Lincoln investigation results in arrests

COURT RECORD

Intensive investigation over a five day, four night, period by Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr. and his deputies, resulted in the arrest of two Albuquerque residents who are now held on charges of burglary and the murder of Police Officer Gilbert Montoya of Moriarity on the morning of Thursday, February 16.

Investigating a break-in at the Ernest Shell station in Corona which occurred about 10:15 the night preceding the fatal shooting, the sheriff suspected a possible connection, and devoted almost full time seeking clues and witnesses. A witness was found who had seen a suspicious car in that vicinity about the time of the burglary and was able to give an accurate description of the man and vehicle. The spare

tire of the car had been left behind, apparently to make more room in the trunk for the loot from the service station.

The accumulated evidence and clues were turned over by Sheriff Vega to officers in Moriarity and state police, and warrants issued for the arrest of Carl E. Bell, 20; and Ray C. Raney, 24; both of Albuquerque, who were taken into custody on the burglary charge and also charged with the murder of the police officer. The stolen articles from the service station were found in their possession, it was stated.

Montoya, night patrolman for the Moriarity Police Department was shot in the back of the head and killed instantly when he reported to a call that robbery was in progress at the Moriarity Trading Post.

Skeen remarks trigger jests he's eying '68

SANTA FE--Sen. Joseph R. Skeen, minority floor leader, made a statement during debate on the uniform gasoline tax bill Thursday that has given Senate Democratic leaders an opportunity to rib him a little. All in good-natured, partisan fun, of course.

Skeen, a Lincoln County rancher who also represents Otero County, said in support of the tax measure that he lives in the country, enjoys living in the country, "but I depend on cities for services . . . and know their problems . . ."

Then he explained that he ran

in the last election "on the basis of recognizing the problems of the rural areas as well as the cities."

It was this statement about running and campaigning in the cities that prompted Sen. R.C. (Ike) Morgan, who opposed the gas tax measure, to comment that he detected a slight sign that Senator Skeen might be thinking in terms of running in 1968.

Senator Morgan, D-Curry-Roosevelt, apparently was subtly implying that Skeen might be thinking of being a gubernatorial candidate next year. Skeen's term as senator does not expire until 1970.

School merger in the making

Officials of Santa Rita Parochial School and Carrizozo Municipal School have been discussing a merger of the two school systems, a move expected to benefit young people attending these schools and the community.

For the past year students from Santa Rita have been coming to the Municipal School for music instruction, basketball, pre-school, lunches, and other classes, under Title I program.

The way plans are shaping up Santa Rita School would not be closed down, rather it will be leased to the Carrizozo School and classes will continue to be held in this building, probably the first three grades.

There are a number of things

to be worked out before the merger can be completed and all eight grades at Santa Rita be brought under the public school system. One problem is housing for two classes of first, second and third graders.

There are three teachers at Santa Rita, handling eight grades. Under the municipal system there would be one teacher for each grade. This will improve education in the area, and the merger should put Santa Rita parishioners in a position to do more community and church work.

Santa Rita School started the 1966 school year with 80 students.

Catholic ministers are teaching in public schools now in many areas of the United States. It is expected that one of the Sisters now teaching at Santa Rita would continue to teach under the public school system.

Paul Harvey Says

Building an SST is like hiring a lawyer; it costs more if you don't.

Britain and France are hurrying ahead with construction of a supersonic transport plane. So, probably, is Russia.

If we don't get this project off dead center soon, our nation's airlines will have to buy their first SST's from overseas, thus compounding our already frighteningly lopsided balance of payments.

The Federal Aviation Agency has carefully studied competitive designs. The FAA is prepared to put all its eggs in the airframe by Boeing and the engines by G. E. Past performance of both companies supports this vote of confidence. Everything is in readiness, except that some members of the 90th Congress are hesitant.

The objections they raise are almost identical to the objections they voiced when we switched from piston engines to jet transports, just ten years ago: "Too expensive." "Impractical." "Noise." "Airports are not ready for it."

If the President should give industry the green light tomorrow, it would be 1974--seven years--before the first Mach 2.7 aircraft would carry paying passengers.

During the tedious construction and shakeout the airports could be made ready. If the sonic boom should prove to be intolerable, which I doubt, the SST could be used only for long over-water flights and still justify its existence.

These will be 40 million dollar planes. Since some 700 will be needed, and since 40 per cent to 50 per cent of them will be sold

overseas, this can mean an export market amounting to 15 billion dollars, whereas the government's investment in producing the plane will be less than 1 1/2 billion dollars.

Boeing is betting 165 million of its own money and GE is wagering 65 million.

Senator Mike Monroney says, "I don't know how you can maintain a satisfactory balance of payments if you lose the world market for American aircraft."

There is the further likelihood that our military will find the SST useful. Certainly they will be used, as is the present Air Force One, as special-purpose aircraft. The SST, further, is a natural for an airborne command post or an aerial tanker for refueling our supersonic fighters-bombers. And, with modifications, I expect the military will soon want to carry its bombs to their targets at supersonic speeds.

Also, moneys spent on such projects recirculate inside the United States. Boeing will subcontract 69 per cent of the SST, thus stimulating the economy in Ohio and California, Washington and Kansas, New York and Maryland, Oklahoma and Tennessee.

So the super-plane is a long-haul bargain.

While our gold reserves are shrinking and our debt is rising, let's curtail some of the billions which we are lending and spending overseas. But to withhold this comparatively small sum would be as short-sighted as was the Senator who, in 1956, proposed closing the United States Patent Office "because there is nothing more that needs to be invented."

PARTY HONORING DR. J. P. TURNER



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

I read with interest Mr. Herman Kell's reminiscence about his mining days in White Oaks, which appeared in the February 16 issue, since Herman is a very old friend of mine.

I am a White Oaks "product," as was my husband, Ralph Treat, who passed away twelve years ago. He was also one of the boys who started working in the mines at a young age, along with the Kell brothers, Jules (Shorty), Bill and Herman, and I remember quite well when the Kell family came to live in White Oaks, and also when they went away, much to the regret of every one.

Perhaps you will permit me to add a "little bit" to Herman's memoirs? For instance the day his brother Jules fell down a 125 foot shaft in the Old Abe mine and miraculously escaped with his life, albeit with a wrenched back, a broken arm and many sundry bruises and scratches, Jules is now living in East Texas.

Then much later there was the time Ben Leslie was knocked off a ledge way down in the mine by an avalanche of earth and rocks and suffered a broken neck and other injuries thought too serious for him to recover from, but he did recover and as far as I know he is very much alive and residing somewhere in the vicinity of Carrizozo.

And incidentally, my husband was one of the first to reach the scene of both accidents and help rescue these boys.

We moved to Carrizozo from White Oaks. My husband held the office of County Clerk for Lin-

coln County two terms and later we came to El Paso, with our five young children who are all married now and in the process of raising families of their own. To them this is home, but I have to admit to a deep feeling of nostalgia whenever I think about White Oaks and all the wonderful people that once lived there.

A very popular novelist of those yesteryears, by the name of Emerson Hough who did much of his writing while living in White Oaks, wrote one about the little town and gave it the title... Hearts' Desire.

I believe, as Herman does, that there is still a gold treasure in those hills just waiting for someone with a good size capital and plenty optimism to come and discover it.

Mr. Payton I have been receiving your paper as a gift subscription from a friend, a former Carrizozo resident and I enjoy reading it, even though I don't very often see familiar names, but it is nevertheless like a breeze from the mountains and valleys around "ye Ole' Home Town."

Thanks for letting me join the "conver 3rd."

SANTA FE --- The House passed 34-17 a bill by the Judicial Systems Study Committee to finance district courts on the state level with an appropriation from the state general fund. Representative David Norvell, Clovis Democrat, pointed out district court financing is uneven now. Some counties do not have enough property valuation for the authorized one-mill property tax to produce sufficient money to finance jury trials.

1961 by the Integrim legislative committee. Representative Norvell pointed out it has been difficult for the legislature to determine use of court funds, the status of operations and other necessary information in the past.

District judges have managed finances of their courts for years. There is strong resistance among some judges to the legislation which would remove part of their authority. For the coming fiscal year property tax levies to finance district courts would be left at their present levels.

A bipartisan bill by Senator Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, would create districts for New Mexico's two seats in the U. S. House of Representatives. District one would include Bernalillo, Colfax, Los Alamos, McKinley, Mora, Rio Arriba, Sandoval, San Juan, San Miguel, Santa Fe and Taos Counties.

District two would include Catron, Chaves, Curry, De Baca, Dona Ana, Eddy, Grant, Guadalupe, Harding, Hidalgo, Lea, Lincoln, Luna, Otero, Quay, Roosevelt, Sierra, Socorro, Torrance, Valencia and Union Counties.

The legislation is badly needed to provide uniform justice in all of New Mexico's 32 counties. But stiff resistance from some district judges could kill the proposal in the Senate.

Besides Runnels, other signers are Senators Alex Martinez, Santa Fe Democrat; Junio Lopez, Las Vegas Republican; George Koran, Albuquerque Republican; Leo Dow, Albuquerque Republican, and Anthony Panagakos, Albuquerque Republican.

Some Democratic leaders oppose creation of Congressional districts at this time, saying New Mexico's population in the 1970 federal census may justify another Congressman. This is hardly likely since the state's population increased only 5,000 last year. To earn a third Congressman in 1970, New Mexico would need about 1.5 million population. The state's population is not approaching this figure at present.

The proposal is a major move which has been under study since

tion of counties is a fair division. It has been pointed out that District one, including populous Bernalillo County, might elect a Republican. Democrat Johnny Walker would be in District one and Democrat Tom Morris would be in District two.

The legislation received a narrow 4-0 pass recommendation 5-4 from the Senate Public Affairs Committee. Prospects are considered fair that the proposal will clear the Senate. Only New Mexico and Hawaii elect their Congressmen at large now among states with more than one representative.

Senator Emmett Hart, Tucuman Democrat, introduced a bill to appropriate \$50,000 to the state engineer for repair and improvement of dams, reservoirs, ditches and flumes in San Miguel and Guadalupe Counties. Not more than \$10,000 could be spent on one dam or reservoir. The bill is in the Senate Finance Committee headed by Runnels.

Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, Belen Democrat, introduced a bill to permit municipalities to pledge municipal sales tax receipts to pay revenue bonds. Belen and Albuquerque are interested in the legislation which would have statewide application. The Senate-passed bill to increase the state gasoline tax from

6 to 7 cents a gallon, abolish municipal gasoline taxes and distribute the increase to municipalities and counties may have rough sledding in the House. The bill was amended in the Senate to allot .9 of the penny increase to municipalities and .1 to counties. The Senate passed the bill 29-13 after long discussion.

Among opponents was Senator Aubrey Dunn, Alamogordo Democrat. The New Mexico Municipal League and New Mexico Petroleum Industries Committee support the legislation.

Senator Ozze Davis, Albuquerque Democrat, proposed to permit local option elections on Sunday sales of liquor. The bill is in the Public Affairs Committee.

Senator Ernest Hawkins, Moriarty Republican, and others submitted a bill to prohibit below cost liquor sales and permit a 16.6 per cent retail markup on liquor prices.

Senator Frank McClure, Grants Democrat, sponsored a bill to permit an 8 per cent retail markup on liquor and a wide variety of other merchandise. Senate Democratic leaders predicted price markup bills will be defeated.

flowering shrubs, the ideal time to prune most ornamental plants is during the dormant season before the beginning of new growth.

Here are some points that you should remember when pruning your shrubs:

Don't simply trim back the top. Trim out the plant by cutting older branches back to the ground.

Prune annually to reduce necessity of heavy cut back. Such shrubs as Forsythia, mock orange, Deutzia, and Spiraea can be cut back to the ground when overgrown plants need rejuvenation.

If this is done during the dormant season however, you lose that year's blossoms.

To retain flower buds, shrubs such as forsythia, lilac, mock orange and Garland Spiraea should be pruned shortly after flowering.

Shrubs with colored twigs such as red and yellow twig dogwood should have about a third of the older wood removed every year for maximum coloration.

Remove old flowers of shrubs such as lilac, vitex, Hibiscus, and crape myrtle, to maintain optimum flowering the next season.

Powdery mildew can be controlled in roses by purchasing resistant varieties. Several resistant -- Summer Snow, Blaze, Paul's Scarlet -- are available at local nurseries.

If resistant varieties are not used, protective sprays will be needed during the growing season.

Actidione PM, Phaltan, Karathane, and sulfur sprays have given good control of this disease but often must be repeated every 7-10 days.

Powdery mildew is caused by a fungus which spreads from plant to plant by wind-borne spores. The fungus appears as white to gray moldy or powdery patches on leaves, stems, and buds. The mildew spots may enlarge until they cover the whole leaf. Many leaves will curl and become distorted.

Winter months are a good time for making landscaping plans. You can locate on paper the trees and shrubs you want to plant this spring. And it is easier to erase a mistake on paper than to dig and move a large plant in later years.

While preparing a landscape sketch, keep in mind: allowing for ultimate size of trees and shrubs; selecting only shrubs which "do something" for your house when planning your base planting; accenting doors and windows with shrubbery, but not so much that it smothers them.

Try to locate annual and perennial flowerbeds so that they have a background - shrubs, fence or wall. Plan short drives and walks to be direct, long drives and walks appear shorter and more interesting if curved slightly.

Trees should come first in landscaping a new yard, because it takes them longer to make a "show" than any other plants. They are an investment demanding careful planting. Study possible tree locations to derive shade where needed, and create proper framing for the home. Then enjoy your trees and other plants for many years.

Every tree needs a good start. If you pay attention to the "four R's" of tree planting -- the right tree, planted the right way in the right location during the right season -- it will get that start.

The right way to plant is particularly important for street plantings since the soil is usually very poor. Digging a large hole for the root system; a hole two to four feet in diameter and 30 inches deep is usually necessary. Use only good top soil for refill. Settle the soil around the roots with water. Do not tamp. Leave a basin to hold at least ten gallons of water.

Mites are likely to again be a problem in the area, John Durkin, Extension Entomologist, gave the controls for mites as well as other orchard pests at the Fruit School held at Hondo last week. The clover mite and the McDaniel mite cause the most damage in the area.

A delayed dormant spray is recommended for the clover mite. Some of the sprays that can be used at this time are: dormant oil, lime sulphur and polysulphide. The McDaniel mite thrives over winters on the trash around the trees, and a miticide should be used in the regular spray program for his control.

For the control of these pests and others, get the bulletin "Apple & Pear Sprays for New Mexico".

Powdery mildew and cytopers canker are the two major diseases causing injury to fruit trees in the area. Cytopers canker infects the trees through wounds and pruning cuts.

Douglas Bryant asked the

group, "Are we selling or marketing apples?" "Selling is getting rid of apples and marketing is the orderly disposal of them. To make an apple orchard pay, we must market. Repeat orders at a reasonable price are a necessity.

Just as growing apples is a profession, so is being a salesman; and seldom does the same person excel in both."

Bryant summed up his tale by saying that the small growers must get together or get out. Feed farm sheep extra grain for six weeks before lambing to prevent pregnancy disease.

Symptoms of pregnancy disease are loss of appetite, dullness and lagging behind. The ewe is unsteady on her feet and usually grinds her teeth and breathes heavily. The ewe may walk in circles or push against some solid object. Blindness may also result. Later stages of the disease bring about prostration, with the head thrown to one side.

Early treatment of the disease may be achieved to some degree of success by administering a half pound of sugar or molasses in a pint of water, twice daily, preferably by stomach tube. A new method of treatment reported to be highly successful is the administration of 4cc of water, by stomach tube.
