School officials from eleven Class C schools in the state met in Corona last week with league president, Jack Mayfield, presiding and Corona principal, Lewis Stratton, as host. The result of the meeting was a four district league set up for 1968. The league admitted Mountainair, Navajo Mission and Reserve as member school.

District 1 includes Navajo Mission and Dulce. District 2 includes Melrose, Vaughn and Roy.

District 3 includes Reserve, Mountainair and Corona. District 4 includes Tatum, Capitán and Cloudcroft.

In the 1968 football season the

winner of Districts 2 and 3 will play each other, and District 1 and 4 will play off -- the dual district winners playing for the state Class C championship.

Corona will have Reserve on its schedule for the first time in 1968, and the game will be played at Reserve, tentative date is October 25.

## Turkey shoot good hunting

Hunting season opens this weekend and there will be hunters all over the place at Carrizozo Recreation Center -- guys and gals hunting for a handicap bowling score good enough to win a turkey.

A "turkey shoot" is the first contest for individual bowlers to be staged at the new center.

For a small entry fee, bowlers can enter as many times as they like. A turkey will be given for five entries. The overall winner will receive a trophy on November 19.

To arrive at a handicap score, you figure like this--say you average 150 pins for three games, subtract 150 from base score of 200, gives you 50, take 70 percent of this figure, which gives you 35, which would be your handicap.

Now you're in the turkey shoot and just fired a 160 game (above your average) with your handicap added on you have a game score of 195, which could win you a turkey.

## Funeral service held Monday for Ralph Lopez

Funeral services were held Monday for Ralph Lopez, who died in Carrizozo hospital following injuries received Thursday. Mr. Lopez was born in White Oaks January 3, 1900 and had spent his life in Lincoln County. At approximately 8:00 p.m. November 9, Mr. Lopez walked out of the Yucca Bar in Carrizozo and witnesses testified that he was followed by Richard Beltran,

age 30, and that a fight occurred in the street. An autopsy showed that Lopez died of a ruptured spleen.

Richard Beltran was arraigned on November 10 before J.P. Friday Sherrill and bond set at \$10,000. Richard's father, Jerry Beltran, and brother, Tony, appeared with him and were given until November 17 to secure a lawyer. Should they fail, the state will appoint an attorney.

## WARREN HARRIS APPOINTED TO CAPITAN SCHOOL BOARD

Herbert Traylor was voted to be vice president, a position held by Schuster. Traylor and Supt. # School into bonding program

At the meeting of Carrizozo school board last week it was agreed that the district needs to enlarge present facilities which are over crowded and the board members OK'd a bonding program with the intent of enlarging and remodeling present school buildings.

Bonding capacity of the district is approximately \$135,000.00, give or take a few thousand, and the question exists whether or not the needs of the school can be met with this amount of money.

Dave Brennan, state school planning consultant, visited with school officials on current problems and procedures of school building. Ernest Vigil, state school board relations specialist, attended the meeting and offered his assistance.

The board has obtained the services of Quinn & Co. of Albuquerque as financial advisor. They expect to contract with an architectural firm this week. Overall school building needs will be considered.

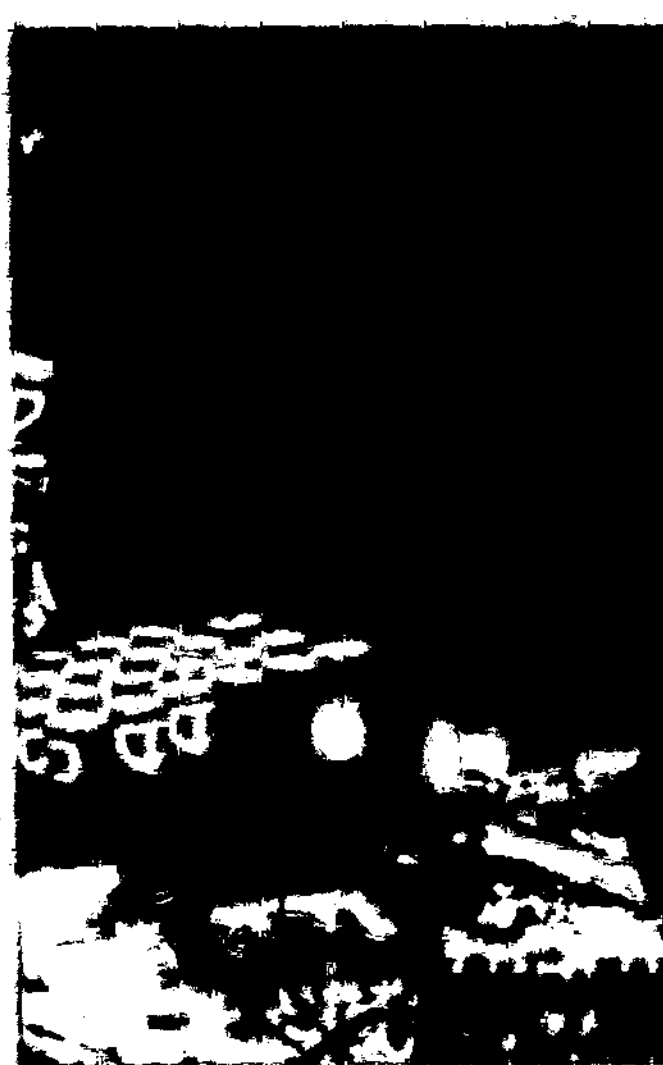

Rev. and Mrs. Robert Combs of Las Cruces spent the day of November 6 at the home of Rev. and Mrs. Jess Rains.

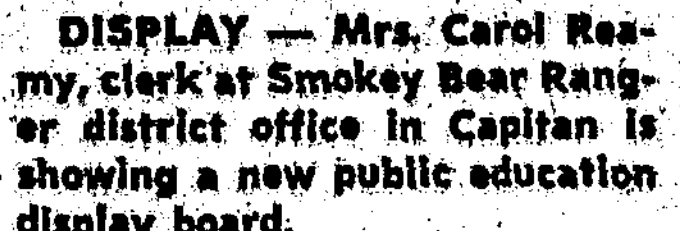
Hunting guests of Rev. and Mrs. Jess Rains last weekend were Mr. and Mrs. Bates of Lubbock, Texas.

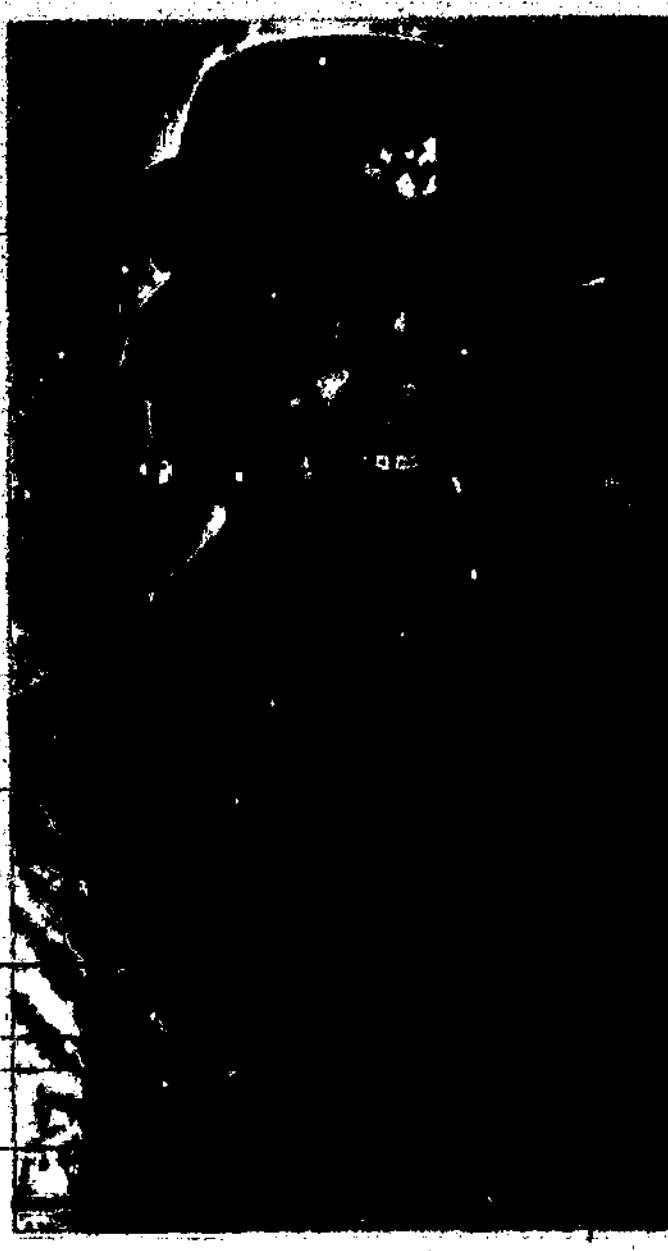

Other games played included a Jal victory over T or C 34-0.

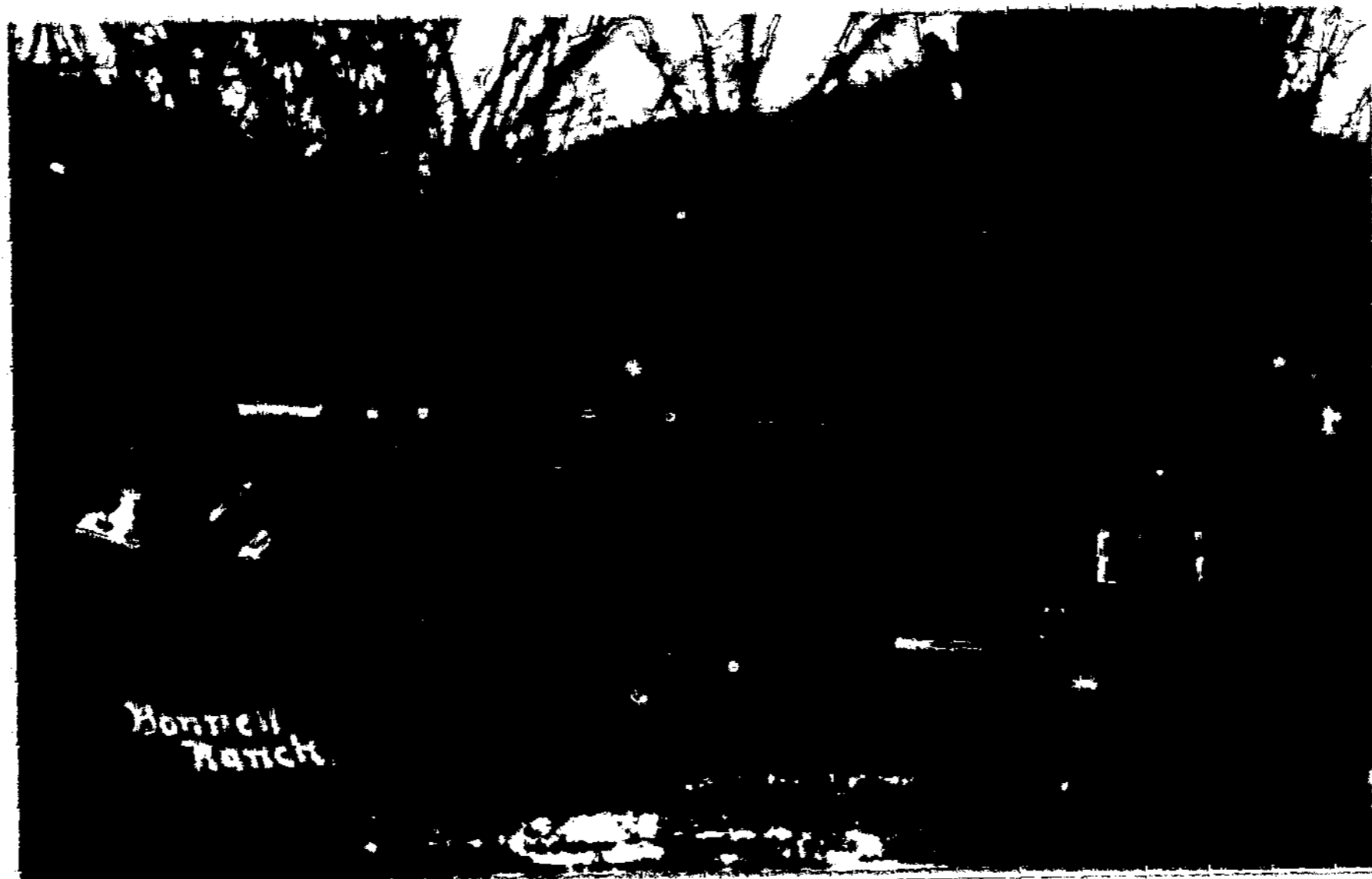
Nov. 11 program at Carrizozo school

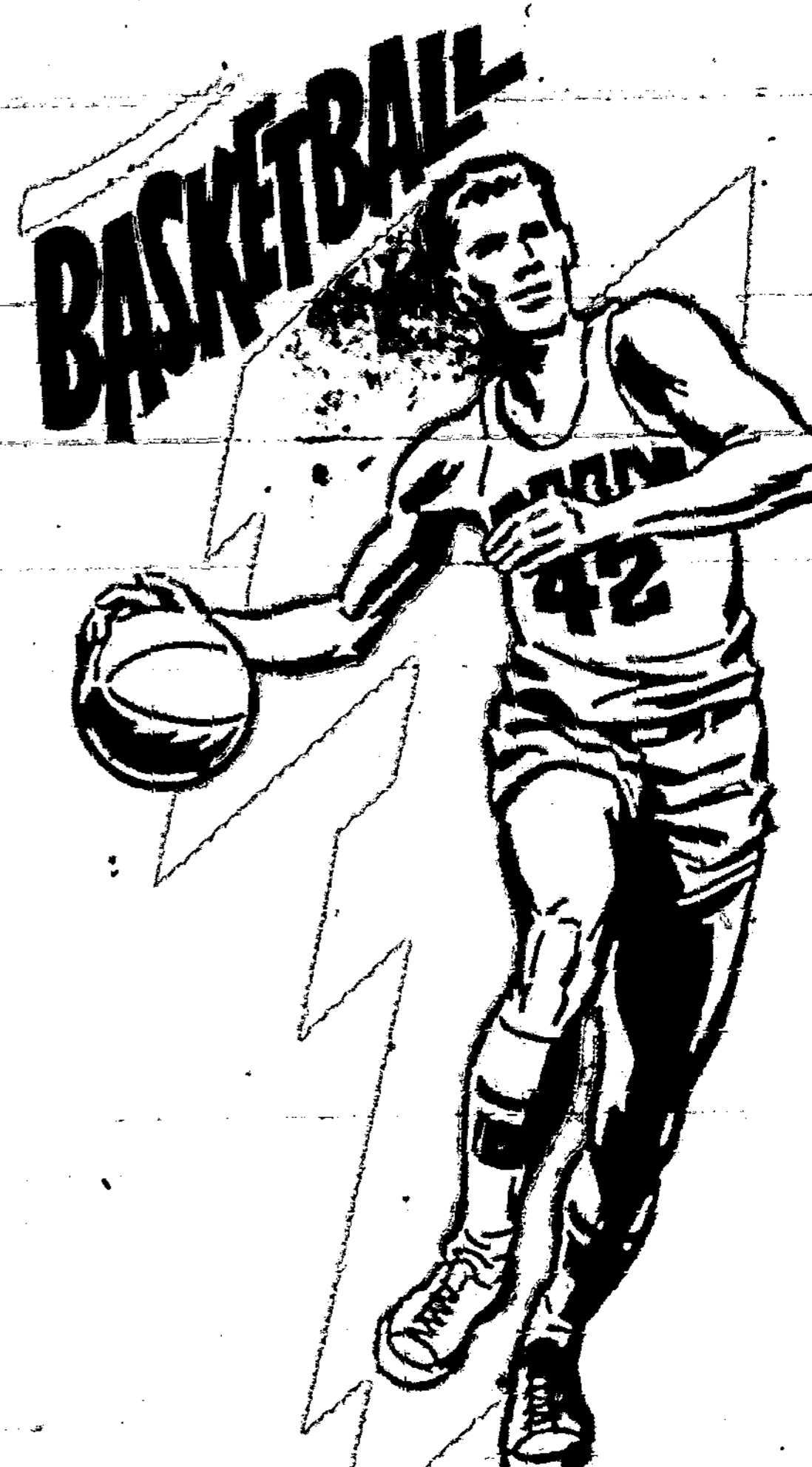
