Original plans for the cleanup came from an April meeting of Future Homemakers of America, when during convention, state chapters agreed to a state-wide beautification program.

A first meeting was held in Carrizozo in May with local and school organizations sending representatives. Donda Jo May was elected chairman of a city beautification committee.

A follow-up meeting in late June set the dates and goals for the just-accomplished cleanup. Clyde Halsten was appointed adult chairman-coordinator and organizer for the swimming and hamburger parties.

Yearly budgets listed for Lincoln County, Carrizozo, Corona, Capitan- for fiscal 1967

Lincoln County's \$837,721 budget, recently approved by the County Commissioners and Louis Fernandez, State department of finance and Administration was put into effect on July 1, start of the fiscal year.

Based on a 1967 property valuation of \$21,937,797 the budget is only a slight increase over the current fiscal year. Current property taxes are expected to produce \$199,936 while other taxes, fees, grants and other sources are expected to produce \$637,785.

Fund breakdown were: General fund (including courthouse utilities, office expenses, insurance, postage, etc.) \$50,487. Salary fund (including county clerk, assessor, treasurer, sheriff, probate judge, commis-

sioners and deputies) \$62,320.

Road fund (including road crew salaries, road equipment and insurance) \$117,000.

Agricultural agent fund (contract with New Mexico State University) \$5,550.

Courthouse and jail repair fund, \$2,350.

Audit fund, \$2,392.

Primary and special election fund, \$4,556.

Farm and range improvement fund, \$3,000.

Health fund (including health nurse, sanitarian, clerk and laboratory) \$9,512.

Recreational facilities fund, \$11,500.

Fire district funds (from state fire allotments and districts' cash balance) Ft. Stanton \$4,500; Hondo \$5,000; Nopal \$5,470;

Boalfo \$5,000.

Court fund (district court salaries, offices expenses, etc.) \$40,000.

Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital, \$329,700. (Includes \$7,871 from a special 3-4 mill levy and \$329,029 income from hospital services.)

Lincoln County Municipal Hospital, \$94,688. (Includes \$7,671 from the special levy and the remainder from hospital services.)

Predatory control fund, \$9,000.

Debt retirement (bond payments and interest) \$50,700.

Carrizozo

Carrizozo city officials have approved a \$304,046 budget which went into effect at the start of

the current fiscal year, July 1. Its \$238,900 general fund includes a special recreation contribution of \$227,646 by Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer; \$3,276, government grant to the airport (final payment); \$25,000, water revenue; \$5,000, state fire fund; \$3,093 cigarette tax.

Spending categories in the general fund include administrative \$4,500; health and sanitary \$4,500; police \$13,500; streets (mostly wages) \$23,300; sanitation \$4,700; parks and recreation fund \$170,500.

The fire protection fund will be \$5,000 and the juvenile recreation fund \$3,093.

Auto crash kills girl

An Artesia family's holiday in Lincoln County ended in tragedy with a one-car accident near Capitan which took the life of one daughter and left another in "fair" condition in a Roswell hospital.

Killed was Carolyn Joyce Davis, 19, and injured were Janel Davis, 17, and Donald Mc-

Knight, 16, of Picacho, driver of the car. The girls are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. "Tiny" Davis, 1011 S. Second, Artesia. The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McKnight, Picacho, and is in "good" condition in the same hospital.

According to State Policeman Darrel Austin, the car was apparently traveling at a high rate of speed when it went out of control, overturned twice and threw both girls from the car. Carolyn Davis was apparently killed instantly, he added.

The Davis family was spending the July 4th holiday with the McKnight family.

Among the survivors are Miss Davis' parents, and sister, Janel, of Artesia; and two brothers, Ronnie Davis, Artesia; and Steve Davis, Portales.

This made the second fatality on Lincoln County highways during 1967.

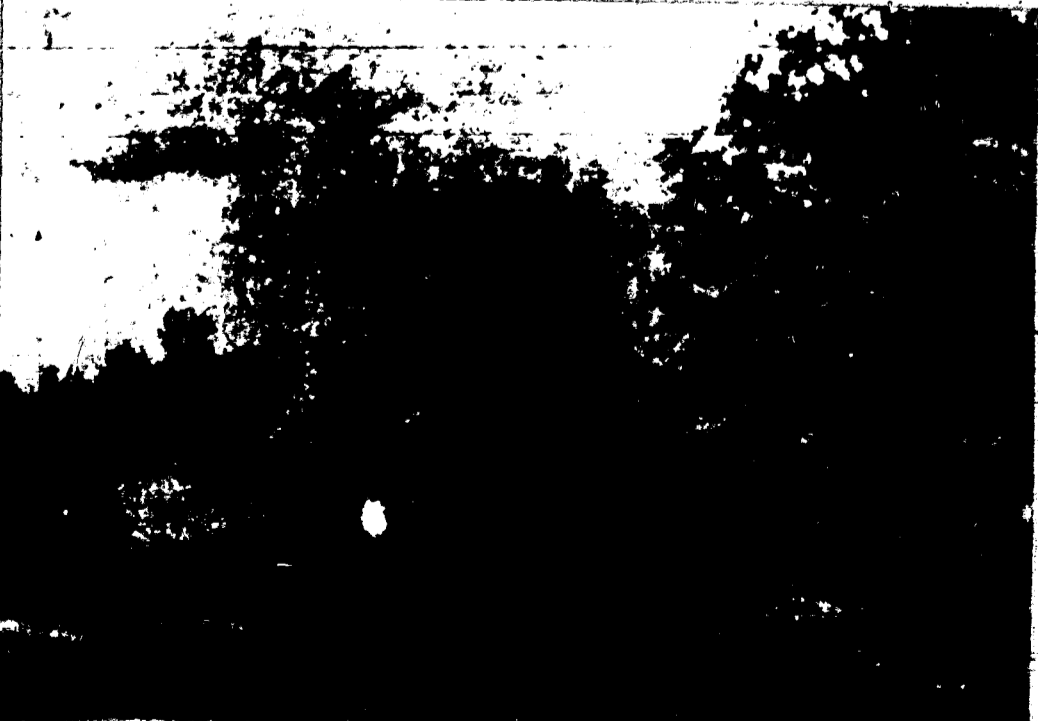

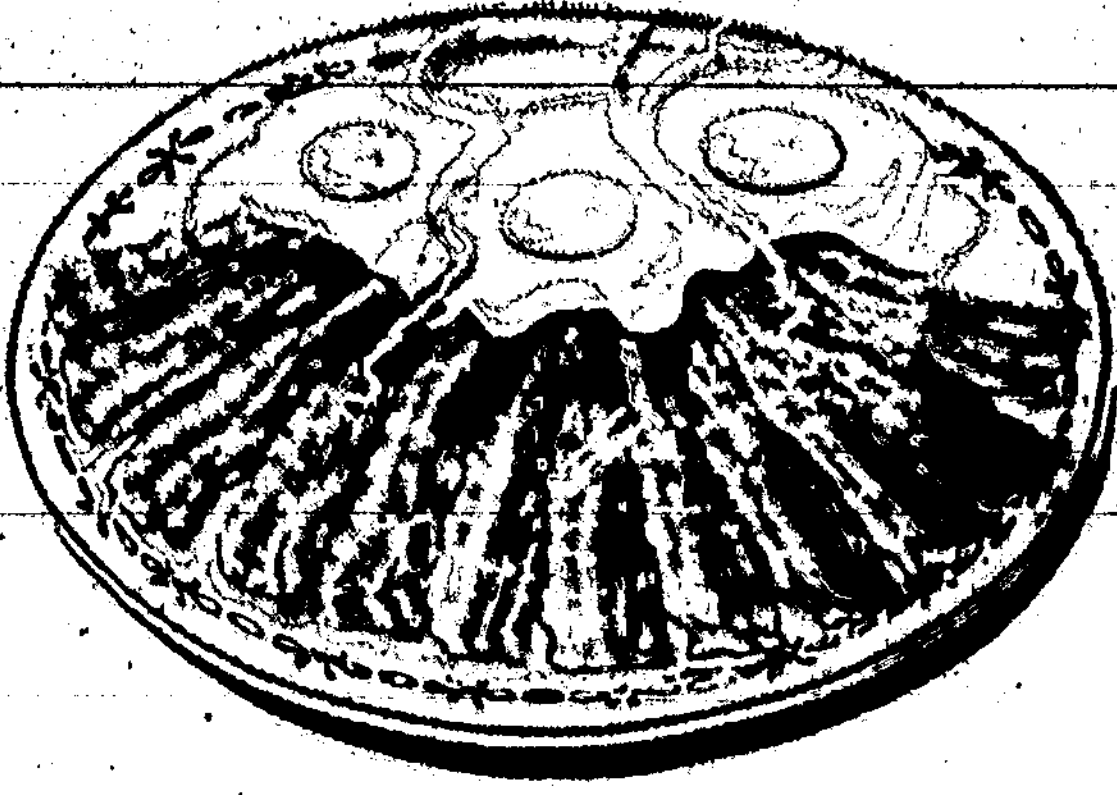
