

School budget hearings in Carrizozo May 4

No big increases expected in Lincoln County Schools

Starting early Thursday, May 4, all Lincoln County school districts will have budget hearings in the courthouse at Carrizozo. These hearings are open to the public.

Budget figures for all Lincoln County schools are given here which tell much, but not all, of the story. Such items as gifts from individuals, \$20,000 in Capitan budget, Title I money, bond and interest payments don't show but the amounts are as recorded. Carrizozo school budget is up because of added students from St. Rita School. Hondo budget

is down because several families have moved out of the community and their enrollment is down. Hondo will have the advantage of two new school busses, bought by individuals, Tom Babers and Mrs. A.N. Kimbrell, to be used on school bus routes. Capitan school budget is up, but only \$10,000 and Capitan received a gift of \$20,000 so

actually their budget is lower than current year. Things are steady at Corona, budget within just a few dollars of previous year and same is true at Ruidoso. Ruidoso has two less teachers in new budget, because they expect less enrollment. All schools are giving teacher raises, the amounts shown are the average add-on money in each school above present salaries.

According to George White of Ruidoso an attorney for the New Mexico State Board of Education has ruled that school of the state have no choice -- they start operating on Daylight savings time when it becomes effective Monday. This means the schools will move their clocks up an hour.

Superintendent Duane Darling at Capitan stated that a school could change their starting time if they cared to. Capitan schools will go along by moving up an hour, starting at 8:30 a.m. Carrizozo school will start at 8:50 a.m.

A four man pistol team from each district competed. Officer Bill Bults of Picacho was the Lincoln County participant. The Las Cruces district won with a 19.05 score. Roswell had a score of 18.61.

Demo's weight chances for Governor's chair

SANTA FE--The early line on the 1968 Democratic sweepstakes for nomination for governor puts Sen. Mack Easley of Hobbs in the forefront with many other prospects looming as potential candidates.

Among them are Speaker Bruce King of Santa Fe County, Rep. Bobby Mayfield of Mesilla Park, Sen. Harold Rannels of Lovington, Albuquerque City Commission Chairman Ralph Trigg, Rep. Mel Eaves of Albuquerque and Rep. George Fettinger of Alamogordo.

Easley said during the recent legislative session that subjects of legislation outweighed political aspirations in importance. But his supporters were pushing him as a candidate for governor then and are continuing efforts.

Easley, a former speaker and ex- lieutenant governor with heavy legislative experience, is Senate Democratic caucus chairman and a strong party man. He is former Lea County chairman.

If he makes the race, he will carefully weigh these considerations first: Republican Governor Dave Cargo's chances for re-election, prospects for announcing an adequate campaign fund, Democratic Party unity and

the effect of the national political picture on the New Mexico election. Easley has said for years his ultimate goal is a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, but if conditions seem promising, he probably could be attracted into the governor's race in 1968.

King, who squeezed onto the ballot for governor in the 1966 pre-primary nominating convention but withdrew later, is assessing his chances in another race. He had strong Bernalillo County support in the nominating convention. The convention system was repealed by the legislature this year and the direct primary was revived.

King probably will not announce his plans for several months while he stays in the public eye with speaking appearances. Rep. Mayfield won the chairmanship of the Legislative Finance Committee last week in a close vote over Sen. Rannels who had been chairman for the last two years.

Mayfield, a strong supporter of former Gov. Jack M. Campbell during his administration, has been a House leader several

sessions. He is taxation and revenue chairman.

Rannels has been independent on some major issues, including Congressional districting and a Highway Department investigation. He is chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee and has served on the strong Legislative Audit Commission.

Democrats must cut heavily into Cargo's Bernalillo County vote next year to win and some observers favor Albuquerquean Ralph Trigg for the job. Cargo carried populous Bernalillo County by a thumping 21,000 votes in 1966.

Trigg has another district advantage. He has been a close associate of U.S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson for many years. Sen. Anderson is still the strongest figure in Democratic politics in New Mexico.

Rep. Eaves and Fettinger might be considered long-range prospects for governor. Eaves leans toward the liberal side and Fettinger tends to be conservative. Both hold key committee chairmanships in the legislature

this year. Both are young with bright political futures.

In the Republican camp all is sweetness and light. Gov. Cargo could be opposed for renomination in 1966. Possibilities include Ed Foreman of Las Cruces, a former Congressman from Texas, and Sen. Joe Skeen of Picacho, Lincoln County, the popular Senate minority leader. Skeen is a former state Republican chairman. Foreman an able speaker, has kept himself in the forefront with public appearances.

Cargo, a liberal Republican, battled conservatives to win his Party's nomination last year. Intra-party scraps are in progress now over the national committee's post and state chairman.

House Minority Leader Steve Helbing, Roswell Republican, complained that GOP legislators are underrepresented on interim legislative committees. Seventy-eight legislators were named by Democratic leaders to interim committees or boards. Twenty-three of them, or 29 per cent of the total, are Republicans. The 42 Republican legislators account for 37 per cent of the 112

members in the House Senate. An application was filed with State Liquor Director Turner Branch to transfer ownership of

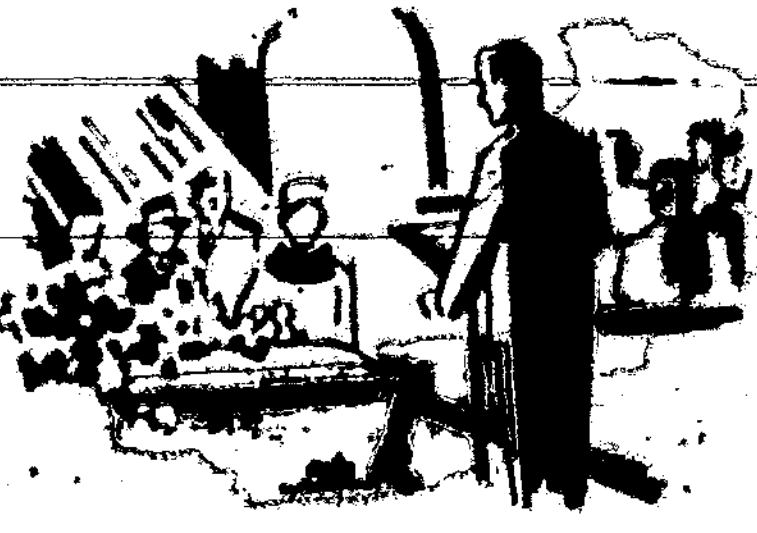
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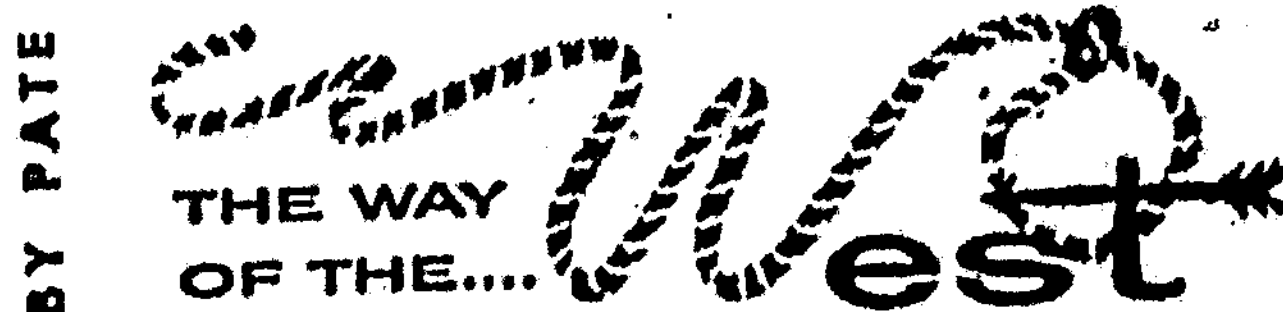
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Good weekly newspaper!

Looks from this distance like you're publishing a weekly newspaper with lots of reader interest. We continue to hold to the opinion that weekly newspapers can do well if they make an effort to report what is going on in their area -- because no daily newspaper, no radio, no magazine, no TV can or will do it so well. Tell your printer to underlay that SHOWN OFF next time, and to throw away a bunch of worn borders. Your balance of ads and news appears real fine. If all your people think like your mayor in his proclamation -- WHEREAS, all of the residents of the City of Red Lodge, Montana, are conscious of the naturally beautiful setting of the city and of efforts in the past to beautify it for enjoyment of ourselves and visitors who come each summer and winter -- you've got a town to be proud of.



We've been grabbing at things to make us feel good this week and the 7th annual newspaper equipment survey made by American Press (a trade magazine) had such items. One, near 55% of large weeklies (those printing 12 or more pages a week, we do 24 or more) are now printed offset. Two, by 1995 every newspaper (with possible exception of metropolitan dailies) will be printed by offset. It has not been easy at the News but we have the satisfaction of liking the looks of our pictures and printed product each week, plus knowing that we are keeping up with the times.

You home Gardeners should get your irrigation system organized and then run down to Flowerland for set of pepper, chili, or tomato plants. Sure would spice up kitchen work.

The cause of freedom of information lost some ground in Lincoln County when county commissioners decided not to have warrant list published. Practice has been since 1961 to pay the Redondo News for publishing the warrant list as legal notice, and the Lincoln County News has published the list free of charge as a matter of public information all these years. Now the Republican commission has ruled no pay -- the News will probably continue its public service ways.

Short note under old news heading -- No. 1 Edna Gallacher, planned by Bryce Dugger of Carrizozo, spots 330 feet from south and west lines of section 26-65-10e, in Lincoln, from El Paso Times report.

S P Railroad is working up a case against practice of diverting .00450 mills of tax money from town to school. It has worked like this for years -- if town uses the money tax is based only on area within town limits, if town waives its right in favor of school the levy is made on entire school district which includes a lot more railroad that just the town. The S P calls such action subterfuge because it's costing them money.

We frequently hear the question about when the all-new Lincoln County News printing plant will have an openhouse . . . the answer is, we're simply not ready and this week is a good example of why.

The schedule of producing and/or printing three newspapers should go like this -- start setting type for Lincoln County News Monday noon, continue working on

New York and San Leandro, California. This equipment is valued at over \$10,000.00, which is one of the good reasons for three newspapers-grouped together to make use of the same equipment.

Actually the Friden equipment, known as Justowriters, has been our stumbling block since the News first went offset in December 1966. First off we had a service man come into our plant repeatedly who did not know this particular equipment, with the result that we needed service again almost the same day. To make a long and frustrating story short -- our Friden reproducer, the one which types the justified columns (you're reading one right now) went out of commission Monday just before noon. We called the service office in El Paso at that time, they said they'd see what they could do, Cookie Harris was punching type on the other Friden machine and normally would have had the automatic reproducer working while she worked.

Thursday morning at 8:30 we called El Paso again, a man was on his way. Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. we called Fred Munn, service manager, and told him how serious our situation was and that we could not continue to operate with such service. The real disappointment came when Mr. Munn told us that we had been getting

good service.

So . . . Paul, Max, Peter, Cookie, Eleanor, Judy, Minnie, will take their turn keeping our Justowriter reproducer going all night Tuesday and all night Wednesday in an attempt to get back on schedule. The Lincoln County News has given real poor service on some printed products, we readily admit -- apparently good service means one thing to a small company like the News and is something else to a large company like Singer (Friden).

Now you know -- until we whip our production problems in line and feel comfortable in our new plant we're not about to have an openhouse.
