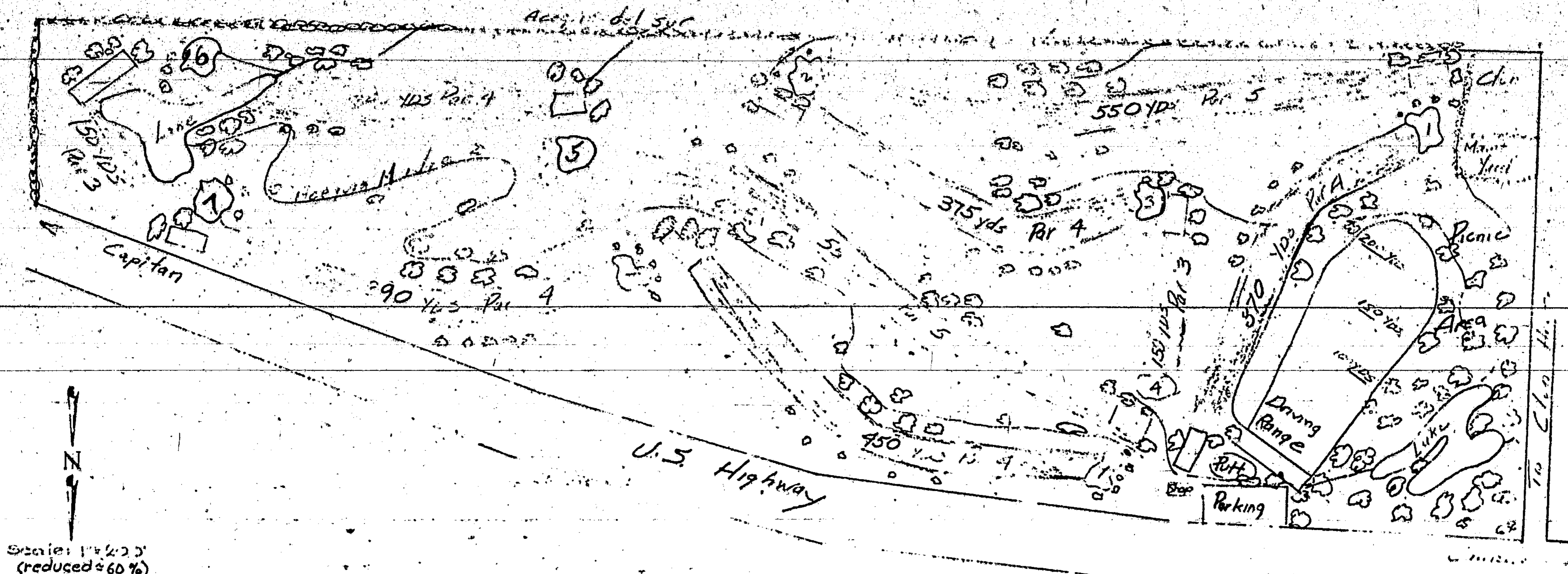


# Proposed Carrizozo outdoor recreational facilities

CARRIZOZO OUTDOOR RECREATION FACILITIES

During a recent meeting, the board of directors for the Carrizozo Country Club voted to give the lands and facilities of the golf course and club to the Town of Carrizozo, board officials tell.

With the land donated to Carrizozo, it will become part of the Carrizozo recreational complex, with funds administered by the town.

Officials note that Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer have agreed

to donate monies to the recreational fund for the construction and maintenance of a new golf course, built on the site of the present one.

Amount of the Spencer donation will depend upon the amount of matching funds the State is willing to produce, one member tells. At present, Tom Mann, of Mann Engineering, Roswell, is in Santa Fe checking on this. Exact figures vary but the sums of \$125,000 to be matched

by the state and another donation of \$75,000 to insure maintenance of the facility to prevent its becoming a tax burden to the residents of Carrizozo were mentioned during a recent city council meeting, when Mann outlined the original golf course proposal. Mann's Santa Fe findings will be presented to the recreational planning committee, of which Ray Wells is chairman.

New members to the board include Johnson Stearns and Pat Voss.

## Future is 'tremendous'

Ancho's schoolhouse was prepared for an expected 40-to 50 persons for the Lincoln County Development Association meeting Wednesday night, but more than 80 turned out to listen to Department of Development officials outline possible route for the county to follow to entice and hold a tourist trade.

"Lincoln County's potential is so tremendous compared with other counties in New Mexico that I forecast tremendous growth here in the next 10 to 20 years, here in the next 10 to 20 years," told Gus Benakis, D of D industrial division official.

Benakis outlines possibilities which included enticing out-of-state companies to build here, looking for light manufacturing which would have low transportation costs since the state is not populated enough to really be considered a market.

His concept is that anything which helps New Mexico will in some way also benefit Lincoln County. Benakis predicted that

agriculture will play an important role in the state's future with large enclosed greenhouses with year-around growing schedules and cooperatives formed. With this, he noted, a maximum growth with a minimum of water needed would result.

"Christmas tree plantations will play an ever-increasing role of importance in the state's economy," told Ken Soles, state forest service marketing development official.

Ray Bell, state forester, told that plans were being developed to utilize surplus government fire equipment to establish rural fire fighting units and to train rural fire fighting personnel.

Dean Earl, state forestry official, told that the southwest Douglas fir is a most desirable Christmas tree and grows well in this climate. Persons desiring further information are asked to write: State Forester, Box 2167, Santa Fe.

## Burial ground access barred

No one living around Lincoln now really seems to know how old the secluded and now inaccessible graveyard of the Penitentes really is. A couple say that it is older than their 70-plus years.

It is located near the old east road that traverses most of the length on Lincoln canyon. Problems seem to have arisen over access rights to the graveyard, which is surrounded by property owned by Ray Taylor. He has posted the entire property and doesn't want persons to trespass.

Persons in Lincoln have asked New Mexico Attorney General Boston Witt for a decision as to whether or not access can be refused to what most Lincolnians consider a "holy place."

Raymond Maes, a life-long resident of Lincoln has recently started a drive to clean up the town cemetery. He has been helped by several town residents and tells that if access rights are granted to the Penitente burial grounds then it, too, will be cleaned and maintained.

According to Maes and other old timers of Lincoln, the Penitentes group is a secret Spanish religious cult which inflicts physical punishment on its members in memory of the crucifixion of Christ during Lent. A small group is said to still be flourishing in the northern part of the state although there have been no known Penitente activities around Lincoln for many years.

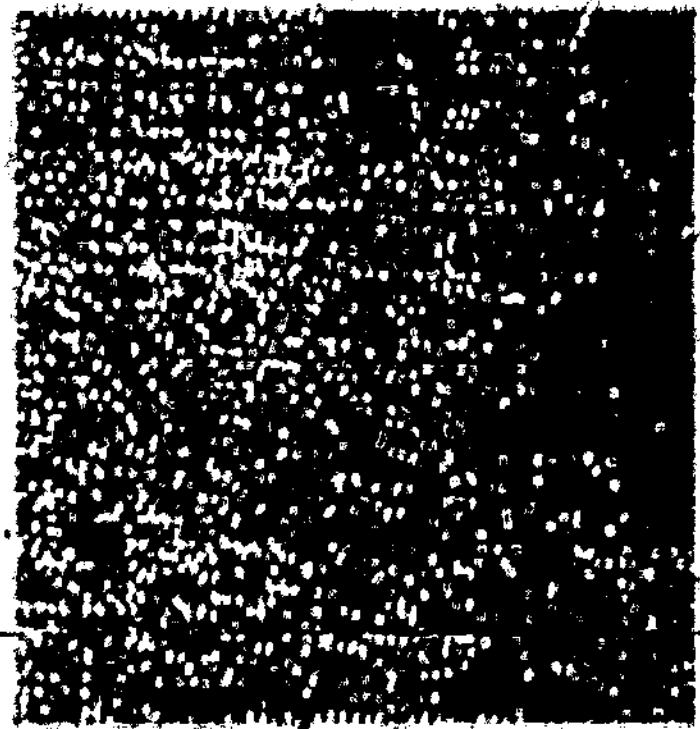

## Capitan sewer bids too high, go \$8,860.99 over estimate

Eight bids were opened for Capitan's sewer project, but the apparent low bid by Powers Corp., Albuquerque, or \$108,645.

99 was \$8,860.99 more than the engineer's estimate of \$100,172.99.

Judge Edward E. Triviz is currently attending a session of the National College of State Trial Judges at the University of Pennsylvania School of Law in Philadelphia. He is one of 135 trial judges from 50 states

chosen to attend this session of the College.

Judge Triviz, who serves on the District Court is taking courses in court administration criminal procedure, modern trends in evidence, sentencing and probation, pretrial procedures and other developing fields of trial court administration. The courses are taught by experienced judges and others of national reputation.

Mr. Justice Tom C. Clark, recently retired from the U. S. Supreme Court, sent his congratulations to Judge Triviz and said, "Your attendance at the College evidences your desire and firm resolve to make your

court better, to give our citizens the most effective and highest quality of the administration of justice. Justice Clark is the chairman of the Board of Directors of the College.

The National College of State Trial Judges, now in its fourth year, is sponsored by the National Conference of State Trial Judges and the American Bar Association.

Since the first session in 1964, some 700 judges of trial courts from every state in the nation have graduated from this intensive four week course. A second session of the College will be held in August at the University of Nevada in Reno.

## Message from the publisher
