Mill spouts iron ore concentrate

Several weeks ago large places of squipment were moved on to cleared-off ground just east of the overpass. A tie was usade onto city water lines, some loading ramps welling and fromore hawled in from two mines.

On September 2 this equipment was put into operation by Dotson Minerals Corporation, the end result is an iron ore concentrate which is being sold on contract to Ideal Cement Co. in Tieras Carron, Southwest Portland Cement Co. in Busiand, Texas, the Atomic Energy Commission and Keenecott Copper Co.

An investigation is being made about prospective sale of this. heavy aggregate (from one con-.ceptrate) for use in contine offshore oil and gas lines which need weight to offset buoyancy of licakie.

Carl Dotson of Socorro is owser of Dison Minerals Corporation. He has been supplyine from ore concentrate under contract for four years, using dry magnetic process to obtain concentrate. Ore comes from the Joues Iron Mine on Chapedern Mess 26 miles nor hwest of Carrinoso, and the Yellow Jacket Misse on Loss Mountain just a few miles northwest of Carrisoso.

The we process by mill now in use was built by filiph Murfin. The concentrates being processed were mised and crushed at the Josef Mine, 10 tons were put through the jig in the first eight-hour day of operation September 1.

Mr. Deison said they expect to process from 210 to 260 tons of concentrate when they get into full operation. The amount of head feed needed for the mill will be around 150 tons each eight hours. The faill will operate around the clock employing two mill mea, two drivers each matt. One said will work he mines, probably twelve men total.



State law is that after theordinance is passed a municipality has two years in which to get the project under contract. An FHA attorney at Still water, Okla:, has issued the opinion that the first election is no longer yalid and that the Issue will need be decided again by Capitan voters.

The Village of Capitan is causing to be published this week a notice of election on October 24 with the question of shall the Board of Trustees of the Village of Capitan be authorized to incur an indebtedness for and on behalf of said municipality by issuing revenue bonds in an amount not exceeding \$76,000.

Such bonds are payable both as to principal and interest solely out of the net income derived from the operation of the municipal sewer, system.







cern for the people, and wish to. thank you for your letter of August I have contacted the Red Grovs

in Viet Nam, and I understand that they will mail any charity clothing free, however in order to get the items for the people here who need them, the package must be addressed to me, so you may check with the local chapter of the Red Cross to insure free mailing. If the Red Cross will not help, then I ask you to check with the Postmaster there for free or minimum space available costs to send any charity items.

As I mentioned in my letter, my unit has the responsibility for

helping the people of two Montenard Villages; Plei MINW 1 and 2. located West of Picika. approximately 11 miles East of the Cambodian Border. This area is heavily populated with Viet Cong and has the highest Maiaria rate in the country. The people, because of what the Viet Cones have done to them, killing and abducting bushands and wives, have a very strong dislike for the Viet Coor, and as a result have helped us on numerous occasions by informing us where and when Viet Cong are in the immediate

area. We have taught them to bathe, taught them about firstaid, we're building a spillway for them and are now trying for a school for the children, and as they have very

little education, and it is extremely difficult for them to get any type of job in Viet Nam. This of course means no income. They eat only rice and benance nine some pineapple so the vitamin deficiency allows a very high disease and death rate among the children. They live in crude huts, have no shoes, very little clothing, never even heard of soap until this last June, Quite honestly I have never in my life seen people having to live without absolutely nothing, not to mention the . Viet Cong senseless murderings and stealing from them.

Then there's the children, and there's 106 now, as there was a new boy yesterday. The little ones are my primary concern because if we can help them by teaching, showing and schooling, then their lives and their childrens lives will be better, incidentally they are susceptible to learning and they don't forget. " Even the little ones now clean their teeth with fingers, and wash. I managed to get some cornfrom the United States Agency for International Developement, and will get more, which will give them vitamins. We also are making plans to build a dam between our itwo villages, and stock it with fish for their food (meat). It's a real challenge and really very rewarding and encouraging to see the delight, over what we would think insignificant, a piece of gum, a wave saying bello, or half a bar of moun.

If your church would like to help, then I'd like you to gather toothbrushes and old toys or clothes. The clothes should not include any heavy coats as it is usually warm here. Childrens clothes will be most welcome, I realize that toothbrushes cost money, so if you prefer clothes, old loys, I think the Red Cross will help with mailing costs,

SANTA FE -- A National Education Association team looking into public school finance in New Mexico was classly questioned by legislators on its molives, methods and objectives.

The New Mexico Education Association sparked the investigation with a resolution declaring financing of public schools in inadequate and listing other charges which Rep. John Mershon. of Cloudcroft branded as "distortions."

Many legislators resent the investigation and the HMEA resolution on grounds that lawyear to provide proper funding for public schools. The HMEA has pointed out that the per cent of general fund money for schools has dropped in recent years.

Northern New Mexico School at El Rito is stepping up its vocational training. About 50 Espenois area students are taken daily by bus to the El Rito school for vocational classes. Training in auto body work, drafting and building trades electrical work is being accelerated.

Revenue Commissioner F.A. (Tony) Vigil says the Revenue Bureau must boost tax collections by some \$700,000 a month over corresponding months of the. previous year for the next eight to 10 months to meet State Finance Department Income projections.

Vigil believes the Finance Department set projections too high. The Revenue Bureau's anticipated collections for the present fiscal year are \$152 million. So far the required pace has been maintained.

The legislature added a penny to the state gasoline tax this year but nunicipal gasoline taxes were abolished. No additional money was provided to pay the cost of collecting the increased tax which is apportioned back to municipalities and counties.

The added penny accounted for most of an increase of \$519,908 in gasoline tax receipts in August over August, 1966.

Caesar Sebastian, the new legislative auditor, was working on seven audits on contracts awarded by the legislative auditor's office when he was named to his job.






