Lincoln hospital OK'd for medicare

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital will become eligible to receive Medicare patients around May 1.

The hospital will be eligible because the board has succeeded in hiring Miss Lois Miller, a registered nurse, who is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Z. Manire of Carrizozo. Miss Miller will begin work as a night nurse on May 1, bringing the number of registered nurses to three, with one licensed practical nurse. Patients will now receive care from licensed nurses round the clock.

The increased nursing staff was the last requirement left for the hospital to fulfill. The improved operating floor and X-ray room were completed last year and the building was

approved for Medicare in January.

Medicare will mean that senior citizens in this area can use the local hospital instead of traveling to Roswell. It should also mean, better use of the hospital here. Since January 1, 35 per cent of the patients at the hospital have been senior citizens, and the hospital board predicts that the number of older patients will increase markedly under Medicare.

The board of trustees will meet with state representatives again on April 11 for a final evaluation.

J. T. Clegg, speaking for the board of trustees, thanked all the citizens of Lincoln County who wrote letters and helped make Medicare possible.

Remodeling works wonders in St. Rita Catholic church

Through help from the Catholic Church Extension Society, an organization that helps mission churches in the United States, the St. Rita Catholic Church in Carrizozo has been completely remodeled and redecorated inside. The completed job has wrought a beautiful interior.

Mike Ortiz of Santa Fe was responsible for much of the work. Furnaces were moved outside, new ceiling, new tile on aisles, new carpet, cushioned kneelers, and of course new paint have brightened the atmosphere.

Of special beauty are the Altar of Sacrifice and Altar of Reposition constructed of native stone. Much wrought iron has been used

which fits in beautiful with the stone work.

New vestment cases have been constructed in the sacristy, and a new baptistry is equally beautiful to match the church interior.

According to Father A.T. Bolman there was no plan for the work, except that they knew what they wanted and ideas came as the work progressed.

The walls have been insulated, new doors added. The organ has been moved to the body of the church with the idea of getting people to participate more. A public address system has been installed.

Fay Harkey donated rock for the work and Fred Chaves did most of the electrical.

Health program to start in Carrizozo schools

Carrizozo Municipal school is beginning a Health Examination Project. The purpose of the project is get better health records for the students and to attempt to improve the health of certain students as a result of information gained through testing. The test will consist of four parts, historical data gathered by the school with the assistance of the parent, information gathered by Nurse Bradley, testing by the Lab at the hospital, and a physical given by Dr. Spencer. The first move in the project will be to take the 5th, 5th, and 4th grades and develop a workable procedure.

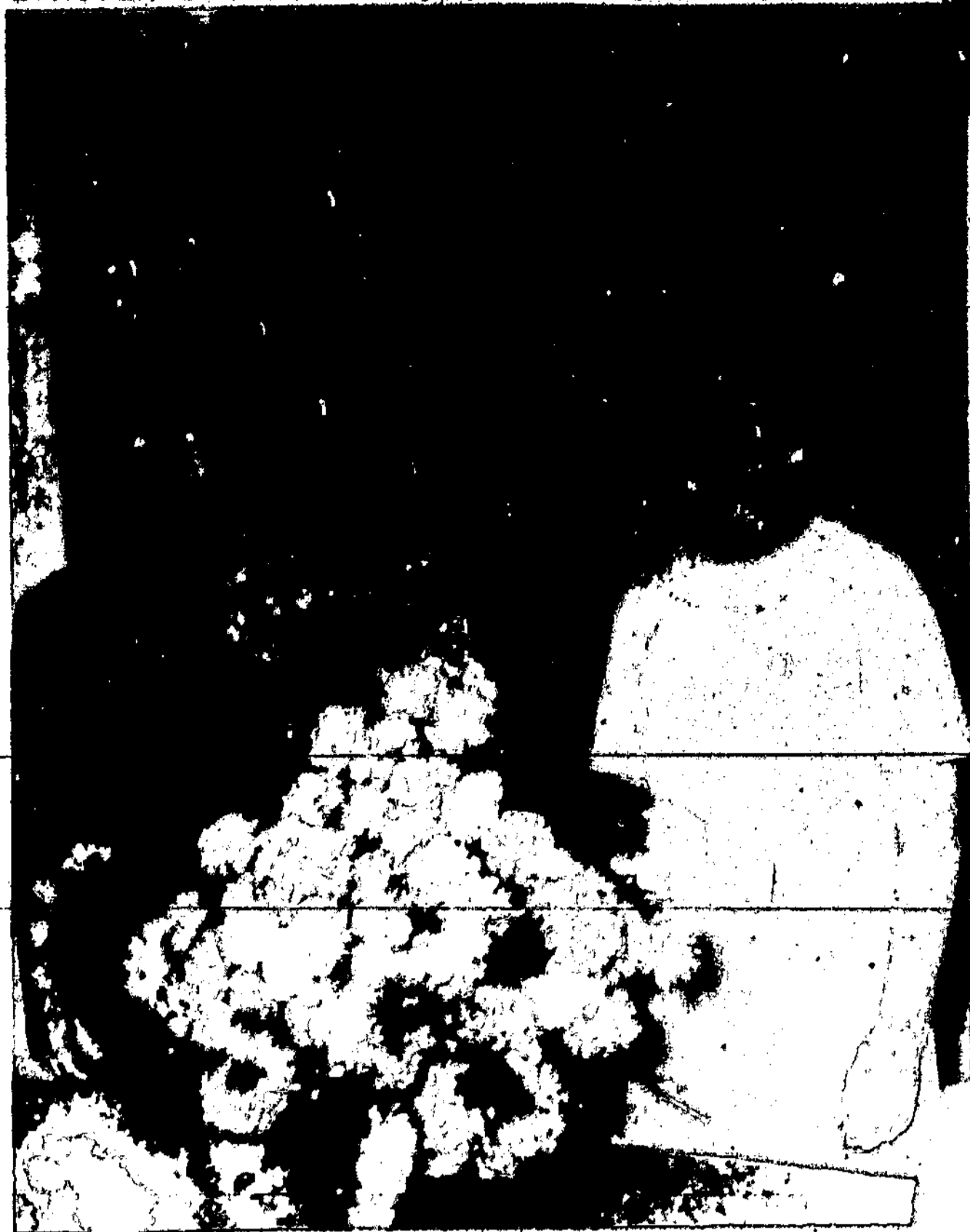
Letters are being sent to parents asking their permission, and their cooperation. This project is made possible through the use of federal Title I money. It is hoped that almost all the children will be found in satisfactory health. The few who need further attention will be very fortunate in having their difficulty diagnosed. St. Rita will be included also since federal Title I funds are being used. The result of the testing will be made known to the parent, and a copy of the complete health record will be given the parents who request it.

28th Legislature rated moderate

by Fred Buckles SANTA FE--The first session of the 28th Legislature, moderate in its approach, passed constructive legislation and left other problems unsolved.

The House and Senate deadlocked on the last day on general appropriations, below cost liquor sales, minimum wages, mandatory property reappraisal and unemployment compensation benefits. Conference committees were named to try to settle differences on some of these bills.

The legislature enacted a mild conflict of interest law and a lobbyist registration act. Both are first ventures into a controversial field.

A bill intended to prohibit discrimination in selling to New Mexico liquor wholesalers was approved. Suppliers or distillers cannot sell spirituous liquors to in-state wholesalers at prices higher than prices to wholesalers in any other state.

The House repealed the 1963 Legislative Retirement Act but the Senate balked, killed two repealer bills sent over by the House and ordered a study of the retirement fund by Legislative Fiscal Analyst Inez Gill. Majority Leader Tibo Chavez of Belen was acting chairman of the Senate Rules Committee which voted a "do not Pass" to the two repealers.

An act creating area vocational schools was passed. The sponsor was Representative Bobby Mayfield, Mesilla Park Democrat. A proposal to establish a public defender lost narrowly in the House 34-33. The Judicial Systems Study Committee, headed by Representative David Norvell, Clovis Democrat, submitted the legislation. Another effort will be made on this bill at a later session.

Workman's compensation benefits were raised. Representative

Finis Leroy Heidel, Lovington Democrat, was chief sponsor of the bill.

The relative responsibility law was repealed. Four mine safety bills -- by Representative Kelly Mora, Raton Democrat, were approved. Chaves County House districts were reapportioned in a bill by Representative Max Coll, Roswell Republican.

A bill to permit collective bargaining by public employees failed. Albuquerque legislators were the sponsors. A measure by Representative Frank Bateman, Hobbs Democrat, to give in-state refiners priority to purchase state royalty oil was enacted.

Maintenance of the new state capitol building was handed to the Legislative Council in a bill signed by Republican Governor Dave Cargo. The legislature approved codified laws on corporations, savings and loan associations and public schools.

A bill to centralize district court financing on the state level cleared the House 34-17 but died in the Senate. An anti-discrimination law failed.

A Veterinary Practice Act, defining animal care practices permitted to owners and setting rules for practitioners of artificial insemination, was passed. The chief sponsor was Representative Alva Parker, Elida Democrat.

Senator Jerry Agudaca, Las Cruces Democrat, tried to exempt New Mexico from daylight saving time. His effort failed on a close vote after steam- ing controversy.

A bill to repeal the veterans' property tax exemption of \$2,000 died lopsidedly and the exemption was extended to Vietnam veterans.

The unpopular pro-primary nominating convention law was repealed and the direct primary was revived. Primaries will be held in late August and filing fees for most candidates will be doubled. If a candidate polls at least 15 per cent of the primary vote, half of the fee will be returned. Rural electric cooperatives

ADAM POWELL "GREAT STUFF"

That a member of Congress can so misconduct his public and private life that he is thrown out of Congress should humiliate his constituents, but Harlem still thinks Adam Powell is "great stuff."

That he is a fugitive from the law in his own home town means little to his homefolks. That he has been travelling abroad and basking in the Caribbean sun with other women at taxpayers' expense offends his constituents only admiration and envy.

That Negro Adam Powell has been thrown out of the "white Congress" makes him more than ever "one of them!"

There has never been an instant of doubt, before, during or since the congressional hearing which expelled him, that his Harlem constituents would overwhelmingly re-elect him. Indeed nobody -- but nobody -- dares to run against him.

"I will walk the streets of Harlem on Palm Sunday," Powell boasted. "I'm bringing my Bimini disciples with me, but I won't be riding on the foal of an ass!" And from 110th to 145th Street they cheered their "leader."

Whose fault is this? What has happened so to invert our sense of values that the rude, the ruthless and the vulgar is publicly applauded?

I'm ready to take part of the blame -- because I belong to a profession which has allowed its own perspective to get warped.

The state gasoline tax was increased from six to seven cents and municipal gasoline taxes were abolished. The penny increase in the state tax will be distributed to municipalities and counties.

Legislators voted to ask the electorate if they want a constitutional convention. The proposition will be on the 1968 general election ballot. A special election will be held late this year on several proposed constitutional amendments.

A bill by Senator Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, to boost secondary recovery of oil in southeastern New Mexico was approved. A Construction Industries Act, product of a two-year study, was passed.
