## Natural gas turn-on awaits meter arrival

### County Commissioners meet for busy session in Zozo

Lincoln County commissioners Bob Shafer and Joe McKnight were in Carrizozo Tuesday for regular commissioner meeting. Commissioner Max Oliver's brother had died and Oliver had gone to Springerville area. Chris Starr has sold his Rodeo Bar two and half miles east of Capitan to Avelino Trujillo, a Lincoln County resident. The commissioners approved the transfer of the liquor license. Bid on diesel and gasoline went to Zumwalt 66 Service, \$1180 bid price on diesel and 2015 (tax included) on gasoline, contract to run for two years. Other bidders were Continental Oil and Rittler. Low bidder on insurance covering county vehicles went to Sam Calloway Agency, Ruidoso and Tularosa, \$1,088.80 for two years. Other bidders were Dan D. Sweargin Agency, J.C. Moore Agency, and Clark Insurance. John Gaume, representing New Mexico State College, attended

the meeting along with Mrs. C.A. Snow, Mrs. Jimmy Gibson, Mrs. Jess Harris and Ralph Dunlap to discuss home demonstration agent in Lincoln County. Mrs. Gaume told the commissioners that the state would have matching funds available in July. The commissioners did not commit the county to any action on the HDA matter. County chairmen of both political parties received notice from the county clerk advising them to make their recommendations for registration board members. Appointments were made at the February 7 commissioner meeting as follows: Dorothy Bagley, Ken Fuller, alternate; H.H. Shire, Ben Sanchez, alternate; Geraldine Randall, Bill Edgar, alternate. This committee will purge voters lists, and appoint registration clerks who serve one day registering voters. At 11:00 a.m. call came from Capitan, snowing hard up there.

### Ten Lincoln Town farmers join in three-mile ditch project

The Lincoln County ASC committee was in session in the courthouse Tuesday getting conservation work started for the new year. Attending were: Fred Pflingsten, vice chairman; Arch Perkins, member; Herman McKibben, office manager; Ralph Dunlap, ex-officio; and Howard Harkey, SCS county representative. Chairman Ernest McDaniel was absent.

3 1/4 miles, of ditch which will serve ten farms at Lincoln. The farmers plan to construct 6,000 feet this year, the rest in following two years with ASC help. Going in on the project are: W. G. Shrecengost, Henry Sanchez, Arthur Salas, Salas Estate, Rose Livesay, Clark Pflingsten, Beverly Nethaway, Jose Baca and Elfigo Griego. The ASC committee was going over 23 applications for conservation work and expected to approve them.

Actual usage of natural gas in the homes of Carrizozo, Nogal and Capitan awaits only the arrival and installation of meters and regulators, president Joe "Bert" Cheney of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, said this week. They are expected to arrive from the factory about the 15th of this month.

A total of 570 homes and commercial establishments in the area have already been signed up for service, he said, a number far exceeding that expected when the project was first contemplated. Carrizozo leads with 340 installations, including 65 businesses outlets, 20 will be served in Nogal, and Capitan will have 210, of which ten will be on the rural perimeter.

Ft. Stanton Hospital and the surrounding homes and buildings will be served with one meter, but total consumption there will exceed that of the entire city of Carrizozo, Cheney said. The Sierra Blanca Boys Camp will also be among the institutions on the line.

More than 50 percent of the homes in Capitan have already been piped into the houses from the main line, and nearly that percentage is ready in Carrizozo, the president stated, and piping into the homes will start this week in Nogal, and into additional homes in Carrizozo.

In compliance with state laws, all appliances and heaters must be vented and be fitted with 100 percent safety controls.

### GAS BOARD MET MONDAY

The construction contractor is about a month ahead of schedule now due to good weather. Gas Association members learned Monday night at a saving of \$100,000 had been affected by rerouting lines.

Natural gas is in lines going to Ruidoso and Capitan. Carrizozo lines will be tested by February 14, under 999 pounds of pressure. Engineers pointed out that it takes only two ounces of pressure going into house, line pressure will be maintained at 600 pounds.

A new state law allows use of regulator which means that many home owners in Association area can use existing lines.

Bills in amount of \$156,000 were approved.

Board members S.M. Ortiz and Arnold Boyce reported to the news that the Association is working hard for the best interests of local people. Clint Brannum, representing Department of Housing and Urban Development was to be in Carrizozo Wednesday night to meet with Association, about release of money for local operations.

Attending the board meeting were: Bert Cheney, Ray Provine, Valton Hall, S.M. Ortiz, Arnold Boyce, Member Jete Voss is on sick list, Robert L. Maddox, engineer of Santa Fe was present, and field engineer.

Scientists have found a compound that prevents insects from maturing. The compound is found in the Balsam fir and is only known to affect certain insects in the Hemiptera or plant bug family. The boxelder bug has been controlled with this hormone-like compound.

When you make large pruning cuts on your fruit or shade trees protect them with a wound dressing. A water-asphalt emulsion is preferred and should be used on any cut over two inches in diameter. The water-asphalt emulsion is available at nurseries and seed stores.

various livestock programs were discussed. Bobby Rankin and Gene Ott answered many questions that the farmers had.

A new molasses block containing a bloat retardant is being used successfully in some areas where they graze alfalfa. It costs about 2 cents per day for a lamb and has stopped losses from bloat. I think that the meeting could be summed up in the statement that any livestock operator depends on the skill of the operator in buying, selling, and managing the livestock.

If you are calving or lambing

In corral, use iodine on the navels to prevent stiff lamb disease or other infection from entering the navel.

Diseases entering in this manner can be reduced by dipping the stump navel in a solution of iodine.

The iodine can be applied from a small jar, such as a half pint jelly jar, and should be of veterinary strength, about 10 percent iodine. Using iodine that is normally advised for human use will be of very little benefit, as it doesn't contain a high enough percentage of iodine.

Considerable discussion arose over a recent sixteen mile trip by a town fire truck to a reported fire which turned out to be false alarm. It was pointed out that such expensive equipment should not be used without verification of the situation and official authorization. A definite policy will be set soon.

### Town will add 5200 ft. new sewer line

The Carrizozo Town Council voted at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night to advertise for bids on sewer pipe for the construction of a new line of approximately 5200 feet from Apgar to Ortiz to tie on at the cemetery. Bids will be requested for 4500 ft. of 6 inch, and 700 ft. of 4 inch, with L's and T's. It was estimated construction work would start within a month.

The motion for start of the project was made by Councilman Buster Surot and seconded by Councilman Joe Ventura.

It was also voted to advertise for bids for 550 feet of 8 inch pipe to replace the old pipe presently running from the water filtration plant to the main tank. Utility Manager John Hein told the Council that the old pipe had been plugged in many places with wooden sticks to stop the leaks. He said that there were ten such plugs in one short length.

A petition was presented signed by approximately thirty citizens requesting that action be taken in regard to intimated TV Cable interference with regular antenna reception.

The council instructed City Marshal Chanco Morales to start rounding up unlicensed dogs within the limits. Mayor Leandro Vega estimated there were 40 to 50 of the animals running loose.





Map shows accidents

The 1966 traffic accident map which Sergeant Melvin West has completed this week shows 200 accidents, eight fatal accidents with nine people killed. Fifty were injury accidents, the rest property damage only. New Mexico residents were involved in 132 of the 200, non-residents in 68. Sixteen two car accidents involved residents and non-residents.

involved New Mexico residents. Of the nine fatal accidents four fatalities were non-residents, five were Lincoln Countyans.

This points up the fact that this is a local problem. According to national traffic reports all fatal accidents occur within 25 miles from home.

This should prove to Lincoln County residents that it is local people who are involved in accidents and that safety is a local problem.

Kennedys insist on deleting those portions about the deerhunting trip three years prior to the assassination, and then turn right around and allow "Kennedy family sources" publicly to recite particulars of that expedition?

We'll see. However history may add him up or cut him down, President Johnson's surely painful silence during this deplorable debate eloquently shames his unsavory detractors.

Making an offset newspaper come out looking good is simply a matter of having your dots arranged properly. Those of you who have a magnifying glass at home, get it out and look at the solid blacks like in "County News" at the top of page (Feb. 2) then put your glass over on the face of Rudy Villegas. Notice how the dots have opened up to make light areas of his cheeks, then the dots have closed up to make Rudy's mustache. The white shirts in this picture are made up of real fine dots, the black pants worn by Roberto Flores are made up of dots almost completely filled in.

The "dot talk" can get real confusing -- No dots are involved in line shots, meaning photos taken of solid blacks and whites, like the "County News". 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


