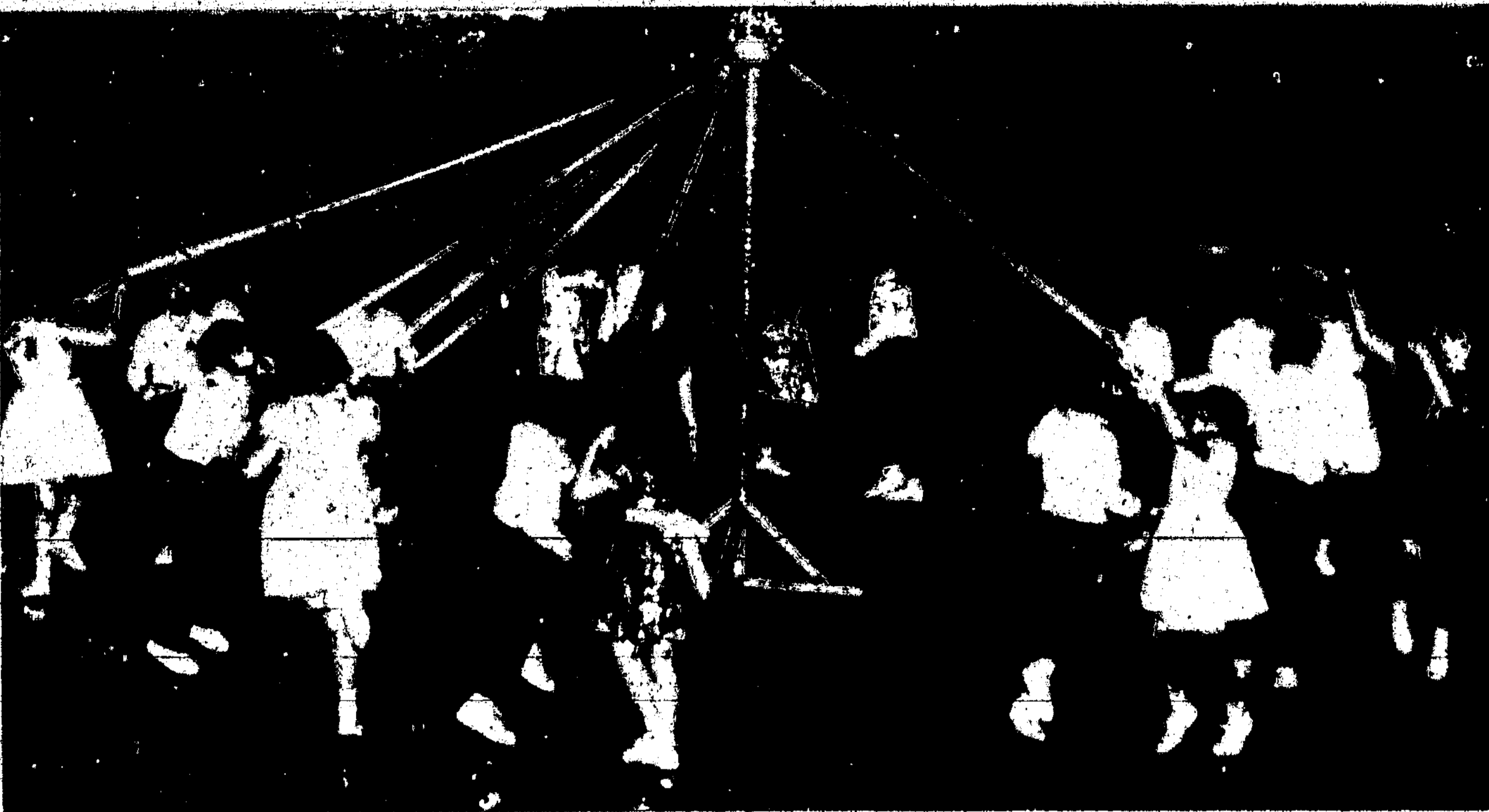


## Cubriendo la Plaza

## Montoya's power becomes apparent

SANTA FE — U. S. Sen. Joe Montoya is the central figure today in the New Mexico Democratic Party and his strong influence is becoming more apparent. Montoya's choice, Harold Volden of Albuquerque, was named acting state chairman in early February. Volden is expected to be elected chairman for a two-year term Saturday by the state central committee in Albuquerque although complaints have been heard recently in the ranks. Many legislators credit Sen. Montoya with taking part in major legislative committee appointments in the statehouse. Re-

portedly, much party activity has been handled in recent weeks from Montoya's plush office here in a federal building which formerly housed the Santa Fe Post Office. Volden firmly denies this, but says he has visited the office a number of times. "I visit everybody," he observes. A new state Democratic headquarters is being opened this week at La Fonda in Santa Fe. State offices in the Lensi building here were closed in mid-March because of lack of funds. The party's campaign debt after the general election was some \$50,000. Volden said a public relations man will be employed part-time by the party. Henry Mathews, former managing editor of the New Mexican in Santa Fe, has performed publicity chores recently. Mathews worked last week in Secretary of State Ernestine Evans' office while Mrs. Evans attended a meeting of the Defense Advisory Council of Women in the Service in Washington. Volden said a headquarters manager has not been picked. Mrs. Helen Enders of Santa Fe, who was on the headquarters staff several years, is recovering from a leg fracture and is not set to return.

State police recovered 870 stolen cars in 1966 valued at \$1,178,136.55. Speeding violations (33,230) were way out in front for the year, next closest was passing violation at 4,008. Fines, costs and other fees collected during 1966 in Lincoln County totaled \$49,855.00. The state police made 1,852 arrests in 1966, 1,069 were non-resident.

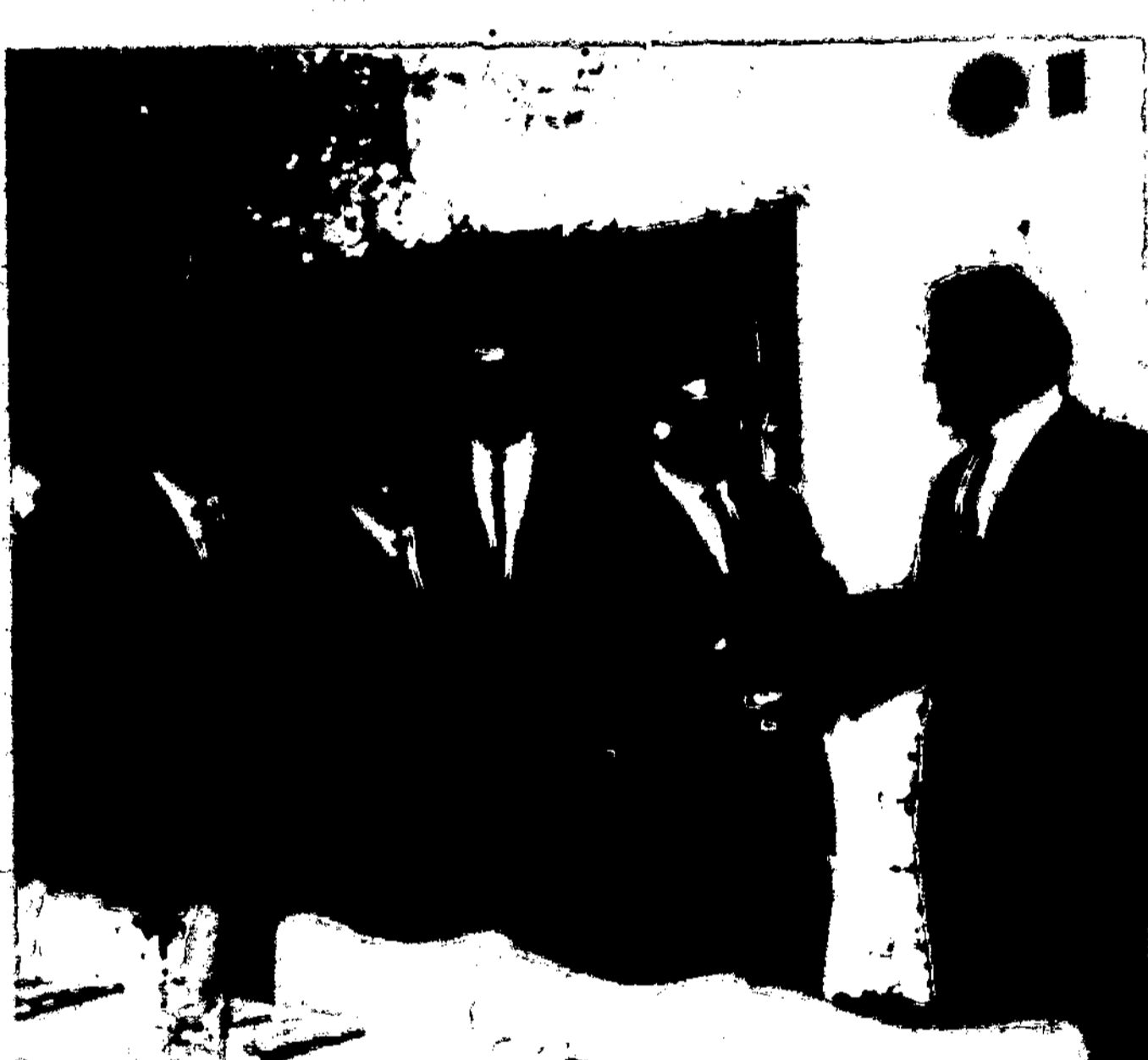

## Dilapidated buildings must come down



The Carrizozo City Council at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening discussed final notification to owners of dilapidated buildings around town. It was agreed that they presented a menace to life and limb as well as detracting from the town's appearance. Several property owners, who have been notified several times to tear them down will be notified once more, it

was determined, and if no action is taken, legal methods will be utilized. Lengthiest discussion of the evening surrounded a report that the regular water meter in a small home in the city had gone berserk, and registered total usage of more than 58,000 gallons in about a week. The owner protested his bill of \$25,

"in a pleasant manner," Mayor Leandro Vega reported. Investigation by the city engineer revealed the wildness of the meter, and it was voted to charge the owner only the minimum amount and install a new meter. The council opened three bids on gasoline and diesel use for the ensuing year, and voted to accept the low bid of Lakay Distributing Company. Building permit was awarded to the Church of Christ for an addition to the church with approximate cost of \$2,500 in materials. Most of the labor will be supplied by members, it was stated. Permit was also given to Henry Silva for a \$400 block addition to his home. Council voted to loan the city grader for leveling off part of the cemetery in preparation for Memorial Day activities there.

# Corona School now using Continuous Progress plan

Corona Elementary School is now using the "Continuous Progress" plan in grades one through six.

For some years schools have been gathering facts about the development of children. Research has shown that among children entering the primary grades there are a difference in size, age, vision, hearing, speech, general health, social development, emotional make up and intellectual ability. In order to make better use of these facts Corona Elementary School has initiated the "Continuous Progress" plan. Simply stated the Continuous Progress Elementary school is a plan whereby children in their first six years of school are taught in classes which have no grade level designation. It is one six year plan, rather than six one year plans.

The graded system, which has been in use for many years, has presented some problems in coping with individual differences. Some of these problems are promotion, non-promotion, skipping and crossing grades barriers for the purpose of using more advanced materials or material relegated to the lower grade.

The Continuous Progress elementary school will benefit pupils who develop more rapidly and those who develop more slowly. The objective of this plan is to take children from where they are, at their own rate, just as far as possible. Pupils who develop more slowly, some of whom are simply immature, are given

more time to get started. For these immature pupils the situation is not "cover the material or flunk." The Continuous Progress elementary school provides ample time for these "slow starters" to make up deficiencies which occur during their first years. At the same time the faster students are not held back by these slower children, but may progress at a faster rate, even

Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Yandell and sons are visiting relatives in Monta Vista, Colorado.

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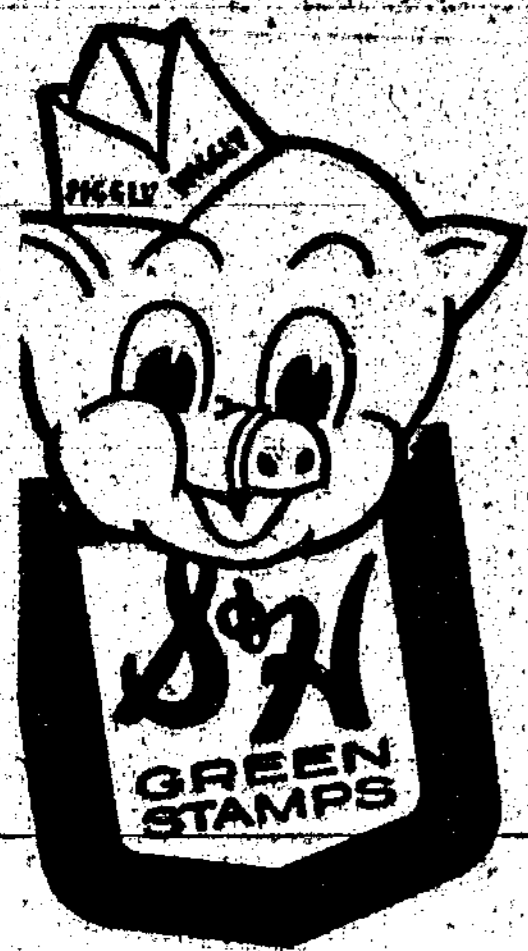

Phil made copies of some of the old pictures of Carrizozo for me. Do you have prints of the modern ones? The theme emphasizes the change from Railroad town to a motorists' haven.

Mrs. Dorothy Guck Nogal, New Mexico Dear Madam,

I read your article in the October 1964 issue of New Mexico Magazine and enjoyed it very much. A friend had given me some back issues.

In 1910, my mother taught school in Nogal. I was through there a few years ago and the building was still standing. My younger sister was born in an adobe house that faces a narrow lane which runs off the main road to the east.

I think it was the next year that my mother taught at Parsons. I think it may now be called Alto. She and my father taught at many places around the Capitan Mountains -- Hondo, Blue Water, Arabelle, Meek Spladle, Richardson, Encinosa, Deseo (Paradise Valley), the Patos. They had home-

steaded at the foot of Carrizozo Mountain and income in those days was very small from small ranches and they had to teach for the additional needed income.

We knew the Titsworths in Capitan, the Sellers in that area (I think Bessie Sellers is now Mrs. Cummins who have the store in Capitan), Stovers, Pfingstens, Kemps, and, of course, many others.

When my mother taught school at Deseo (nothing remains there now), the Sellers children and the Traylor children were her pupils. I think Herbert Traylor now lives in Capitan.

## Immunization recommended

Dr. G.K. Fair, District Health Officer for Lincoln County remarked today on the advisability of school children being immunized against measles. "Many parents do not consider the necessity of having their children of school age immunized," he said. "Actually, these children are more often exposed to the illness, Measles is a disease which is carried primarily through the school system. Preschool children are frequently exposed by their brothers and sisters from school."

Besides the dangers posed to the child by the disease, the inconvenience caused by the care of a sick child for a duration, especially when the parents must take time from work to attend him, and the loss of time spent in school must be considered. Most physicians feel it advisable for a child to receive measles immunization even if the child has been exposed. In many cases, the disease can still be prevented. In case the child contracts measles after immunization, it is usually a mild case and of shorter duration. Many parents often do not consider the cost of medical care, medications, child care, and possible hospitalization that accompany the disease. These expenses may be much greater than the cost of immunization.

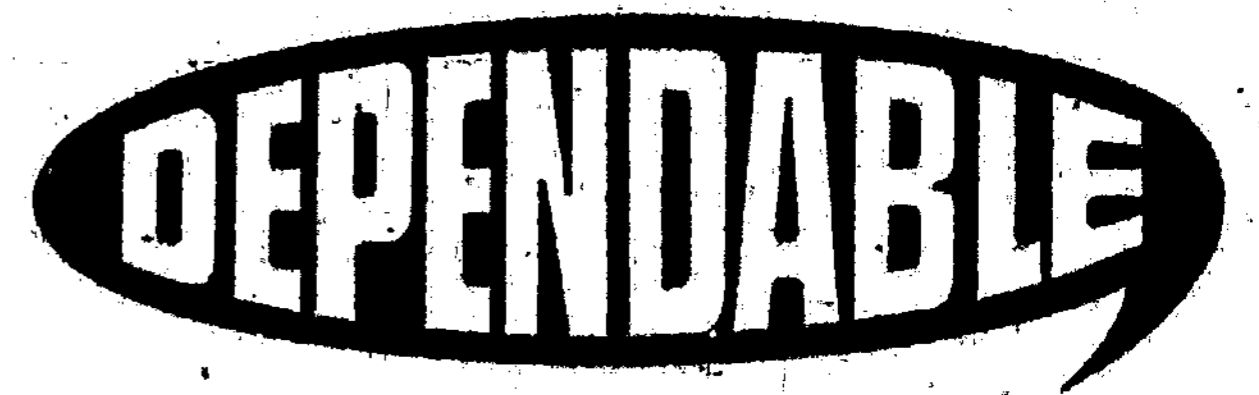
