Ground breaking for Capitan Baptist Church

A dream of a great many Lincoln County people is about to come true when ground is broken for a new Baptist church at Capitan. Verlin Prince, pastor, said the date would be set real soon and completion expected in September.

The First Baptist Church at Capitan has \$4,000 in its building fund and the balance needed for the \$30,000 to \$40,000 project will be borrowed from Baptist Convention of New Mexico loan corporation.

Most of the work will be done

by volunteer laymen and others contributing their time and materials. Location is adjacent to the school grounds west of Capitan on U.S. 380.

The structure was planned by the Department of Church architecture, Nashville, Tenn. It will be L-shaped, will seat 178 in the sanctuary and have space for 158 in the Sunday School area. The building will set on 200x300 foot lot belonging to the church.

The building now used by Baptists at Capitan was in existence in 1905 and probably served as a community church at that time. Capitan Baptist Church has 84 on its membership roll.

I heard that and similar expressions so many times following the '60 election. Even homesteaders who had remembered the election hanky-panky in Paar County -- who had recanted the LBJ way of promoting his personal businesses from his public offices -- figured that maybe we needed some enlightened selfishness in dealing with the rest of the world.

"When those Commies get up from the conference table from now on, they'd better count the fillings in their teeth!"

It didn't work that way. The Senate Majority Leader who had been so adept at converting political opponents in the Capitol cloakroom has appeared a babe in the wilderness of international affairs.

In domestic matters, his customary dexterity is recognizable. He has howled to the Democrat Party line of a caretaker Big Government taking care of its children. This is hardly the "government by the people" which once characterized our republic, but it is a "government of the people" inasmuch as we got what we voted for.

It is in dealing with other nations that President Johnson has been conspicuously ineffectual. The French threw us out. The British aid our enemies. And even in hard-bargaining with

Latin America, we got the short end of the stick.

This President's domestic policies are sufficiently liberal to callify even the so-called "Harvard crowd." Though they don't really talk the same language, they share the Big Government philosophy.

But President Johnson, in such matters as Vietnam -- is influenced by the same timidity which caused the Bay of Pigs invasion to abort. It is generally conceded that Adlai Stevenson convinced JFK that we must withdraw our air support, thus dooming that effort to disaster.

Presently the same "Harvard influence" -- and I am using that phrase because it has come to be identified with an otherwise nameless ultra-liberalism -- is restraining our President from more effectively bombing our enemies in Vietnam.

The President is caught in a terrible tug-of-war between his military advisers and the Harvard crowd."

In Congress, LBJ was a master getter-along. In the White House, trying to please all factions -- desperately desirous of being loved by everybody -- inhibits whatever facility he has for decision making.

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

Farm & Ranch News

Dr. Bond was at the Freeman ranch last week to check some cattle that had a swelling under the jaw. After all the tests were run, it was found that they were suffering from a lack of protein and vitamin A.

All the cows affected were given an injection of vitamin A, D and E, along with increased supplemental feed.

The grass from the area was analyzed and had a very low phosphorus and digestible protein content.

Under the present dry conditions, it might pay to increase the vitamin A in your feed.

I visited the apple fertilizer test plots with Dr. Hour, Monday and helped apply some test chemicals.

The apple leaf analysis from last year were given to the growers. All the leaf samples indicated a lack of iron—especially in July and August.

The Wool School is June 7 and 8 at New Mexico State University this year. It is planned at the same time as Homemakers College so that there will be some thing of interest to all concerned.

Spinach production in the Hondo Valley was reviewed last week by Paul Schoenberg. Several growers are considering producing spinach as well as other vegetables.

The grower can expect to invest \$40.00 to \$50.00 per acre and gross about \$250.00. Spinach will produce around 500 bushels per acre.

Perennial weeds such as Johnsongrass are one of the biggest problems. If insects are not controlled, they transmit a virus blight which ruins the spinach. The possibility of deer damage was also brought out.

Anyone considering planting spinach should contact Paul Schoenberg in Roswell before June 1st.

Mow lawns frequently so that no more than an inch is cut off each time.

Frequent mowing makes for easier mowing. Hand mowers push so hard. Power mowers run easier. You aren't faced with the problem of what to do with the clippings.

Think of mowing as a pruning process—to encourage a tighter sod and discourage annual weeds.

Best mowing height for bluegrass and fescue lawns, such as you likely have, is 2 inches. Bermudagrass should be maintained at 1 to 1 1/2 inches high.

Inside the Capital

SANTA FE

The State Judicial System Study Committee will re-examine its proposal to convert the present patchwork method of financing district courts into a centralized structure supervised by the Department of Finance and Administration in Santa Fe. The wealth of the 11 judicial districts varies sharply and the ability to provide court services to the people can be correspondingly affected. Jury trials cannot be financed in some less fortunate counties simply because money is not available.

The goal of the centralized financing system is to erase inequities and to relieve judges of burdensome administrative duties so they can spend more time judging.

At present, one judge in each of the 11 districts must handle court finances. He collects money for the court's operation. He approves expenditures by signing vouchers on the court fund. He hires a court clerk who signs warrants on the court fund in accordance with his vouchers. And he employs an auditor who is supposed to determine whether finances have been properly handled according to law. The position the law imposes on district judges appears to have a set of built-in conflicts.

Unbudgeted surpluses of district courts received much attention in a new study recently completed for the Judicial System Committee. The surplus amounted to an impressive \$319,667 statewide last fiscal year. It represents funds beyond money needed to meet budget requirements.

District 10 reflected a surplus of \$32,066--\$7,906 in Do Baca, \$7,603 in Harding and \$16,557 in Quay. Surpluses for other counties included: Sierra, \$4,781; Torrance, \$920; Socorro, 0; Grant, \$18,539; Hidalgo, \$6,293; Luna, \$13,692; Lea, \$14,157; Guadalupe, \$3,307; San Miguel, \$4,271; Lincoln, \$2,429; Dona Ana, \$16,588; Otero, \$128, and Valencuela, \$2,637.

present patchwork system of financing contains an incentive to judges to sharply understate court fund balances from the previous year so application may be made for funds from the state court fund.

In defense of the unbudgeted surpluses, judges point out they cannot anticipate the need for handling unusual and expensive cases or the convening of a costly grand jury. The apparent surplus funds enable them to pay for such expenses.

Court funds are invested in six of the judicial districts, including \$52,600 in San Juan, \$10,000 in Quay, \$4,980 in De Baca, \$3,384 in Harding and \$1,440 in Lincoln.

The interim legislative committee, headed by Rep. Dave Norvell, Clovis Democrat, will meet again in June in Santa Fe. Members include Rep. Bonfacio M. Tabet, Belen Democrat, Rep. Raymond Devenport, Las Cruces Democrat, and Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat. Apodaca is vice chairman.

The committee's centralized district court financing bill was passed by the House 34-17 and killed in the Senate in the legislative session this year. Some district judges strongly objected to the bill before the Senate Finance Committee. Some judges do not want to yield authority over fiscal affairs of the court.

A Fort Sumner delegation last week discussed proposed state participation in a new museum at Fort Sumner with Acting Gov.

Lee Francis and John Wilson of the State Museum. Fort Sumner Mayor Gordon Lucas, J.P. West and W.M. Franks met with the state officials.

No commitment was made by the state but Francis said, "I would like very much to see this established."

State Tax Commission Secretary Jesse Kornegay said Union County officials signed a \$31,000 contract with McMorris and Co. of Santa Fe and Amargillo for a countywide property reappraisal only needing updating, appraisal set for completion next December.

Union County property was mapped about four years ago with the aid of the State Tax Commission. With this major element of reappraisal only needing updating, the cost of the countywide project was sharply cut.

Centralized administration of the State Special Hospitals Board at Fort Bayard near Silver City, Los Lunas Hospital and Training School and New Mexico State Hospital, Las Vegas, was under way with a series of meetings of officials, including the superintendents of the institutions.

George Bryan, \$18,000-a-year administrator of the Special Hospitals Board, would be director of centralized services which would include purchasing and pooling of other efforts. Substantial savings and more efficient use of facilities would be produced, the state administration declares.

The best year of them all



 Every day I care less whether we drive it or park it in Vietnam. The history of appeasement suggests to me that we should let our military men bring this conflict to a swift and decisive conclusion.
 But I also comprehend the Harvardian position -- that Vietnam is none of our business.
 For President Johnson to follow the advice from either side would be more to our advantage than his presently unbecoming and cruel posture.

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
