The local board determined the classification for 44 registrants. There were six men who were classified for the first time. Twenty-six men were reclassified into Class II-S, student deferments.

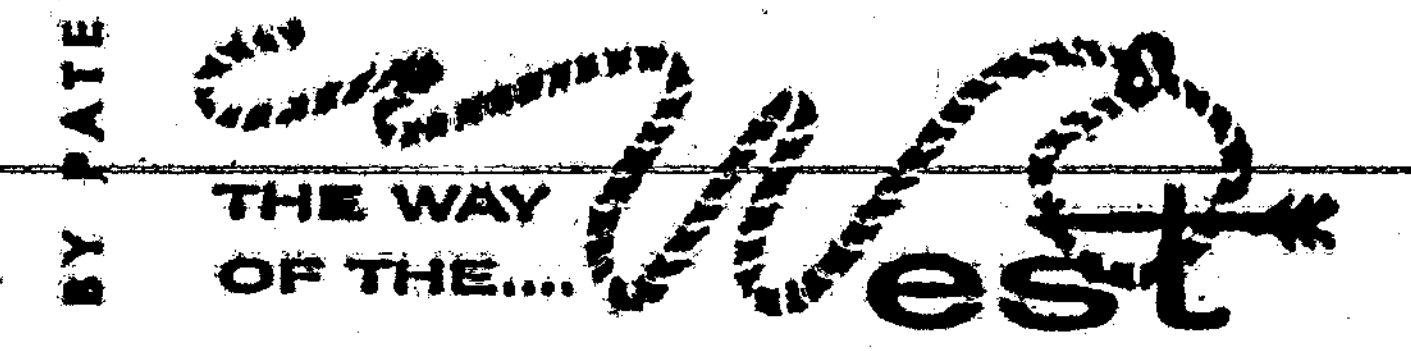
The total registration of Local Board No. 14 is 2,036. This is an increase of six men since the board's meeting of last month.

Pale, Eleanor and Nick enjoyed the Thanksgiving weekend at Dwight Payton house in Aztec. This town has the appearance of a lively and going community but it is the most spread-out town we ever saw. Dwight took over a newspaper shop where his work is spread out much like the town and to ever get a semblance of economy he will need to move a lot of things. The narrow gauge railroad to Silverton, Colorado starts at Aztec. Bureau of Indian Affairs has built beautiful new dormitories for 150 Indian students. Aztec population boomed up high when gas and oil were struck in the area and has now leveled off around 4,500.

Moriarty is one of New Mexico towns that manages to get together for community action -- they won a national clean-up prize, 150 members are expected at banquet Saturday where J. O. Robertson, director of N. M. Department of Development, will speak. Ted Morse, Torrance County Citizens editor, keeps tab on Moriarty.

Our travels through northern New Mexico last week took us north of Espanola through Abiquia to where Hwy 96 cuts off west through Coyote, Gallina, Reghas to Hwy 44 and northwest to Aztec. This is beautiful country and couldn't possibly be poorer country -- maybe there are poor

people in that area but it's no fault of the land.

This is news of a sort -- Los Alamos County commissioners have found that decorating of the commercial areas is in the public interest, benefits the community, has been done in the past, and therefore is a legitimate expenditure of public funds. County crews will put up, maintain and take down the Christmas decorations and lights in Los Alamos. Up to \$2,000 will be used from the street lighting fund to pay utilities and labor. We've heard lots of public officials hide behind the phrase -- "It isn't legal, we can't do that" -- on jobs they don't want to fool with.

One of our dear friends died November 12. Her name was Rilla Freeman, she lived in small town of Kingsdown which used to have a high and grade school plus a dozen business places, most all gone now. Mrs. Freeman reported news from Kingsdown for the Bucklin (Kansas) Banner for 46 years. There wouldn't be a person in the county with more friends than Rilla.

We are going to have a meeting in our garage some night soon of people interested in getting a model cities grant for Carrizozo -- our goal will be \$17 or \$18.50. Albuquerque is expecting a grant of \$117,000 to rehabilitate its slums and Carrizozo ought to raise seventeen bucks. We intend to tap a few names to prod the planning and we may drink a toast to those 88 cities that made LBJ's Great Society list.



Holidays bring back memories

During holiday weeks like Thanksgiving, when old friends get together, they just naturally come up with memories, like the picture above showing the Carrizozo orchestra back in the days when it was the best in the state four years in a row.

Mr. T. E. Kony and Mrs. H. S. Burns were trading mandolins and teaching piano in the 30's and when a young man named Jake Burkett came to Carrizozo to teach band and orchestra in a very short time

this Lincoln County town became the home of the best musical organization in the state.

Mr. Burkett taught Carrizozo youngsters to play all instruments in the orchestra and, starting from scratch, developed a group that won first place at music contest in Silver City, next year first in Roswell contest, next year first in Albuquerque contest.

This period of fine music started about 1936 and lasted until J. C. Burkett left his

teaching position here. Burkett took over operation of the Lyric Theatre in addition to his teaching duties during his stay in Carrizozo.

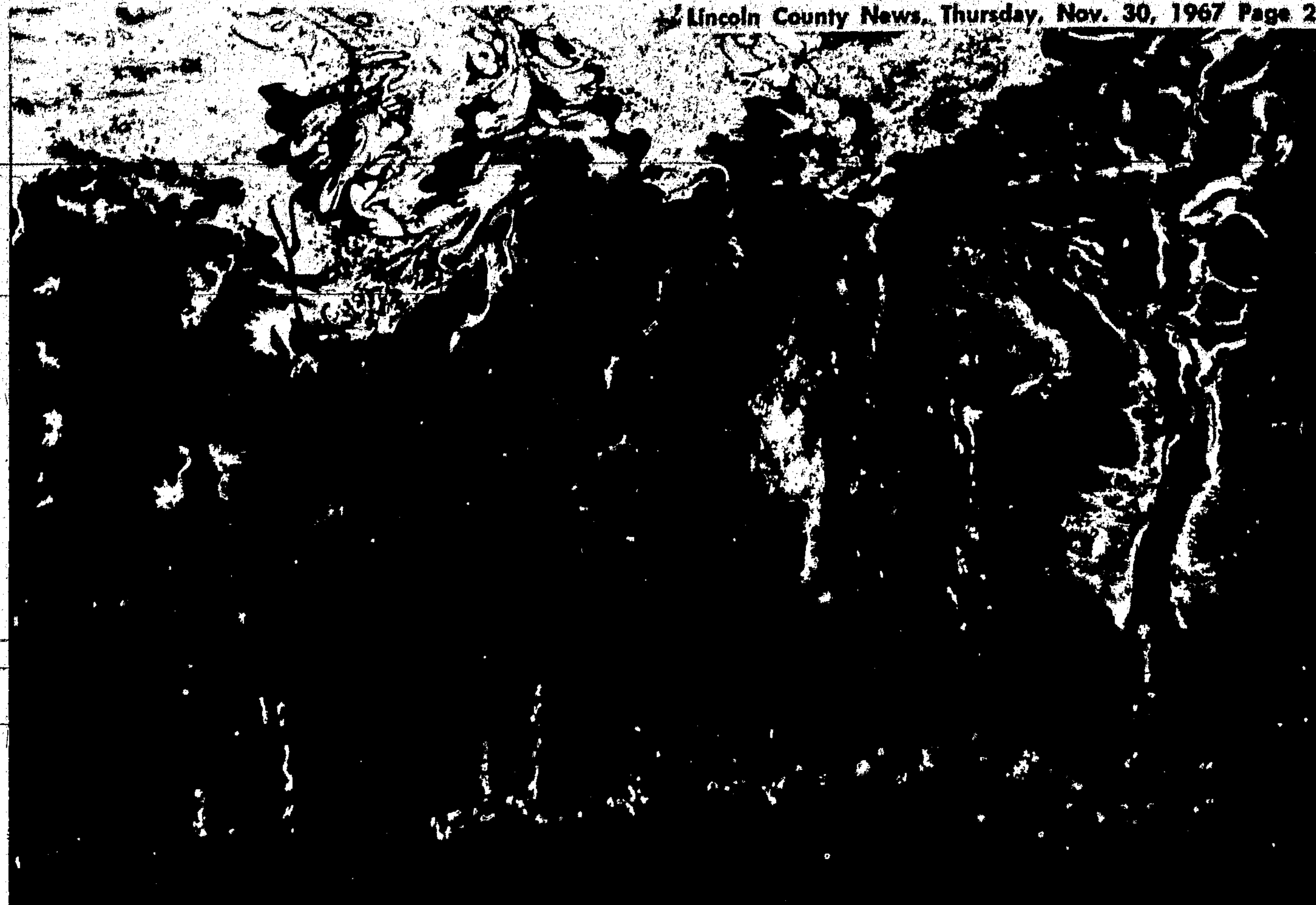

Education is discussed

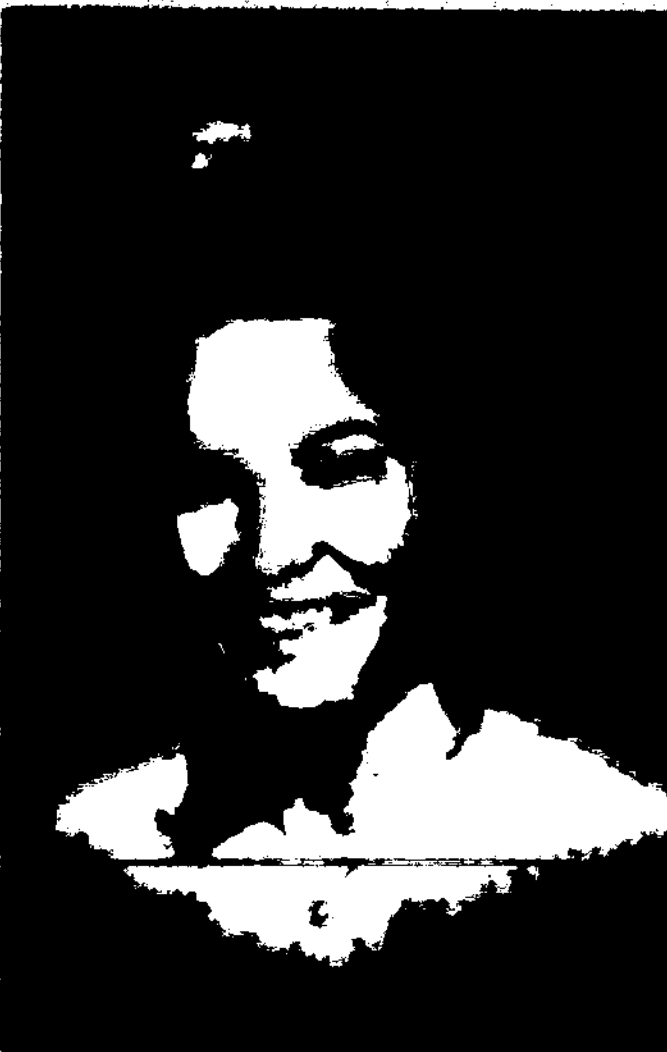

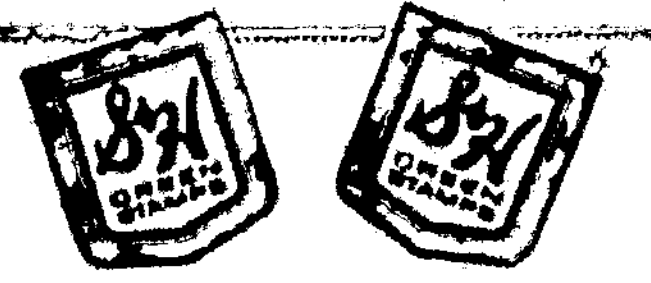


