## Hancock fined \$100 plus

At 5:05 p.m. Wednesday a jury of six brought in a verdict of guilty on the charge of disturbing a lawful assembly (40 A-13-1) with sentence of \$100 plus costs, and not guilty to charge of making wrongful entry to a public facility in the case of Ruidoso Hospital board of directors vs. Don Hancock.

County, was represented by Jack Wharton of Alamogordo. Assistant district attorney Bill Payne prosecuted the case, Dick Parsons and Reggie Hughes represented the hospital board. District Judge Edward T. Triviz presided in the magistrate court.

The case was a temporary stalemate in the feud between Attorney Parsons, representing the hospital board, and Attorney Hancock, owner-operator of Color Cable TV in Ruidoso. The trouble started when the cable TV people brought their equipment to a July 4 meeting and made recordings. Medicare was being discussed in the hospital board meeting and there was disagreement on the part of various parties over the hospital participating in the Medicare program.

In the testimony it was brought out that Parsons told Hancock that the two tapes could be used but there would be no more. The August 7 meeting, which resulted in the charges, started with a private meeting in the kitchen where hospital board members and law officers were present. Hancock walked in but did not stay.

Bill said he and George just figured it was a family affair and never made any move to stop the pool cue argument which Coy lost. According to Logsden it was about ten minutes after the first dispute that Mrs. Maroney walked in again and this time with a revolver in her hand. Maroney received a bullet in his shoulder which put him in the Ruidoso hospital. Mrs. Maroney is in jail in Carrizozo charged with aggravated assault.

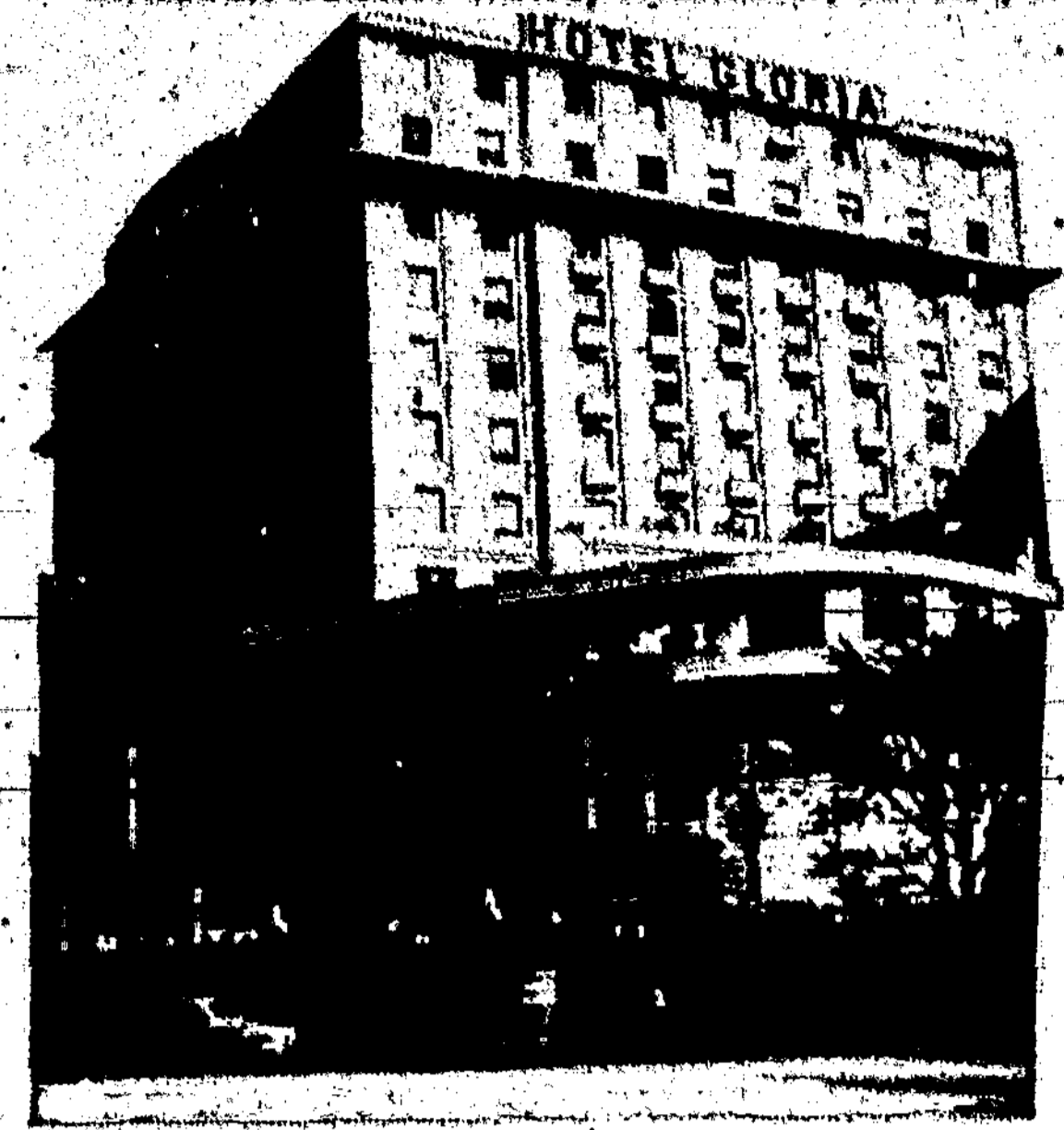

## MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLISHER

### Competition is the spice

People in business do better for the most part by attempting to speak well of competition, either that or not at all. We try to follow that thinking in the operation of our newspaper.

Ever so often a big state daily paper will print an ad which suggests that potential advertisers would do better to use a post-card-size space in that newspaper than to send direct mail.

Over a long period of years newspapers have not effectively boosted their own services and have taken time to job at what newspaper people call junk mail (third class). Such 'junk' is no worse than some of the pages used by the state daily mentioned.

We see nothing wrong with Dutch Bell sending out ads for garage business through the mail. Of course we'd like to have the business but not to the point of saying this type of advertising is not good.

Newspapers make use of second class mailing permits. The majority of direct mail is sent under a third class mailing permit. The second class people don't want the third class people to get any edge — and they could darned well quit hawking.

We believe that all advertising is good — some much better than others. The best thing weekly newspapers have to sell is readership — maybe a fourth of the people in our area read the Albuquerque paper, another fourth the Roswell paper, another fourth the El Paso paper, another portion the Alamo area paper, the rest read no daily paper of any kind . . . but the big majority of these people will read the Lincoln County News and read it thoroughly because it tells about home folks.

Third class mail is not bad, it just happens to represent competition and competition is the spice of life.

### Don't bother my dog

What do you do when someone throws rocks at your best dog, or says your wife has a big mouth or overworks her tongue. How mad would you get if people continually throw bear cans in your front yard, or said "Oh, you're not working today" like maybe they thought you were cheating.

What would it do to your pulse if a person were to tell you, that your place was the weediest or junkiest in town, or that your kids were all unruly brats. Like, maybe, when you're trying your best to raise flowers and keep a neat place and your neighbor throws all his trash up against your fence line. What does it do to your peace of mind.

After near a decade of teaching school and going on two decades of serving the public as newspaper publisher and editor we have developed a 'thicker skin' than we had as first-year teacher. Now we look first at the source of the irritation and then we say, "Payton, just see that you don't speak or act in the same small manner as those other people".

Then if that doesn't quite get our pulse back to normal we repeat a few damns and hells with words like such people don't care about their families or their town in the first place.

### No hot dog town

Carrizozo has several good eating places with outstanding features along one line or another — but there is nothing like a hotdog place in this town.

We've crossed the United States from Tioga, North Dakota to Marfa, Texas, from San Francisco, California to Louisville, Kentucky, from Denver, Colorado to Juarez, Mexico and make regular trips back and forth across the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandle country. In all that traveling we might have passed a half-dozen hot dog places — (you see them in Wyoming) none in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma or Kansas.

The News editor is one who likes his food hot off the skillet, particularly hamburgers, steaks, hotdogs, etc. Hot food is hard to buy, regardless of size of place and you never get any sizzle at a carryout place.

The worst service we experienced was in a big motel restaurant, excuses, excuses — it was in New Mexico. The worst Mexican food we've eaten was in eastside place supposed to be famous for same — also in New Mexico. Some of the best service we've enjoyed has been in Carrizozo. You can get the best of Mexican foods in this town, hamburgers that are special, good average steaks and a general run of short orders that will be better than the highway average.

Not many people in Carrizozo know what a genuine hotdog should look like or taste like or how hot they should be — but then, neither does any highway place we know of between El Paso and Wichita.

This just isn't a hotdog town.

Don't stop the summer TV reruns yet; you're omitted some of the best ones!

We want to see that newscast again where the experts were saying Reagan couldn't win.

Let's re-run the presidential press conference of December, 1965, where he promised to "reduce the number of federal civilian employees."

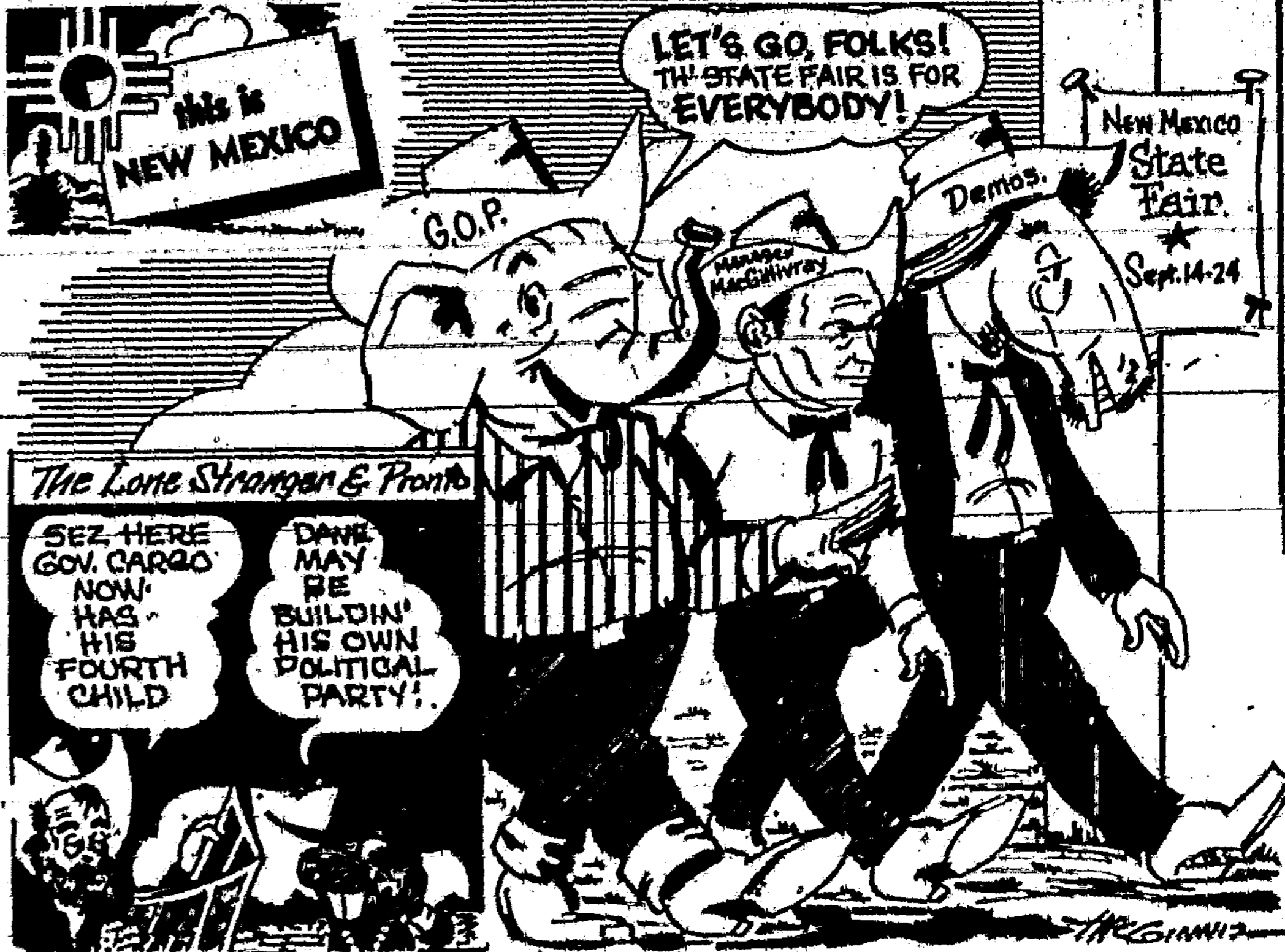
