

# Appraiser says Lincoln County valuation to go up

Lon E. Nelson whose firm is handling the reappraisal of property in Lincoln County, met with county commissioners Tuesday to report on progress of the reappraisal.

Nelson told the commissioners and people at the meeting that he expected the overall market valuation figure now being used in Lincoln County can be reduced. Nelson cited De Baca County where the 33 1/3 assessed valua-

tion is being used. After reappraisal the county market valuation increased, the commissioners cut the assessed valuation back to .25 percent and still wound up with about 20 percent higher than before reappraisal.

Enumerators (people checking properties) working in the Ruidoso area are finding that 15 percent of properties have never been on the tax rolls. Nelson said he expected this percentage

to drop way down in other sections of the county.

The main holdup to completion of the reappraisal is in the Hondo Valley where surveying has not been completed and no plats were available, Nelson said his people have drawn up their own work maps and are going ahead with the job.

There are 600 commercial properties in Lincoln County, separate from ranch and home

property. Nelson said that getting 98 percent of county property on the tax rolls was a realistic estimate. Some building was going on as the enumerators were working, but could not go back and recheck.

Mr. Nelson said he did not think taxes would be raised as a result of the reappraisal. They have found that better homes are under-assessed and lower priced homes are over-assessed. It

was pointed out at the meeting that the \$2,000 veterans exemption comes off the tax rendition.

Prior to the meeting with Nelson the commissioners had been host to a group of ladies, Altha Merrill, Pat Flatley, Clara Snow, Lorene Ferguson, and Corrinne Provine, who asked that the county employ a home demonstration agent. The commissioners said, "No money." The ladies are coming back in force.

The reappraisal should do several beneficial things for the county, one of which might be to save the commissioners from the hands of irate housewives by making available money to employ a home demonstration agent.

The other benefits could be: 1. Provide market value basis in county. 2. Increase valuation for bonding purposes. 3. Provide up-to-date mapping and re-

ords. The Nelson enumerators and checkers found 50 cabins in one area on a recheck; Now field men will have to go in and find out who owns the cabins. Bernallillo coding is being used in Lincoln County, which can be the basis for computerization.

Nelson said he was prepared to defend valuations in court if necessary. The reappraisals will be ready for 1968 tax rolls.

## Changes being made in state hospitals

SANTA FE, N.M.—The first step was taken Tuesday in Santa Fe in a proposed move to combine administration of seven state institutions.

Gov. David F. Cargo has proposed that George Bryan head the seven state hospitals. Bryan is now Executive Director of the Special Hospitals Board and under Cargo's proposal he would also become head of the Los Lunas Facility and the State Hospital.

Bryan is currently head of the facility at Ft. Bayard and the Meadows Hospital at Las Vegas. Effective July 1, he will assume control of State Medical Facilities being set up at Walker Air Force Base at Roswell in accordance with legislation passed by the 1967 legislature.

The Los Lunas facility has a hospital and training school at Los Lunas, a hospital at Ft. Stanton and Villa Solano at Hogerman. These hospitals now have no superintendent due to the resignation of Phil Carter.

The State Hospital at Las Vegas is also without a superintendent. Dr. Dan Palmer, who had been in charge of the State Hospital at Las Vegas, has been moved by the State Hospital Board to Santa Fe to take charge of the Community Services Program.

Under Cargo's proposal, Bryan will assume the general administrative duties of both Carter and Palmer and will maintain headquarters at Los Lunas. This will also probably mean that the superintendents of the seven institutions will have more responsibility.

Meeting in Santa Fe Tuesday were representatives of Cargo's office, Ed Gutierrez, chairman of the State Hospital Board, James L. Davidson, chairman of the Los Lunas and Bryan, representing the Special Hospitals Board.

toward the construction, operation and maintenance of this golf course. With this money being available the town would be qualified for a recreation grant.

Recently, according to release from Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman's office, a small town no larger than Carrizozo was chosen by a plant with a good payroll as a new location, because the town had a golf course and recreation hall. Carrizozo has a great deal of growth potential, due to its location on two major highways and the railroad, also its natural advantages in being near the mountains and having a good climate. But with today's shorter work weeks and more people seeking recreation than ever before, a town needs to offer more than a good climate.

Construction of adequate housing needs to be considered if we are to draw people. Lack of good housing has lost us a dozen families connected with civil service in the past six months. The word 'can't' should not be in the dictionary of Carrizozo people interested in their town's growth and future prosperity.

## Lincoln Co. schools receive variety of compliments

The budget party going over Lincoln County school budgets last Thursday included Harry Wagalter, chief of Public school finance; Jim Warren, assistant director of school transportation; Jay Miller, NMEA representative; Calloway Taulbee, director of institutional services; Weldon Parrie, Title I; Gerald Dean Sr. and Holt Lovelace, representing the county; and superintendents and school board members.

Mr. Taulbee made the following comments about Lincoln County schools:

**CARRIZOZO**  
Carrizozo High School enrolls 240 students in grades 7-12, with a teacher-pupil ratio of 1-16. The program of studies is comprehensive with a good diversity of vocational courses along with the academic core of the program. There are no serious deficiencies and the school was classified as Accredited.

**HONDO 5-4-67**

Hondo High School enrolls 128 students in grades 7-12. The teacher-pupil ratio is 1-12. Last year this school was classified as Conditional Status. A good deal of improvement has taken place and the school is now classified as Approved. The school is to be complimented for the wise use of Title I funds in bringing about a great improvement in the library service to the school. One item that has been brought to the attention of the school has to do with the science laboratory facilities. They are housed in a barracks building. This is not a violation of a standard but we have expressed our concern at the fire hazard that this facility presents, and the school is urged to take all precautions in the use of that facility.

**CORONA**  
Corona High School enrolls 106

students in grades 7-12 with a teacher-pupil ratio of 1-12. The program of studies meets the standards of the state and the school has been classified as Approved. The administration and staff at Corona are to be complimented for their earnest effort to bring about innovation to their instructional program. At the secondary level their experimentation with flexible scheduling is setting an example for the small high schools of the state. It is hoped that the spirit of innovation will result in a vastly improved program. Mr. Hill has called upon services of the Department of Education, the Title III Center and other service organizations to help in planning the changes that the district is now carrying out. Such resourcefulness again becomes an example for small school districts who complain that they do not have the proper resource with which to work.

**RUIDOSO**

The Ruidoso school system was the first to request a full evaluation of its program from the Department of Education this year. The evaluation report shows that the program meets the standards of the state and in many cases goes beyond its standards. The high school program has been classified as Accredited. There are no serious deficiencies. The school is engaged in the expansion of its vocational offerings, and it is complimented; it is a school of 410 students in grades 7-12. A school of this size has a good opportunity to offer a good diversified program, and we feel that Ruidoso is meeting its obligation in a very satisfactory manner. The administration and the staff are to be complimented for the progress made by the school. **CAPTAN**  
Capitan High School enrolls 93 students in grades 9-12 with a

teacher-pupil ratio of 1-11. This school has shown great resourcefulness in bringing about improvement to its program. It has one of the best libraries in the state for a school of its small size. Although the program of studies is somewhat limited, because of the small enrollment, it is still rich enough to meet the basic needs of the students. The school was evaluated by the North Central Association, and was given a favorable report. On the basis of all of this the school has been classified as Accredited.

Transportation in areas of declining population is a serious problem, but is being handled well as possible in Lincoln County. Corona has the highest per capita transportation in the state, \$375 per student -- and the lowest per-mile cost in the state, 28¢ when the state average is 55¢ per mile.

### Workshops conducted by Myrtle Williams

## Corona school pilots organ program

Corona Public Schools has been one of the four schools in New Mexico to pilot the Lowrey Student Education Program this year. The program is designed to teach the fundamental skills of music using the Lowrey organ. The organ is a versatile instrument which introduces a child to many different instruments and sounds that appeals to him and encourages him in his musical experience. The organs are furnished to the Corona Elementary Schools without charge. Funds for books, music, etc. have been acquired through the use of Title I money.

The program is taught by the classroom teachers. Use of the organ incurs constant use of the organ without disrupting the classroom and without subjecting the child to criticism from any source, thus each child is permitted to progress at his own pace. The organ has been correlated with choral and rhythm activities, social studies, science and mathematics during the year, and has augmented the band program.

Beginning next fall Corona will be the center of a pilot project for the primary grades under the direction of Mr. Joseph Buzzelli, the originator of the program, of the home office in Chicago.

The state, thinks the News editor, lacks a labor pool, lacks culture such as people coming from industrial areas think of culture, really lacks the desire to clean up the premises, and generally speaking does not give a damn whether or not industry moves into New Mexico.



## Hike in income tax rates seems more likely to Buckles

INSIDE THE CAPITAL SANTA FE -- Gov. Dave Cargo said recently the state will look to a boost in the income tax and removal of exemptions from the state sales tax for new revenue.

After July 1, 27 deductions and 27 exemptions will be in effect on the gross receipts or sales tax. A cluster of exemptions could be removed but it is doubtful if this would yield the amount of new income the state will need.

A hike in income tax rates is far more likely. The legislature this year appropriated about \$185 million for fiscal 1967-68 although revenue of only \$181 million is anticipated. The \$5 million difference will come from the general fund surplus accumulated in recent years.

More "breaks" in the state income tax rate will be pushed. At present, the first \$10,000 of taxable income is taxed at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent. Within this colling various levels of tax rate will be proposed to ease the burden for wage earners in lower brackets.

Rep. Tom Holland, Albuquerque Democrat, introduced legislation of this type in the session this year. The bill failed but

Rep. Holland's recommendations should spark much interest.

Gov. Cargo may be able to escape a tax boost in the 30-day legislative session next year by urging transfer of part of the state's 5-mill property taxing power to local school districts, subject to voter approval. The governor will be running for reelection in 1968 and several prospects for the Democratic nomination against him will be prominent in the legislature. These are poor circumstances for consideration of a tax boost -- always a distasteful subject to legislators -- but it may be necessary.

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The average teacher salary at Jal in 1967-68 will be \$7,705, the Public School Finance Division of the State Finance Department said. Jal's average in the present year is \$7,361. The average increase at Jal will be \$345, the agency said.

After 27 of 90 public school budget hearings had been held, Tatum recorded an average teacher salary of \$7,697 for 1967-68 and Eulice listed an average of \$7,715, highest so far in the state.

Jemez Springs and Cuba in Sandoval County set starting pay of a teacher with a B.A. and no experience at \$6,000, the highest beginning level in New Mexico history.

The legislature this year earmarked matching and non-matching funds for teacher pay boosts and the device is proving to be effective. Scarcely a teacher in New Mexico is receiving less than a \$300 average pay boost. Magdalena is an exception at \$258 but Magdalena school officials discovered more funds are available and are reconsidering. The average teacher pay hike statewide will exceed 5 per cent.

Chief Liquor Auditor Arthur Sanchez said liquor price decreases in Raton, Las Vegas and Taos stemmed from discounts instead of a lower price structure. Sanchez said the new state affirmation law will gear New Mexico liquor prices to the New York market.

New York accounts for nearly 12 per cent of national liquor purchases. New Mexico consumption is only .37 of one per cent of the country's total. Distillers are required to affirm in New York that their prices to wholesalers are not higher than their prices to wholesalers of any other state. A similar law will become effective in New Mexico June 16.

Sanchez said the result will be to reflect New York prices in New Mexico and there will be no general price drop.

The State Highway Commission will open bids May 26 on the eastern segment of the Interstate 10 Denning bypass. The project will be .9 of one mile long. Estimated cost is \$757,000. State Tax Commission Secretary Jesse Kornegay said property reappraisal was completed in De Baca and Guadalupe Counties. Kornegay said the De Baca valuation was increased about \$1 million to more than \$9 million for 1967. The county-assessed total for residential and commercial property gained from about \$4.5 million to about \$5.5 million, Kornegay said.

In Guadalupe County, he said total valuation was increased from about \$12.3 million to about \$13.8 million. County assessor totals for residential and commercial property moved up from about \$5.5 million to about \$7 million, Kornegay reported.

Dan Ely of Albuquerque is a prospect to be named chairman of the State Boys School at Springer. Gov. Cargo appointed Ely to the board. Cargo will probably reappoint Alvin Stockton of Raton to the board when his term expires in July. Ely and Stockton are Republicans.



## Schools complimented

Continued from page one. Corona district valuation is \$4,881,201 and expected to increase a million dollars when new Trans - Western booster plant gets on the tax rolls year from now. Jim Warren said of Corona school, "You could smell good education" Grand total budget of \$254,531 at Corona was approved based on average daily membership of 295. Somewhere in the series of hearings this comment was made by one of the visiting officials, "The poorer the school district, the higher the per diem and mileage for school board members." He then told school board members present, "you're just foolish", kidding them because there per diem and mileage monies were so low. Ruidoso schools had serious losses of enrollment this year and their operating costs had to be cut back around \$50,000. Teacher salaries at Ruidoso were increased in the new budget but its total is slightly lower than the 1966 - 67 figure, \$596,132 approved for 1967-68. Average daily membership is 295.

Hondo schools also are down in enrollment and their total operational costs have dropped from \$256,048 to \$231,378 and budget total of \$242,558 approved. ADM is 295. Carrizozo schools were declared to be financially sound and in shape to take on some 70 added students next school year. Carrizozo operational costs will go from \$283,106 to \$315,975 based on average daily membership of 484. Transportation insurance costs in Lincoln County seemed high to visiting officials. There were looking at \$25 - 30 per bus costs yesterday and twice that much or more in Lincoln. Wagalter suggested a survey be made. Grand total budget for Carrizozo is \$340,624, approved. Captain school is expecting an average daily membership of 394 students during the 1967-68 school year and will have operational cost of \$242,388. Budget total is \$237,921. Captain school has the smallest amount of money available from local sources of any school in the county, total shown is \$48,401, and \$20,000 of this is a gift from private sources.
