Letters to the Editor

In answer to letter to Department of Game and Fish requesting confirmation on legality of having lawn deer for pet. In Section 53-2-7 of New Mexico Law states that it shall be illegal for anyone to take, capture or kill or have in his possession any game bird or animal while not permitted by regulation. However it has been the policy of the Department in cases where orphans are found. After being investigated by conservation officers to enter into an agreement where such parties have proper facilities and environment to raise such, providing that the animals be allowed to run free to go back to its workland at its discretion. It is further agreed that any time the animal is not cared for properly that it be picked up and placed in refuge provided for such animals.

We discourage people who are not absolutely sure that they are orphans to leave them alone, as many are kidnapped each year and result in baby dying of improper care, and sometimes becomes necessary to file charges. We do ask everyone's cooperation in preventing the loss of many animals each year.

An airplane crash five miles northeast of Ruidoso Sunday about 1:30 p.m. claimed the lives of Mr. and Mrs. E.J. Wallace and Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Potter of Kermit, Texas.

The wreckage was discovered by two boys who were helping fight a forest fire, apparently caused by the crash. Evidence recorded by investigators indicated that the craft almost plunged straight down into the thick forest. It sheared off the top of a tree about 35 feet, then skinned two nearby trees at about 20 feet.

Much of the plane was disintegrated, with hundreds of small pieces on the ground. The cockpit was a charred ruin, making identification difficult.

library and as teacher aid. Mrs. Durham will work in the area of health and teacher aid. Beginning this week the library will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for all periods.

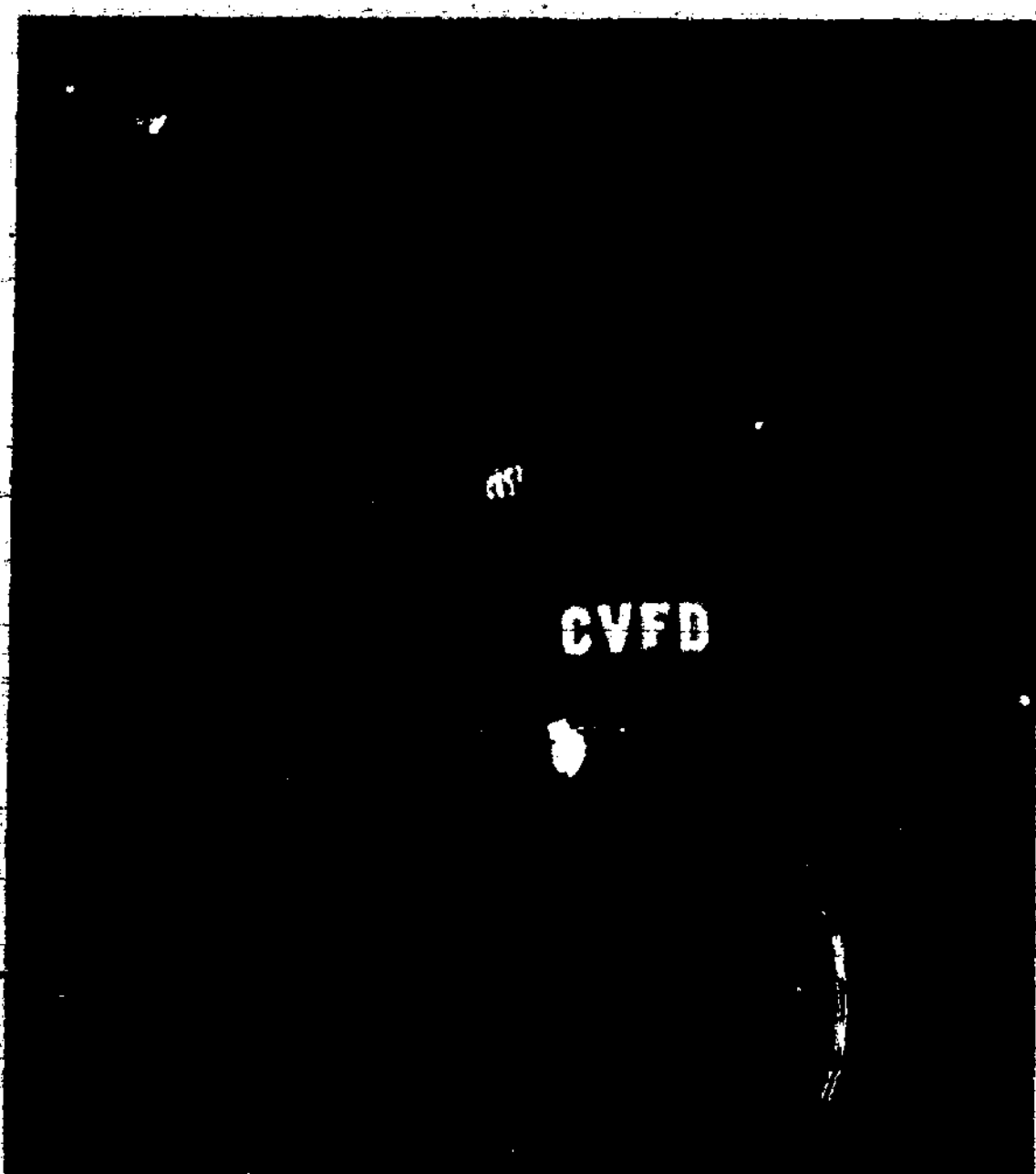
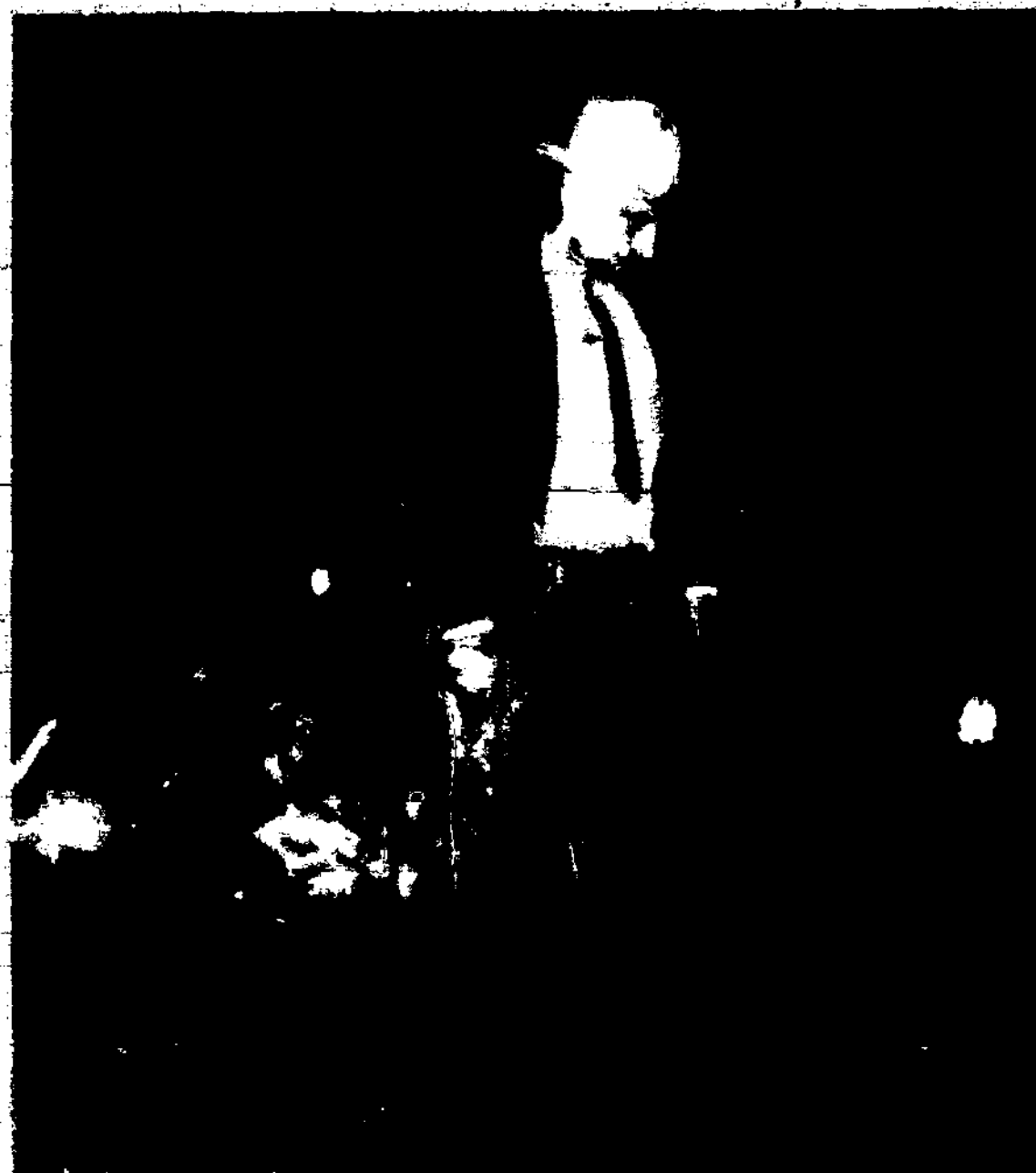
Teachers were rehired by the board of education.

Miss Brady is from Clinton, Louisiana, which she identifies as a "spot on the road" close to Baton Rouge. Both will receive their B.S. degree in home economics education this coming June.

While here in Carrizozo they expect to have experience teaching classes in the work-study program, buying and construction of clothing with the Home Economics II class as well as home nursing and family health with that group. 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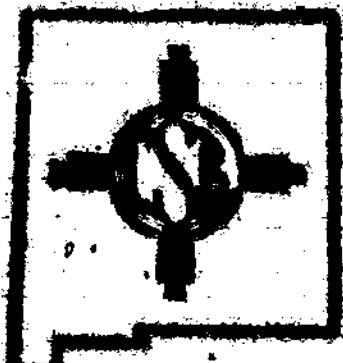




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Commentary - -

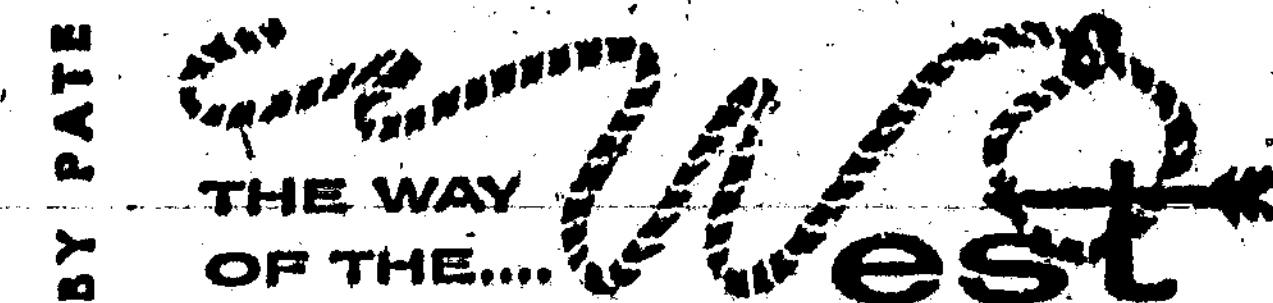

One cent gas tax clears legislature

SANTA FE--A bill boosting the state gasoline tax one cent cleared the legislature and went to Governor Dave Cargo after a hard fight in the House.

The New Mexico Petroleum Industries Committee and the New Mexico Municipal League lobbied intensely for the bill which hikes the state gasoline tax from six to seven cents a gallon. Municipal gasoline taxes would be abolished. The state would distribute .9 of the increase to municipalities and .1 to counties.

Representative Cartor Kirk, R-Hidalgo-Luna, strongly opposed the bill on the House floor. Kirk said projected income from the legislation was inaccurate. Municipal League statistics held increases would be: Bolen, \$6,610; Bayard, \$12,080; Capitan, \$1,374; Carrizozo, \$4,308; Cimarron, \$1,662; Clayton, \$5,130; Clovis, \$120,700; Clouderoff, \$1,497; Columbus, \$2,320; Deming, \$60,741; Estancia, \$1,054; Eunice, \$4,235; Fort Sumner, \$4,534; Grants, \$10,362; Hobbs, \$31,151; Hurley, \$8,760; Jal, \$6,896; Las Cruces, \$49,126; Lordsburg, \$17,425; Moriarty, \$8,068; Mountainair, \$3,157; San Jon, \$2,422; Santa Rosa, \$20,416; Socorro, \$10,287; Springer, \$2,486; Tatum, \$4,796; Truth or Consequences, \$10,859; Tucumcari, \$20,690; Tularosa, \$5,840, and Vaughn, \$6,500.

The bill was passed by the Senate 29-13 and by the House 44-26. Governor Cargo was expected to sign the bill. The price of gasoline would be increased in unincorporated areas and in municipalities which do not levy a municipal gasoline tax.

The big general appropriations bill, containing teacher pay raises, was pending early this week. Provisions allow a salary increase of 450 for teachers.

The state would guarantee a \$100 increase with earmarked funds in the general appropriations bill. The state would also offer another \$175 in pay raises with matching funds to be provided by local school districts from available sources.

Compromise legislation pending in the House would allow local school districts to vote up to 2.3 mills of ad valorem tax to raise additional funds. These funds, if voters approve, would not be available before next year, but State Finance Department analysts say nearly all school districts have enough cash balances now to yield the \$175 matching money.

The Senate passed a bill by President Pro Tom R. C. (Mac) Morgan, Portales Democrat, to permit counties to levy a 50 percent surtax on the state income tax. The surtax would hinge on a voter referendum.

Funds would be used to support public schools. Legislators were wrestling with school finance early this week.

Adjournment is expected Saturday for the 28 Legislature's First Session of 80 days. Fifty-three bills were on the House

of the New Mexico Dairy Processors Association, spent much time at the capitol pushing for the bill.

Senator Rannels' bill to establish Congressional districts for New Mexico's two seats in the U. S. House of Representatives fell on a 40-30 vote in the House that adopted an adverse committee report. Five Democrats joined the 25 Republicans to oppose the report, but 40 Democrats voted together to kill the legislation.

Archbishop sees more Parochial closings

More Roman Catholic schools in the Santa Fe archdiocese likely will be closed because of financial troubles and a lack of teachers, the Most Rev. James Peter Davis has announced.

The archbishop said he was talking mainly about smaller schools in small communities and not the major schools.

He said the number of nuns and priests who enter teaching is declining.

"You can't go back and make up for the bad years... even if there is a subsequent rush of girls in the convent," Archbishop Daris told a group of parishioners at a meeting last week.

"Besides, to be very frank with you, many sisters feel that spending their life teaching arithmetic or some other purely secular subject is not what the church needs most from its religious leaders at this point in history," he said. "And they may well be right."

He said one experiment would send nuns into the public schools as teachers.

"They will, of course, have to go without their habits," he said. "But the habit doesn't make the monk, they say, so a sister remains a sister even when she wears a lay woman's clothes."

St. Mary's High School at Albuquerque is the latest school in the archdiocese to be closed. Its last class will leave this spring.

The archdiocese includes most of the northern one-third of New Mexico.

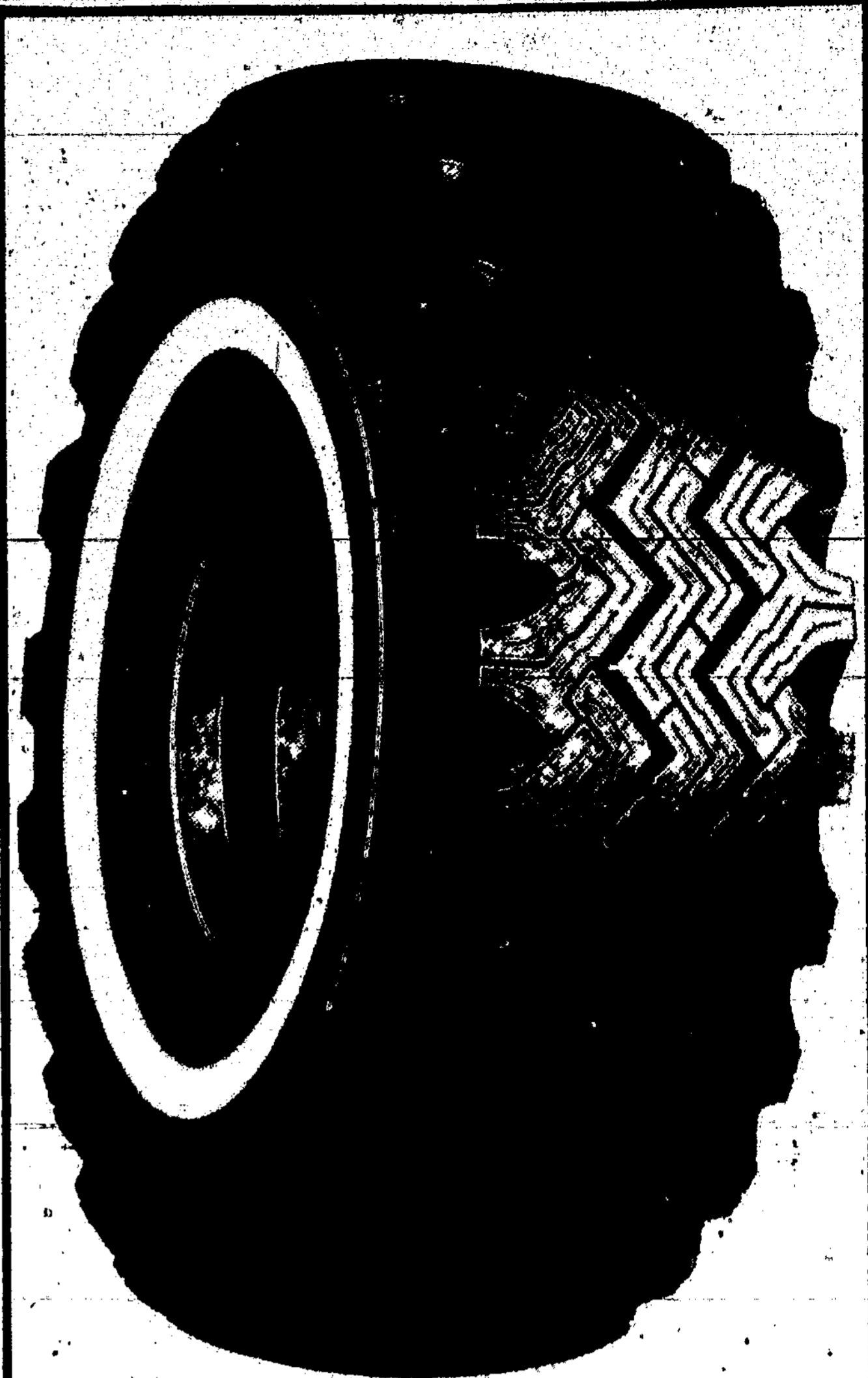
