Recreation Center is dream come true

People of all ages in the Carrizozo area have been enloying a new center that is the culmination of much planning and the development of an idea that resulted from a program at the Carrizozo Woman's Club.

The program centered around delinquency and what could be done for youngsters of the area. Sheriff Glen Bradley and State Policeman Andy Benevidez presented the program citing the need to keep youngsters off the streets at night.

Ruth Armstrong and Jackle Spencer decided that Carrizozo needed a teen club or some such organization and out of this thinking grew Mufflers Hall which served the needs of young boys as a meeting place and place of recreation.

It was right after Christmas of 1965 that Dr. and Mrs. A.

N. Spencer decided they wanted to put money in something to benefit the entire town and this led to the development of the recreation center idea.

In March of 1966 the Carrizozo recreation committee composed of Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Mrs. Welcolm Armstrong, Fred Chavez and Ray Wells met with the town council to present plans for a \$320,000.00 community center.

· The building would have 1400 square feet of floor space, eight bowling lanes, billiard tables, ping-pong tables, snack ber and dance area, terrace and space for parking, check rooms, locker rooms, kitchen, carpeted throughout

The Spencer family planned to pay the initial cost of construc-. tion and also pay the maintenance cost and cost of management

for a 10-year period after which the property would come under the management of the town.

Mrs. Spencer told the council that \$100,000 would be available that summer to start the project. The new center would be located in Spencer park.

Construction contracts were let for construction and equipping the recreation center in December of 1966. Work was completed in August 1967 and the Carrizozo Recreation Center opened its doors Saturday, September 2.

The process of shakedown and getting equipment working smoothly was expected to take a few weeks and in the meantime the decision has been made to put down all new carpeting because the floor covering first installed shows marks of all kinds.

Three bowling leagues have been formed and are going in great shape. People of all ages are making use of the pool tables and ping-pong tables. Friends and neighbors are enjoying watching the action and visiting

over a Coke or cup of coffee. Joe Light, center manager, said that business was about double what he expected before the opening, and that business improves as more people learn the fun of bowling.

The architecture of the new. building is very attractive and compliments the surrounding Interior decoration is bright and gay, with plenty of space for play.

Mrs. A. N. Spencer told the News Wednesday that she was 'thrilled' with the response and the way people are making use of the center.

A dedication ceremony will be performed at 12:45 noon Saturday, October 28, when Mayor Leandro Vegá cuts a ribbon and opens the center officially.

There will be two tournaments during the afternoon with 16 top bowlers competing for \$100 cash and trophy -- this will be an exhibition bowling contest including some of Alamogordo's top

The ping-pong tournament is wide open, with trophy for winner and several top players expected to compete at this sport. There will be door prizes and a dance with band striking up the music at 8:00 p.m.

School bonds to be discussed by board

At its November 8 meeting, the Carrizozo school district board of education will discuss plans for new construction expected to relieve crowded conditions in Carrizoso grade school.

Before the start of 1967-58 school year plans were to make use of Santa Rita school, based on expected enrollment of 475-500 students. When earollment terned out to be 450 the Santa Rita school was closed and all students moved to public school, Result is that grade aghos! classes average out 30 sincients compared to only 15 per class

in Carrisozo high school. Two meetings have been held with archibels about possible additions to the present krade school building, in the form of three large rooms with flexible ility to be used as six class rooms, or multipurpose room, or

other purpose,: One grade school class is held in the kigh school now, another is held in grade school


Lost boy safe in Belen


Logion Has Good Meeting



Crucial Cloudcrost game Friday




