

Chamber Commerce assisting Hospital Medicare approval

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, vitally interested in retaining its present Senior and retired citizens, and in attracting more to the community, this week added its weight to the effort of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital at Carrizozo to gain Medicare approval of the present facility.

The Chamber is contacting the State's Senators and Congressmen requesting special consideration of the hospital's problems, and a slight slitting of the usual government red tape, to make possible the construction of a new

wing on the hospital for a nursing home for the elderly.

Although the Hospital has recently expended \$1,600 in remodeling of its operating room, spent \$14,000 on a new modern stainless steel kitchen, and has fulfilled and exceeded every plant requirement of Medicare, and was recently inspected by the State Department of Public Health and awarded an "A" rating in every category, according to Administrator J.T. Clegg, Medicare approval has been withheld because the Hospital does not have a registered nurse on duty 24 hours daily.

Attempts have been made to acquire the number of nurses necessary to qualify for Medicare but has proved impossible, Clegg points out. The country is short on experienced nurses, their salaries are high, especially in the larger towns, and few young graduates will come to the smaller communities which not only can afford to pay them less, but do not offer the outside attractions of the larger communities.

The importance of the approval of Medicare is that only a Medicare approved hospital can the patient receive reimbursement of the major share of his bill, a

patient in a non-approved hospital must stand all the expense himself, whether or not he is enrolled under the Medicare program. Only exception is that of a patient on welfare.

Clegg cited a recent instance in the local hospital in which two male patients, one 76 and the other 86, were treated. The former, on State Welfare had his complete bill paid by the state. The other, although eligible for Medicare, received no aid, because the hospital was unapproved, and his widow is faced with a bill for \$886.66, which she can ill afford.

Although in far away Washington, the distance from Carrizozo to Roswell, 90 miles away, and El Paso, 130 miles away, seems short; it was pointed out by Mr. Clegg, that to elderly folks it is a long way from home, and a sad and lonely place to be sick. He said that among the greatest factors in recovery for an elderly patient was the opportunity to see his loved ones every day. He stressed that the 80-year-old wife, or conversely the 80-year-old husband, of a patient would have little opportunity to travel the distance to either of those cities daily to visit. To him, and to many others

in the community, this is the ultimate cruelty.

"To split hairs over mere technicalities, where the aged and infirmed are concerned is inhuman," the Administrator said. "In addition, it is a fact that percentage-wise, the patients in our hospital get far more nursing care and individual attention than do patients in the larger hospitals with a registered nurse on duty with a large staff of Nurses Aides under her supervision. We have a Registered Nurse on duty sixteen hours a day in direct contact with our patients."

Letters have been received by Administrator Clegg from New Mexico's Congressmen stating that they are making efforts to assist in obtaining Medicare approval for the Carrizozo Hospital. A faint ray of hope was seen in one from Senator Clinton P. Anderson stating "There may be a possibility to give a special certificate to a town as remotely located as Carrizozo -- but it would still have to get 24-hour nursing service."

Fifty-foot flame salutes gas turn-on



A 50 foot flame will shoot high into the air over Carrizozo Friday evening at 6:30 o'clock to signify the installation of natural gas in the area and set off the formal celebration of the completion of the project.

An elaborate and extensive program interspersed with musical selections by the Carrizozo High School Band will be conducted from a low-boy converted into a huge platform at the Carrizozo Meter Station just across the tracks from the city off Highway 380. The Band will start it's concert at six o'clock.

Arnold Boyce, a member of the Board of the Capitan & Carrizozo Gas Association, who is also director of Ceremonies and introduces a long list of dignitaries including Johnson Stearns, president of the Citizens Bank, who will give the main address on the "Progress of Carrizozo". Editor and Publisher Paul Payton of the Lincoln County NEWS will summarize the project from its inception to its completion.

The flame will emanate from a special pipe joining the mainline with a valve turned slowly and then gradually elevating the flame to its 50-foot zenith. Pressure in the line could project a flame more than 300 feet in the air, it was emphasized by Contractor Pat Higdon, whose firm has done the installation work in the area, but the resultant heat would be too great in the vicinity, he said. Mr. Higdon will be given the honor of lighting the flame in recognition of the splendid co-operation which he said his men have given the community during the construction work. It was stated by local leaders. They pointed to the fact that much of the installation had been done by horing, rather than tearing up pavements, and had been accomplished with little disruption of normal traffic. It was also pointed out that his employees had displayed a friendly and co-operative spirit during their work, which brought them the respect of the populace.

Among the dignitaries to be introduced from the stand will be: Mayor Leandro S. Vega of Carrizozo, Mayor J.C. Germany of Capitan, Carrizozo City Attorney Elfred Jones, Contractor Pat Higdon, President Joe B. Cheney of the Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Association, Jevie Ross, vice president of the Association, secretary treasurer James Provin, members of the Board, M. Ortiz and Valton Hall, Manager Fred McDonald and Assistant Manager Johnny Hayes of the Association, Superintendent of Carrizozo Schools Glen Allison, and Capitan Superintendent of Schools Duane Darling.

Following the half-hour band concert the program will formally get under way with the playing of the Star Spangled Banner by the Band, followed by the invocation by the Rev. Milford Milster, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carrizozo. Benediction will be by the Rev. Father Anthony Bolman of the St. Rita Catholic Church of Carrizozo.

Mrs. Lacy selected educator

On February 10, 1967, Mrs. Rosemary Williams, Educator, New Mexico, of the Southeastern New Mexico Education Association notified Mrs. Hattie Lacy that she had been selected one of six educators for the Southeastern District Hall of Fame. Mrs. Lacy will receive her award at the SENMEA convention's afternoon session in Roswell on March 17, 1967.

Schools in the Southeastern District, of which the Capitan school system is a member, recommends their teachers for the S. E. District Hall of Fame. Mrs. Lacy was among the six selected.

Mrs. Hattie Lacy received her teacher's degree from the Sul Ross State Teachers College, Alpine, Texas, in 1920. In the same year Mrs. Lacy became a member of the Kappa Delta Pi, a Honor Society in Education. Hattie Lacy had special training in remedial work through-out her teaching career.

Mrs. Lacy began teaching in New Mexico in 1924 which included the schools in the Capitan school system. She was awarded

her work with the Indian school children at the Ft. Stanton TB Hospital. Also she attended the graduation exercise of most of her elementary students. She was chosen as 2nd place teacher of the State of New Mexico in the year of 1959. In the same year the graduating class of the Capitan high school chose her as the teacher of their year book. For the teacher of the year in the state, she was sponsored by the Capitan Woman's Club.

During her teaching years at Ft. Stanton TB Hospital, of which she taught 12 straight years of 11 months per year, the former Executive Director Kirby Morrison, of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association, notified Mrs. Lacy, "that as she had had more experience than anyone else in the state of New Mexico, in teaching tubercular children, could he have her assistance in preparing his teachers for the teacher's workshop on "Education of the Exceptional Child", held at New Mexico Western College in Silver City, in the year of 1961; to which she

was honored to comply.

Mrs. Hattie Lacy was retired in her 36th year of a most unique teaching career, when Ft. Stanton TB Hospital moved to Ft. Bayard. Her retirement was effective in May, 1966.

One of the six selected teachers in the SENMEA district will be selected to the State of New Mexico Teachers Hall of Fame in the near future. Mrs. Hattie Lacy and Lewis Cummings are the only teachers of the Capitan school system to be selected to the S. E. district Teachers Hall of Fame.

Virgil Weir — Virgil Weir, 66, died Wednesday morning, presumably of a heart attack, following a short illness at his home in the Shafter Apartments. Mr. Weir had been residing in Carrizozo about ten months. He was reported to have been in Gran Quivira. He is survived by his wife, Louise, two brothers, and a son in Laguna Beach, Calif. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Chapel of Roses.

GROCERS READY TO ACCEPT USDA FOOD COUPONS

Families with U. S. Department of Agriculture food coupons to spend will find retail grocery stores scattered through Lincoln and Otero County ready to accept them like each.

This was announced today by Carl Speagle, in charge of the Roswell field office, U.S. Consumer and Marketing Service.

He said about 31 food retailers have applied for authorization to accept these coupons. With nearly all county food retailers in the program, patterns of trading should continue as usual, he explained.

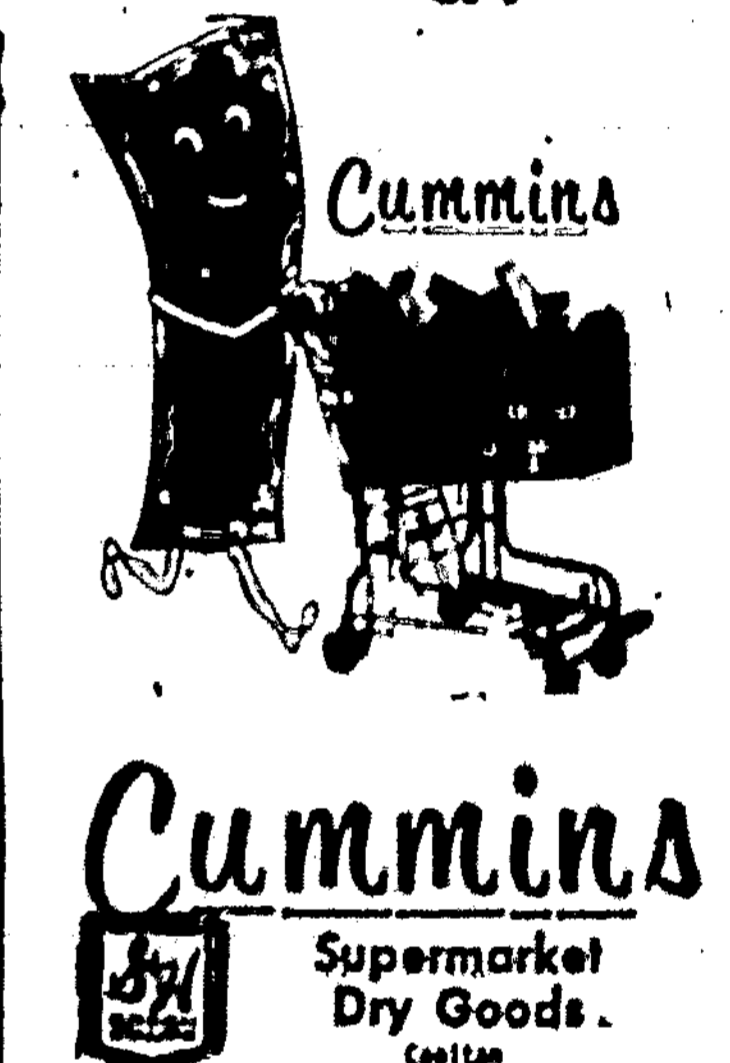
"Remember," he emphasized, "that USDA food coupons can be spent only for food, so don't get upset with your groceryman if he won't accept coupons for soap, matches and other household needs. Although such items are sold in most grocery stores, they are not food."

You can buy almost any food you want, Speagle pointed out, as long as that food is produced in the United States.

"This regulation makes sense," he said, "because one of the purposes of the USDA Food Stamp Program is to help American Farmers sell more of their foods."

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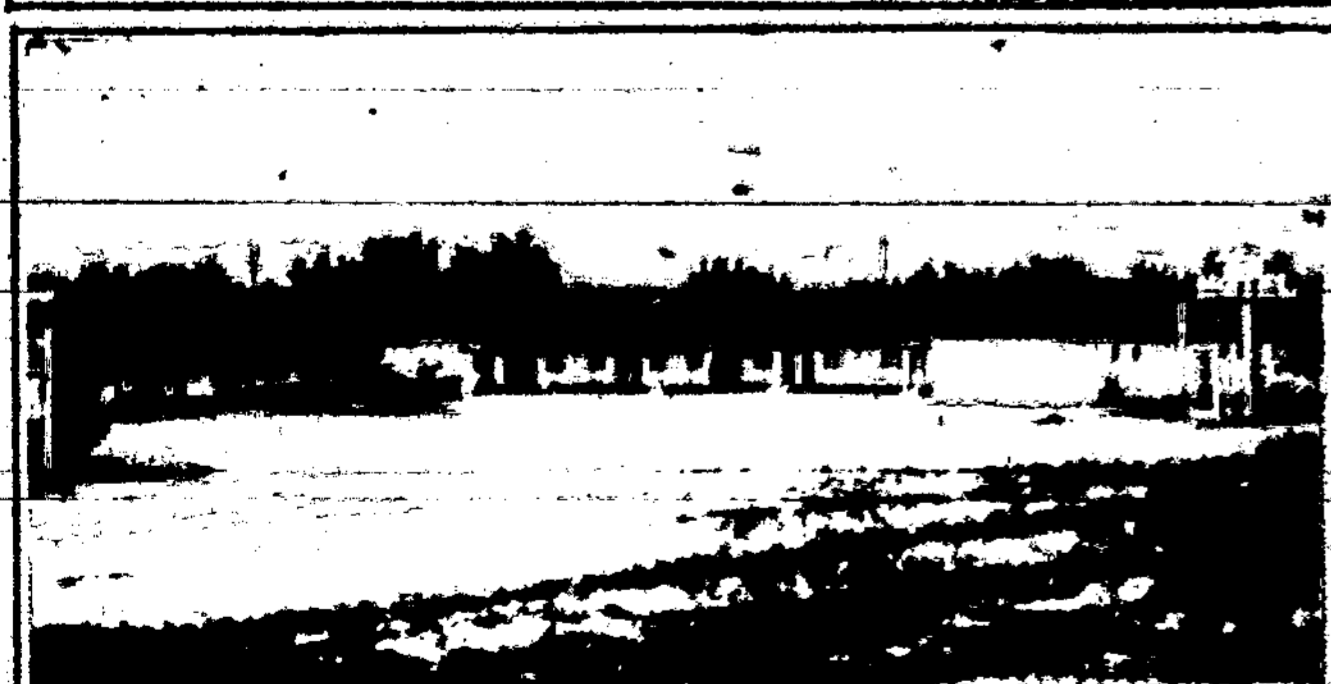

Orville E. Priestly now in that special place reser ad for strong-minded, was one of the breed of editor and publisher who did much more than just study the dollar-side of his newspaper operation. He wrote the editorials for his Las Cruces Sun-News and guided its editorial policy.

We'd like to think that our profession was full of dedicated men who work full time at newspapering, not true. There are only a few like Orville -- his passing was a great loss to New Mexico journalism.

We can't afford it

The subject of "free" education is being kicked around in California and news from that free-wheeling state could have had influence on adjoining states... like New Mexico.

Talking with Bernio Laala Sunday, one of Lincoln County's more knowing educators, we both agreed that kindergarten (being promoted by state PTA) would be fine if the state could afford the extra cost, but before adding extra tax burden New Mexico had best take care of present educational programs.

This week one-third of Carrizozo 1966 graduates in college -- there is no good reason why two-thirds of New Mexico taxpayers should subsidize the other third... especially when it's the two-thirds that really need the educational advantage.

But, more important than who is paying for what, is the fact that New Mexico taxpayers are carrying a full load and legislators are looking for new means to finance present state programs. New Mexicans cannot afford free tuitions any more than can the people of California.

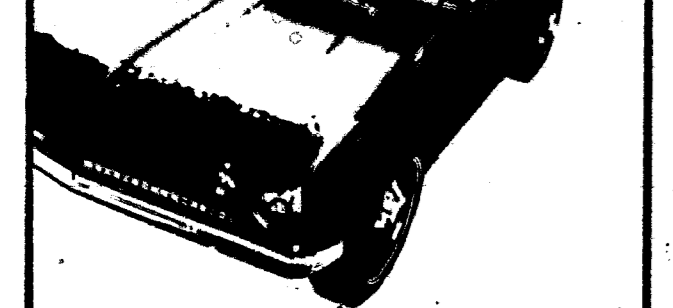

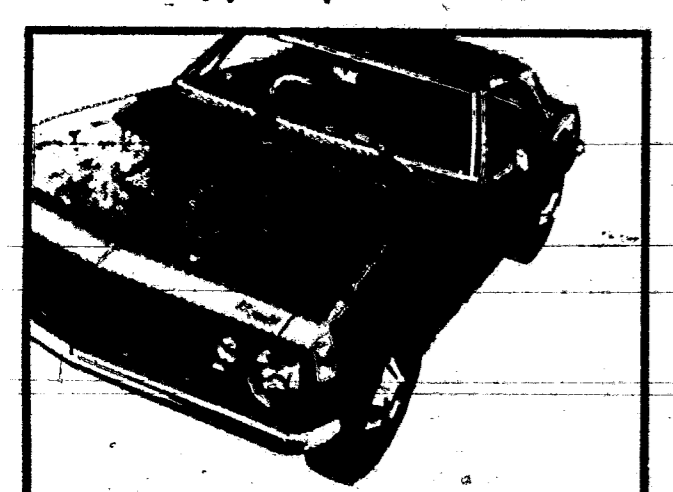

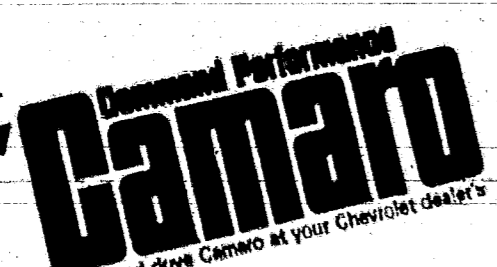

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE--The Congressional districting plan introduced by Representative Max Coll, freshman Republican from Roswell, should look inviting to Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe.

Most New Mexico counties with heavy Spanish-American population would be placed in a district with Albuquerque's Valley which also has a strong concentration of Spanish-American voters. This lineup did not pass unnoticed by U. S. Representative Johnny Walker of Santa Fe who defeated Chavez by a slim 4,000 votes in the 1964 Democratic primary for the office he holds.

Coll put the following counties in one district under terms of his bill: Catron, Colfax, DeBaca, Grant, Goshute, Harding, Hidalgo, Los Alamos, Luna, McKinley, Mora, Quay, Rio Arriba, Sandoval, San Juan, San Miguel, Santa Fe, Sierra, Socorro, Taos, Union, Valencia and Legislative Districts 1 through 9 in Bernalillo County.

Significantly, U. S. Representative Tom Morris of Tucumanari in Quay County lives in this proposed district as does Walker. Coll would force Morris and Walker, both Democrats, to run against each other.

Walker said during the week-end he would not run against Morris out of friendship and respect for Morris' seniority in Congress.

Coll would distribute counties in the other Congressional district as follows: Chavez, Curry, Dona Ana, Eddy, Lea, Lincoln, Otero, Roosevelt, Torrance and Legislative Districts 9 through 18 in Bernalillo County. Districts 9 through 18 in Bernalillo County are in the Heights area of Albuquerque and are normally pro-Republican.

This district would be likely to elect a Republican to Congress. The other district, containing much Spanish-American vote, would probably choose a Democrat.

Chavez ran a strong race against Walker in 1964 and might be persuaded to try again if New Mexico's two seats in the U. S. House of Representatives are split in this fashion. Both of New Mexico's Congressmen are elected at large now, New Mexico is the only state with more than one Congressman, besides Hawaii, to elect its members at large.

Coll's bill, signed by nine Republicans and one Democrat, is in the House Privileges and Elections Committee headed by Representative Robert Martin, Red Rock Democrat. Co-sponsors include Representatives Carter Kirk, Deming Republican; Walter Bamer, San Ysidro Republican; Lee Coker, Dalt Republican, and Harry Schram, Roswell Republican.

Other Congressional districting bills are expected from both political parties. Both Walker and Morris oppose districting, holding New Mexico may gain a third seat in Congress after the 1970 federal census. Republicans cooled this in 1970.

Some district judges are strongly opposed to the House bill to centralize district court financing on the state level. Representative David Norrell, Clovis Democrat and majority leader, introduced the bill for the Judicial Systems Study Committee which he heads.

The bill would require district courts to submit budgets to the State Department of Finance and Administration for approval and would place control over court financing in the state court administrator. The bill is in the Appropriations and Finance Committee.

The financial ability of district courts varies widely over the state. Some districts are in sound condition and others are poor.

House Agriculture Chairman Alvin Parker, Portales Democrat, introduced a bill allowing the State Cattle Sanitary Board to charge packers reasonable fees for overtime meat inspection service. The bill was in the Agriculture Committee. The House passed 46-0 the major bill by Parker to merge the Cattle and Sheep Sanitary Boards into a New Mexico Livestock Board. The legislation was sent to the Senate.

The House Natural Resources Committee, headed by Representative Walker Bryan, Carlbad Democrat, conducted a hearing on a proposed State Water Board. The proposed board is in committee for additional consideration and amendments. Representative Hoyt Pattison, Clovis Republican, is chief sponsor of the bill.

The long hearing included testimony from ranchers and farmers from Curry, Roosevelt, Lea and Catron Counties and State Engineer Steve Reynolds. The proposed water board would be appointed by the governor and would administer state water laws and regulations. The board would employ a state engineer.

A bill to boost the state gasoline tax from six to seven cents and distribute the increase to municipalities received a "do not pass" recommendation 4-7 from a Senate committee. Sponsors were planning to try to preserve the bill on the Senate floor. Existing municipal gasoline taxes would be abolished. Counties would not share in the state tax boost, according to original terms of the bill, but an amendment would allocate 10 per cent of the increase to counties.

A bill by Representative Ernest Miera, Bernalillo Democrat, would repeal the present weak campaign expenditure law. Control over election campaign spending would be lifted entirely. The bill was to be considered early this week by the House. Miera is chairman of the Public Affairs Committee.

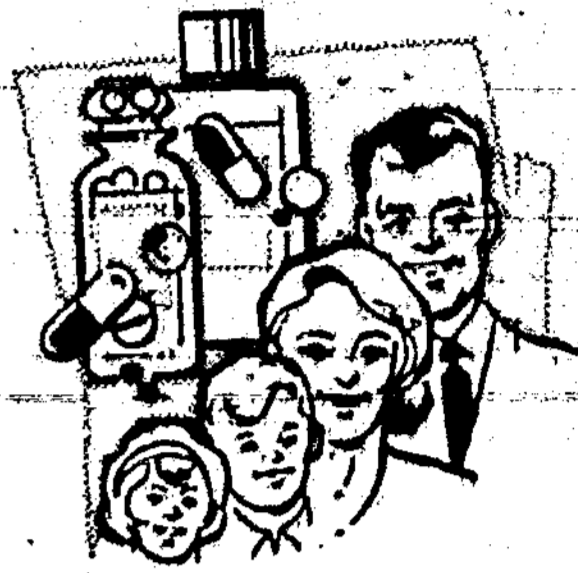



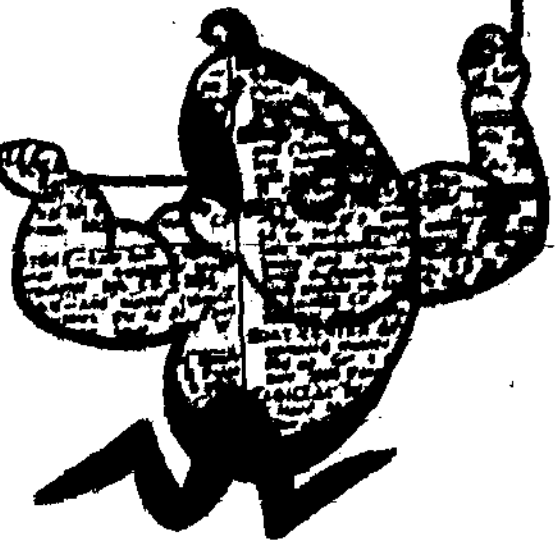
