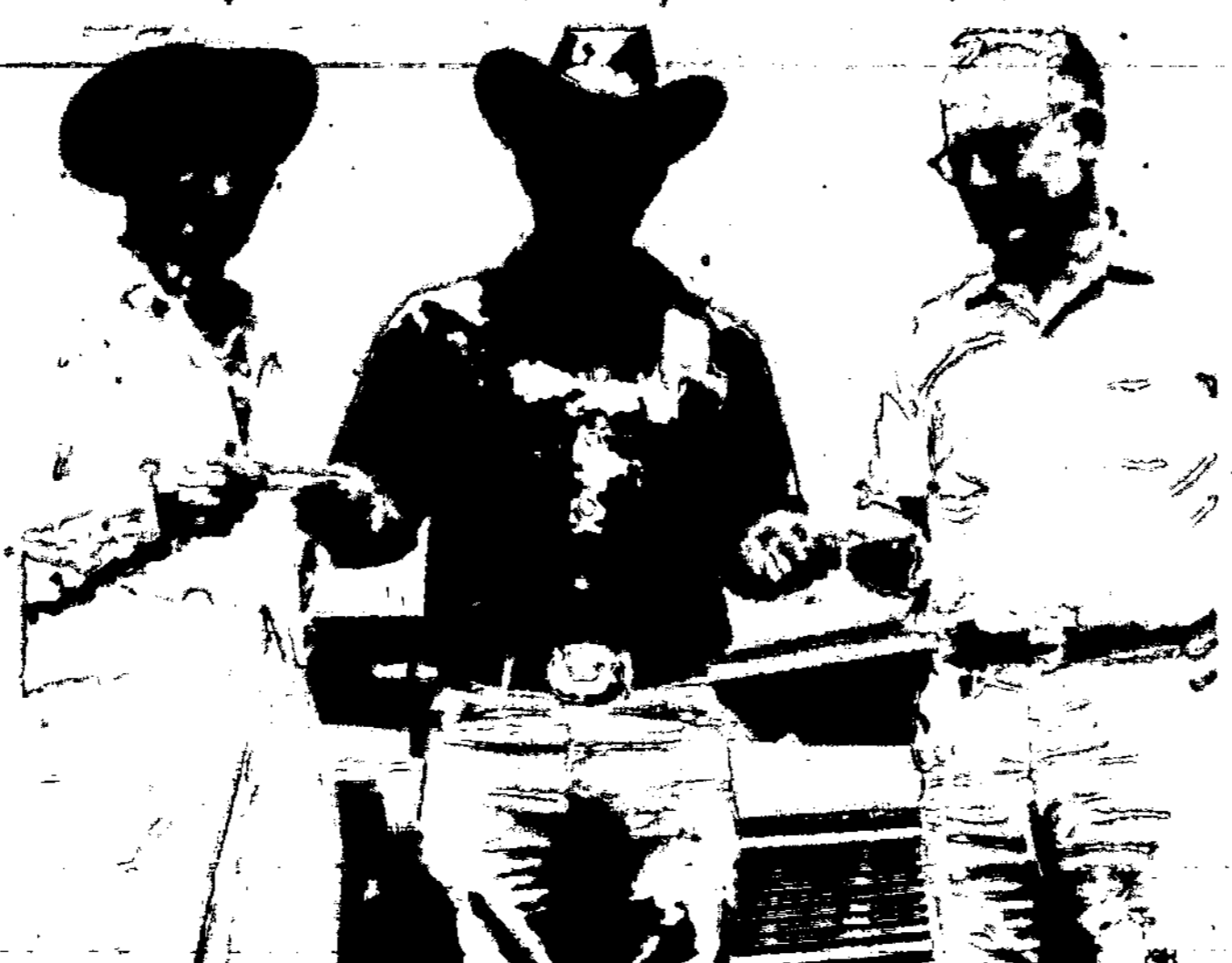

Carrizozo captured two blue ribbons, one in the shot put and one in the pole vault.

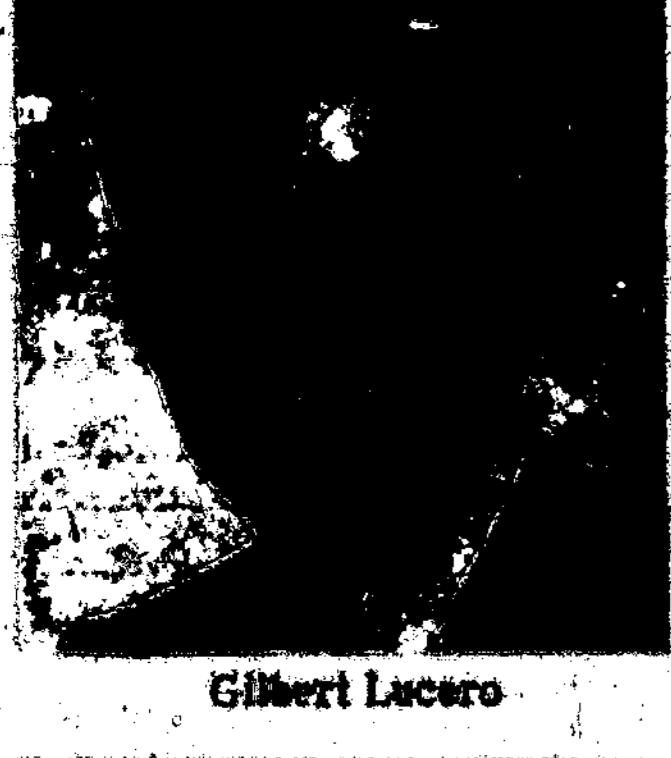

## Smokey Bear Ranger Station will expand

Die Beaublen, District Ranger for Smokey Bear Ranger Station at Capitan, told the News Tuesday that he expected the District to have a new office in downtown Capitan prior to June 30. Not all arrangements are complete and the location could not be officially announced.

The ranger station in Capitan was originally designed for two people, now the staff has grown to seven plus families. The expansion has come about because of the needs in range management. A quarter million acres of Forest Land are included in the Smokey Bear District, 90

per cent of this land being grazed. Nogal Lake is the only established recreation area in the District. Ranger Beaublen said that future planning includes making the present Ranger Station into residential type of administrative site, and be expected this to be done in the next two years.

When the mines at White Oaks were closed the Lee family moved to Carrizozo. Here Nettie continued her work in the church and closed her work in the church and was Sunday school superintendent for 6 years. She was also organist and a member of the choir. She and Ray Lemon married in 1911. They moved to and lived in Kansas one year then returned to Carrizozo and have been here since. Their only child, Col. M. R. Lemon lives in Washington D.C. Esther, then Associate Conductress. She was Worthy Matron in 1927. She was organist and filled other stations also. former dentist building. It was made into one large room with two rest rooms. This canteen is part of the training program. At this time, there are confections and cold drinks. Though later they hope to add luxuries. The children all get an allowance. The training part is teaching them the value of money and how to budget it. An attendant is present and several of the residents help. They keep it clean and take care of the duties assigned to them.

As we leave this, I am so pleased to note their water movable sprinkling system which covers 60,000 square feet at a time. 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## Trees put out more blooms, should set full apple crop

Cold weather during the past week killed some of the early blossoms in the upper third of the Ruidoso-Bonito valleys. The apple trees have now put out more blossoms and unless there is more adverse weather, they will set a full crop.

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Temperatures in the lower part of the Hondo Valley ranged from 27 degrees to 30 degrees, and killed few blossoms. Actually, the high winds will cause more blossoms to drop than the cold weather.

Today, there are indications of an excellent apple crop. An estimate of the damage to the peaches and apricots will have to wait another week before we can be sure what percent of the fruit was killed.

I attended the wool sale held last Friday in Roswell and, considering today's wool prices, several Lincoln County growers received top prices for their clip. The fine wools were selling better than the medium wool clips.

Ivan Wagon received 51 cents for his clip. His ewes averaged around 14 pounds for a gross per head income of \$7.14. I expect very few wool growers will equal this per head income, which is the better means of estimating a fair price.

The income per head is what pays the expenses. Just to top the market on price per pound does not mean everything.

Some other sales on a price per pound basis from Lincoln County were: John A. Cooper, 55 cents; J. P. McKnight, 53 cents; Joe Skeen, 49 cents; and Joe McKnight, 51 cents.

## Of county political powers

By way of introduction

Emmett John Hughes is an honest writer (Newsweek) we think, whether or not one agrees with him is another question. He says this about New Mexico Governor David Cargo: "As for Cargo; a virtually-sure Romney supporter, he had to fight the GOP organization through the primary, then win election in a campaign for which he could raise less than \$15,000 from traditional GOP sources."

Hughes reports the lament of one GOP National Committeeman: "The tragic truth is that GOP organizations, in most states, no longer represent even a conservative rank-and-file. They just represent their own prejudices and privileges."

Hughes' writing is intended to convey the message that GOP leaders on state, county, district and precinct levels across the nation essentially care not a damn who runs the country so long as they can run their county, district or precinct. The proof of this lies in the stunning failures of liberal GOP governors to remake their own party in their own states.

## What happened in Lincoln --

Lincoln County's fifteen votes were cast for Governor David Cargo's opponent Cliff Hawley in the Republican convention, Lincoln County central committee did not openly support Cargo in the general election, although working to elect a Republican slate.

Lincoln County's two legislators have not gone to bat for Gov. Cargo either before or since election.

As of now (April 17) Gov. Cargo has not remade his own party in the only county state-wide to consistently elect Republicans.

## Is there a power source in Lincoln?

Speak up now or forever hold your peace. Ranchers used to be a source of political power in New Mexico not so much any more.

School officials have developed into a lobby force that may become powerful but to date we don't count school people as moving vote force in Lincoln County.

There is no labor vote of consequence here, church people come times seek out strange bedfellows, voting with the liquor interests every now and then. In Lincoln County "church" is not especially a source of votes, if it is a standoff exists. Race track people probably spend as much money on the Republican side as on the Democratic side, which puts them in a neutral position and not a source of political power.

Surely a candidate needs votes from all these groups to win an election but hardly needs all the votes of any one group to win. There is no concentrated single source of political power in Lincoln County.

## Why continued Republican success?

Certain Republican leaders in Lincoln County might like to think that their influence was a deciding factor in swinging elections but we would not for a minute agree with Hughes that Lincoln County Republicans care not a damn who runs their state or nation.

The reverse is true. Lincoln County Republicans do care and we think the proof is in the making.

The success of the Republican party in Lincoln County has been largely a matter of luck -- lucky to have candidates file who invoke confidence on part of local voters sufficient to put them in office.

## Prejudice on part of a few

When Lincoln County threw all of its votes to Hawley that did not mean all or even a majority of Lincoln County voted that way, rather it meant that two or three people at most were voting their prejudices and privileges, just as Hughes said.

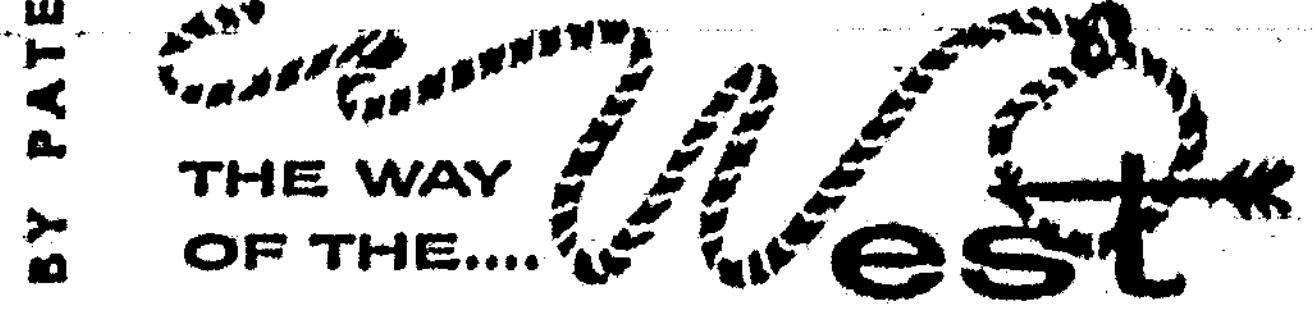


## Lincoln County voters are individualists

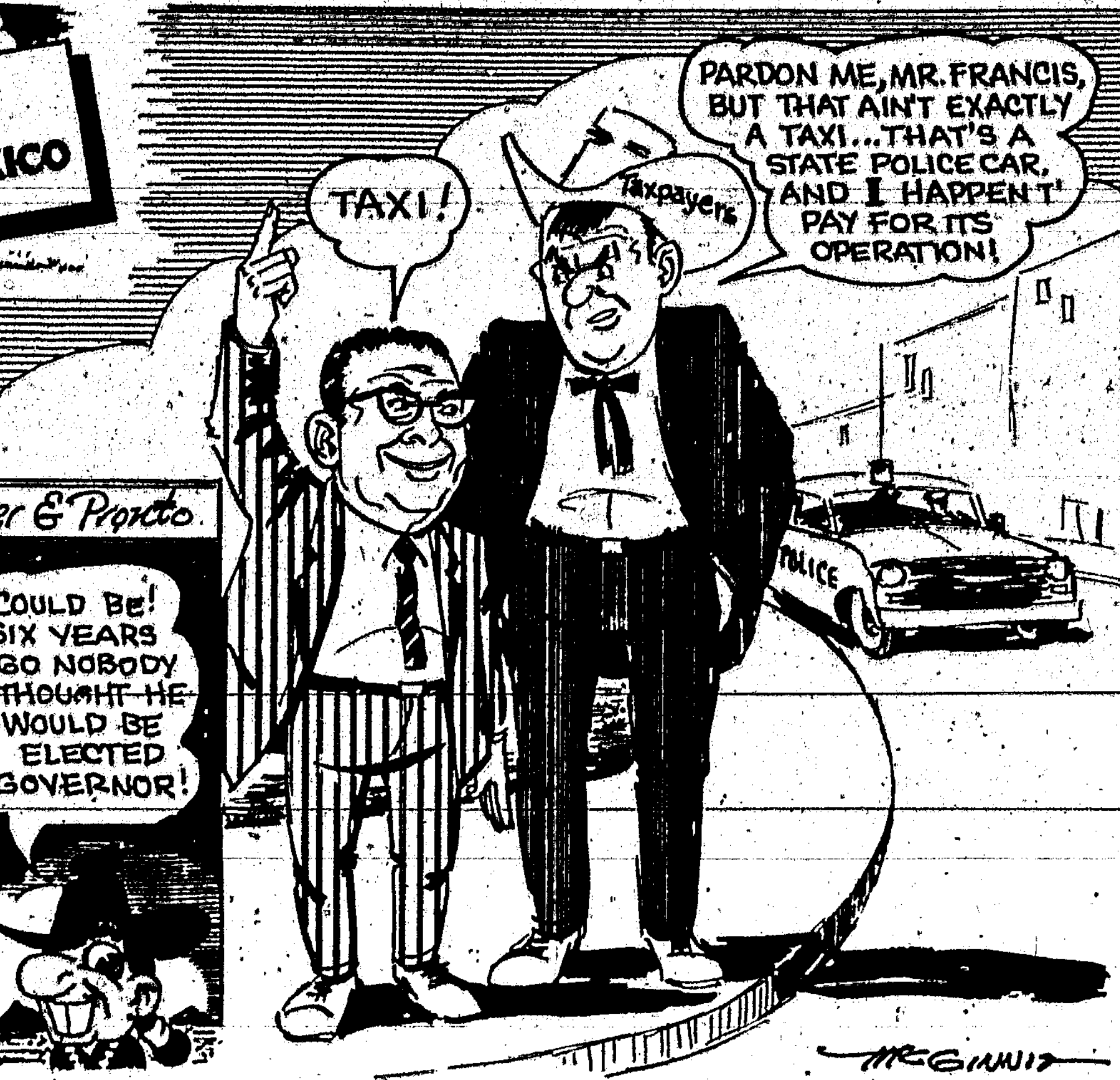

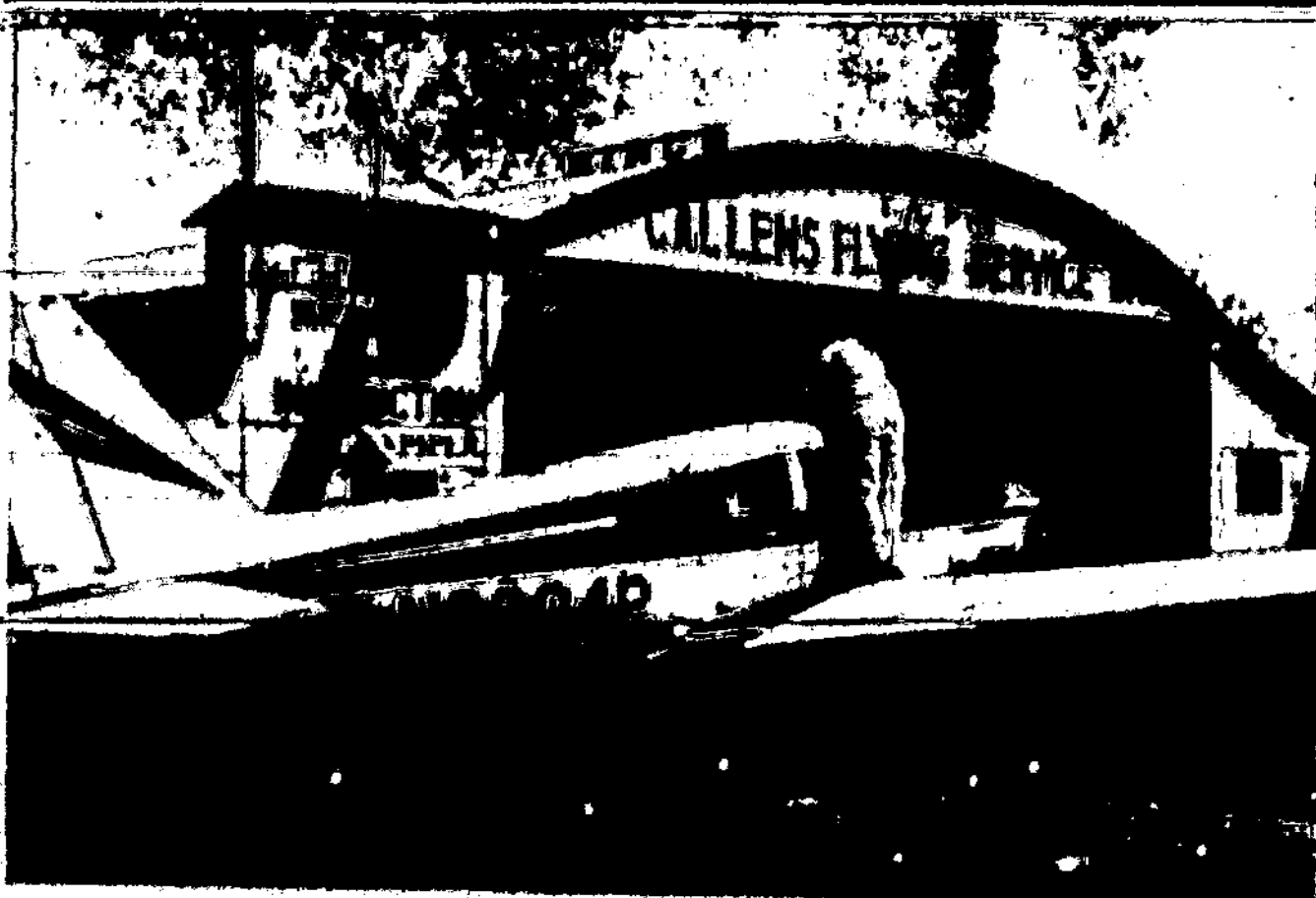

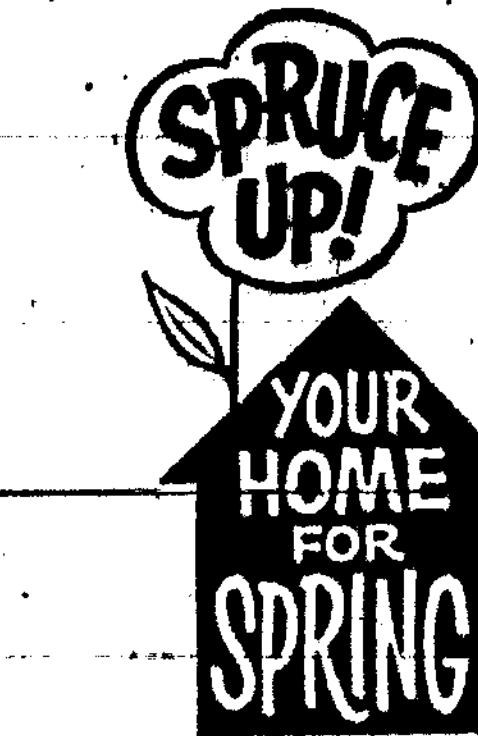
