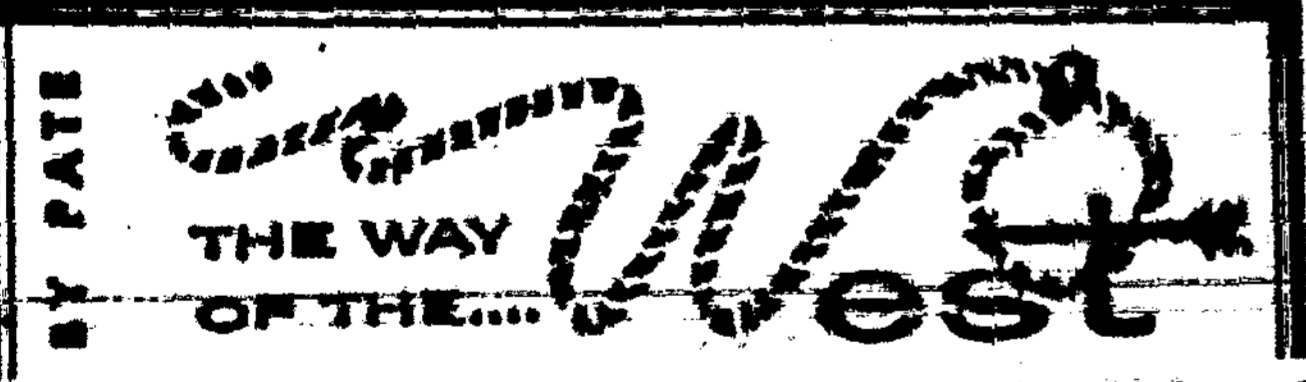
Rep. Hoyt Pattison's bill to exempt military personnel from the requirement to foreclose water rights not used for four years was set for final action in the House this week. The Natural Resources Committee gave a "do pass" to the amended bill by Pattison, a Curry County agricultural engineer, Gene Finch, legislative director of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, endorsed the bill.

Rep. Kelly Mora, Raton Democrat, introduced a bill to extend authority of the State Grasshopper Control Board to range caterpillars because of crop damage in Colfax, Union and Harding Counties. The board's overall proposed budget for next fiscal year is \$50,000. New Mexico State University anticipates heavy infestation by grasshoppers this year.

The Public Service Commission ruled that Public Service Company of New Mexico may furnish electricity to the new Kaiser Cement and Gypsum plant at Scholle, Socorro County. The PSC denied the river application of Scholle Electric Co., a subsidiary of Socorro Electric Cooperative Inc., to provide the service. Rates were left open to negotiation between Public Service and the Kaiser firm. The PSC has favored utilities companies for years in its rulings.

Rep. Alva Parker, Elida Democrat, sponsored a bill to give counties more control over the secondary highway system and reallocate funds on a formula in force before 1958.

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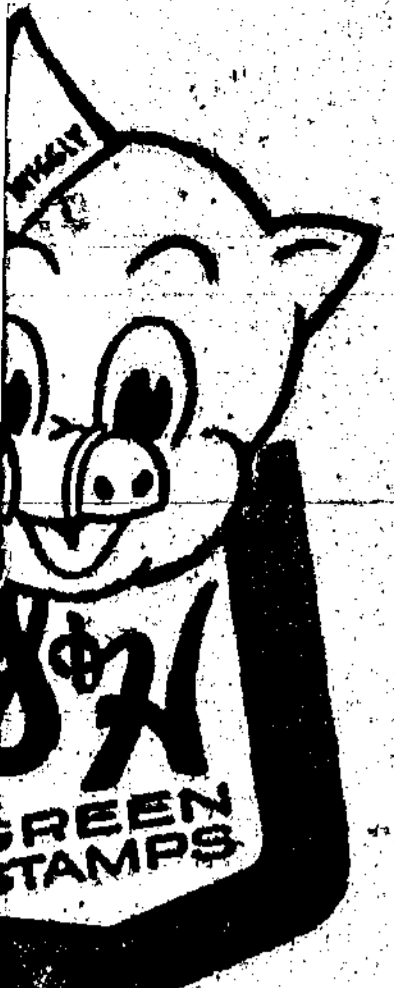
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C of C letter asks people to stem cutbacks in highway funds

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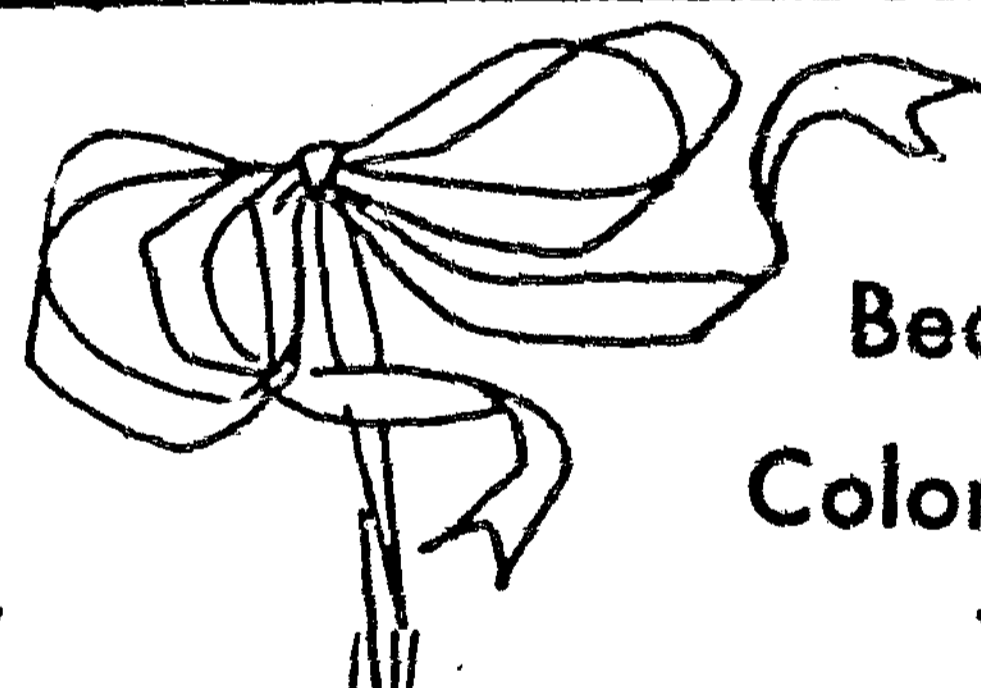

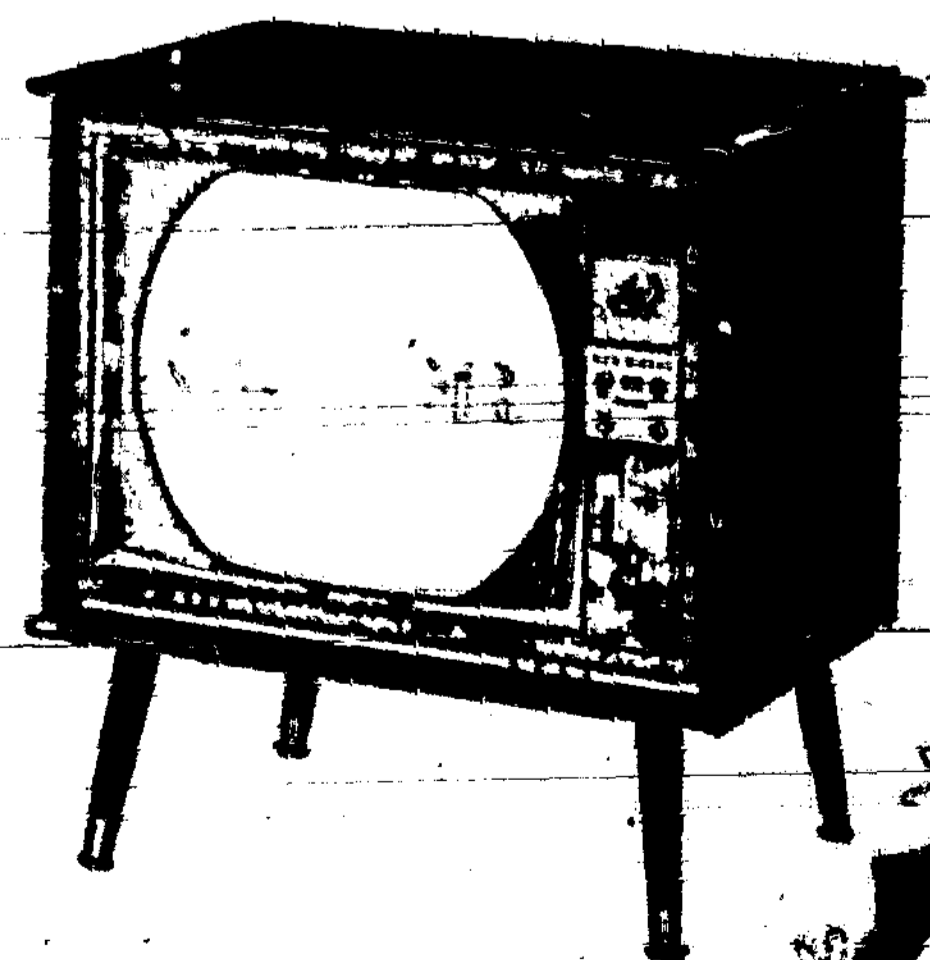

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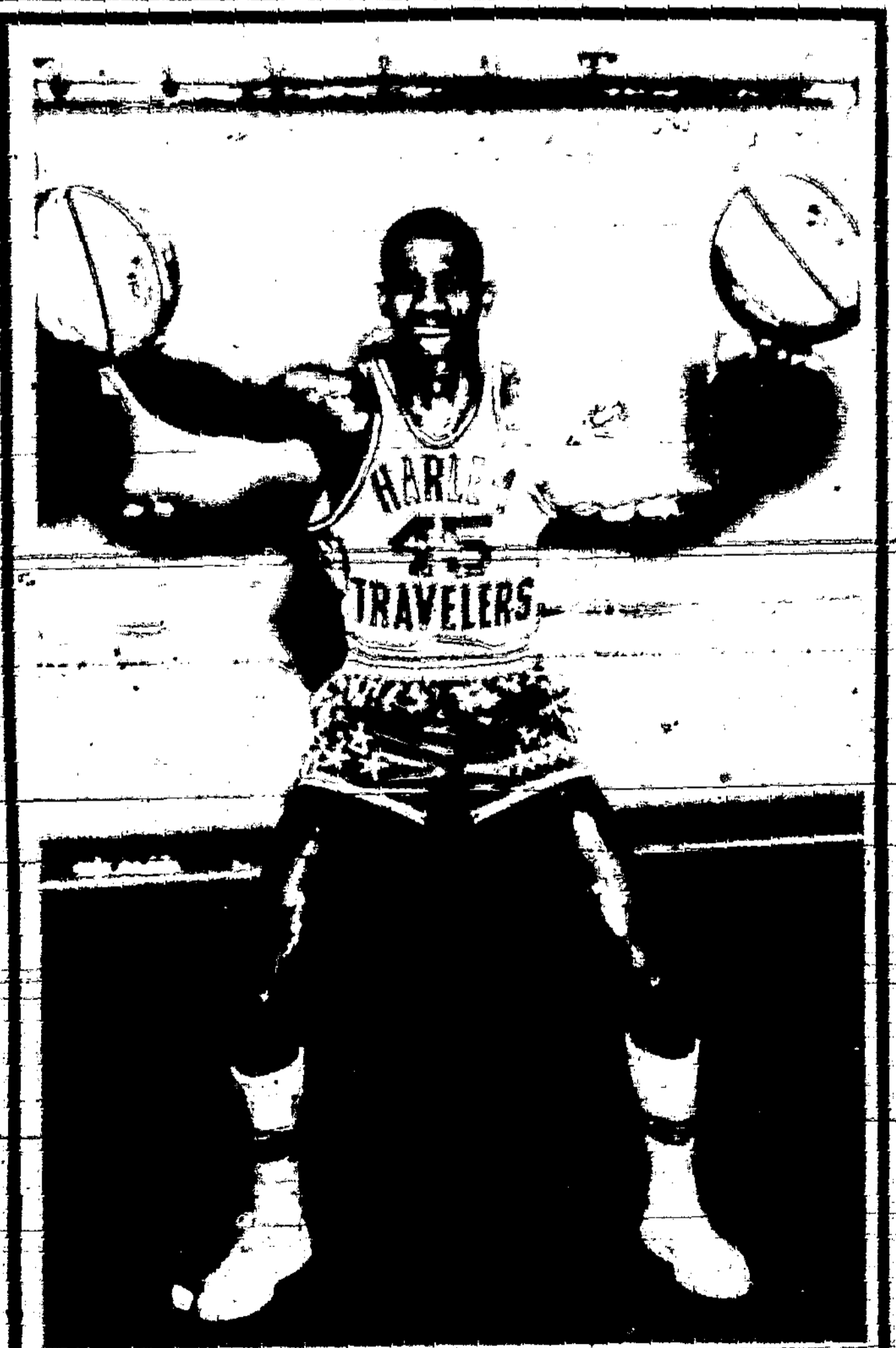
