
Hoppers infest this county

Deadline for spray is Aug. 15

An Aug. 15 deadline has been set by the state entomologist for spraying hoppers says Ralph Dunlap, county extension agent. The warning was issued following the discovery in Lincoln County of more than 400,000 acres infested with grasshoppers. County range damage is reaching the millions of dollars, Dunlap told.

More than 100,000 acres are infested in the Nogal Mesa area, he told. Out of 27 landowners in the area, 22 were willing to participate in a spray program, said Lamoyné Peters, Nogal Mesa spray committee chairman. Other board members are Fletcher Hall Jr. and Ellis Schilkebeck.

In the north Capitan area, more than 300,000 acres are involved. The main problem here is that (Continued on back page)

Germany explained that a dam would benefit both Capitan and Ruidoso since it could be filled while Eagle Creek is running a good stream of water and Ruidoso could have all the water it needed without interfering with Capitan's needs.

"This is our next project," he said, "but we'll get the sewer system installed and operating before we get too far along with the dam."

Corona coach goes to Texas

Pat Casey, football coach at Corona during the past school year, has accepted a job as coach of football and track at Lasbuddie, Texas, a small town east of Farwell.

Coach Casey said that Lasbuddie team had a winning season last year but had not been strong, probably 35 youngsters will turn out for football. Lasbuddie is in Class B (about like N.M. Class C).

No plans for replacement of Coach Casey at Corona have been made because no formal resignation had been received Wednesday.

Center nears completion

Plans are being completed for the grand opening of the Carrizozo Recreation Center which should be held within the next two or three weeks says Joe Light, center manager.

Installation should have been completed on the 8-lane fully automatic bowling alley by Wednesday, he said. Lloyd Markel, Brunswick representative agreed.

"The Carrizozo Recreation Center will charge for the use of its facilities," Light said, "but there will be one major difference between this and any other commercial enterprise—prices will be lower." The center will be operated to generate its own operating expenses, he said noting that the gift of Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer of the building and facilities to the town of Carrizozo made it possible.

"This center has been planned for all residents of Carrizozo and there will be pool tables which

may be rented, ping pong tables which may be rented, a snack bar which will serve cold drinks and sandwiches only, a lounge which may be used to stage dances or other chaperoned teen-age entertainment or for the use of local organizations.

Center of attraction, though, will be the Brunswick-installed completely automatic 8-lane bowling alley. "It's the most modern bowling facility in the state," Light said.

Bowling leagues are presently being organized, he said. During grand opening days there will be questionnaires passed out so that he may have some idea of the number of persons wanting bowling lessons and to participate in leagues.

In addition to the bowling, which will cost 35 cents a line for adults, 25 cents a line for students, shoes may be rented for 10 cents. Bowling equipment will also be for sale at the center,

he said.

Activities are being planned by the center for teenagers and will include dances in the lounge.

Light pointed out that the lounge will be made available at no cost to local organizations wanting a meeting place, tables and chairs will be available. A folding partition will be utilized to shut small meetings off from other activities.

"Our biggest problem now is waiting for the restaurant equipment for the snack bar to arrive," he told. Hours for the snack bar will be from 1 p.m. until late evening. When school opens the snack bar will remain closed until about 3 p.m. he told.

The bowling facility is to become a part of the Alamogordo Bowling Association which presently includes two facilities in Alamogordo, one at Holloman Air Force Base and one in Ruidoso.







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Educator looking for new answers

A well-known educator who is familiar with the northern New Mexico economic situation doesn't believe that education in its normal sense will solve the problems facing that area.

Tom Wiley, long-time state superintendent of schools and now on the faculty of the University of New Mexico College of Education, believes that the real solution is locating factories in various towns and training area residents to work in them.

Here is what Wiley has to say: "The furor about northern New Mexico's 'violent' people is based largely upon fiction. However, many of these people are mixed down in a hopeless limbo of attachment to their welfare checks. No one has come across with the least semblance of a solution. The Tijerina forces have persuaded the people to violence and the Office of Economic Opportunity struggles with theories and practices that make no real impact in rural communities.

"Education has been advocated as the ultimate panacea. In its larger sense, education will cure the basic ill which besets the people of these areas, but education within its traditional confines will do little to alleviate the trouble.

"It takes more than book learning - although that is important - to prepare them to move from the quiet environment of the hills to the jostling fomentation of a city. Traditional education does not prepare them, but nevertheless it encourages them to migrate. No basic means of earning a living at home has been developed. This will take a great deal more than knowledge of a few handicrafts, as desirable as this may be.

"While the government is pouring out millions of dollars to alleviate poverty, it should subsidize industry to train these people - not necessarily to move into the 'rotten core' of some big city but to work in factories

which are located in the small towns.

"A tremendous potential work force exists in such areas. If developed, the people could continue to live in the most attractive part of New Mexico while earning a reasonable and respectable living."

SCATTER THE JOBS - Wiley is the first to realize that training in itself isn't enough and he feels that the owners and operators of factories have a responsibility too.

He continues: "This (the need for training) is part of a more general problem. The mania of industrialists to move their own homes out to the suburbs while at the same time erecting skyscrapers and factories in the centers of large cities could become our Waterloo as a nation. Observation indicates that the automobile may be destroying that which it created - the giant city. Or the

city may destroy the automobile as a means of local transportation. Or the two together may destroy all of us who fight traffic in order to look for parking spaces which don't exist.

"Large concentrations of population have no essential elements basic to survival. And if industry were to spread out many towns would flourish, Las Vegas, Mora, Tierra Amarilla and other locations in New Mexico are no exceptions to this rule. At the same time massive migration of low income people into city ghettos, where misery engendered hatred actually threatens the nation's stability, would be alleviated."

It isn't hard to agree with Wiley that "the problem calls for much more imagination and daring than has been exhibited up to the present time, because reversal of this suicidal stampede into highly concentrated population centers will be no easy matter."

Chicken on label now means chicken in can

Las Cruces -- You won't need a magnifying glass to find the meat in a can of turkey or chicken soup after August 31.

It requires continuous inspection of the processing of poultry and poultry products in plants that sell in interstate commerce.

The act also requires that products be accurately and honestly labeled.

On Sept. 1, a U. S. Department of Agriculture regulation will require that liquid, dried, or frozen chicken or turkey soups contain at least two percent poultry meat on a ready-to-serve basis, says Miss Louise Garrett, foods specialist with the Cooperative Extension Service of New Mexico State University.

If a label says "chicken-flavored," you will know that the can contains less than two percent meat, she explains.

The new regulation was adopted in 1964 under the poultry products inspection law, but did not go into effect immediately because of industry appeals.

The act is one of the consumer protection laws administered by the USDA Consumer and Marketing Service, Miss Garrett adds.

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Elephant Butte worth recreation \$\$\$ millions

LAS CRUCES -- The value of water for recreational purposes in 1966 at Elephant Butte Reservoir is estimated to be between \$10 million and \$43 million, recently said Robert O. Coppedge, agricultural economist with the Agricultural Research Service, Salt Lake City. Coppedge spoke at the annual meeting of the Western Farm Economics Association at NMSU Thursday.

Coppedge used four different methods to compute the values of recreation in terms of expenditure by visitors to Elephant Butte. These expenditures included travel costs, food, housing, equipment fees, depreciation, and others.

Recreational expenditures at Elephant Butte dropped \$4 million from early to late summer, Coppedge pointed out. The reason for this, he said, was that recreationists prefer high water

levels at Elephant Butte, and when water is released in the summer, the levels are necessarily lowered. He estimated that recreational expenditures dropped \$21.67 for each acre-foot of water released.

Coppedge calculated the cost of each acre-foot of water lost because of seepage or evaporation from the reservoir.

The water used by recreation-

ists prior to July 31, based on recreationists' expenditures, had a value of \$394 per acre foot. After July 31, the water value was \$562 per acre foot, Coppedge said.

California tomato farmers with less than 600 acres under cultivation have fallen behind the o-

perators of larger farms because they have been unable or unwilling to accept new practices as readily as the operators of larger farms, according to Harold O. Carter and John Wildermuth of the University of California.

In 1958, they pointed out, to-

mato farmers with less than 600 acres earned a rate on a par with that received by operators of larger farms. Since then, the highest rate of return has been achieved by operators who will employ the latest production techniques, farming at a high level of intensity, and on a farm

sufficiently large to take advantage of scale economies.

The annual meeting, attended by 225 agricultural economists from Western states, concludes Friday with a business meeting and a morning program devoted to the economics of recreation.

State park located in beautiful country



Valley of Fires State Park is only three miles from Carrizozo, Carrizozo, once known as Carizo Springs, played a minor location point in the infamous Lincoln County War of the late 1870's. The park is located amidst beautiful country. It is on a sort of high point in a valley surrounded by mountains. White Oaks, one of New Mexico's most famous ghost town lies at the foot of the largest nearby mountain.

The lava bed itself is some forty miles long and five miles wide at its widest point. Most of the bed can be observed from the park. The aboriginal Indians, who somehow were close enough to observe the original flow of lava, passed the name of Valley of Fires down through time with their legends of things past. It must have been an awesome spectacle, that original show. Today's observers can merely try to imagine the premier performance as they trace the evolutions of the once liquid rock now hardened into fantastic forms. Valley of Fires State Park has been visited often by geologists who take great delight and interest in getting the rocks to tell them their story. Others, who have a more modern interest in the history thereabouts, use the park as a base to visit White Oaks or nearby Lincoln town, the scene of so much bloodshed and once the stamping ground of New Mexico's most widely known chisels, Billy, the Kid. There's something for all at Valley of Fires State Park.

What makes Valley of Fires State Park different from all of the other state parks in New Mexico is that it is located on the rim of a large lava bed. The bluish-black rock still looks, after a few thousand years, as if it has just been spewed up and allowed to cool overnight. Trails from the park meander through the beds allowing one to observe nature at its most violent and at the same time most beautifully interesting. Overnight campers and picnickers are welcomed at the park and all the modern facilities are provided for the visitor's comfort.

Gov. Cargo has deactivated a total of 31 boards so far

SANTA FE--Gov. Dave Cargo abolished more boards last week, boosting the total he has deactivated to 31. Most were obsolete and inactive or were appointed by previous governors with their purposes long since completed.

But Gov. Cargo's actions gave impetus to his drive to simplify the structure of state government, a worth objective. Much of his program to reorganize state government must await a legislative session. The Governor's Committee on Reorganization of State Government met again. The committee will receive reports on state agencies from student interns for use in shaping decisions on reorganization. An editor will be hired to write the committee's final report.

Former Gov. John F. Simms Jr. of Albuquerque and Santa Fe County heads the blue-ribbon committee. Former Governor and U.S. Sen. Edwin L. Mechem of Las Cruces is chairman of the finance subcommittee, assisted by State Finance Director Ed Hartman.

Latest boards abolished by Gov. Cargo were the Regional Economic Development Council and the State Rural Electrification Authority.

Deputy Atty. Gen. Oliver Payne said a Bernalillo County District Court decision on voter residence applies only in Bernalillo, Valencia and Sandoval Counties. Judge D.A. MacPherson Jr. held voters must live in the precinct in which they vote.

The ruling is significant. It means business addresses cannot be used in voter registration and it may prompt thousands of voters to change voting address. But the ruling cannot be applied statewide without further action. Bernalillo County Republicans filed the court suit and later the New Mexico Republican Party adopted plans to push for updated voter registrations statewide.

The recently released Harding County audit for fiscal 1965-66 contained mild criticisms. Auditors said there is no evidence that gasoline and diesel oil used on road equipment was being bought on bids. The report also said long distance telephone calls must be recorded with pertinent data. Auditors said there was lack of support on invoices for meals, lodging and other expenses of a county officer or employee and lack of logs for trips. Records did not show that dealers selling gasoline, oil, tires and tubes to Harding County were deducting the federal tax. The county is exempt from the federal tax.

A unique in-service training program starting in September will unite efforts of the State School for Boys of Springer, Springer Public Schools and New Mexico Highlands University at Las Vegas. Title III funds will provide \$67,000 for the program.

The State School for Boys vocational training program will be accessible to public school children. The special education facilities and faculty of Springer Public Schools will be available to the state school. Both schools include students who are educationally retarded and culturally deprived.

State Highway Department employment totals 2,542 this month, a drop of nearly 300 from 2,816 in July last year. Maintenance work accounts for 1,294 workers, including the following: Deming District, 287; Roswell District, 253; Albuquerque District, 256; Las Vegas District, 246, and Santa Fe District, 267.

Articles of incorporation were filed at the State Corporation Commission for Bowl-A-Matic Lanes Inc. of Fort Sumner. Incorporators were Max Wertheim, R.E. Lund, John Humphrey Jr. and Jeff Good of Fort Sumner.

Also plans are being made to install a linguistics system to aid Spanish-American children to master English faster and easier. Heading this program will be Erma Wilson, first grade teacher at Santa Rita.

A team of Carrizozo teachers will attend the Ford Foundation conference in Santa Fe August 16-18.

Attendance and participation have been "real good" for the summer library program, Ellison told.

The tennis courts have been expanded, fenced and refaced and plans are being made to install lighting, he said.

Randall Greer of Nogal has been appointed school board trustee to fill the spot vacated by the resignation of John Allen Hightower of Ancho. Hightower had been board chairman for several years, Ellison said.

Bus routes look solid, schedules are being juggled to accommodate the most students and supplies are presently being ordered, he said.

subdivision is involved and more than 100 landowners have to be contacted. Hopper committee members for this area are:

Walt Wilson, chairman; Mill Jones, A. W. Gnatkowski and Bill Edgar.

Under the spray program, landowners will have to contribute one-third of the cost of aerial spraying with Malathion, deadly to hoppers but not harmful to livestock. The other two-thirds of the cost will be shared equally by the state and the federal government.

Dunlap noted that there may be another infestation down into the Mescalero Indian Reservation. "We just don't have enough people at present to get a complete report," he said.

If hoppers have been flying for a week, Dunlap warned, the federal government will not participate because hoppers are laying eggs and a spray would not kill the larvae.

The estimate of 25 cents an acre might be a little more than the actual cost, but refunds would be pro rated, Dunlap said. Spraying will be done by blocks, areas in excess of 10,000 acres, but all property owners in each block must be signed up for the program, he said.

"Past hopper experience shows that if there is no spray program, there is no winter feed for livestock," Dunlap said.

Mention was made of using the runway at Fort Stanton for multi-engine spray planes to operate from. Officials are presently being contacted.
