## More than 10,000 volumes in Capitan library

Capitan's beautiful new library building will be formally dedicated Monday evening, Feb. 20, with an extensive program and Open House Celebration.

The new building, which is adjacent to the High School, is of approximately the same construction and architecture as the latter and embraces 2,000 square feet of floor space.

It was built with funds from Title I, and from a bond issue. The furniture, carpeting and other interior furnishings were donated by Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer.

More than 10,000 volumes are available to the school children and members of the community in general, and the library will be open Monday and Wednesday evenings for the convenience of town folks.

Superintendent Duane Darling of the Capitan Schools who will present the main address of the evening, emphasized the cordiality of the invitation to the

general public to attend the dedication ceremonies. "We hope they'll all come, not only to inspect the new library, but to view the general facilities of the high school," he said. Refreshments from the cafeteria will be served to visitors.

Program for the occasion includes: Prologue by the Junior Band; Pledge of Allegiance, entire assembly; Welcome, Leota Pfingsten; Hymn by the Senior Band under the direction of Bartley McDonough; a brief address by Superintendent Darling; "Claire de Lune (Claude Debussy)" by Judy Bergman.

Remarks by Dr. Mildred Fitzpatrick, Director of Title I, and her assistant Weldon Perrin; Remarks by Jack Mayfield, Principal, Capitan High School; Green Beret by the Capitan High School Chorus; Presentation of Plaque Zane Leslie, President of the Capitan Board of Education; and Frosty, the Snowman by the Band.

## Convict doing 'life' cites himself as horrible example

Citing himself as a "horrible example of what can happen to anyone who fails to develop a sense of responsibility," Steven Swartz, 26, who has served five years already on a life sentence in the New Mexico Penitentiary, addressed school children in Carrizozo, Corona, Capitan and Hondo, Wednesday.

He is voluntarily visiting schools of the state, talking to students on juvenile delinquency, in the hope that what he has to tell them may keep others from making the mistakes which landed him in his present predicament.

Swartz was convicted of first degree murder committed during an attempted armed robbery and described the monotonous and confinement of prison life where "one day just doesn't differ from any other." Even holidays, he said, were the same old routine.

Swartz pointed out that he had possessed every advantage in his youth but got into trouble because, "nobody ever told me that in

order to have freedom, you must also have responsibility."

He ended his 20-minute talk to the students by saying, "While you're surrounded by warmth and love and family, I'll be surrounded by cement and wire."

The convict was accompanied by district attorney, E. H. Williams, Jr., Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. and Sergeant Melvin West of the State Police. Following his tour of the state's schools he will return to his dreary home in the penitentiary, where he teaches in the prison's high school.

## Land bank associations closed over \$17 million

ROSWELL, NEW MEXICO Mr. Yonnie Jasper, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Roswell has been informed that our Association is one of seven Federal Land Bank Associations in New Mexico which closed over \$17 million in long-term Land Bank loans during the 1966 business year ending December 31. This was an increase of \$2.8 million over the 1965 business year.

Wm. G. Plesied, Jr., President of The Federal Land Bank of Wichita, said that loans outstanding reached an all time high of \$422 million at the close of 1966. This is an increase of more than \$70.5 million for the year despite the shortages in the U.S. money market in 1966.

One of the brighter spots emerging at year-end, Mr. Plesied said was that the money market was easing slightly. "The last interest rate we paid, for bonds sold on December 20, was down to 5.95 per cent."

According to Plesied, these seven New Mexico Federal Land Bank Associations and 56 additional associations in Colorado, Oklahoma and Kansas closed over \$127 million in loans during 1966 with an average of \$25,922 per loan. New Loans originated and are serviced by the Associations for The Federal Land Bank in the four-state district.

The Bank and Associations, which will observe their 50th Anniversary in 1967, are owned by the borrower-members which they serve. The Bank obtains money for lending through sales of bonds on the open market. The 63 Federal Land Bank Associations and The Federal Land Bank of Wichita are serving more than 32,000 farmers and ranchers in the four-state district.

Mr. Plesied predicted that the needs for long-term agricultural credit will continue to rise during 1967.

The Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association is moving along rapidly toward its goal of supplying most of Lincoln County with natural gas.

Original signers can contract for natural gas by paying a meter, deposit of \$30.00 provided construction has not passed by their property.

The deadline on such an agreement has been set for Monday, February 20, at 1:00 pm. After this deadline, meter deposits will be the actual cost of a meter and line installation or a minimum of \$125.00.

Any person who has not signed an agreement for natural gas is advised to contact the Citizens State Bank in Carrizozo where contracts are available.

## Daylight saving time will go into effect in April

SANTA FE-- A bipartisan House bill on water pollution was introduced last week in the legislative session and referred to the Natural Resources and Appropriations and Finance Committees.

Signed by Democratic and Republican leaders, the bill creates a Water Quality Control Commission composed of representatives of the State Health Department, Game and Fish Department, State Engineer, Oil Conservation Commission and Parks and Recreation Commission.

The commission would adopt comprehensive water quality program, approve water quality standards and enforce regulations to prevent or abate water pollution.

Commission regulations could be appealed to the State Court of Appeals. The commission could seek a district court injunction against a violation or threatened violation of its rules. The bill contains the emergency clause, it would become effective immediately if necessary two-thirds majorities are voted in both houses and the governor approves.

Sen. Herbert Taylor, Gallup Democrat, introduced a bill to raise the state sales tax from 3 to 4 cents, abolish one-cent municipal sales taxes and distribute the added state tax to counties and municipalities. The New Mexico Municipal League and New Mexico County Officials Association support the legislation, sent to the Finance Committee.

Sen. Fletcher Neal, Carlisle Democrat, introduced a 14-page Public Purchases Act requiring sealed bids on purchases over \$2,000. Sealed bids are now required on purchases over \$1,000. The system promotes competitive bidding and the minimum should probably be left at \$1,000.

If Gov. Dave Cargo replaces State Personnel Director Harold Blko, as expected, after legislators adjourn in mid-March, Milton E. Scudder of Santa Fe will apply for the job. Scudder was state personnel director in 1961-63 for 18 months. A Democrat, he is now operating an investigation agency and selling insurance here.

Cargo will also likely replace a Democrat on the strong State Personnel Board. There are three Democratic members and two Republicans at present. Political party distribution is not specified by law, however.

Bill Langeweger of Hagerman, president of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, told the legislature available water must be used for the greatest benefit to the state's economy. Langeweger detailed farmer and rancher water problems for lawmakers.

Testifying at a House Committee hearing on a bill to raise the state minimum wage, Langeweger said "For many years agriculture has been in a cost-price squeeze." The house passed a memorial by Rep. Hoyt Pattison, Clovis Republican, asking Congress to exempt farm trucks from the

federal highway use tax. The House bill on water pollution was introduced last week in the legislative session and referred to the Natural Resources and Appropriations and Finance Committees.

Gene Finch of Espanola, legislative director of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, told the Senate Public Affairs Committee which was hearing the daylight saving time issue: "You're not saving any daylight by moving the clock up." The Senate later defeated 27-14 a bill by Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat, to exempt New Mexico from DST.

Daylight saving time will likely go into effect in April in this state although legislation calling for a referendum on the question is still pending.

Speaker Bruce King of Santa Fe County and PRAs, Alfonso Vigil of Hachos de Toas and Mel Eaves of Albuquerque proposed a Ski Area Safety Board. New Mexico has 214 boards commission and agencies now and each requires administrative expenses. The legislature should curb a tendency to create additional boards.

Rep. Frank Bateman, Hobbs Democrat, submitted a bill to encourage petroleum refineries in New Mexico. Bateman would give preference to New Mexico refineries in the sale of state royalty oil accruing from state oil and gas leases.

Bateman amended his bill to accommodate objections raised by the State Land Office and Oil Conservation Commission. Walter Famaris Jr., president of Famaris Oil and Refining Co. at Monument in Lea County, said the legislation "would put oil which the state owns in the hands of New Mexico oilmen and keep at least this part from being shipped to Texas."

Reps. Alva Parker, Elida Roosevelt County, Willie Greaser, Tucuman, and Lee Coker, Datil, Colton County, dropped in a bill to create a New Mexico Livestock Board and abolish the Cattle Sanitary Board and Sheep Sanitary Board. The proposed seven-member board would be named by the governor and would represent the state livestock industry.

Supporters say the legislation would save \$25,000 in administrative costs. An executive director would manage the board's affairs under its supervision.

Rep. John Mathson, Albuquerque Republican, would amend the state constitution to permit the land commissioner to lease state land for development of geothermal steam which is said to underlie the area extending from Rio Arriba County to the Grants sector. The proposal is in the Judiciary Committee.

SANTA FE REPORT FROM...

## Rep. W. G. Shrecengost

The following pieces of legislation have been introduced by Representative Shrecengost:

House Bill 95 provides for issuance of revenue bonds for water and natural gas associations; it amends present law so that additional bonds may be issued if necessary for future expansion. Two associations in Lincoln County are directly affected, Eagle Creek Inter Community Water Association and the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association. The measure passed House last week without dissenting vote and is ready for Senate hearing this week.

House Bills 101 and 171 have to do with motor boat fuel tax. They are companion bills which will make revenue possible for expansion or improvements of state parks and lakes, which will encourage tourism. The bills were heard by taxation and revenue committee Monday, received "do pass" vote to be presented on House floor Wednesday morning.

House Bill 137 would prohibit picketing of farms, ranches and orchards, while perishable agriculture crops are being harvested. The bill got dual referral to be heard by two committees, labor and agriculture. It was in labor committee Tuesday, no action taken, sponsor opinion is that labor committee is waiting to see what agriculture committee will do.

House Bill 115 relates to state purchases. It creates purchasing standards committee, defines powers and duties of this committee, provides for keeping of records by state purchasing agent. Bill was heard Monday in corporation and banks committee, tabled temporarily as there are two or three other bills relating to same subject.

## Home economic girls conduct class for three, four, five-year olds

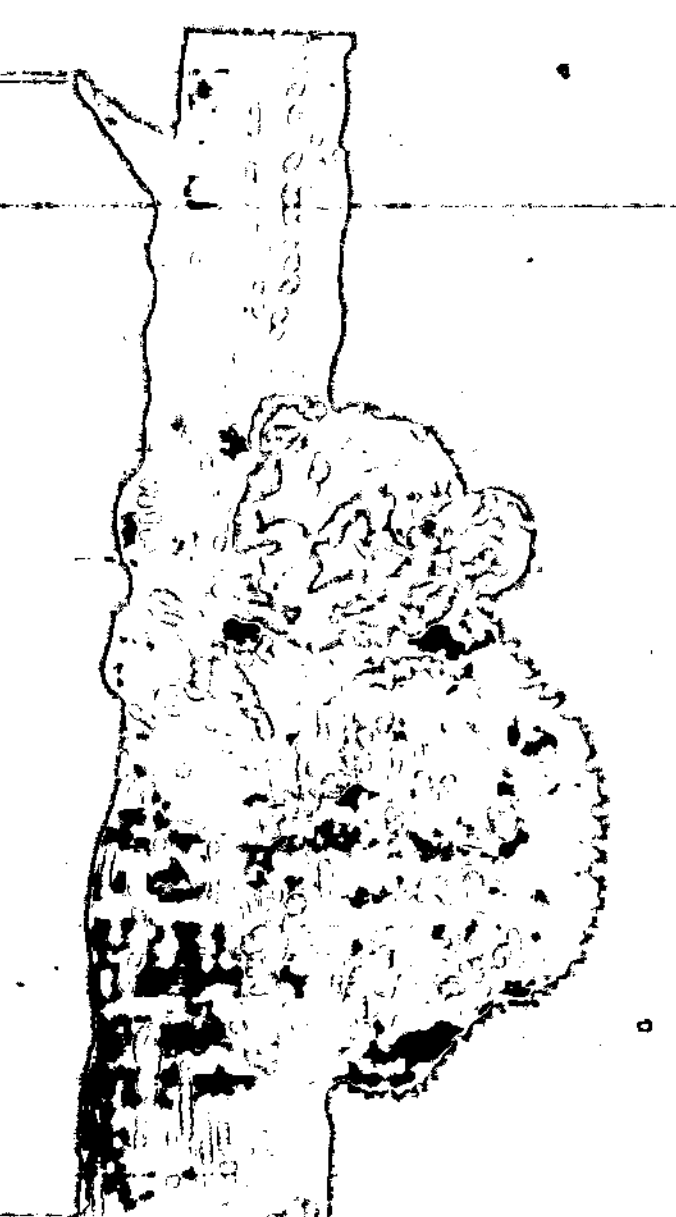

EDITOR SPENDS PLEASANT DAY IN SANTA FE

The Lincoln County News Editor in company with Jay Lassater and C. L. Brown left Carrizozo Sunday afternoon headed for Santa Fe and unexpected pleasure as well as business.

The north part of New Mexico is enjoying early spring weather much the same as Lincoln County and our trip was a genuine Sunday afternoon tour. The unexpected pleasure came with a stop at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Brown who live in a 281-year old home, former trading post, saloon, etc., at Gallistone. Walls are 22 inches thick between rooms as well as outside. Dinner at the restaurant across the road was a real climax to some wonderful New Mexico Hospitality.

Up bright and early the next morning in Santa Fe the News editor went up Canyon Road to visit with Dale Bullock, owner of Rydal press. Dale is a friend of many years, one of the best printers in the state and had some equipment we wanted to see. In our conversation with Dale we got the message that state purchasing of printed matter needs attention to correct serious defects which are costing state taxpayers large sums of money.

Our first breakfast of the morning was with Jay Lassater. After the trip up Canyon Road we enjoyed a second breakfast with Mr. and Mrs. Paul Frost, C. L. Brown (One of the hardest sleepers we know) and Jay again.

After the second breakfast we hurried over to the capitol building and visited with Rep. W. G. Shreeve. Best part of this visit was a tour of the building with Betty Shreeve as guide. We like the new capitol very much, beautiful paneling, colors, floors, and everything fine except arrangement for news people to cover legislative sessions in both houses.

A special guest package gave us a seat next to Speaker Bruce King in the House of Representatives. We enjoyed being there watching the wheels of government turn -- they were rolling along pretty good, representatives serious minded for the most part.

The Rev'd William E. Crews, Vicar of St. Bee's Episcopal Church opened the Monday session of Legislature with his prayer:

Almighty and Everliving God, we yield unto you most high praise and hearty thanksgiving for the life given unto this nation in Abraham Lincoln. In particular we thank you for his vision of society where each man stood free with his neighbor to vote, purchase a house, be educated and travel unmolested by class hatred throughout this land.

How long O Lord before justice will be done; how long O Lord before persecuted find peace; how long O Lord before all men will turn and follow in the path to human dignity. Give us grace to lay to heart the problems of this state in housing and employment, let us point the finger at others when we ourselves fail. We ask this in the name of one who drank water with the Samaritan at the well and was welcomed by the Gentile. Praise be to his Birth, Christ Jesus the Lord of all people. Amen.

The particular interest of Lassater, Brown, and Payton was two pieces of legislation, House Bills 175 and 176 which in general extends the coverage of the Public Utility Act to Rural Electric Cooperatives in all respects. These companion bills, if passed, would put the power company supplying Carrizozo under control of the Public Service Commission.

After the House of Representatives adjourned Rep. Bill Shreeve, Dr. Eugene Marlin, David Koch and Payton went to the Compound for lunch of veal cutlets, real tatty, and lots of conversation about House Bill 86 introduced by Shreeve. This legislation will set up board of institutional finance. Later in the afternoon at governor's press conference we learned more about Bill #86 which tended to change our thinking that such a board could be a good thing for the state.

Situation among the several state institutions as of now is that much flagging is going on, generally to the detriment of the state. The new board would deal only with finance, but such an arrangement would put this new board in a position to straighten out some bad deals.

With Jim Colegrove as guide around the halls of the new capitol the News editor attended the governor's first press conference after his return from his trip through Ohio and Michigan. Gov. Dave Cargo made the statement several times that he did not want to criticize the legislature, "I've taken the oath, made a Valentine resolution" were the words he used.

Gov. Cargo said he had spent an hour with Sen. J. Skeen that morning. Skeen has been reported as critical of some of the governor's statements.

Governor Cargo is going to set up a state tourist council of nine members, one each from four regional councils and five appointed by the governor. Memberships will be subscribed to by any person interested in tourism, payment of dues will make the council self supporting. It is expected to coordinate all our activities. Travel pamphlets will be coordinated, with the intent that materials about all attractions are available statewide.

The matter of where our tourists come from is of concern to Gov. Cargo. He has asked the Department of Development for a market analysis intended to show where New Mexico prime markets are located.

Another aim of the governor is to set up a series of trails, such as "Old mission trails," "Cattle trails," etc. The governor said "We've got to get them off Hwy 86 long enough to visit our state. Advertising of the State of New Mexico will be changed. An advertising conference will be set up, with people skilled in advertising, to make choices of best ways to advertise our state and how to get most for our money.

Gov. Cargo said he found that our state magazine is held in high esteem around the country, but distribution is poorly handled. Now 64,000 copies are being printed, he would like to see this increased to 100,000. Parts of entry will be changed to information carriers.

The subject of reorganizing state government with 50 more than 20 departments was discussed by Gov. Cargo at the press conference. He said both Ohio and Michigan officials have promised help. There are now 214 boards, more added each year, and many of them should be eliminated. An aim of reorganization would be to get departments put together, to go on performance budget. The governor said he would make special call to legislature next year to reorganize the executive branch of our state government.

## Herman Kelt is last of deeprock miners

Lincoln County old-timers tell us there is only one of the breed left... only one man who actually worked in the famous old mines at White Oaks in their heyday... his name is Herman Kelt a recent visitor in Lincoln County.

Herman's aunt married Allan Lane who has come down from White Oaks to Chaffield, Texas, where Mr. Kelt was born, around 1902. Times were tough on the Texas farm for the Kelt family, father had died leaving seven children the oldest being 18, and the family thought if they could just make out, maybe 50¢, or a few dollars a day, they would be in heaven.

The Kelt family came to White Oaks. The North Homestake mine, considered the original discovery, was opened by a fellow named Wilson who sold his mine or traded it off for a few dollars and a six shooter. There were two men in on the mine who decided to split their holdings which made for the North and South Homestake mines. Jack Winners, know as old

Blue Skin, now buried in White Oaks cemetery, had the north part of the Homestake.

The Old Abe mine, was discovered just before the 90's according to Mr. Kelt. William Watson located this lode, Herman worked in all three of these mines. Other mines like Lady Godiva, Little Mac, Boston Boy, were never really producers but lots of work was done on them.

Mr. Kelt started as a boy of 16 sorting ore at the North Home stake. Next he went down in the mine and started shoveling, running air machines, and doing some of everything even to running the hoisting engines.

They had a grizzly with bars of iron three-quarters inch apart. Ore cars came down from top of shaft and dumped ore over the grizzly, fines going through into bin, coarse on the floor where the waste was taken out and ore shoveled into bin.

Wages were \$3.50 top in the early days at White Oaks, that was for a 10-hour day.

Herman and his brother had a lease on Old Abe before it caved in at the 1200 foot level. Will

Kelt, George Curran, George Queen and Herman were partners in the lease. Judge John Hewitt had agreed to get timber to catch up 110 feet of cave-in. He never got them and the partners worked lowgrade ore up above for about six months.

Will Kelt did all the rock work sinking the winz and running the last 200 feet of tunnel in the Old Abe. They hit ore again from 1300 feet down to the winz. Ore from this mine ran \$50 a ton.

Mr. Kelt recalls that the Whitmans came to White Oaks from New York about 1915 and took out tungsten from the Old Abe, the North and South Homestake mines. The Queen boys came along in the 40- or 50's with lease on Hudspeth property did a lot of work, but never made it pay.

There is good ore in the White Oaks area today, says Herman Kelt, but he would not be able to tell anyone where the ore is located.

The Kelt's moved to Carrizozo in September of 1927, so the youngsters could go to school. At that time there were probably 75-100 people living in White Oaks, but not much going on up there.

## Choate family in the news

SEATTLE (AP)—A "For Sale" sign went up Wednesday on the Robert Eugene, the ancient 98-foot boat that carried a Montana family to a new life in the Aleutians 27 months ago.

Alice Choate, widow of the man who established a 260,000-acre sheep and cattle ranch in Unalaska Island, called here with her youngest son Ted, 12, to sell the old freighter. Carl Flory of Unalaska, a former tugboat chopper, washerman, "It's sort of like selling your home, but it has to be," she said "Rufus had planned to get rid of the Robert Eugene, anyway before he died."

Rufus Choate, 53, died of a heart attack May 10, 1958 but his wife and four children decided to stay on the windy, stormy swept island to finish what he started.

Choate always called the 76-year-old boat his "ark". When the Choate family called for Unalaska in 1934, the Robert Eugene was stuffed with cattle, sheep, pigs, chickens and other animals for the wilderness homestead.

Several times that summer Choate made the two-week voyage back for more livestock and for a year his family lived in the boat until they could repair and abandoned Army post office for their ranchhome.

The Choates left a 6,000-acre ranch near Miles City, Mont., "because it was getting too crowded."

After dentist and doctor appointments for Ted, who is a homophiliac and spends much of his time on crutches, Mrs. Choate and her son will return to Unalaska by plane.

## 1967 income predicted

Roswell, New Mexico -- Rising production costs began to make serious inroads into farmers' and ranchers' net income as 1966 drew to a close, and the outlook for 1967 indicates more of the same.

Wm. G. Plested, Jr., President of the Federal Land Bank of Wichita, said in a year-end statement that farmers and ranchers in the four-state area served by the bank will probably have about the same gross income in 1967 as in 1966, but their net may be off as much as five per cent.

"The prices of virtually everything farmers need will be up in 1967," Mr. Plested predicted. "Real estate taxes may increase by another five to seven per cent; feed, fertilizer, labor costs, insurance, seed, live stock -- all are likely to follow the same pattern."

The cost of money, upon which interest rates to farmers is based, was higher in 1966 than at any time in the bank's 50-year history, he said. This had an adverse effect upon the bank as well as upon its borrowers. "The Wichita bank is one of 12 Federal Land Banks which are owned by Land Bank Associations throughout the country," he said. "Collectively, we borrow money by issuing bonds and we loan this money to farmers. At one time in 1966 we paid as much as 6.14 per cent interest on money we loaned out to farmers at 6 per cent, our legal ceiling."

One of the brighter hopes emerging at year-end, Mr. Plested said, was that the money market may be easing slightly. "The last interest rate we paid, for bonds sold on December 20, was 5.95 per cent."

In 1966, net farm income per farm in the U.S., was \$4,900 -- an increase of 68 per cent over 1960. But there were 17 per cent fewer farms at the end of 1966, so the real per-farm increase was probably closer to 3 per cent.

Where do American farmers go from here?

As indicated by developments of the last couple of years, the next big breakthrough on farms and ranches will be the sophisticated uses of calculators and computers.

"Rancheros are already making use of computers," Mr. Plested said. "Smaller farmers and ranchers too will hire these services."

Locally, the 1967 forecast is for smaller crops, specifically alfalfa. Labor costs here are advancing and real estate taxes for 1967 are expected to increase. At the end of 1966, there were fewer farms and ranches in the Association's district, which comprises DeBaca, Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy and Lea Counties than at the beginning of the year.

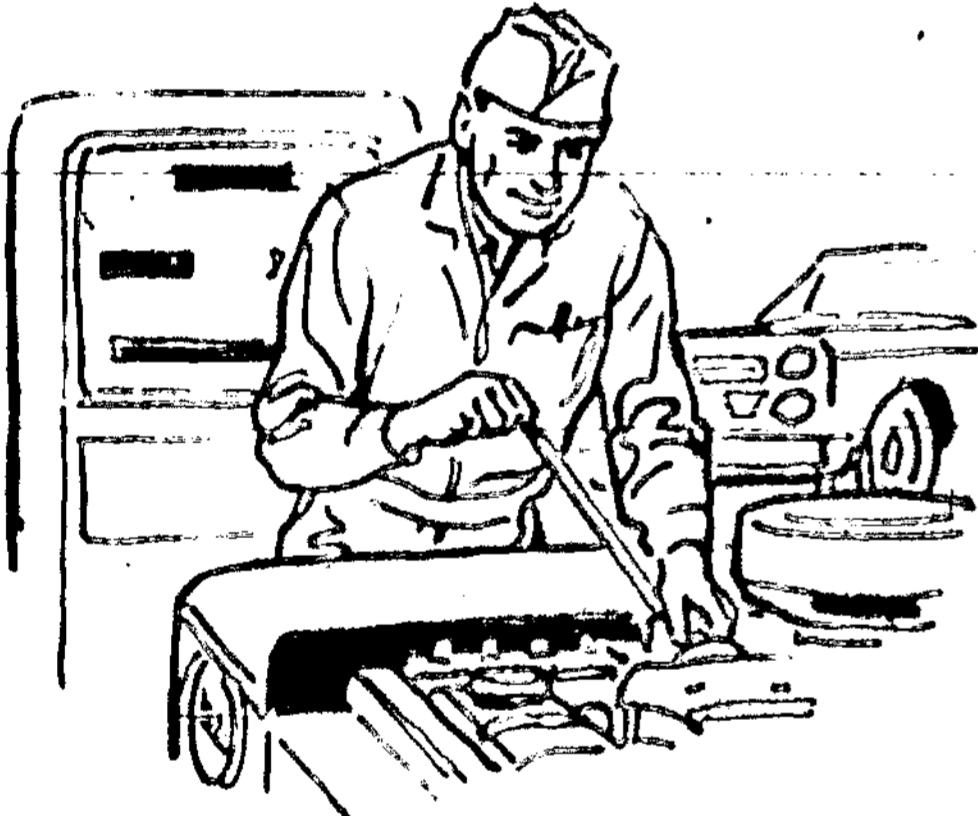

Moral awakening from machines

Another tragedy of our highly technical age has again taken a toll of the best. The space-race means nothing if this is the answer now with perhaps more losses later in trying to land men on the moon or more distant planets, and have them return safely. The very scientific complexities with billions now spent and more demanded to acquire know-how in a hurry, provide no insurance against human error and mortal frailties that can lead to death leaving none to achieve no matter how gallant the effort.

Is this a stern lesson like that of the fate of the 125 men that were sent to an ocean grave in the atomic submarine, avoidable if men's lives are placed above a time-table? Defective material and manufacturing, malfunctioning, must never a time-table that gives precedent over vital risks lives both men and their mission fail, and make all gully by toleration.

Too often investigations end in excuses, subterfuges, concealments, and self-justification, but one fact remains always: Man is not sufficient in himself. To trust in human devices is to err. It leaves the human error. A higher and more solemn trust of man in his Maker to guide, govern, and protect is his salvation. History has recorded this; the Scriptures elucidate this primal requirement to defeat evil of any sort. Our nation was founded and advanced under this divine Principle. It was the motto on our now vanished dollar.

Mathematics and the glorified adding machine and memory cabinet--the computer--lack this moral sense leaving imperfect conclusions since the vital premise is lacking.

This tragedy is impressive because of the nationally known exploits and the high-trained, fine men. It seems closer to most of us that the impersonal and deaths of the thousands of our heroes in Viet Nam today, though of national concern also. Yet among these soldiers and those who may soon be forced to join them may be geniuses that never had a chance--lost also to our nation.

Present and potential future events on the present course should cause every American to ponder and act upon one burning question: "How truly am I?" Following this train of introspection can come other tormenting specters, Have we a representative government; or are those long in office betraying public trust, violating their oath to uphold the Constitution and our national ideals of liberty and justice to all? Is our prosperity a myth when the public and private debt in United States is one trillion four hundred and fifty billions. Is this the heritage with nothing but wars and court convictions of officials the monument that is being built as another tower of Babel?

Above this awful confusion of din and clamour of strife and shouted lies comes "the still, small voice." It was not in the fire, the wind or the earth-quake. It was not in matter or its elements. Centuries later came the gentle outcry from the great Teacher, who turned water into wine, fed the multitudes, stilled the tempests, raised four-day dead, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy-burdened and I will give you rest." This highest demonstrator of God's power gave the world an understanding of Spirit as the Life of man and a new Commandment. "By their fruits ye shall know them." Only Love can bless, Walter A. 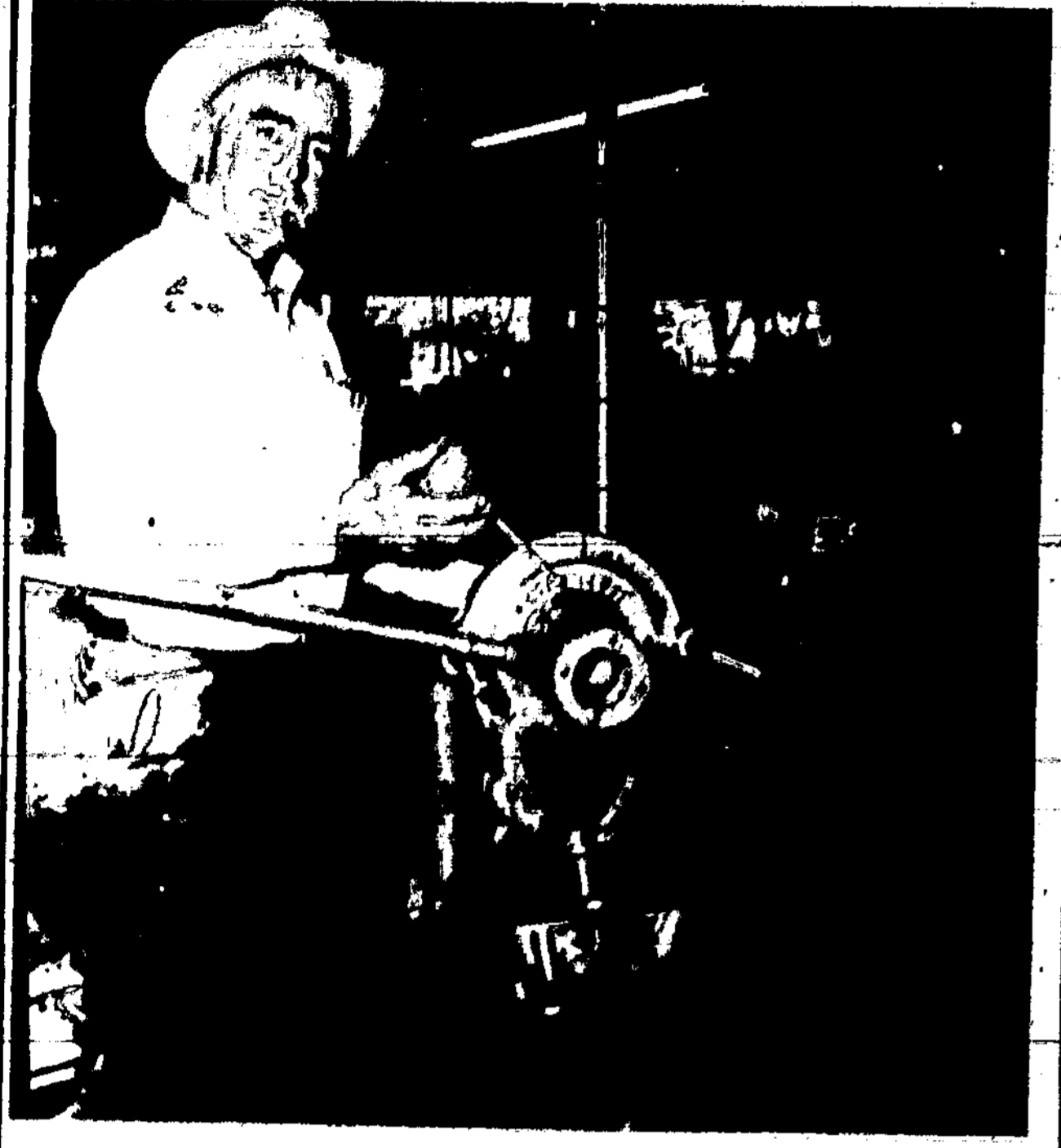
