Dear Mr. Hensley:

Thank you for your letter of September 15 and we are extremely pleased to learn that you are considering Carrizozo as a location for some of your people to reside who will be employed in this area.

We want to convey a sincere and cordial invitation. We are proud of our town; we have a group of dedicated and enthusiastic citizens who believe that to live in New Mexico is a privilege, one we would like to share with you. Although our town is small, we think big and have made many improvements in recent years designed to make those already here happy with where they live and to attract new citizens.

We have in the last five years, paved several sections of town, built a new courthouse, brought in natural gas, constructed a new, modern sewer system, a new annex to an already excellent school plant, a new swimming pool and several new parks, modernized and improved our fine hospital and only very recently, our town has a new recreation center costing \$350,000.00, a gift from our Doctor and his wife.

Located at the junction of two federal highways and on the main line of the Southern Pacific Railroad, we feel our transportation needs can be met. The altitude here is 5,412 ft. and enjoy a good year-round climate. We are very near to the mountains, fishing, hunting and Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, the southernmost in the United States, is very handy, and during school, there is a bus every Saturday, that takes interested children to ski classes. Horse racing at Ruidoso is also enjoyed by many.

Lincoln County, New Mexico - our county - is just simply a terrific place to live. It is one of the larger counties area wise, while we only have approximately 1 person per square mile population wise and these are mainly concentrated in four towns. During the summer months we have a large influx of tourists but it isn't crowded as we have been blessed with so much of this beautiful country that there is plenty of room.

All of us like to brag about where we live and when we read about the havoc being created by hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, riots and strikes, we believe stronger than ever that here in Lincoln County, we have been blessed. Outside of a dry spell just about every year, we just don't have any real troubles. And even when it gets dry, it always rains and we raise some of the best livestock to be found anywhere. Another thing that is worth considering is that our juvenile delinquency problem is hardly worth mentioning and I think it is because here in the County, everyone gets along with everyone else.

I am sure, many of the things I have written here are things you are already familiar with but again let us say how glad we are that you are considering Carrizozo. We do not have a payroll, this is what we need most. For many years, we enjoyed a substantial railroad payroll, as this is a terminal point. With modernization, personnel on the railroad has been diminished to the point where we cannot consider it one of the mainstays of our economy.

You have made inquiry of the housing available and mentioned mobile homes as a possibility to fulfill your requirements. This we can do and will do, upon the Go signal from your company. We have some houses for rent and will make every effort to have more and to improve those already here. We can assure you of the mobile homes and also that we are very anxious to please you and your people. If there is a chance at all of having fifty families move to Carrizozo, please rest assured that there is no end to which we will not go in order to make this possible.

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

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

## The Best in The West

INTRODUCTORY — Tony Payton, editor of Gardnerville (Nevada) Record Courier has been visiting the New Mexico Paytons in Carrizozo this week. To make good use of his talents the News editor suggested that Tony write a couple of hundred words on the subject of "Why Nevada is the best state in the west" while his father does the same with subject "Why New Mexico is the best state in the west." Tony went through high school at Clayton, N. M., with a partner now operates two newspapers in Nevada.

## Nevada New Mexico

If Americans really knew what is happening in Nevada, the exodus to that Silver State would be the biggest westward tilt since the Sooner land rush or the forty-niners' quest for gold.

The "happenings" there, and perhaps it's telling tales out of school to let south-central New Mexicans in on some of the secrets, are what make Nevada a stronghold, or perhaps hold-out is a better word, for precocious individualism, free spirit and greatness.

One has to believe these things still possible to believe in Nevada and what the Silver State has come to stand for in this modern time. Individually, these things are in existence in, say, New Mexico and throughout other areas of the United States--but not collected as in Nevada.

Specifically, and in no certain order, Nevadans enjoy highway travel without a maximum speed limit; 25 hour, seven-day liquor laws; legal, taxpaying open gambling by free enterprise, rapid divorce and instant marriage laws; and controlled prostitution is not illegal in many areas.

A legal den of iniquity, you say? Hardly. Nevadans believe, generally, that a person should be allowed to do as he pleases--and to that end are the liberal laws that spell Nevada.

And for much the same reasons Nevadans pay no inheritance tax or state income tax; there is no tax on warehousing and property taxes are among the nation's lowest. Small population allows local government control, even to the statehouse level, while local bureaucracy in non-existent. Welfare is only a small thorn, while much tax monies go to a high standard of education from kindergarten to the university level.

Of course, all is not rosy in this mountainous state where simple drinking water is at a premium in some areas. It may not be perfect, but it's the best thing we have going.

The Lincoln County News editor likes to think that he is a practical down-to-Mal Pais type of thinker. . . like when someone says their state is the best, we immediately challenge-- better than what?

In this case we are being practical. New Mexico is a better state than Nevada because we've got more of the things people seek out--when they have time and money to do so--in all sections of our great state.

We have the climate, the scenery, the wide open spaces, the oldest culture in American, the perfect mix of peoples, New Mexico could well be called the bastion of democracy.

From the Jicarilla Mountains of Lincoln County across the flats to the San Andres, west to the continental divide and north to the San Juans east to Capulin and back south along the Canadian and Pecos Rivers--you find people enjoying the best of the West because they want to be in those places.

Hunting, fishing, boating, hiking, camping, skiing, horse racing, fiestas, or just sitting and watching the fabulous colors of oventide as the gold of sunset changes to many blues of night--New Mexico has more of the good things in life.

There's room for faith here, faith in a land that is rugged, faith in people who still live by age-old standards, faith in God who is close to the good earth in New Mexico.

There is much room to work and grow because nature left the basic raw materials, much good soil for food products, minerals on every hand, enough water for many more people than now live here, widespread ranges for missile experiments which are as necessary as the croplands.

New Mexico has towns in all areas that are doing well for one reason or another. Las Cruces, Carlsbad, Clovis, Clay-

The Capitan Lions Club and their wives enjoyed their dinner and meeting at the new recreation center in Carrizozo last week.



## Where does wealth go ?

EDITORIAL IN HAVENER OKLAHOMA

An editorial recently appeared in the Havener, Okla., Ledger and it sounds as though they have the same problem we do here: the wealth generated in Lincoln County being used to build our neighboring towns. We're building other towns everytime we buy something out of town that can be purchased here. Those trade-at-home slogans aren't just so many meaningless words; you're robbing yourself every time you buy out of town.

The article titled, "A Losing Proposition" is as follows: This is the time of year when many people lose money by thinking that prices are lower elsewhere. This is, at times, true, but the difference is very slight. A drive to any neighboring town costs money and it takes an extremely large purchase to effect any savings.

Most people feel that the cost of gas and oil is the only expense. This just isn't so. Most Governmental agencies allow 8 cents per mile for anyone using his own car on official business. Most of these people will tell you that they lose money at that figure.

That means that a 120-mile trip will cost a car owner \$9.60. This isn't much but at the difference in prices it would take a purchase of better than \$300 to break even. In addition there is the lost time, and the fact that any adjustment that must be made entails another \$9.60.

This also provides other undesirable losses. Surveys show that out of each dollar spent locally about 3 cents goes for taxes. This means that each such purchase is paying \$9 toward better schools, better streets, better police and fire protection and better roads - somewhere else.

That isn't a large amount in itself but if there are 100 such purchases made during the year then \$900 in additional taxes must be absorbed here and paid here. This tax money is tacked on to everyone's tax bill.

When all of these facts are considered, plus the fact that there are good selections of merchandise right here, that local merchants stand behind the products, and that in many cases prices are not lower elsewhere, it can be seen that shopping out of town just isn't profitable for anyone but merchants elsewhere.

We might add also that here in Carrizozo, our merchants annually contribute thousands of dollars to all kinds of worthy causes such as Little League, Boy and Girl Scouts; in fact, to anything that will benefit the town and its citizens. If you've ever served on a committee to raise funds I don't have to tell you who's always at the top of the contact list. So the next time you think about buying something out of town that you can get here, give a little thought to those extras you get by trading at home, and if you still want to shop out of town, those merchants will be glad to see you coming; They can take your money, build THEIR town, provide services for THEIR citizens, recreational facilities and better schools for THEIR children, and support for THEIR worthy causes. When you spend that dollar out of town, kiss it goodbye; that's the last of it you will see.



## Soil & Water district report

Following is the Annual Report for the Carrizozo Soil & Water Conservation District for Fiscal Year 1967.

The Carrizozo SWCD was organized October 11th, 1945. There have been six additions to the District making a total acreage at present of 1,004,217. It is all rangeland with about 85 landowners.

The general purpose of the District is to promote soil & water conservation through a long range program. Landowners and operators are encouraged to enter into cooperative agreements with the District and to develop and apply conservation plans.

The District is managed by a Board of Supervision consisting of the following:

Lee Straley, Ancho, Chairman; Bill Gallacher Jr., Carrizozo, Vice Chairman; Bill Stephenson, Carrizozo, Secretary - Treasurer; Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo, Member; A. W. Gnatkowski, Ancho, Member.

The Board of Supervisors meet the first Wednesday of each month to conduct District business. Anyone interested is invited to attend. The Supervisor may also be contacted individually regarding conservation.

The District makes heavy equipment available to cooperators for conservation and development work. This equipment consists of a D & C caterpillar tractor with dozer, carry-all, ripper and plastic pipe layer. The equipment is managed and operated by Randall Greer. Books and accounts are kept by the Secretary - Treasurer, and are audited annually.

Listed below are some of the major accomplishments of the District during Fiscal Year 1967.

New or revised conservation plans 8 100,000 acres

Cooperators assisted 45  
Cooperators applying practices 30.

The third annual Banker Award was given to Pres Pino of Carrizozo.

An exhibit was placed at the county fair and 4-H members exhibiting livestock were recognized.

A workshop for Supervisors was attended by all members. The State Convention of SWCDs was attended by two members.

Twelve regular meetings were held with 82% attendance.

A quarterly newsletter was started to publicize conservation activities.

The Ladies Auxiliary met twice during the year and assisted with the Information and Bankers Award program.

The SWCD has memorandums of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service, Bureau of Land Management, State Department of Forestry and cooperates with ASCS Extension Service and U. S. Forest Service. These agencies assist the District to obtain their objectives.

The Board of Supervisors wish to express their appreciation to these agencies and to the District cooperators and others for their support of the District Conservation program.

Barbara Knight won first with her Guernsey heifer, and second in Dairy Showmanship.

Wayne Dunlap took first place in the Wool Breeds class with his Rambouillet market lamb. This lamb placed fourth in the entire contest.

Gordon Barham won the trophy for the champion lamb carcass at the Lincoln County Fair, Carol Cooper came in second.

I have heard of a few lamb contracts in the state, and they are around 21 cents for wether lambs and 22 cents for ewe lambs.

A tour of Fort Stanton is planned during the American Society of Range Management which is meeting in Alto, October 5 & 6. This tour will include information on fertilizing range grasses and how it can benefit the rancher.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS PROVIDERS OF PLENTY" by the more than 700 Associations and 12 Land Banks of the nationwide system", he went on to state "as the farmer and rancher-owned Land Banks have been a major source of long-term agricultural credit for the past 50 years, we feel it is a worthy objective of our Golden Anniversary observance to document the true contributions America's agricultural producers make to the world which our nation enjoys. He concluded by saying, "Serving farmers and ranchers with good service is our goal". He then introduced a film "Providers of Plenty" which was shown to our stockholders and guests and which was enjoyed very much.

Mr. Vonnie Jasper, the Association's Manager, reported that

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The general purpose of the District is to promote soil & water conservation through a long range program. Landowners and operators are encouraged to enter into cooperative agreements with the District and to develop and apply conservation plans.

The District is managed by a Board of Supervision consisting of the following:

Lee Straley, Ancho, Chairman, Bill Gallacher Jr., Carrizozo, Vice Chairman, Bill Stephenson, Carrizozo, Secretary - Treasurer, Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo Member, A. W. Gnatkowski, Ancho Member.

The Board of Supervisors meet the first Wednesday of each month to conduct District business. Anyone interested is invited to attend. The Supervisor may also be contacted individually regarding conservation.

The District makes heavy equipment available to cooperators for conservation and development work. This equipment consists of a D & C Caterpillar tractor with dozer carry-all, ripper and plastic pipe layer. The equipment is managed and operated by Randall Greer. Books and accounts are kept by the Secretary - Treasurer, and are audited annually.



No ballot for or against said bond question shall be received by the judges of election unless the person offering the same shall be a qualified elector of the municipality under the laws of the State of New Mexico now in force, and, in addition to such qualifications, shall have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year. 
