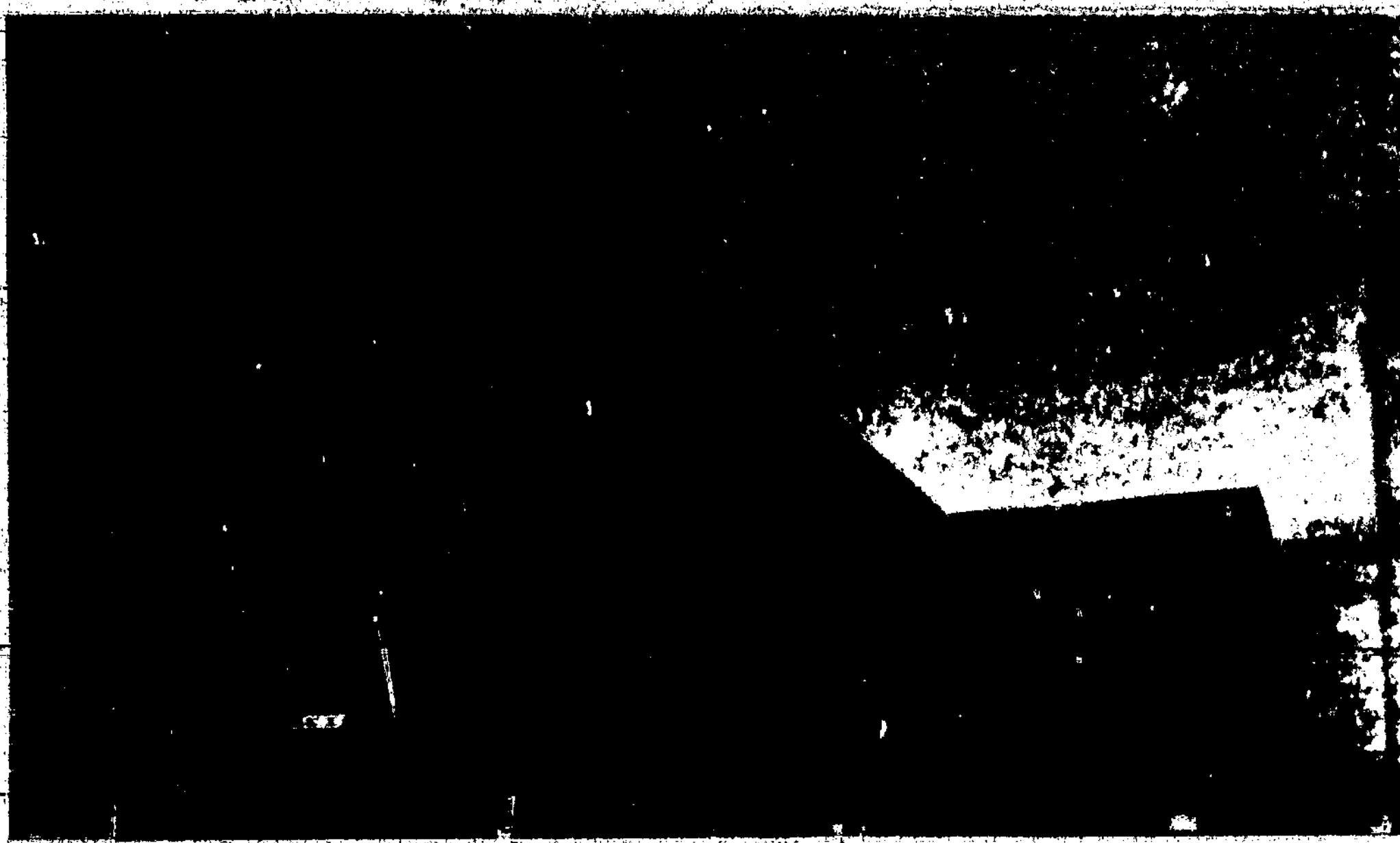
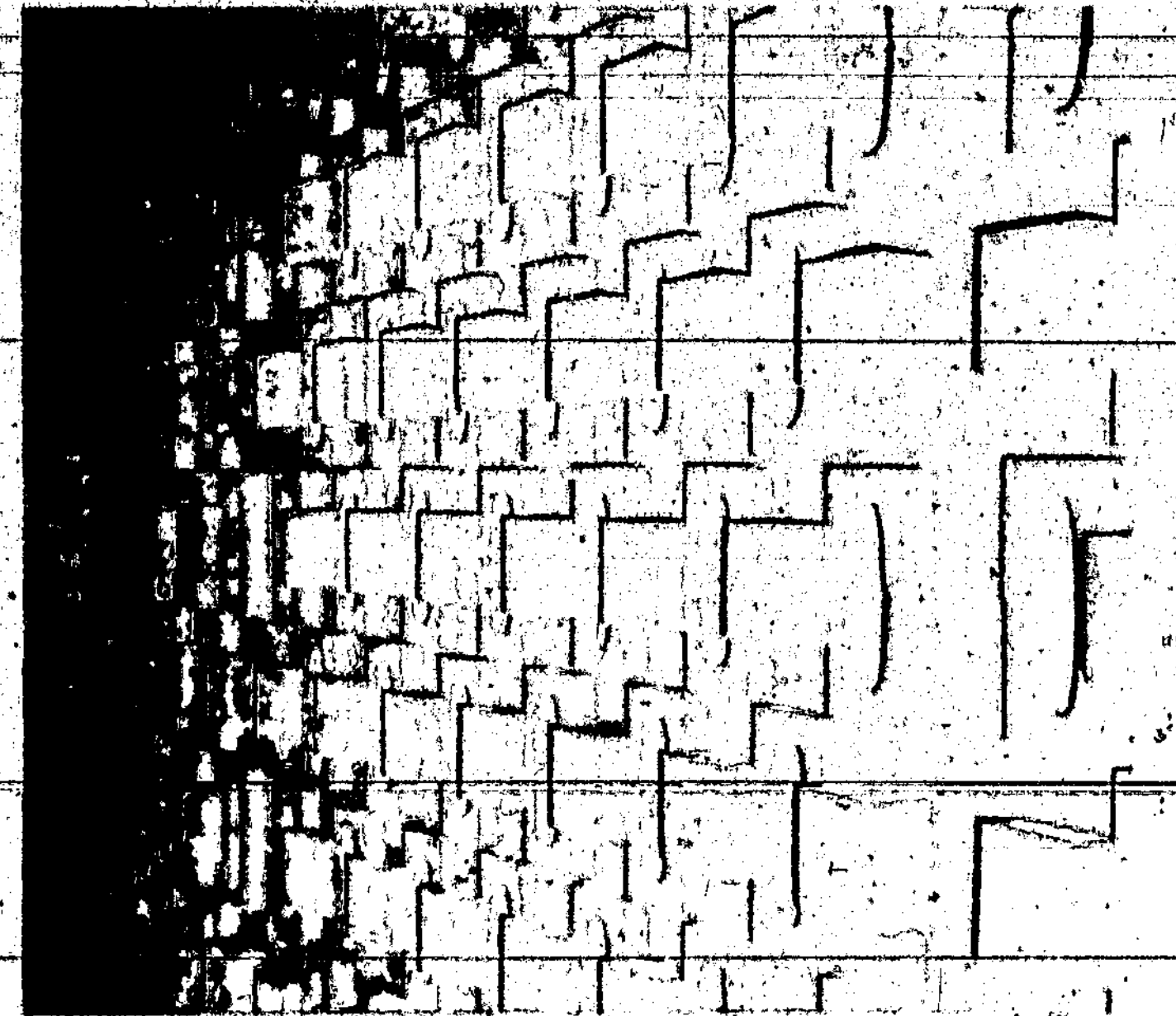

# Medicare approval given Zozo Hospital

It wasn't easy and except for the patience and persistence of several people Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo would never have been certified for the medicare program.

The final piece of the puzzle was put in place when Lois Miller, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. L.Z. Manire of Carrizozo, wrote J.T. Clegg, hospital administrator, stating that she wanted to work. Miss Miller is a registered nurse and her selecting Carrizozo as a place to work was almost as good as finding a needle in a haystack.

Miss Miller together with her father, Mr. Robert Miller of Lombard, Illinois, (suburb of Chicago), drove to Carrizozo. Mr. Miller visited a spell and Lois started to work.

Notice was received from John M. Mullano, regional representative, Dallas office of the Bureau of Health Insurance, this week that the Carrizozo hospital application for medicare had been approved . . . effective as of May 1.

Much work has been done in the past year, besides filling out the hospital staff, in the way of

getting the hospital ready for certification. The A.N. Spencer family has contributed generously.

The interior of the hospital has been completely repainted and redecorated. All beds have new mattresses. The operating room floor is new, an electro cardiograph machine has been installed, and new blood testing machine purchased. Carrizozo Hospital has the best equipped kitchen in the state, all new and a beautiful work area. Television sets are available for all rooms at no extra cost to the patients. The hospital grounds have been completely re-landscaped.

The manner and means by which people take advantage of the medicare program is rather simple. All people that are 65 years or older should have a social security medicare card. When sick they go to doctor, he declares they do or do not need hospitalization. If they go to the hospital they then present their medicare card and if eligible they are under the program.

By the law of averages Carrizozo hospital should be able to handle all of the business originating in this area.

### Ninety a goin' . . . thirty-five in emergency . . . forty-one a comin'

Santa Fe — Republican Gov. Dave Cargo has repeatedly pledged his support for the State Personnel Act, intended to protect the jobs of qualified employees but the turnover has been heavy in the Revenue Bureau and Motor Vehicle Department since the new administration took office Jan. 1.

The agencies, two of the largest in state government, are traditional patronage areas. Turnover has been reduced since the Personnel Law was enacted in 1961 but the employee change are still substantial when a new governor takes office.

of Santa Fe, is superintendent. Mrs. Shipman says vocational training is geared to New Mexico's manpower needs.

The state is preparing to buy thousands of types of drugs on annual contracts and Purchasing Agent Al Cochran believes substantial savings will be realized. Invitations to bid on the new contracts are being mailed and Cochran hopes to award a contract about June 1.

State Hospital Pharmacist Roy Browning is preparing the contract, the first of several annual purchasing awards, Cochran plans.

Ninety Revenue Bureau employees have left the payroll since Jan. 1, including 35 in emergency status. This is a whopping turnover rate of 27 per cent. The Revenue Bureau personnel total has been trimmed from 335 last Dec. 31 to 309.

The new administration has hired 41 Revenue Bureau workers since the changeover, including only seven in emergency status. Emergency employees are not required to pass a qualifying test but their service is limited to 90 days.

The purchasing agent, a Clovis resident before his appointment by Gov. Cargo, also plans to let annual contracts for insurance, auto accessories, office supplies and other products bought in mass quantities by the state. He will ask an insurance expert to analyze present state insurance contracts and says workmen's compensation policies did not include enough information on classifications.

Latest monthly distribution of municipal sales taxes by the revenue Bureau: Clayton, \$4,803; Carrizozo, \$1,405; Moriarty, \$855; Belen, \$6,834; Estancia, \$826; Tucuman, \$13,148; Elida, \$230; Springer, \$1,508; Silver City, \$14,057; Truth or Consequences, \$5,927, and Ruidoso, \$5,672.

Eighteen State Finance Department employees have left the payroll, a whopping turnover rate of 33 per cent. The number of Finance Department workers has been cut from 53 to 42. Only six new employees have been hired since Jan. 1, The Finance Department is headed by Ed Hartman, an able experienced administrator respected by both Republicans and Democrats.

Numerous methods of ousting employees from their jobs may be used. Personnel may be cut off the payroll for budgetary reasons. Workers may be transferred across the state in an inconvenient move intended to "persuade" them to resign. Or an employee may be reclassified in Santa Fe to a new job with a sharply lower salary.

Loopholes in the Personnel Act should be closed to provide job continuity for able employees and efficient service for taxpayers but little has been done in this area in the six years of the system's life.

Phasing out of the school's academic program will be completed in 1970. The first classes in building trades and auto mechanics will be graduated May 27 after two-year courses. Average pay of all vocational graduates is about \$3,900 a year, ranging from \$300 for beauty operators to \$600 for auto mechanics.

John Montoya of Albuquerque has been hired by the Ligor Division as an inspector at \$330 a month and assigned to Lea and Eddy Counties. The division has 13 inspectors now.

baccalaureate address at Capitan at 8:00 p.m. in the school Auditorium.

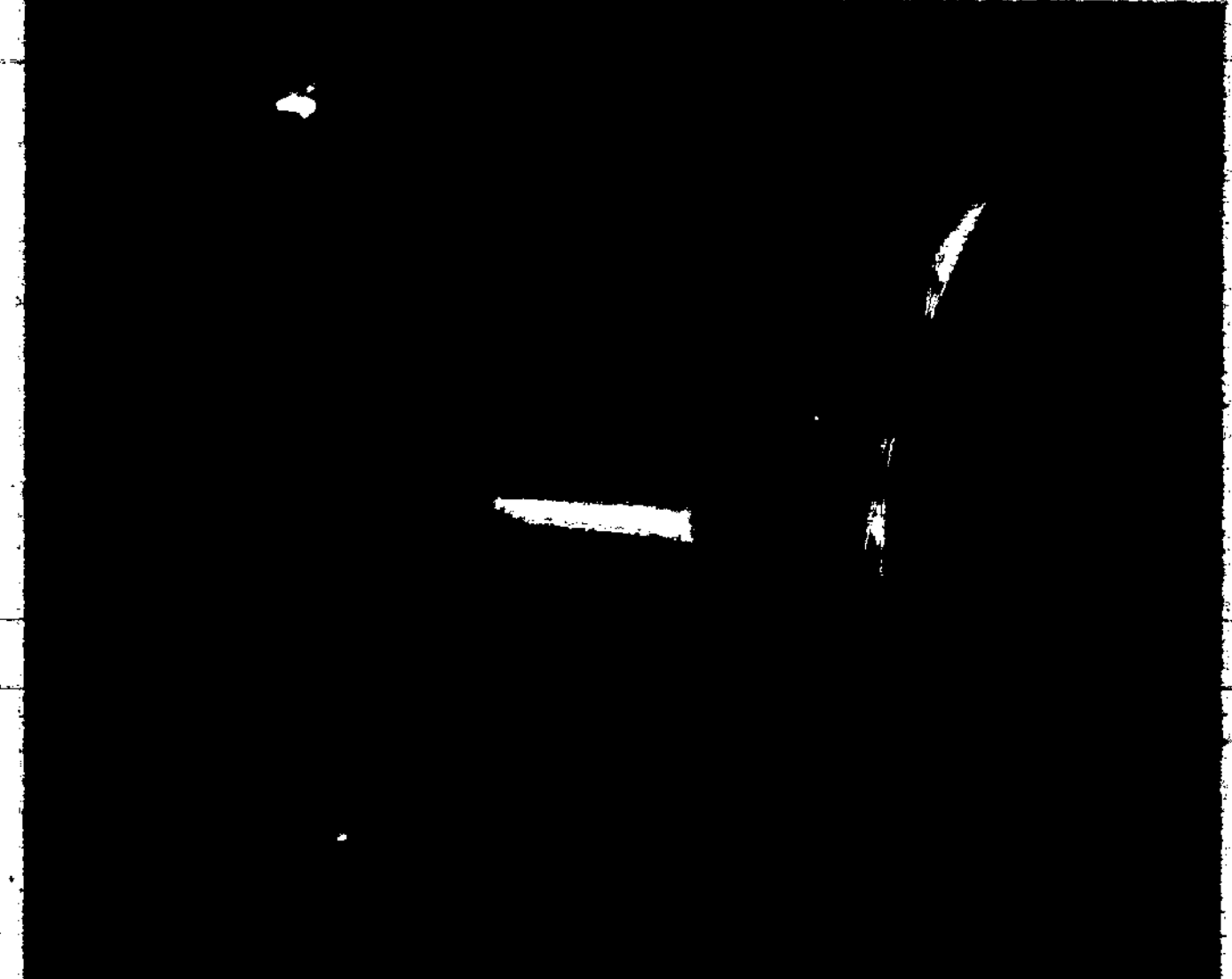

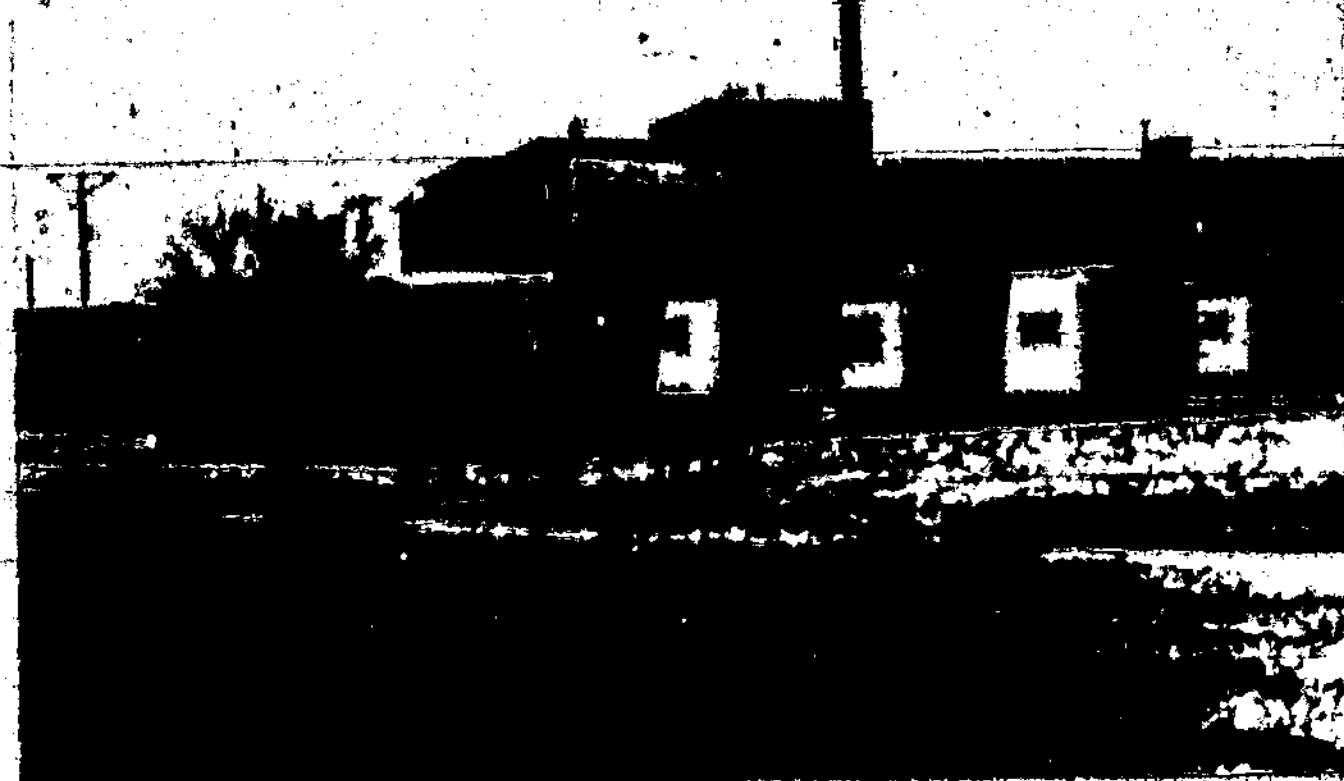
Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Petty, Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Harper from Carrizozo attended the meeting. A total of 28 people were present.

gather information on what they have to offer for development, both industrial and tourists.

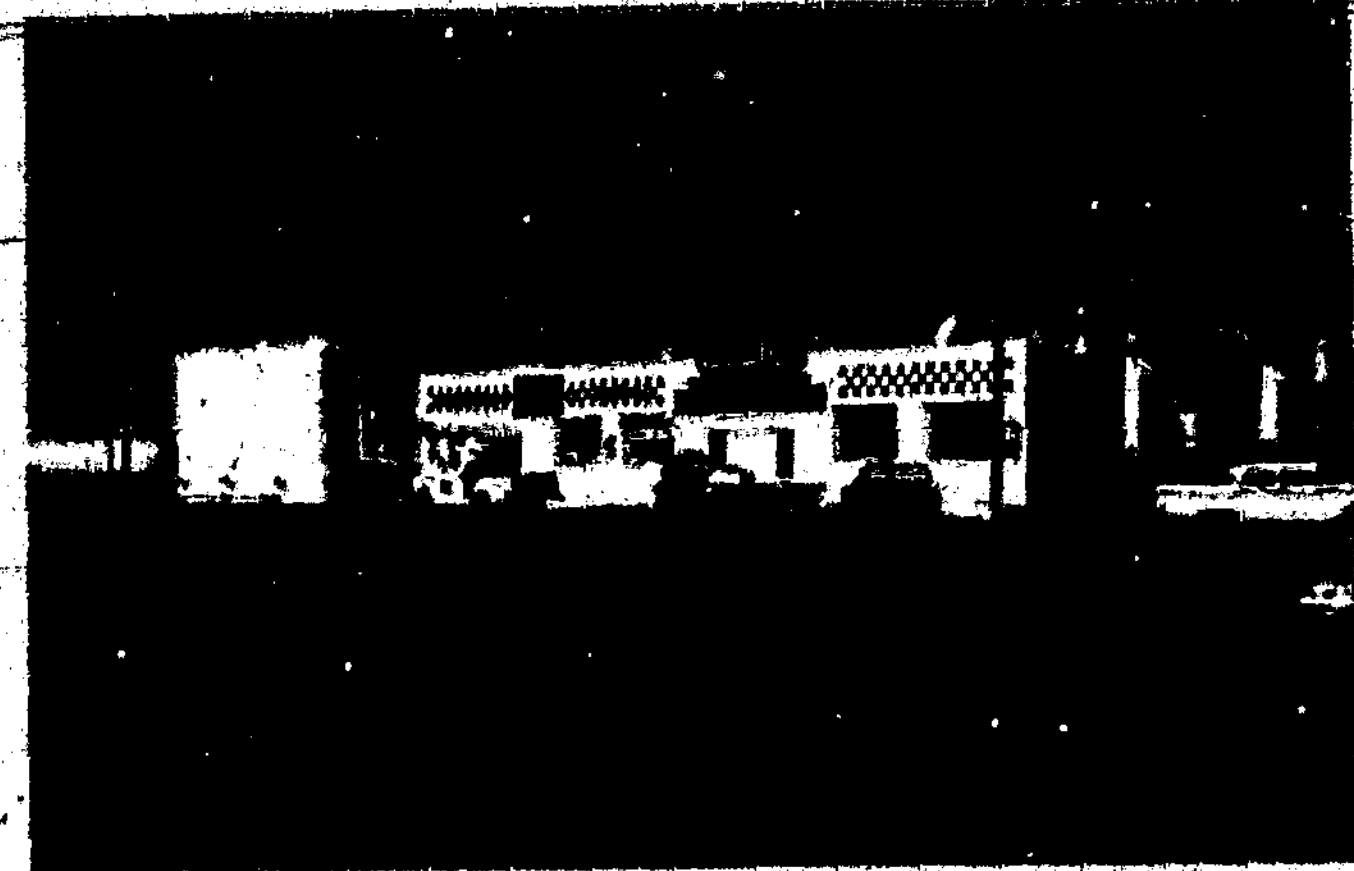
### New Management at Malco

## Modular Scheduling at Corona

After a year of study, planning, visitation, testing and consultation with specialists from the State Department of Education and the Educational Service Center of the University of New Mexico, Corona High School became the first school in the state to put into effect the "Modular" system of class scheduling. The ringing of passing bells and the seven "fifty-five minute" "lock-step" periods have given way to twenty-six fifteen minute modules.  
The Corona School District constructed a new high school building last year. They were constructed with the idea of every classroom and all equipment being designed for the individual student. The Board of Education and the administration of the Corona School feels that every student is an individual and should be given as much individualized instruction and taught as much self-responsibility as possible. Class time varies from fifteen minutes to one hour and forty-five minutes and also vary again from day to day. This permits longer laboratory time on some days and shorter lecture time on

others. This depends upon the need of the pupil and the subject matter being taught. A great amount of time is spent in Open Laboratory situations where students work on individual projects, research papers, Science experiments, Industrial Arts, and Home Economics projects and Directed Studies.  
Teachers may work with individual or small groups as each student's particular needs arise. Many schools in other states have adopted this system of individual instruction. A survey of members of various administrative and teacher organizations indicate that within five years 85% of all secondary schools will be operating under some variation of "Modular Scheduling."

Dr. Frank C. Hibben, Professor of anthropology and director of the Anthropology Museum at the University of New Mexico, will speak on "Earliest Times in New Mexico" at the 11th annual Homemakers College at New Mexico State University, June 6-9.

Dr. Hibben is the author of a dozen books, and his scientific writings include: "The Lost Americans," "Treasures in the Dust," "Prehistoric Man in Europe," and "Digging up America."

Classes at Homemakers College will include those in foods and nutrition, textiles and clothing, home furnishings, landscape gardening, family and community life, and New Mexico history. Special interest classes include those in photography, pottery, and native plants.

Special activities during the 1967 Homemakers College include a pueblo Indian style show, a fiesta supper.

Now is the time to check your ornamental plants for aphids also called plant lice. Aphids thrive on new plant growth when nights are cool and days are warm.

All plants are susceptible to one or more species of aphids. Aphids cause loss of plant vigor, stunted growth, deformation of buds and flowers, and curling or puckering of leaves. These insects pierce the plant with their needle-like mouth parts and feed on plant sap. A sweet sticky substance called honeydew is created by these insects and it attracts ants and provides a medium for the growth of molds. Infected willows, American elms, arborvitae, pecans and other trees drip the honeydew on cars and sidewalks.

Aphids can be many different colors, including black, green, yellow, pink, red, and gray. These pests cluster in large groups on buds, stems, leaves.

Here are some recent publications of interest to home owners and home vegetable growers:

General Insect Control Guide for Home and Garden, 400-J-16, is a publication that lists many of the most common insects that infest the home and home garden and insecticides that will control them.

1967 Grasshopper Control Recommendations, 440-J-15, lists chemicals and rates of application for controlling grasshoppers on non-agricultural land and pasture, feed, forage and row crops. Information on mixing baits and calibration sprayers is also included.

Control Flies in and Around Your Home, 400-J-18, gives tips on why, how and what to use in control flies. Chemicals for use inside the home and outside are listed.

Controlling Diseases of Home Plantings, Circular 389, describes the most common ailments of home plantings.

All slow-moving vehicles operators are urged to use the new Slow Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblem on their equipment. Pull off to the side if you are holding up a line of traffic, when this is possible.

The SMV emblem is an orange triangular warning device which can help identify your equipment as a slow-moving vehicle. It gives a little extra protection against a rear-end collision.

The emblem may be obtained from your local equipment dealer.

Farmers have been using computers for years without knowing it.

Every seed a farmer plants is a tiny computer. Locked inside are factors which can mean extra profit, extra yield potential, disease and drought resistance, uniform maturity, and other important variables.

Of course, this assumes that the seed planted is properly programmed with careful research and development, supervised production and processing.

Seed of unknown origin and dubious quality can be a computer too, with built-in factors that can reduce chances for profit.

The best way to insure that seed is programmed for profits is to plant certified seed. Other seed may have the factors you want, but it's a gamble if you are not sure where or how it was produced.

If this "Willing to Work" program is good for ten counties, Lincoln certainly should have some -- either that or cut the program out completely nationwide.

Opposition is developing to urban renewal in Roswell; but if this program gets official sanction something like a quarter million dollars will be spent just planning to put a new face on downtown Roswell.

Those Chaves County people have had it pretty good for a number of years. Walker Air Force Base and missile sites have caused flat deluge of federal money to be spent in that town.

Our point is not to ask for an outpouring of federal money to be spent in Lincoln County -- but we'd like to make the point that major towns have manufactured their own major problems, why should taxpayers in the small towns bail them out, via the federal government. The manner and means of such spending is totally unfair -- it amounts to robbery.
