Storm interrupts Christmas shopping

A brand of wet and icy weather moved into New Mexico starting December 14 and with only minor letups the state has been in a deep freeze since that date. Conditions are better or worse depending on the section of Lincoln County you are in -- it's a big county.

Corona schools were out December 14, so were the phone lines and communications have not been restored to this date. The editor talked to Supt. Bill Hall in Corona last Thursday and our guess is that school will not resume there until after the New Year. Snow fell intermittently that day in Corona, the wind was blowing and in general it was a blizzard.

December 14 was not especially bad in Carrizozo except for the wind which was a @#\$%^&* which is short for #-%\$%^.

December 15 was more of the same in Carrizozo, lots of cold wind. The editor drove to Capitan that day with no trouble but from Nogal turnoff on the roads were covered with ice and snow and there had been several vehicles off-the-road. Capitan was enjoying a winter wonderland, just a beautiful, soft falling snow with no wind at all.

Sidwell Food Locker is being worked overtime by ranchers bringing in foods from areas where power lines are down, mainly north and west of

Carrizozo in areas served by Central Electric Cooperative. We talked to B. F. Sumner in Mountainair Tuesday and found that his people had been going without sleep doing their best to restore power in the vast area served by Central. Electric outages in Carrizozo have been minor. Some troubles with gas reported, but there is no shortage of gas, troubles mainly where switch to natural gas has been made and changeover not completed.

Nogal has suffered as much as any community in this area, being without either electricity or gas and snowed in to boot. Drifting snow has piled up good in the Nogal area.

Mrs. George Maki told the News that their motels were full and overflowing over the weekend. Charles Hughes at Sands said the same. Bob Means was out with the News editor on trip to plane crash area Saturday and at that time had not had many wrecker calls, by Monday he reported that he was on the go full time over the weekend.

Headlines in Tuesday morning papers were 'New wintry storm isolates New Mexico'. Towns along US 66 and US 60 were experiencing the worst of the storm. People were stranded from Grants to Vaughn and traffic snarled bad in those areas.

Tuesday in Lincoln County (Zozo area) the thermometer climbed up into the 40's and most of the snow melted off. The warming spell continued onto Wednesday with good rain falling much of the day.

Capitan school missed one day, Monday of this week and Supt. Duane Darling said they would make that day up Saturday, January 6.

Carrizozo school missed Friday, December 15, and school was dismissed at the end of the day Wednesday until January 2. Corona school is isolated same as rest of town.

Corona men track to crash site

The News editor and Bob Means left Carrizozo before noon December 16 and drove to the Johnny Erramosque ranch home in Red Cloud Canyon area southwest of Corona where Maj.

Kenneth E. Stout had arrived after a four-hour walk from airplane which had crashed near the top of the Gallinas Mountains. Maj. Stout stated that a charter plane with D. W. Maner, owner

of Maner Flying Service at Alamogordo, had departed from Alamogordo with five passengers at 3:30 p.m. Friday, destination Albuquerque.

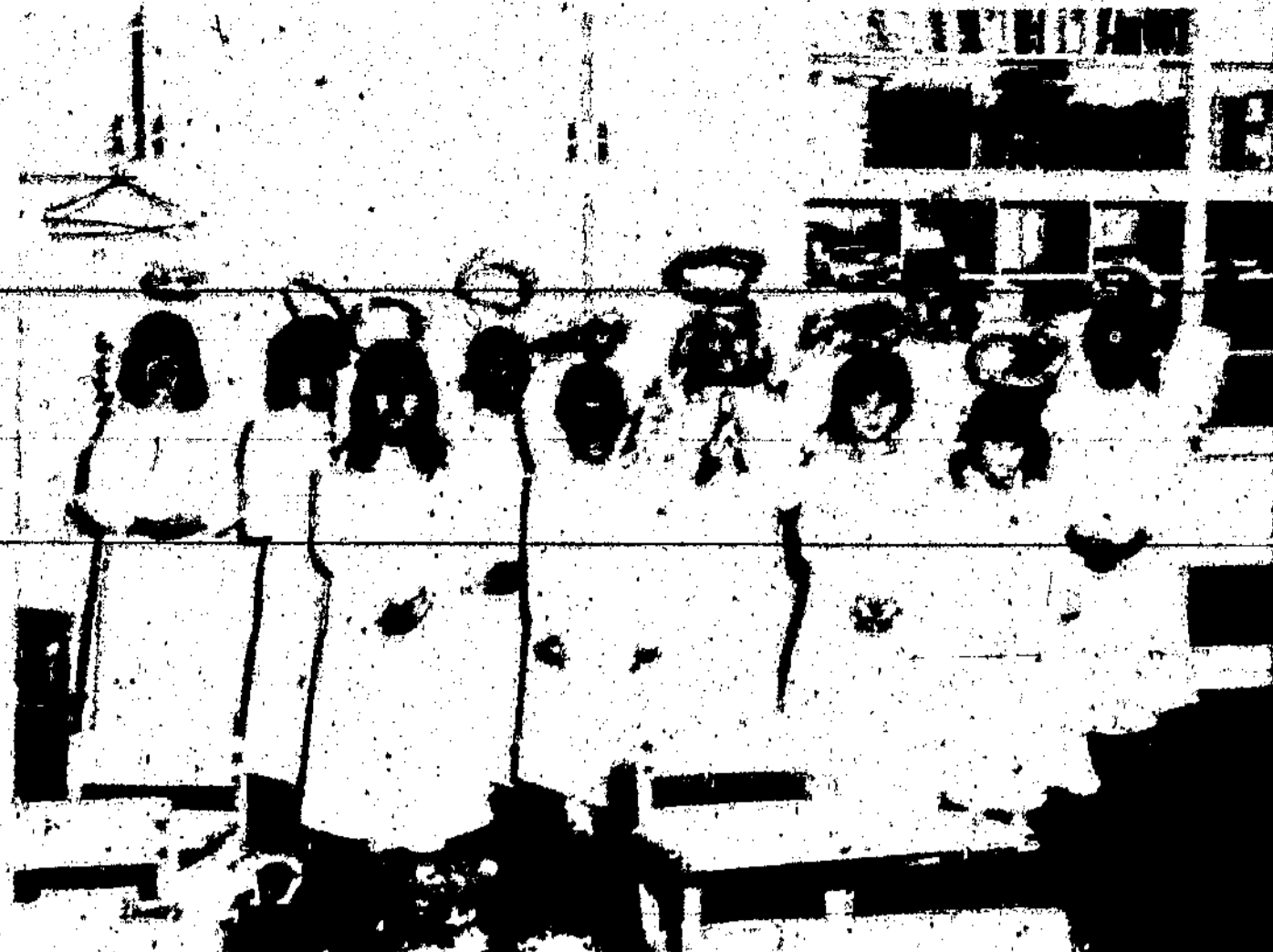

Work done on ancient ditch

Construction has started on the Providencia Community Ditch project. This ancient community ditch is located about three miles west of Lincoln. The ditch is to be lined with 12 inch plastic pipe which will be buried about three feet deep. It will have an outlet valve at each field to be irrigated from this pipeline.

Construction was started on the 25th of October by Bill Martin, a contractor from Estancia. The project should be finished by the end of December 1967.

The pipeline will be approximately 17,000 feet long. The estimated cost is close to \$45,000. Seventy percent will be paid by the A.C.P. cost share program. Fifteen percent will be paid by the State Engineers office, and fifteen percent by the water users. The water users will borrow their share from the Interstate Streams Commission on a long term basis. The savings

on maintenance costs along will pay the water users share within three years. The amount of water saved will be great. There will be no seepage into the soil along about three miles of ditch as there has been. The people along the lower end of the pipeline will have more water available than ever before.

The water users along this ditch are; Clark Pfingsten, James Nethaway, Bill Shrecengost, Henry Sanchez, Benny Apadoco, Joe Baca, Elfigo Griego, Art Salas, Rose Linesay and the Salas Estate.

Corona men

The plane was following the railroad tracks north expecting to turn west down the pipelines which cross south of Corona. Precipitation was heavy in the area when the pilot made a left turn into the Gallinas Mountains. Maj. Stout said he knew he was in trouble when trees came in view outside the plane windows. The pilot made a sharp left bank to avoid a tree, crashed into another and plowed into the mountain.

Major Stout said that when he regained consciousness he was hanging upside down by his seatbelt and ankle. He stayed in the plane area until near dawn the next morning and then started walking for help, arriving at the Erramoupe ranch home before 10:00 a.m. Word was sent out by radio to the El Paso Natural Lincoln Station, and a search party started gathering up.

The decision was made to follow Maj. Stout's tracks in the snow. The list of men who finally

arrived at the site of the crash later included: Elbert Owen, Emmy Owen, Roger and Stanley Sanders, Lee and Frank Mulkey, Bob, Ken and Wayne McKibben, Johnny Erramoupe, Jerry Welch, Bill Berry, Byron Yancey, Holt Lovelace, Bob McCord, Elmo Tracey, Leon Erramoupe, Jim Wise and Ken Russel. The News editor took these names first hand at the point below the crash where the men had stopped to recuperate and build a fire for warmth.

The pilot, D. W. Maner, was most severely injured but was rational when Stout started his walk. He died before the searchers reached the plane. The body was brought to Chapel of Roses in Carrizozo and later taken to Hammons Funeral Home at Littlefield, Texas. Maner was born June 20, 1926 at Hockley, Texas.

Other passengers in the plane were Frank N. Reeder 46, Alex Padilla 35, Daniel Peterson and Dr. Jules Gilbert. Three of these passengers were helped down the mountain, one carried all the way on stretcher -- no small job in

two feet of snow and in the roughest of mountain country. The first three down were taken by ambulance to the Lincoln Station and flown by helicopter to the hospital at Alamogordo.

The sixth passenger, severely injured, reached the rescue point well down Red Cloud Canyon around 6:00 p.m. and was taken to the hospital in Alamogordo. One of the passengers died at the hospital of his injuries.

The Erramoupe home was a source of warmth, food and coffee for a great many people during the long day of the search. State Policeman Andy Benevidez, Albert Clouse, and Robert Watson were helping with the search.

Art Harvey, a pilot for Maner, had taken a charter load to Albuquerque that day and headed back to Alamogordo about 2:00. His plane was forced down by icy conditions at 2:30, only about ten miles and 30 minutes from where the other plane crashed. Harvey said he would have been in the same fix except for ranch road below when he had to come down.

Manire death shocks town

The Carrizozo community was shocked Monday evening to hear of the death of Mrs. L. Z. Manire. Although she had not been well for several months her death came suddenly, caused by a cerebral thrombosis. She died in the ambulance on the way to the hospital.

Lia Manire was born in Post, Texas, on July 19, 1895. She has been an active worker in Trinity Methodist Church, holding district offices in the W.S.C.S. She is survived by her husband, L. Z. Manire, two daughters, Mrs. Mildred Miller, Lombard, Ill. and Mrs. Margaret Karlin, Aztec; one son, William F. Manire; Albuquerque; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Seigler, Hereford, Texas, Mrs. Rya Gerard, Socorro, Mrs. Laura Hendricks, Norman, Okla.; two brothers, Rev. L. H. Hood, Wichita Falls, Texas and Lloyd Hood, Ft. Sumner.

Funeral services will be held Thursday, December 21, 1967, at 2 p.m. at Trinity Methodist Church with Rev. Daniel Heckert officiating. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

Casket bearers are: C. E. Burns, Roy Shafer, Friday Sherrill, Gladney Stubbs, William Gallacher Jr. and Glenn Ellison. Funeral service under the direction of Clarke-Wooten Chapel of Roses Mortuary.

Due to the bad weather, the reception honoring Carrizozo Sun Princess, Teddy Snow, which was to have been held Thursday evening at the Carrizozo Woman's Club has been cancelled.

Eight car pile near Corona

Traffic tie-up due to the snow storm and slippery roads included an eight-car pile up with one horse trailer and horse involved, according to State Policeman, Robert L. Watson, who investigated the accident.

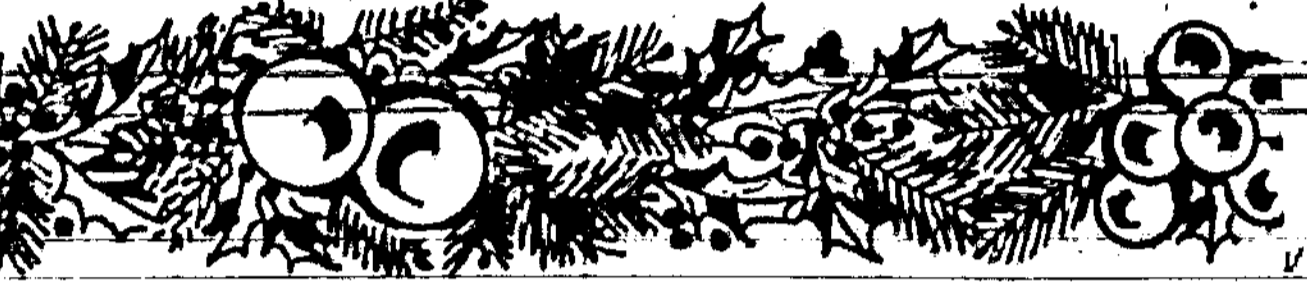

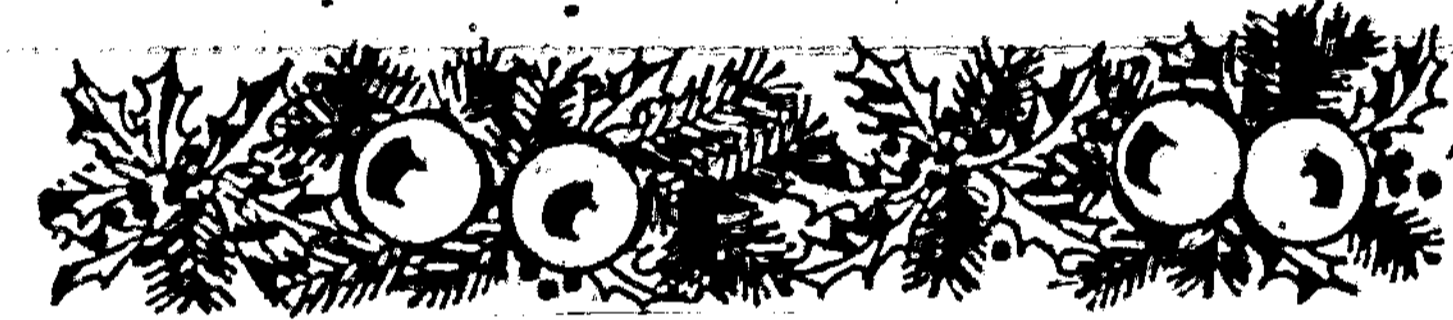

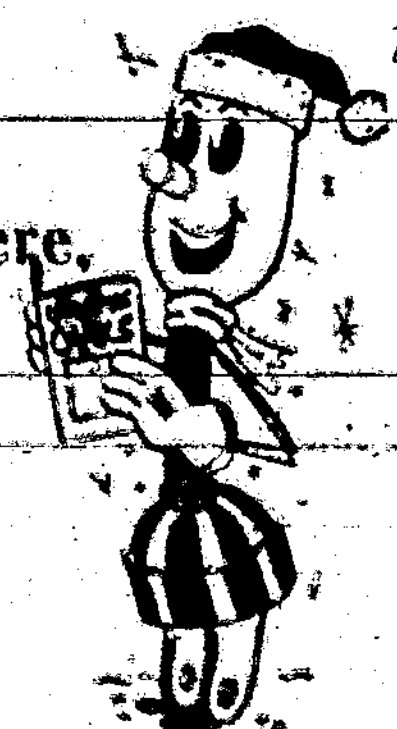
