Development Group to help entire county

"The purpose of the Lincoln County Development Association is to help the entire county, not just Ruidoso," says Don Stark, Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce manager. "True, it was started by several Ruidosoans, but we have had from twenty to forty persons from Corona, Ancho, Carrizozo, Capitan, Tinnie and Lincoln in on the discussions, too," he explains.

Philosophy behind the organization is simple: anything that benefits Lincoln County will also benefit the individual towns, he tells.

The organization really do not have much money--a collection taken during a meeting at Tinnie netted \$60.--which it is still operating on.

Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department threatens to "toss in its badges en masse"

Probably the hottest fire the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department will be called to extinguish this year, 1967, may be the one generated within the fire building itself.

Fire Chief Willis Hill says that the VFD needs more funds, so that the department can buy needed equipment.

Carrizozo Mayor Leandro Vega says that Carrizozo's fire department and equipment are adequate and that he sees no need to spend additional city money. Assistant Fire Chief Sigfried "Ziggy" Lessau tells that if certain molasses are not forthcoming from the city to the VFD, then the 22-man force will toss in their badges en masse.

During Wednesday night's city council meeting, a bill was presented to the council from the fire department for \$50 -- for rent charged the city for the use of the Municipal building, which the fire department claims it owns.

"We're checking into the deed now to see who owns what," says Buster Smoot, council member adding that he was withholding his decision until he finds out about the deed.

"It was my understanding that the city was to receive free rent in the Municipal building in exchange for handling all the correspondence and bookwork for the fire department," he said.

Vernon Petty, city councilman, noted that the Carrizozo city budget is set up to distribute funds for certain projects under certain rules.

"We (the city council) cannot give money to anyone," he told. As for the fire department's allocation, Petty told that the money comes in allotments of \$5,000 from the state and is then allocated by the city council for various previously approved fire department needs. The uses of which the money will be used must be approved before the money is ever sent to the city council, Petty told.

More funds are available at present, Petty thought, and if approved, the fire department's request for additional funds might net them \$7,500 this year instead of the \$5,000 which they are to receive.

Four 1967 graduates of Carrizozo High have left for basic training at Ft. Bliss, Texas:

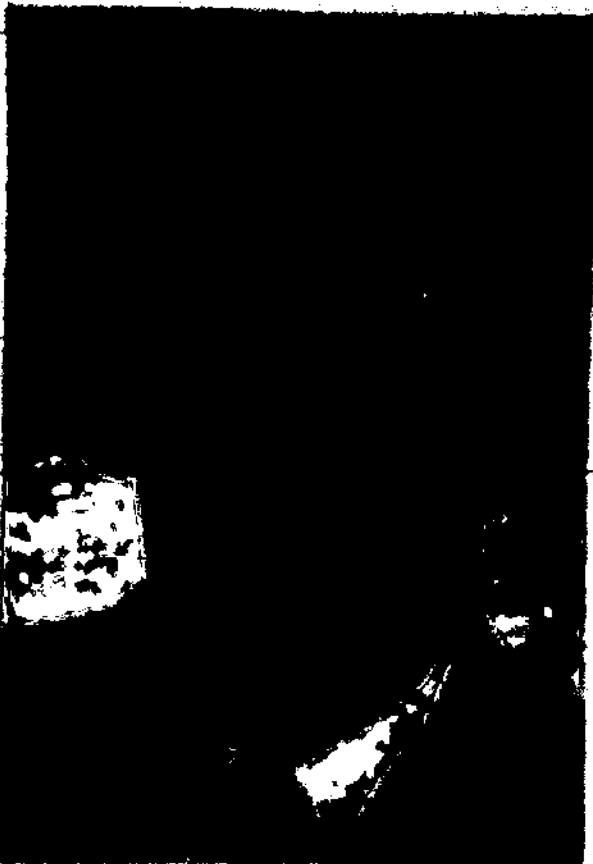

During the past fiscal year ending June 30, a total of \$705,370 in loans was made through the FHA office in Roswell which services both Lincoln and Chaves counties. Also, a loan in the amount of \$76,600 was approved for the Village of Capitan sewer system which will be closed shortly. Each loan is accompanied by technical assistance.

PUBLICITY:

1. When I boarded the Golden State some weeks ago, several passengers asked me what town this was. Have signs ever been considered for placement along the railroad tracks to inform folks other than the signs on the station proper?

2. Is Highway 54 still sponsored by an Association? If it is still functioning, is there much publicity? Is traffic on it improving?

3. Do the local merchants and gas station people pass out Carrizozo folders to people they feel are out-of-towners?

4. When tourists check in at their local motel rooms, do they find a Carrizozo folder there for their consideration? Also, during rodeo, Billy the Kid, and other seasonal activities, are there notices to that effect that might attract the tourist?

5. Have local citizens been sending the Carrizozo folders to their friends and relatives and inviting them here for a visit?

6. Does Carrizozo take a very active part in State and County fairs? Is there something distinctive about the town, its locale, its people that would be worthwhile in publicizing at such events?

7. Has some writer, such as Dorothy Gack, prepared an article on Carrizozo and the surrounding area for distribution to the travel sections of the various big city newspapers?

THINGS TO BE DONE BY THE TOWN:

8. Do local motels and hotels have special rates for more than one-day stops to encourage visitors to stay and take in visits to Ancho, White Oaks, etc.?

9. Are there any local, county or state laws that would discourage visitors from hiking, photographing.

10. Provide small pieces on lava at the motels, bank, or Valley of Fire to intrigue the visitor. The Lava Flow should be an attraction and the sample might encourage a visit to the Park.

11. Encourage local residents and property owners to improve their property's appearance as a selling point for the town. Large, old, and unused buildings could be refurbished for industry attraction; outfit as sleeping quarters for large hunters groups or dismantled and the property improved with either a new structure or landscaping.

12. During the summer season, is the local pool available for tourist use after 6 or 7:00 p.m. Do the local motel owners consider this a feature and would they be willing to underwrite pool expense to provide this facility should it be needed?

THE RAILROAD PROBLEM:

13. Is the Southern Pacific doing anything to improve its passenger hauling potential through use of more modern equipment? Service encountered on my return trip to Chicago would seem

to indicate the railroad tolerates passenger service and that's about all.

14. Is there a Railroad Committee in the town letting the railroad know they are concerned with its continued passenger operation?

SUGGESTED POTENTIALS:

15. Has local soil been tested to determine its fitness for farming, irrigation, use for large structure foundations, mining future?

16. Have national manufacturers been contacted as to local space, labor, climate, water conditions that might be of use to them in selecting a new site?

17. Location on two highways and a railroad would make this a good location for a warehouse or merchandising center.

18. Because of surrounding natural terrain, this could be made a hobby center for rock collectors, yucca and cactus makers, mineral hobbyists.

19. Has Carrizozo ever considered building facilities that might attract conventions of regional Lions, Legion, Rotary, and Miscellaneous groups?

20. Large numbers of high school senior classes are taking travel trips each year. With Carrizozo as a center, such groups could visit this area of the country over their allotted 3 or 4 days.

21. Is the local airport of any use to persons desiring to fly somewhere, but lack a plane? Can planes be rented and are these facts available locally?

22. Is this area ideal for the building of a construction material company? Sand, Lava, lumber are available.

23. Would stock raisers, mining groups, sporting enthusiasts consider Carrizozo as a place to erect a permanent headquarters?

24. Have movie and TV producers been contacted in regard to using the scenery in this area in some of their productions?

ATTRACTION VALUE FOR VARIOUS GROUPS:

25. Is Carrizozo and the surrounding mountain area satisfactory for glider flying enthusiasts?

26. Do various church groups know of the Tabernacle facilities, and proximity to Carrizozo?

27. Have ads been placed in various Hobby or Sports magazines to attract the following: Sking followers, Square dancers, Bicycle riders (Local area ideal for short bike trips. Bikes to rent?), Hiking clubs, outdoor campers (Rest tents, etc., locally?), airplane clubs, hunters and fishermen, rockhounds fans, artists, camera fans, amateur astrologists, young scientists (Atom sits, lava flow), wild west magazines (History lovers).

The friend opened the book and looked at it a few minutes. A very surprised expression came over her face and she exclaimed, "Oh my brother married a Carrizozo girl, the Miss Billy Crumley." Ruby asked that she contact this girl to find out if the Lane Sisters were still there and since they were she immediately wrote them. Imagine their surprise Sunday after the 11 o'clock service when a nice looking lady stepped up to them and called each by name and said, "I'm Ruby Alexander Kelly from Cameron, Louisiana. That wonderful husband Ed Kelly had made it possible for Ruby to come to her second home, Carrizozo Trinity Methodist.

She met and visited with the members for a short time expressing her thanks and appreciation for all they'd done. What a wonderful day it turned out to be they all agreed that this personal visit more than paid for all they'd done. If all who are reared in Waco show the results of wonderful training and especially Christian training as Ruby does we will be well rewarded for all we do. Ruby's dream of coming to Carrizozo came true and the day was only too short but we can truthfully say it was the "End of a perfect day at Carrizozo Trinity Methodist."

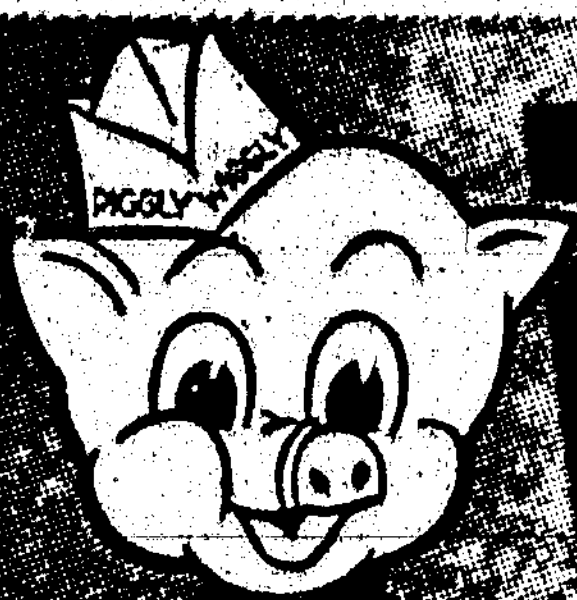

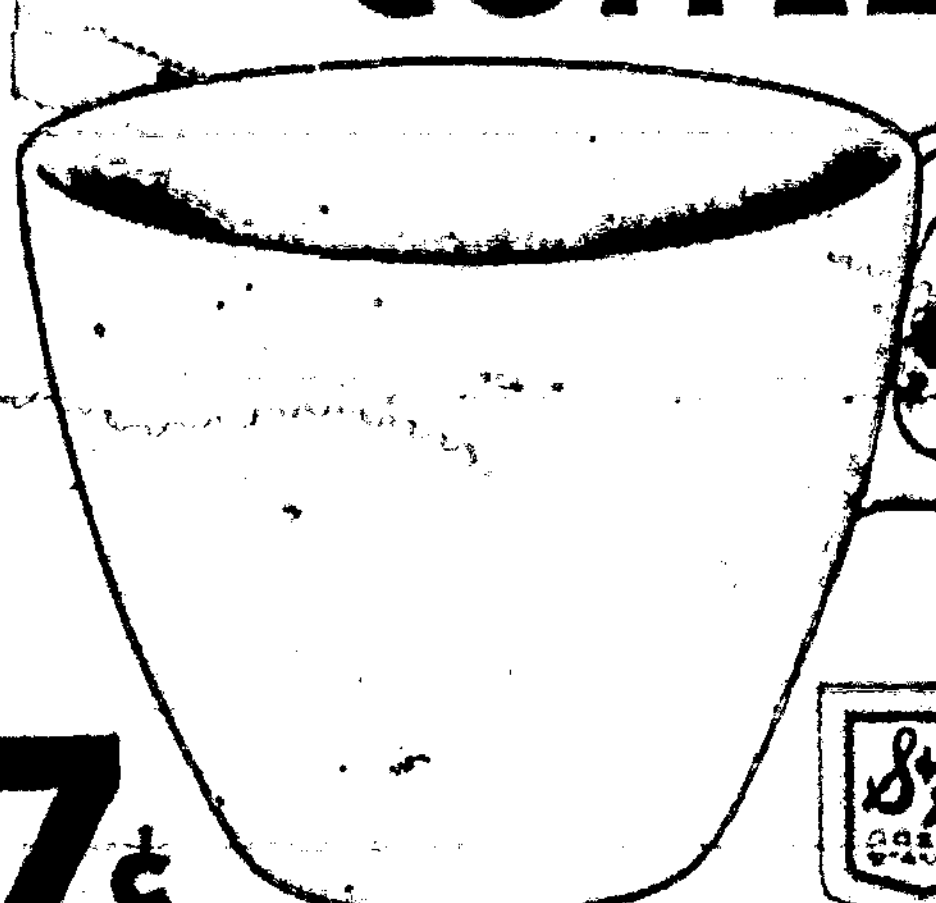

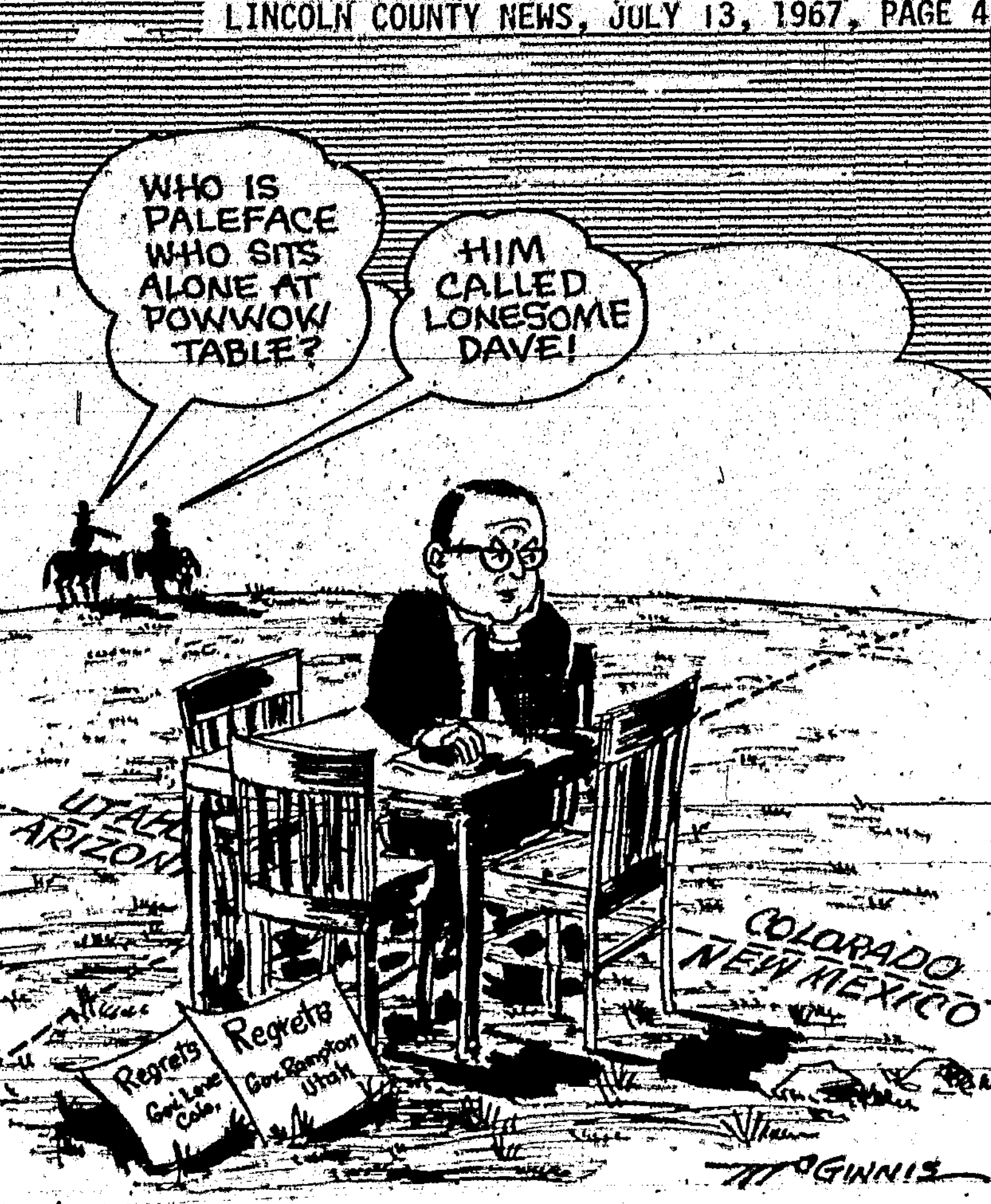

The passage of 20 years since Hiroshima and Nagasaki, along with the deadening bombardment of diplomatic threat and counter-threat, have jaundiced the common man to the uncommon peril. He has never been nearer the threat than Bikini, or the Sahara, or Lob Nor- or Alamogordo.

Except for some of the inhabitants of Carrizozo, N.M.

A postscript to the still unfolding story of the first Fat Man was told recently by newsmen William L. Laurence, who was the sole official reporter chosen by the wartime leaders of the Manhattan Project to record the Alamogordo event for the public.

As the 20th anniversary neared, Laurence was irresistibly drawn back to "ground zero." But he was also drawn back to Carrizozo, the helpless human quantity in the unknown equation.

He revisited Carrizozo, a town some 30 miles east of Zero, whose 1500 inhabitants might have different names today if the wind had changed to easterly on that morning in 1945. In preparation for this eventuality, Laurence recalled, several hundred Army trucks carrying carefully briefed personnel had surrounded the sleeping town in the dead of night, ready at a radio signal to dash in and bundle the townspeople out of the fallout zone, without telling them why.

That didn't happen, of course. Few of the original inhabitants yet know, to this day, that wholesale poisoning was ever a possibility. All they know is that, at the gray, dawn of the atomic age, they were stunned awake when Fat Man went off, and many thought the world was coming to an end. No one yet knows whether they were right.

I was there (Lincoln County) on that day in July 1945 when Fat Man was tested at Trinity. It is still frightening to think of what might have happened had the unexpected developed.

Perhaps the people of Lincoln County, who still remember, might be interested in learning what fate had in store for them and how they survived a crisis in the ominous shadow of the A-Bomb.

I enjoy the News as it is practically the only connection with the past and present happenings in Lincoln County. Now and then familiar names, places and events appear, and they bring back happy memories. I have traveled quite extensively throughout the world and

Cargo says peonage act was adopted in 1849

SANTA FE--Republican Gov. Dave Cargo would establish a State Department of Labor in legislation he hopes to send to the 30-day lawmakers' session in January.

A governor-appointed secretary of labor would head the department. These functions would be placed in the new agency: The Fair Employment Practice Commission, state mine inspector, child labor laws, wage collections, apprenticeship training programs and others.

Gov. Cargo says: "We have diffused the power on labor laws all over the state." He said duties of district attorneys to enforce minimum wage standards would be moved to an Enforcement Division in the Department of Labor.

Cargo said a Peonage Act was adopted in 1849 and Sen. Broussard Cutting pushed through the last major labor legislation in New Mexico in the 1920's. "We really haven't had anything since," the governor said.

He met last week with Larry Prentice, his administrative assistant, and Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe, member of the Commission on Reorganization, and discussed the proposed Department of Labor.

A meeting is set July 18 with large employer group representatives on the proposed agency. A meeting with organized labor representatives will be held later, then a joint session will be scheduled. The present three-member State Labor and Industrial Commission would be abolished and its duties would be assigned to the secretary of labor.

Cargo believes the move would aid industrial development of New Mexico because potential industry could get full information on labor laws at a central place.

Other major new departments Cargo would like to establish are a Department of Public Safety and a Department of Penitentiaries and Corrections. He would abolish the State Police Board which kicked off major controversy by reorganizing the State Police Department.

"All they do is to get out and try to administer the department," the governor said. He has abolished several minor state boards which had been inactive for some time.

A Legislative Council subcommittee assigned the job of taking a close look at the new capitol building met in Santa Fe. Members are Sen. R. C. (Ike) Morgan of Portales and L. M. (Ike) Smalley of Deming and Rep. Hoyt Pattison of Clovis. Morgan and Smalley are Democrats, Pattison is a Republican.

Sen. Morgan said the subcommittee will hire an architect

and engineer to check the capitol building and develop a "punch list" of unfinished items. The subcommittee will report to the council July 27. "If there is anything structurally and architecturally wrong, we want to know it," Sen. Morgan said. He represents Curry and Roosevelt Counties.

Universal Constructors Inc., Albuquerque, began work July 5 to rebuild a bridge over Interstate 25 south of Socorro at a cost of \$69,900. The structure will replace a span which collapsed last January when struck by a Whitfield Tank Lines Inc. truck. The trucker's insurance firm will pay for reconstruction set for completion about Oct. 1.

The Highway Commission will open bids July 28 on an Interstate 25 project in Socorro and Sierra Counties. A four-lane stretch will be constructed. A second phase of the project calls for signs on a 13-mile segment of I-25 north of the Socorro-Sierra Counties line.

Bids will also be opened on surfacing of an eight-mile stretch of highway from Clovis east to Texico. The estimated cost is \$70,000. Also set for bid opening is a rest area composed of shelters, tables and a water system to be located at the Berino port of entry in Dona Ana County.

Two rest area projects are also set for construction in Guadalupe County. Bids will also be opened July 28.

State Finance Director Ed Hartman recently ordered installation of violent green-colored carpeting in five offices and a big conference room in the State Finance Department in the new capitol. Shades of green did not match in the carpeting so colors are in harmony. There was no additional cost to the state. The carpeting initially cost about \$2,000.

The Bureau of Revenue has hired 13 employees since June 1 in Santa Fe, Las Cruces, Alamogordo and Albuquerque offices. Included was William K. Espy, employed as a liquor inspector at Las Cruces for \$330 a month.

Shaffe Hindl was hired as an auditor at \$440 a month. An Albuquerque resident, he formerly lived at Duran, Torrance County.

State Purchasing Agent Al Cochran said virtually all insurance for the State Boys School at Springer was sold by John Mullins Agency of Springer. By Fred Buckles
