# Recreation hall opens Saturday

Construction bids for recreation center to cost around \$330,000.00 were opened in Carrizozo last December and the contract awarded to Compton Construction Company of Roswell.

This week the center manager, Joe Light, and the recreation committee, composed of Ray Wells, Henry Vega, Pat Yoss, Marcus Barela, Glen Ellison, and J.S. Stearns, have announced that the construction program is complete and the center is ready for activity.

Plans are to open Saturday at noon and be open the following Sunday. In weeks to follow the center will be open all days except Monday, noon the probable opening hour.

The Carrizozo Recreation Center will be operated as a regular commercial business and there will be a moderate charge for all services. Bowling prices will be 35¢ for adults and 25¢ for school children.

Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer are paying all construction costs and will maintain the center for a ten-year period -- under the management of the recreation committee -- after which time the center will become the property of the Town of Carrizozo.

Mr. Light said he plans for a short check-out and shake-down period to see that all equipment is functioning properly and that a "grand opening" date would be announced soon.

The recreation center is located in Spencer Park adjacent to Highways 380-54 intersection.

# St. Rita classes moved Monday

Supt. Glen Ellison told the news Tuesday that Carrizozo school can drop or gain 30 students any year. Enrollment figures this year were down from the anticipated number.

In the 1964-65 school year projected enrollment was 370 students and ended with 345. The 1965-66 school year projected 365 and ended with 390.

At start of 1966-67 school year the anticipated enrollment was 370 and the figure went up to 410.

Carrizozo is now participating in Class B athletics because of the increase the past two years. Class is based on average daily attendance, 150 or less is Class C, this year Carrizozo has 148 membership and should be in Class B for two years.

Carrizozo school gained sixty students in the lower six grades by taking in Santa Rita school students, going from 160 enrollment at end of school last year to 220 at start of school this year.

The Bingham, Ancho, White Oaks, Nogal, and Oscura bus routes are loaded different this year but the total figures are not yet available.

School will be closed Monday for Labor Day. The periods of attendance will be broken up this year in close to six-week periods: a four-day weekend at teacher convention time six weeks from start, next four-day weekend at Thanksgiving, and the next at Christmas. Then George Washington's birthday will be celebrated with four-day weekend, after that Easter, and four-days off, then six-weeks later school is out.

Carrizozo school lost 20 students in high school, going from 240 at end of school last year to 220 at start of school this year.

The result of the total enrollment being less than anticipated made necessary the move of all school activities from Santa Rita building to municipal building. Monday 32 students made the move. Some crowding in grade school was necessary and one class was moved into high school building.

Two weeks ago Carrizozo was intending to hire Spanish teacher, now this position will not be filled, other teachers will do the job.

## Diningroom dedicated in memory of Eddie Cabrera

From a start of wide open space in a beautiful section of high mountain country above Fort Stanton an institution has been developed that is one of two of its kind in New Mexico -- Camp Sierra Blanca for boys.

On August 26 the camp dining hall was dedicated in memory of Edward A. Cabrera, a former student who joined the Army in November 1966 and was reported missing in action in Vietnam June 5, 1967 and a month later his mother was notified that his body had been found. He had died as a result of a mine explosion.

Louis Maldonado, who gave the dedication address, told about Eddie as he grew up in Gallup. He was a fine young man, pitcher in the Little League, and with Connie Mack baseball league. He was outstanding athlete in high school, a friendly sort of boy who made many lasting friends.

While in the service of his country he was awarded the National Defense Medal, the Air Force badge, combat infantry badge with gold star, the Purple Heart with one battle star, the Vietnam Service medal, and the South Vietnam government service medal. His mother is Mrs. Esther Cabrera of Gallup.

N. M. Army National Guard posted the colors for the dedication ceremony, to the colors led by Wm. Stelake and national anthem sung by all present. Father Anthony Bolman gave the invocation. Lucio Zamora, acting director of the camp, introduced the guests.

Welcome was given by Glenn Walker, and response was made by Rep. Wm. Sarczewski, Alvin Stockton, NMBS board of trustees, gave a short history of the camp. Chaplain A. S. Kline gave the prayer of dedication.

Mrs. A. N. Spencer received a plaque from veterans organizations of Lincoln County.

The Soney Wright ranch in Lincoln County has been sold to a group of two Texans, an Oklahoman and a New Mexican.

Glover McCarty of Ruidoso, one of the purchasers, said the purchase price was in excess of \$1.25 million. Other purchasers included Alex Singer of Tulsa, Okla., Forrest Atwell of Fort Worth, Tex., Harry Maia of El Paso, Texas.

McCarty said Wright, a well-known rodeo performer, probably will continue to operate the ranch for the group at the present time.

The land adjoins an area of considerable recreational development in the Ruidoso area and there was an indication part of the ranch might be used for an extensive recreational development.

McCarty said the ranch contains 4336 acres of wooded land and a total of 15,000 acres of wooded land and federal and state leased land.

Revised payment rates of this federal-state food subsidy program will benefit lowest income households ineligible to receive welfare financial assistance. Under this one-time special offer, an eligible participant can obtain a month's full quota of stamps for half of his regular monthly purchase requirement.

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



**Building costs went up 1,531,977**

**SANTA FE** — An audit of the Capitol Buildings Improvement Commission showed 80 approved contract revisions for a net total contract increase of \$1,531,977 for the new state capitol and library buildings.

The audit, covering the period from July 1, 1964, through Dec. 31, 1966, was conducted by the legislative Audit Commission unexpectedly fired Alex Armijo of Santa Fe as legislative auditor in a closed session in a 4-2 vote. Caesar Sebastian, Santa Fe accountant and former state finance director, was immediately named to replace Armijo.

During the audited period 97 separate change orders to the basic contract for construction of the capitol and library were proposed. Six were not approved. Eleven were modifications without price changes. The remaining 80 added more than \$1.5 million to the original construction contract of \$4,768,000.

More than \$1 million of the added cost was accounted for by a 1965 change order for 21 items on which bids were initially opened but an award was withheld.

Auditors said the CBIC spent \$2,533 million in the audited period for land and related costs -- appraisals, legal services, demolition work and parking lot improvements.

Purchases included property in Santa Fe's St. Michael's area amounting to \$1,201,232 for which reimbursement from the Public Employees Retirement Association is anticipated, and other land in the state capitol vicinity, aside from the new capitol buildings site, totaling \$1,295,050. This land will be held by the CBIC for development of the capitol complex area.

W.C. Kruger and Associates of Santa Fe was the architect for the new buildings. Robert E. McKee Inc. of Santa Fe was general contractor.

Auditors said two members of Kruger's staff served as project inspectors for the capitol-library building and for a state office building being constructed for the PERA. The architect's firm, auditors said, was paid \$1,000 a month for their full-time services in addition to the regular 5 per cent fee on construction cost. An attorney general's opinion held the extra services were legal and proper. The report said the Kruger firm received \$51,604 for services of a project inspector and for other electrical and mechanical inspection services for the capitol and library buildings.

The audit showed furnishings for the new capitol and library cost \$809,813, included in this total was \$418,968 in contracts for purchases from the Paper Mill of Las Cruces operated by former State Sen. James Patton.

The audit report noted an exception involving a question of the legality of a transaction. The contractor was reimbursed \$2,090 for items removed from four houses on the building site, by former owners, prior to completion of demolition work.

Auditors also said the original contract for remodeling of the governor's residence, awarded in 1965 to J.R. Bransford Construction Co. Inc. of Santa Fe, was \$23,700, but the final construction contract cost was \$118,243. Architect fees of \$1,824, at 10 per cent of cost, were paid to the Kruger company on this project.

Fourteen change orders to the governor's residence contract were approved which essentially

added five items, on which bids had been obtained, to the scope of the work.

The governor's residence project also included extensive re-furnishings. The architect also served as consultant for this phase. Payments for furnishings and related costs amounted to \$30,292. The architect's fee for this segment was based on a lesser estimated cost of \$29,791 and totaled \$2,979.

Purchases of furniture or any improvement, equipment or supplies of any kind for the governor's residence were specifically exempted from the State Purchasing Act. So orders were purchased directly by the Capitol Buildings Improvement Commission or its representative, W. C. Kruger and Associates.

Our guess is the firemen win by many hours as the guys who spend the most time in volunteer service to their home town.


