Tuesday was a work day at the county fair grounds when the exhibit hall was cleaned and booths repaired, the livestock pens cleaned and the grounds given a going over.

Thursday is "setup day" at the fair grounds in Capitan when livestock is moved in, booths set-up and many exhibits put in place. Most exhibits must be in place before 9:00 a.m. on September 8 and remain in place until 4:00 p.m. September 9.

The Canyon Cowbells and Cholla Cowbells will have booths. Lincoln County Extension Clubs will be there with food and sweets. Farm Bureau will be represented. Harriet Kline will have a booth as will Carrizozo Hardware and an electric organ company.

Capitan eighth grade has a project going and will have a booth at the fair. Gamma Beta Phi sorority will sponsor bingo in the exhibit hall basement. Ancho Woman's Club and Capitan Woman's Club will have booths, and Capitan junior and senior classes are expected to be represented with booths.

A big part of the Lincoln County Fair is the long list of premiums and prizes which will be awarded

for a great many events — an amount totaling near \$2,000.00 will be given as cash prizes money.

Friday, September 8, events include judging of junior livestock, junior home economics, open home economics, flower show, art show, open horticulture exhibits and junior horticulture exhibits.

Range sheep judging will be at 9:30 a.m. Saturday. Bartley McDonough, parade director, has arranged for all four Lincoln County bands to be in the parade that takes off down Capitan main street from the school grounds at 10:30 a.m. There is a good list of prizes for parade entries.

The junior rodeo events start at 1:30 Saturday afternoon, open to Lincoln County school students only, with classes for senior boys, senior girls, junior boys and junior girls. Walt Jones will be the rodeo announcer, Fletcher Hall the arena director and Mrs. Zane Leslie the book-keeper.

The Tres Valley Garden Club is having its annual flower show as a part of the Lincoln County Fair. Mrs. Luella Counts of Ruidoso is president of the club. Fort Stanton students will have a showing of hand crafts.

Mill spouts iron ore concentrate

Several weeks ago large pieces of equipment were moved on to cleared-off ground just east of the overpass. A tie was made onto city water lines, some loading ramps set up and trucks hauled in from two mines.

On September 3 this equipment was put into operation by Detcon Minerals Corporation, the end result is an iron ore concentrate which is being sold on contract to Ideal Cement Co. in Tijeras Canyon, Southwest Portland Cement Co. in Busland, Texas, the Atomic Energy Commission and Kennecott Copper Co.

An investigation is being made about prospective sale of this heavy aggregate (iron ore concentrate) for use in coating offshore oil and gas lines which need weight to offset buoyancy of liquids.

Carl Detcon of Socorro is owner of Detcon Minerals Corporation. He has been supplying iron ore concentrate under contract for four years, using dry magnetic process to obtain concentrate. Ore comes from the Jones Iron Mine on Chaparral Mesa 26 miles northwest of Carrizozo, and the Yellow Jacket Mine on Lone Mountain just a few miles northwest of Carrizozo.

The wet process jig mill now in use was built by Edith Martin. The concentrates being processed were mined and crushed at the Jones Mine, 80 tons were put through the jig in the first eight-hour day of operation September 3.

Mr. Detcon said they expect to process from 210 to 280 tons of concentrate when they get into full operation. The amount of head feed needed for the mill will be around 150 tons each eight hours. The mill will operate around the clock employing two mill men, two drivers each shift. One shift will work the mines, probably twelve men total.

The separation process is rather simple, once the ore is crushed it goes into the jig where pulsating water aids gravity and the concentrate comes out on conveyor belt and the tailings on another. Detcon and Martin said the small amount of iron lost in the tailings was of no concern.

Wet magnetic concentration equipment will be installed at a later date which will increase the mill capacity and give desired product for a variety of markets.

The operation of this iron ore mill is not based on any ore going to smelter or into production of steel.

A plat of Edelweiss Resort Village Unit 3 and replat of Unit 1 was approved. This development is close to where road forks to go to Mon Jean.

Aileen Lindamood and Jim McEuen met with the commissioners asking that 100 culverts be installed on road to Mon Jean lookout. The commissioners took the position that the country is obligated to maintain the surface of this Forest Road and suggested that Lindamood and McEuen make their request to the Forest Service.

Gasoline bids were opened, LaMay in Carrizozo and Shields in Hollywood being low bidders.

Country road foreman Leroy McBright has three pages of road repair which will be taken care of as fast and country equipment can get around.

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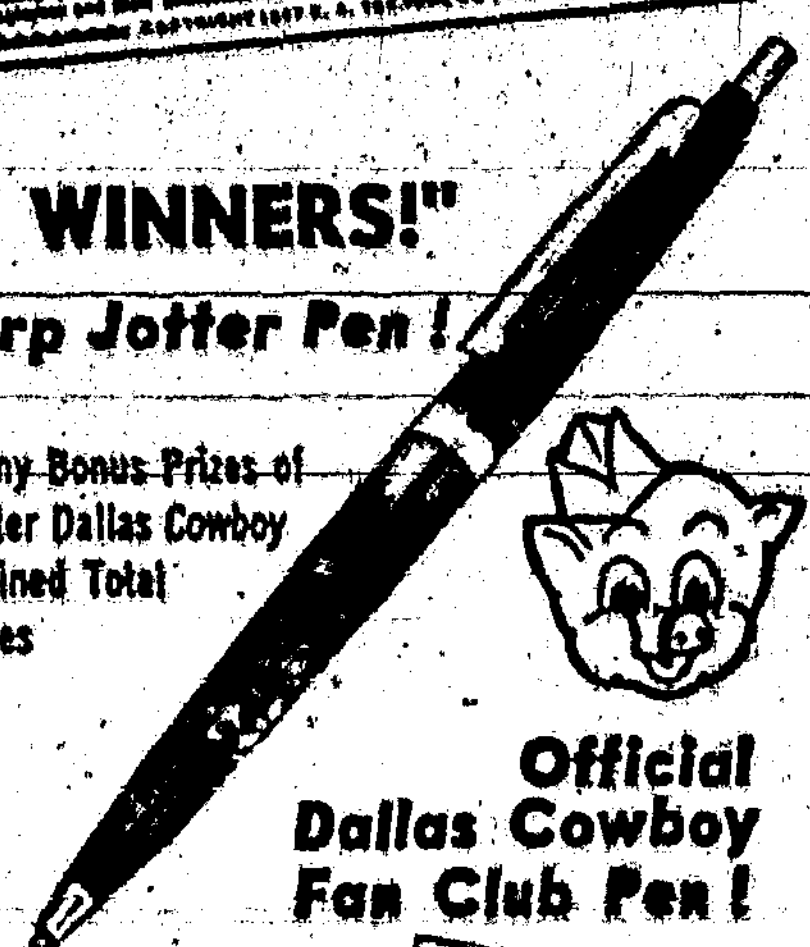

Village will vote October 24 on revenue sewer bond issue

An election was held in 1959 to authorize the Village of Capitan to issue revenue bonds to provide money for construction of municipal sewer. The issue carried about three to one.

Slate law is that after the ordinance is passed a municipality has two years in which to get the project under contract. An FHA attorney at Stillwater, Okla., has issued the opinion that the first election is no longer valid and that the issue will need to be decided again by Capitan voters.

The Village of Capitan is causing to be published this week a notice of election on October 24 with the question of shall the Board of Trustees of the Village of Capitan be authorized to incur an indebtedness for and on behalf of said municipality by issuing revenue bonds in an amount not exceeding \$76,000.

Such bonds are payable both as to principal and interest solely out of the net income derived from the operation of the municipal sewer system.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Miss Nellie,
I greatly appreciate your concern for the people, and wish to thank you for your letter of August 12. I have contacted the Red Cross in Viet Nam, and I understand that they will mail any charity clothing free, however in order to get the items for the people here who need them, the package must be addressed to me, so you may check with the local chapter of the Red Cross to insure free mailing. If the Red Cross will not help, then I ask you to check with the Postmaster there for free or minimum space available costs to send any charity items. As I mentioned in my letter, my unit has the responsibility for

helping the people of two Montanard Villages; Plet MINW 1 and 2, located West of Pletka, approximately 11 miles East of the Cambodian Border. This area is heavily populated with Viet Cong and has the highest Malaria rate in the country. The people, because of what the Viet Cong have done to them, killing and abducting husbands and wives, have a very strong dislike for the Viet Cong, and as a result have helped us on numerous occasions by informing us where and when Viet Cong are in the immediate area. We have taught them to bathe, taught them about first aid, we're building a spillway for them and are now trying for a school for the children, and as they have very

MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLISHER

A training school

Weekly newspapers in the smaller towns have had a severe problem for a number of years -- that of hiring skilled people and getting them to stay located. Our experience, after some 10-15 years, motivated us to pursue an all-out training program of home-town people. Had a long drawnout illibilly type for Linotype operator once who went off to Wichita for 4th of July weekend. He broke his car down, no money to get it fixed, so got a job in Wichita. Have had a number of skilled alcoholics who last at best, eight months. We remember all of them, they were nice guys, one in particular developed a cold and had to stay home to nurse it. After he left we found twelve wine bottles under his bed. Even when you find what hires in for skilled help they will not be skilled in as many fields as weekly newspaper people need be. Everybody does everything at some time or other. Since moving into our new plant we have a number of new machines, new methods... and new training programs. One of the reasons why our "openhouse" is coming nearly a year after moving into a new plant is because it has taken us that long to get to a point where we do better than average quality printing with a minimum of effort. We have been training people to do, pasteup, camera work, run Headliners, operate Justwriters, run Varityper, handle folder, run the newspaper press, operate the linotype, do bookkeeping, gather news, solicit advertising, sweep the floor and wipe down the presses. This is only a partial list. We like to train people who are receptive to learning -- we expect them to do things our way, like it or not, until they become skilled enough to find better ways if such exist. We've told a lot of youngsters starting to work for us that they were getting an education with us paying them the tuition fee. Very few learners are worth their wages for at least the first six months. When the News looks good, full of news, full of advertising, well printed -- we're thankful. The teaching time has been worthwhile.



While helping Jake Fulmer celebrate his 91st birthday the talk turned to early days when Fulmer, John Wright and C. A. Snow owned and operated the Ruidoso telephone company. They didn't have many phone users and Jake talked garage repair man into putting in phone. Mr. Fulmer returned when the phone was installed and had the fellow call his wife who was in Capitlan. Just happened there was a thunder storm in the area and when the call went through a loud clap of thunder sounded -- the fellow turned and said to Jake, "Yep, that's her alright!" This was in 1922.

We enjoyed a lot of conversation with Tom and Dorothy Banks about their living and experiences in Massachusetts while eating some of Pearl Soderback's good food. Tom preaches at 3 and again at 11, first in North church, historically a Portuguese church where sermons were spoken in Portuguese language until just recently. Second sermon is in Memorial Methodist, dome building in use since 1884 in geographic center of town. Tom said that many small eastern towns are integrated, music director of Memorial Methodist is Negro and one of the best. Portuguese have integrated much as have Spanish in New Mexico, they still maintain many of their customs, speak their own language and stay much to themselves. We get the message from Tom that preaching in the east is no different than preaching in the west -- sin is sin wherever you find it.

Life Magazine recently came with us to our villages, so you should be able to get a good idea of what people have from the article, during the next week or two. Agala mam, it was really considerate of you to write, and I was pleasantly surprised that I'd hear from someone from Carrizozo, as I was born there. My grandfather, A.J. Rolland, lived there all his life.

School money continues up

SANTA FE -- A National Education Association team looking into public school finance in New Mexico was closely questioned by legislators on its motives, methods and objectives. The New Mexico Education Association sparked the investigation with a resolution declaring financing of public schools is inadequate and listing other charges which Rep. John Merabon of Cloudcroft branded as "distortions." Many legislators resent the investigation and the NMEA resolution on grounds that lawmakers made a strong effort this year to provide proper funding for public schools. The NMEA has pointed out that the per cent of general fund money for schools has dropped in recent years. The NMEA did not say that school appropriations have nevertheless continued to rise and that enrollments have gained only slightly. Legislators were concerned that the NEA might invoke sanc-

School Finance Division, a part of the governor's executive department, is in control of budgets. The division of duties has been underlined in many studies for years. There is little likelihood that the legislature would move the public school finance chief to the Department of Education, but some sentiment for this change has developed.

Northern New Mexico School at El Rito is stepping up its vocational training. About 50 Espanola area students are taken daily by bus to the El Rito school for vocational classes. Training in auto body work, drafting and building trades electrical work is being accelerated. Revenue Commissioner F. A. (Tony) Vigil says the Revenue Bureau must boost tax collections by some \$700,000 a month over corresponding months of the previous year for the next eight to 10 months to meet State Finance Department income projections. Vigil believes the Finance Department set projections too high. The Revenue Bureau's anticipated collections for the present fiscal year are \$152 million. So far the required pace has been maintained. The legislature added a penny to the state gasoline tax this year but municipal gasoline taxes were abolished. No additional money was provided to pay the cost of collecting the increased tax which is apportioned back to municipalities and counties. The added penny accounted for most of an increase of \$519,908 in gasoline tax receipts in August over August, 1966. Caesar Sebastian, the new legislative auditor, was working on seven audits on contracts awarded by the legislative auditor's office when he was named to his job. Sebastian will not be paid for 30 days while he completes his audits. Lucien File of New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology at Socorro asked for help from Gov. Jave Cargo's office by letter, telephone and telegraph over a period of months in getting specific information. File talked with Administrative Ass't Larry Prantle. File had not yet received a reply from Cargo to his communications.

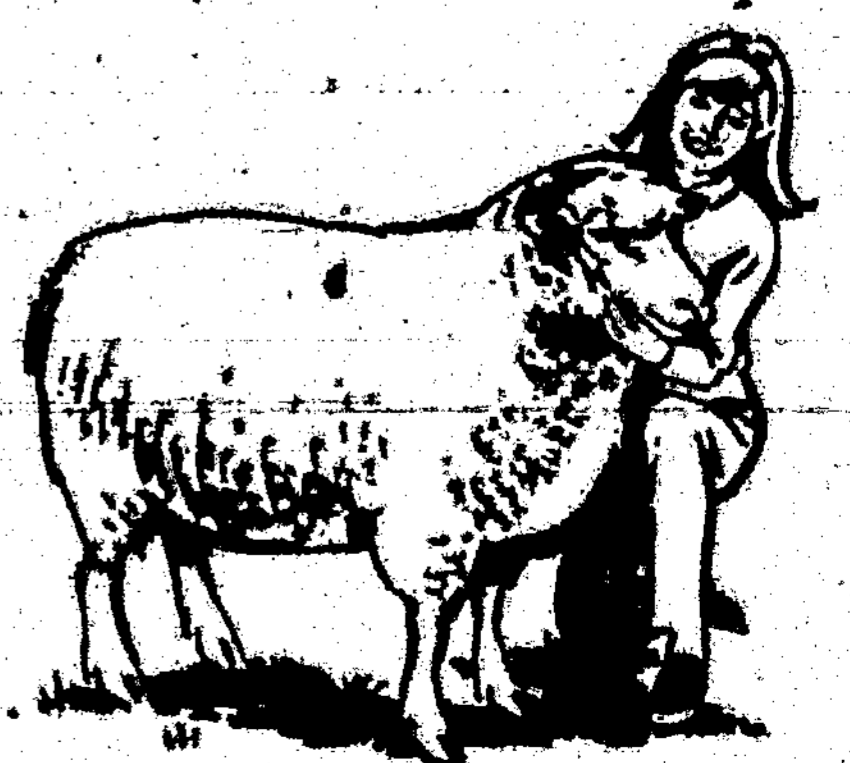
