### Number of State Government exempt jobs is now slashed

SANTA FE — A welcome new law sponsored by Senate Minority Leader Joe Skeen, Placito Republican, will cut the number of exempt jobs in state government under the Personnel Act from about 270 to 200 and produce more qualified employees. The little noticed statute, passed unanimously, was effective Friday. Persons in exempt positions are not required to pass a qualifying test. Many are political appointees who got their jobs through the patronage system. Sen. Skeen's amendment removes a major category of exempt posts from present law. The category covers "heads of divisions of agencies and such other employees serving in policy making capacities as may be determined by the Personnel Board."

The legislature narrowed the number of exempt jobs by adopting the following classification: "State employees, if the Personnel Board, in its discretion, decides that the position is one of policy making." Some exempt job holders, aware they could not pass, reportedly will not even take qualifying examinations required under the change.

There are still two loopholes. Persons in exempt jobs for at least a year will be "grandfathered" in and covered by the Personnel Law. People in exempt posts less than a year may qualify by passing a non-competitive test. Most of those in exempt positions have been hired since the Republican administration took office January 1.

The legislature also clamped down on another avenue of political patronage. The law had allowed hiring of employees in emergency status for up to 90 days without a qualifying test and without a ceiling on salaries. The new amendment permits hiring of emergency employees only when a list of qualified applicants is not available. It also prohibits fat salaries by requiring payment of emergency personnel at established rates for work done.

Political hirings of emergency workers have been common in the past in both Republican and Democratic administrations.

Pay of Dr. Emmett Shockley as Deming schools superintendent was raised \$1,500 for fiscal 1967-68 to \$15,000. Dr. Shockley was hired during the 1966-67 year. Salary of Supt. Hack Henington at Estancia was boosted \$1,090 to \$11,000. Henington also was employed during the year ending June 30. Pay of Oliver H. Newton at Springer was hiked \$1,000 to \$11,000.

William W. Hall, Corona, \$9,900, up \$300; Julian W. Caton, Eunice, \$14,250, unchanged; James R. Fincke, Fort Sumner, \$11,760, up \$560; Calvin R. Trice, Jal, \$13,400, up \$400; Wesley Freeburg, Lordsburg, \$12,400, up \$400; Bernard Baca, Los Lunas, \$14,000, up \$600; Clifton Edwards, Moriarty, \$10,000, unchanged.

# County omits fund requests

## Monies not set for HDA, Sheriff

Lincoln County Commissioners approved a budget of \$837,721 which did not include funds for a county home demonstration agent, funds for another deputy sheriff in Ruidoso or monies for another vehicle for the Sheriff's department.

"The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department has only two cars, one for Ruidoso and the other for Carrizozo," lamented Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr.

"Part of the reason we need to expand is the growing number of calls from outside of Carrizozo. Ruidoso areas like Cedar Creek, Malpais Creek and the golf course down there are out

of Ruidoso's city jurisdiction and we have to answer the calls from here," he said.

A bigger disappointment, however, was the turnout of a request for funds for a Home Demonstration agent. It has been estimated that it will require approximately \$8,000 a year to maintain an agent in the county. Commission chairman, R. M. Shafer had met back in January with a large delegation of ladies interested in having a HDA for Lincoln County.

According to Inice Hust, county clerk, rising cost of services and materials have forced the county to pay more for the same services it has been purchasing.

Part of Sheriff Vega's problem is highlighted by one of his deputies being called out to subdue a drunk. He had to use his personal car, both of the department's were out on call. The drunk was subdued at the cost of the headliner in his 1966 model car. Reimbursement, says Sheriff Vega is at the rate of nine cents a mile.

"The county is growing. The department is not," he says. Other grumblings have been heard from women who had expected that the HDA matter would be approved.

## Smokey Bear Stampede set for July 3-4

Capitan's ninth annual Smokey Bear Stampede will be held July 3 and 4.

A contest to decide who is to be the Queen of Lincoln County will be held on July 3. There will be a night rodeo program and a dance after the rodeo.

There will be two rodeo performances July 4, and afternoon show starting at 2 and an evening performance starting at 8.

July 4 will also see a parade starting at 10:30 a.m. which will proceed down city streets to the Fair Grounds where a free Barbeque will be held. Following the barbeque will be the 2 p.m. rodeo.

Capping off the July 4 program, said Walter Jones, Stampede secretary, will be a western dance that will continue as long as there are dancers.

Rodeo events scheduled include bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer

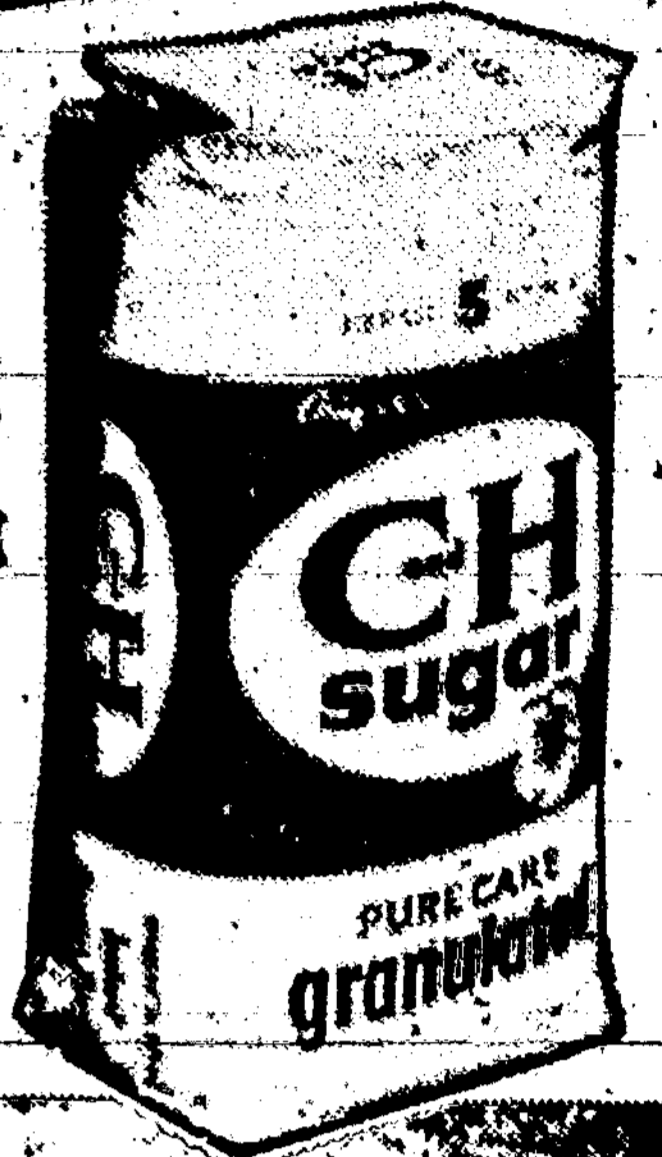

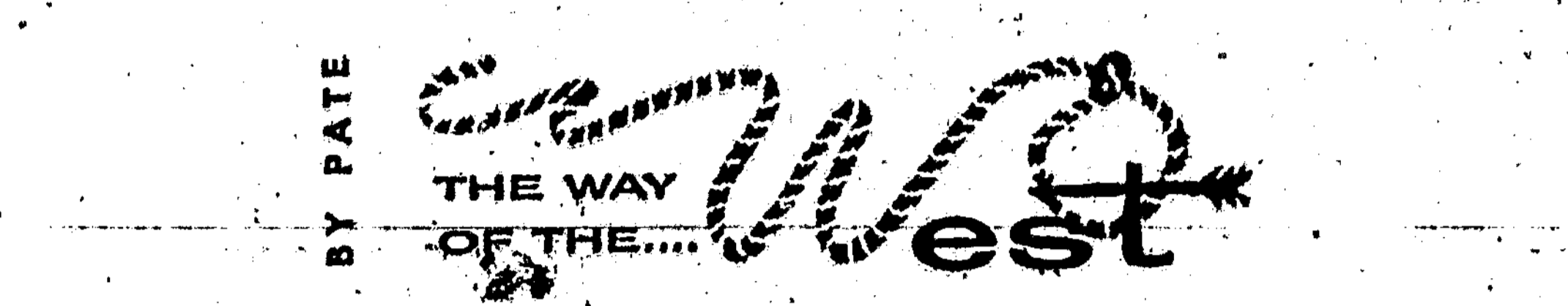
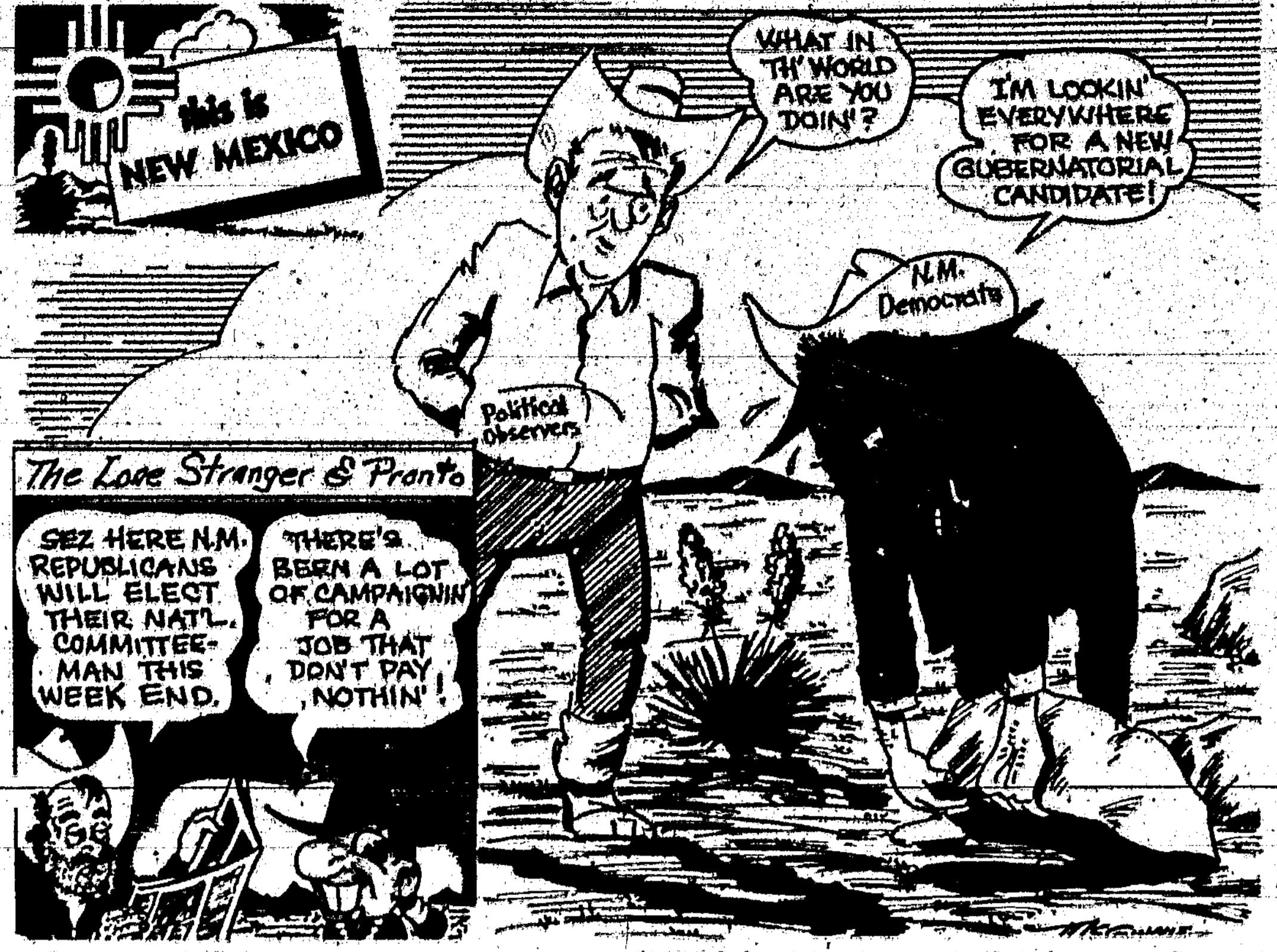

Nasser made the same mistake that we so often make; he took the Russians at their word. A major contributory cause of his grotesque blunder was the torrent of Moscow oratory, blustering, threatening, promising.

Thus was Nasser made overconfident by the false assurance of Russian aid.

May 22, 1967, ten days before war erupted, the Moscow press pledged "all-out support" for the Arab Republic.

May 29, Nasser declared, "The Soviet Union stands with us in this battle and will not allow any country to interfere..."

Then ten Soviet warships moved through the Dardanelles and into the Mediterranean, and Soviet tanks and half-tracks rumbled ostentatiously through Cairo streets while in New York Soviet Ambassador Federenko was pledging Russia's backing to Egypt "all the way."

Well... Five bloody days later a sad, defeated and disillusioned King Hussein of Jordan said it succinctly: "Certain friendly nations let us down."

The Cairo Press protests, "The Russians made promises they did not keep!"

Algeria's President asks, "What happened to all that support Russia promised?"

Now -- aren't we, the United States, making a similar mistake in letting the Communists loud-mouth us out of doing what we should do in Vietnam?

Each of our General officers in Vietnam has said privately that we could, without nuclear weapons, win a military victory within 45 days.

Marine General Lewis Walt, just recently returned from Vietnam to a Pentagon assignment, says, "Yes, of course, the United States could win a clear-cut military victory in South Vietnam. There is no question."

Why don't we hit the fat targets and get this war over with? Because Kremlin leaders beat their breasts and shout, "We won't stand by if you do..."

And Peking announces, "Our Red China armies will not allow a Communist defeat..."

## 200 economists expected to attend convention

Las Cruces -- The Western Farm Economics Association will meet at New Mexico State University July 19-21. About 200 agricultural economists are expected to attend, according to Dr. George R. Dawson, head of NMSU's department of agricultural economics and general chairman for the meeting.

The total program for the two and one half days of meetings will include 44 speakers from 19 universities and four government agencies. Dr. Jimmy S. Hillman, chairman of the agricultural economics department at the University of Nevada, is president of the association. In the opening session July 19,

James T. Bonnen of Michigan State University will present a talk on the agriculturalist's role in the changing research and education program. Four economists and educators who will discuss the talk are Drs. James St. Clair, University of Wyoming; J.C. Evans, Oklahoma State University; Theodore Byerly, USDA; and Harold E. Myers, University of Arizona.

In a contributing paper session, J.O. Gerald of the Economic Research Service will chair a session on agricultural policy and the economic of distribution, and Dr. E.E. Weeks of Washington State University will chair a second session on regional economic development -- domestic and foreign.

A joint paper by Drs. Louis Carlos Felix of the University of Sonora and Harland Paddock of the University of Arizona will deal with underlying resources and social factors affecting agricultural development in Mexico. John T. Schneider of the College of San Mateo will discuss the paper.

Dr. L.B. Fletcher of Iowa State University will deliver a paper of agricultural planning for economic development. His paper will be discussed by Dr. R. Kirby Davidson of the Rockefeller Foundation. Drs. Roger W. Fox of the University of Arizona and Jose Siles of the University of Mexico will deal with the impact of export markets for agricultural products in Mexican economic development. The discussant will be Dr. Hugh L. Cook of the University of Wisconsin.

Dr. Erven Long of the Agency of International Development will talk on problems in giving and administering technical assistance. Dr. John McNeely of Texas A & M University will discuss the talk.

The program on July 20 will include papers on income distribution problems of agricultural commodity programs by Dr. J.D. Coffey of the University of California at Berkeley and contributions and problems in using linear program models for analyzing farm policy, by Drs. N.K. Whittlesey of Washington State University and Ray F. Brocken of Oregon State University, Ken of Oregon State University, Dr. Norman Lundgren of the Economic Research Service will present a paper on evaluation of conservation and resource development programs, to be discussed by Dr. Roger Gray of Stanford University and Walter E. Chryst of the Farm Foundation.

Drs. Harold O. Carter and John Wildermuth of the University of California at Davis will speak on an analysis of the technological and labor adjustment process of commercial farms in the Sacramento-Sutter area. The discussants will be Dr. George R. Dawson of New Mexico State University and Edgar L. Michelson of Washington State University.

George White, Ruidoso, \$11,700, up \$400; Joe T. Gonzales, Santa Rosa, \$12,628, up \$285; J. Placido Garcia, Socorro, \$13,485, up \$445; Ferrell Caster, Tatum, \$12,900, succeeding Roy Hollingsworth, unchanged; Basil F. Burke, Truth of Consequences, \$12,500, up \$800, and Frand H. Duran, Tularosa, \$13,500, up \$700.

The new State Water Quality Control Commission set anti-pollution standards subject to the Rio Grande from Owl Bridge near Los Alamos south to San Marcial, Socorro County. Dissolved solids shall not exceed 1,500 milligrams per liter in a monthly average concentration. Included are salts, sulfates and carbonates.

Within this limit maximum allowable sulfates are 500 milligrams per liter and the chlorides ceiling is 250 milligrams per liter.

Rio Grande standards from proposed Cochiti Reservoir south to Elephant Butte Reservoir headwaters: Dissolved oxygen shall not fall below 5 milligrams per liter. Biological oxygen demand shall not exceed 10 milligrams per liter.

For the entire Rio Grande in New Mexico the coliform bacteria per 100 milliliters. One hundred milliliters is approximately 6.11 cubic inches of water.

Rio Grande counts in the Belon area prior to adoption of the law: Average turbidity (cloudiness), 210 milligrams per liter; dissolved oxygen, 6 mgs. per liter; coliform bacteria, 1,000 mgs. per 100 milliliters.

State Health Director Edwin O. Wicko said: "There is some suspicion that in the area downstream from Albuquerque, including Belon, the Rio Grande has been used as an effluent disposal device." The new law, he said, "Means literally that we have established standards so that waters will not be degraded or become of worse quality."

The State Liquor Division said a package store in Central Grant County, dropped its prices for beer 50 cents to \$1 a case but there has been no general statewide price cut so far in the wake of a court decision voiding the fair trade-mandatory price markup law.

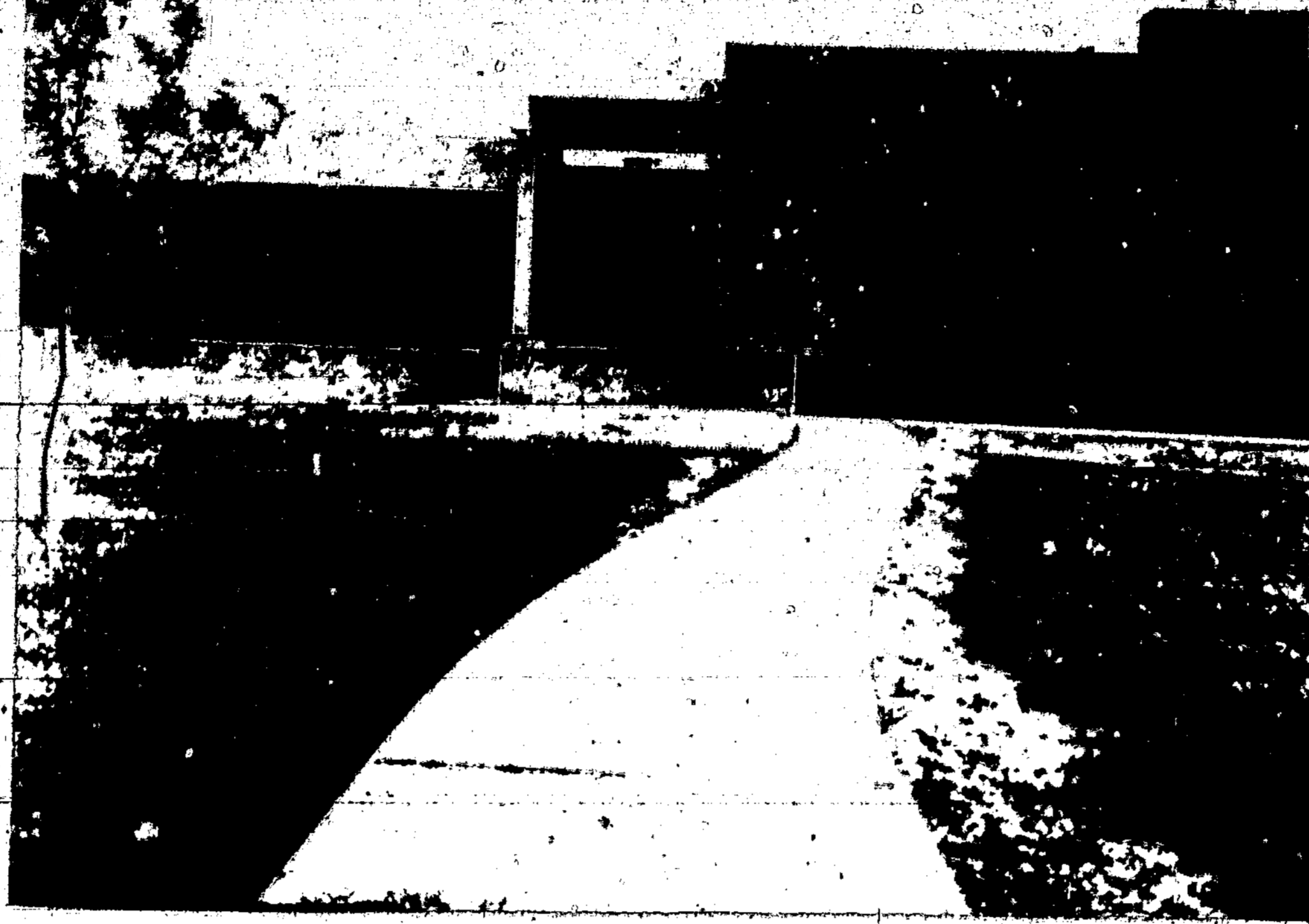
