## Everyone invited to 'openhouse'

The staff of the Lincoln County News has spent most of a year in a new printing plant in Carrizozo, learning new methods and operation of new machines. This Friday they would like to show people how an offset newspaper (three newspapers) is printed. Starting from typed or hand-written sheet of copy, through automatic type setter, through waxer and pastepup, in the camera where 15x22-inch negative is made, halftones stripped in, opaquing done, then plate made to go on press, and the printed product "comes out here" — you can see it all during openhouse day.

A major attraction will be the Captain school band of 49 musicians directed by Bartley McDonough. This band will arrive in Carrizozo at 1:15, be seated in chairs in the News plant and play a concert. The Tiger band will be dressed in the latest type of military uniform with over-

lay. They wear the overlays on parade, take them off and are dressed for concert.

Majorities of the Captain band are Patsy Granham, Patsy Preciado, Jan LaMay, Nicolette Nethaway and Kathy Davis. Patsy McDonald is head drum major. Tom Sawyer Ward and Kayne Cornelius are banner guards. Mrs. Darrel Austin and Mr. War-

ren (Hub) Harris help on most band trips providing pickup and as chauffeur. Supt. Diane Darling also chauffeurs the band around on their trips.

The Captain band will take part in the Ascencade parade at Ruldoso Saturday, and will perform at halftime of the Mountainair-Capitan football game in Capitan the following Friday.

There will be six door prizes for lucky people who register during the openhouse Friday. The drawing will be held at 5:00 p.m., winners need not be present.

## Lincoln County News expansion program started to improve methods

In observance of National Newspaper week and to make a special opportunity for local people, state printers and publishers to view the newest printing plant in New Mexico, publishers of the Lincoln County News in Carrizozo have set October 13-14 as openhouse days.

Combining both offset and hot metal for the production of three weekly newspapers and a large volume of commercial business, much new equipment and some new methods will be on display.

The expansion program was started by publishers Paul and Eleanor Payton in July of 1966 when they purchased the Torrance County Citizen, only newspaper in that county, published at Estancia in the county seat. This newspaper was printed letterpress in Carrizozo for six months prior to move to the new quarters. Ted Morse is publisher of the Citizen.

In October 1966 the weekly newspaper at Tularosa, town of 3,500 population in Otero County south of Carrizozo, was purchased. This newspaper was printed at Deming during weeks a new plant was being set up. Jeff Hardin published the Tribune.

News publishers figured that by combining the production of these weekly newspapers and commercial printing from a three-county area the cost of new 8 1/2 x 7 1/2 building and much new equipment would be justified and allow the Lincoln County News to update its methods.

A building across from courthouse in Carrizozo was partitioned inside following a floor plan made with help from C. E. "Red" Givens, superintendent of Case Thompson Printing Co. in Albuquerque, and Earl Hatfield, Albuquerque branch manager for A. E. Helmsdon in Denver.

Equipment started arriving before the inside work was complete. Neither painters, carpenters, plumbers or electricians were through with construction for a couple of months after production started in the new plant.

The move was made—letterpress to offset newspaper printing and from old building to new modern plant the third week in December 1966. A total of 24 newspaper pages were printed that first week.

Equipment moved from old plant included a C4 Intertype new in 1960, Kluge, two 10X15 open presses, casting box, power cutter, A. B. Dick 360, Menges folder, mailing machine, string tier, type cabinets, steel shelving.

Equipment purchased included a Royal Zenith 30 for newspaper press, 24-inch camera, three darkroom sinks, negative cabinet, enlarger, plate maker, two Fridens, two Headlamps, waxer, repro press, Selectric, new tables for pastepup, cabinets for flats and negatives.

The original plan was to do composition for all three newspapers in Carrizozo. Experience brought about a change in this

plan. Now sets of Fridens have been installed at Tularosa and Estancia along with other equipment necessary to compose newspapers. All darkroom and press work continues to be done in Carrizozo. Flats are based in and papers sent back the same route.

Learning new methods, getting a flow of work established between points 50 and 100 miles apart, getting bugs out of new equipment, changes made for best production, training people—these problems have been severe and are the reasons why openhouse is being held nearly a year after plant opening.

In the year past a switch has been made to pre-screening halftone and back to halftone negatives, we adopted aquatint cans for rubber cement (small things but time saver), started printing our own paper border on Asbern repro and running through waxer which has worked out well, have progressively made more use of hot metal, we now set 48-60-72 headlines using foundry type.

Preprinted ad borders in sizes from 1 x2 up to 2x8 are being used to good advantage. An extra half inch has been added to width of newspaper page to space out columns.

We expect to have all equipment in the plant set up for operation during the two days to openhouse. A special invitation is being issued to printers and publishers to view the plant Saturday.

## Devp. Ass'n to incorporate

The October meeting of Lincoln County Development Association was held in the Carrizozo recreation center Tuesday night. A major piece of business was adoption of articles of incorporation, address of corporation to be extension office postoffice box.

Discussion of number of directors results in vote to have two directors from each (school) district, which group will elect a vice president and secretary-treasurer. The president will be elected at large with all members present and will make the 11th officer of the association.

Report made by W. G. Shrotenog on status of airport at Fort Stanton. A meeting with New Mexico State College officials is pending, to discuss acquisition of land.

Vernon Peity reported that state will not participate in lighting of Carrizozo airport, a situation that has been pending a year or more.

The comment was made that the state department of development had spent \$10,000 in southern New Mexico in effort to get people to vacation in Northern New Mexico.

Discussion of fund raising, money to be used to publicize this area, occupied the balance of the meeting. President Vernon Peity presided.

The November meeting will be held in Ruldoso, date and place to be announced later.

## Faculty at WSSSP meet

NMSU faculty members will make six visits to Carrizozo this year as part of this program. They will consult with teachers here on reading problems and attempt to form a closer relationship between elementary, secondary, and university instruction.

## Bill Gallacher receives conservation award

William Gallacher Sr., a lifelong resident of Lincoln County, received the annual banker's award at Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District and Citizens State banquet.

Mr. Gallacher's father came to the United States from Kilmorane, Ayrshire, Scotland in 1871. He settled in Joliet, Ill. and acquired coal mining interests. It was at Joliet that he met and married Jane Malcolm.

### VISITOR OF THE WEEKEND TO BE HONORED BY C of C

The state park and recreation commission is proclaiming October 13-14-15 as State Parks Weekend. The plan is to choose the state park visitor of the weekend by selecting that visitor or carload of visitors who crosses the check line at each state park at exactly noon on Saturday the 14th.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce will pay a night's lodging for the visitor or visitors of the week, plus one meal and picture coverage (hope they'll come to the News Office).

There were other acquisitions between these two major purchases.

Mr. Gallacher had an active life. He graduated from the school now known as N. M. State, was offered a contract to play professional baseball with San Francisco Seals but turned it down to go in ranching business with his brothers John and Harry, both now dead.

In 1936 Bill was doing well with another game, he was a golf tournament in Amarillo, Texas that year. He has served

on the board of county commissioners, on school board, served overseas in WWI. Bill was helpful in getting the Carrizozo County Club organized, and has always taken an active interest in community affairs.

In making the presentation, Mr. Chet Loe, agricultural representative from New Mexico Bankers Ass'n, told Mr. Gallacher "You are carrying out a program of stewardship of the land, which means productive use". Mr. Loe said that the Federal government can't come in and handle your local conservation

job. Ranchers of this day have got to be money managers as well as ranch managers. Ranchers now are using three times as much operating money to produce the same dollar of production as they were ten years ago. As a nation we have grown used to surpluses, but that is changing.

We are still letting too much beef come in from imports. The period ahead should be favorable for agriculture, Loe concluded.



## Attention called to clean-up progress by youth groups

C'zozo Future Homemakers held a short meeting Tuesday, October 10, then turned the meeting over to the City Beautification meeting with Donda Jo May as chairman. Attention was called to the progress that was made by the youth groups during the summer to help clean up Carrizozo. The FHA Beautification Committee, which is spear-heading the drive, had made a list of tentative assignments for each of the civic organizations who have shown interest in helping with the campaign. Among these assignments were for some of the civic groups to be responsible for buying trash cans and designating the locations for them. School youth groups would paint the cans and place them in posi-

tion. Several groups will be asked to beautify the islands along Highway 54 through the town. At this point Linda Simpson read a letter which she had received from Mr. Harcrow State Highway Engineer, pointing out some of the requirements that must be met for safety purposes. FHA has already collected some wild flower seeds and plans to get these planted in accordance with highway specifications.

Donda Jo also reported on the project which FHA is attempting to get started which might help to promote good will for Carrizozo, that of making cactus jelly and having it distributed by motel operators to out-of-state guests. In order to get this project underway, FHA is asking a local civic group to underwrite the expenses involved and the girls will do the work with local Church women helping to supervise the making of the jelly.

Ideas which were brought up as ways of promoting the clean-up campaign were to have a rally, make up cheers, sponsor contests between classes or organizations. Mr. Bradley told of the city's work in cleaning up and that they might be of assistance to the youth groups.





2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
3/4 cup milk  
1 egg  
1 1/2 cups peeled chopped apples  
Topping:  
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
For coffee cake, mix and sift corn meal, flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk, egg and apples. Stir until thoroughly blended. Bake in greased 8-inch square baking pan at 350 degrees about 30 minutes. While coffee cake is baking, prepare topping: combine brown sugar, flour and cinnamon. ## The Main Advantage

There are lots of things a newspaper can not do, and only one or two vital functions that a newspaper performs best.

When we use the word newspaper we're meaning one that is not afraid to be honest with itself and its readers, speak with a strong voice, fearing only God and serving a community rather than individuals.

The News editor is convinced that a function best performed by a newspaper is to keep a town from becoming so ingrown that rottenness develops.

Governing bodies, large and small, of all sorts of organiza-

tions and institutions, do good for years, decades—then comes the bad apple and disgrace for an entire town. Publicity provided by a newspaper cuts such happenings to a minimum.

When people don't want their names in the news because they, or some of their friends or neighbors, are doing wrong—that is when the entire community starts going sour.

The light-shown by a newspaper should be a strong, friendly light—and by lighting the dark corners people can see to work better toward living a good life in a good community.

## You can't always win

It's tough to make a dollar, some days being worse than others. It's equally tough to get in the airport business and to date. . . after purchase of large chunk of land for such purpose moving tower and lights from Cedarvale, employing engineer to lay out airport, moving power line doing grading. . . Carrizozo just is not in the airport business.

A New Mexico aeronautical chart new enough to bear Gov. David Cargo's picture, has the Carrizozo airport marked to indicate WITH LIMITED OR NO FACILITIES FOR PUBLIC USE. It would be a near cinch that strangers reading this map would not rely on Carrizozo airport for landing except in emergency.

It's a known fact that planes wanting service (gas-oil) do not stop in Carrizozo because the airport lacks communication facilities. For one reason or another, probably some good reasons, the field has never been lighted or you may say—completed.

This aeronautical chart has another dubious feature—a list of state parks, but the Valley of Fires State Park (near Carrizozo airport) is not included.

This is supposedly a Republican year in Lincoln County where people register Democratic but elect all Republican officials—as Carrizozo Republicans are not doing too good. . . some years you just can't get ahead.

## Sorry About that

This is a week of celebration around the Lincoln County News and we have many things to be proud of. We like our new plant real well, it's comfortable, weather-proof, easy to keep clean and we think—attractive.

New equipment has broadened our field of work so that we rarely have to go out of town to get anything done. Our equipment (not all new) is close to the finest available for work we

are doing, and we can do a high quality of printing.

We have a good staff, loyal and willing to work hard at the business of serving a reading public. We appreciate their efforts every week, and this includes a wife who works harder than any of us because she also has a home to keep up.

With all this new equipment, new methods, new building, bright lights, colorful walls, attractive



sketches, modern in every way—the Lincoln County News is still human, a product of people and we can and will, as the months go by, make regrettable mistakes sorry about that.

The editor has always thought, and still does, that newspaper people should do their best, handling thousands of names and trying to spell each one correct, a million dates and aiming at accuracy, a trillion letters of the alphabet and trying to assort them correctly—then not lose too much sleep when mistakes occur because they will occur in spite

of hell, high water or type lice. We committed three errors of handling last week to get one piece of news in our paper. First this news should have accompanied a picture, second it should have had a headline of some sort, third we didn't intend it to be in the paper at all that week, especially in the place where it landed.

This week we're aware that our news handling can stand improvement and we'll be trying harder. The most we can say is that our average has been real good.



The newspaper business this date is not quite the same as in November 1945 when Pate first started publishing the Bucklin (Kansas) Banner. Can't remember that we had an office gal but our first printer will never be forgotten. Tom did not get along too well with the old Linotype. We'd see him go back to type case and start hand setting type that could have been machine set, and next thing we'd know Tom was across the street at a tavern.

Tom's boy came home from service and we three toasted his arrival with alps from bottle (after working hours). The editor said "Supper time, see you boys in the morning" and went on home. On opening the front door next morning—sure enough he saw both Tom and his boy—they had stayed there drinking all night.

The worst causing we ever got came from female advertising customer. Some little thing we'd done with her ad made this part-time lady and part-time rake mad. 'You stinky SOB, etc. etc.' We were fine friends for years after that, still are.

Got into a genuine row with three school board members and superintendent during those early years. Our position was that the superintendent was doing a damn poor job of keeping school, teachers unhappy, students rebellious—the face-to-face meeting got real violent. It wasn't over a year later that all three school board members decided we'd done them a favor.

One of the few times we were caught shedding real tears was over a goodbye piece written about leaving that first newspaper. There are fine people any place you go and most of them in Carrizozo but the people you grow up and mature with are sort of special. Raised in Grand View Lodge in that town, probably be buried by the same crew. Raised four kids in that town, made a stake to get on in the world, and left no enemies whatsoever. That darned Harry Scheib walked out late one night just as we finished typing the piece.

Tom and Charlie Payton are pretty good boys, now living in Wichita, Kansas and Garderville, Nevada. We thought they ought to get a taste of running a newspaper route, the morning newspaper—carried all the previous day's sports and was real popular. Come 10:00 a.m. and Tom and Charlie were not back from their route, they could finish by 8:00 easy. So, we headed to the south end of town, sure enough there they were. Some-

body's small pig had got out and the route boys stopped in the middle of their work to perform what they considered to be a rescue. There were other things besides pigs to distract route boys but none quite that bad.

Real big news scoops are hard to come by in the weekly newspaper business. One we did get was first pictures of bodies being carried from derailed car where flooding had caused wreck near Meade, Kansas. There were four other newspapers in the area but for some reason we got the message and got there at 80MPH on dark wet night, the only reporter and cameraman on hand.

This small Kansas town got the idea it should have a hospital, so three men and two gals made long trip to Hanover, Kansas in far northeast corner to find out how their hospital was getting along. We spent night at Concordia on way home and plotted how the project should be handled. It went over nicely later doubled in size, and more recently a nursing home has been added — better than industry.

When we first started in the newspaper business it was common for home-town printers to print school annuals, napkins, sales books, and a great many other items that are now handled by specialty printers. The rush from rural community to larger towns was just getting started in the 40's but most small towns had a printing plant where by working the entire family it was possible to make from \$5M to \$8M, total wages for three or four people that is.

The same pride governed letterpress printers as governs offset printers. Some are careless and don't know had had their newspapers are, other's know but don't care. . . a few value craftsmanship. We like to think that we know what is good about a newspaper, both content and appearance—not meaning at all that we do extra good.

Towns and people have a way of fitting themselves together—so do editors and towns. We don't mind giving a bit—we don't belt the shoe wall quite so hard any more—repetitious talk, typical of group meetings, puts a finer edge on our nerves now—our attitude is more of look or wait for the opening to progress then give'er all you've got—there's enjoyment in each day of living and we like living right where we are this minute.

## Can't mass-produce a weekly newspaper!

The term mass media came into common usage during the past two or three decades, generally taken to mean 'conveying information to a great mass of people' as a newspaper or magazine with 5,000,000 circulation might do, or television program with presumed high rating. Wire services which send news world-wide tend to make each daily newspaper read alike -- the best newspapers being the ones which rely much on their own efforts for local-regional news coverage.

Around the Lincoln County News we've been getting experience as a central plant printing three newspapers which is the trend of many types of manufacturing and production these days of soaring costs.

We knew at the start that such a personal piece of reading as a weekly newspaper could not be run off an assembly line like car parts -- and after a year of experience that conviction is reaffirmed.

Actually, all we do is edit one and print three newspapers in Carrizozo. The heart and soul of the Otero County Tribune and Torrance County Citizen are put in at their homes bases in Otero and Torrance County.

The kind of news we originate in these three counties, would hardly do to send world-wide by wire service. It is a hand-tailored personalized job just for the particular area served by these weekly newspapers.

There is no end to the work involved, likewise there is no substitute, no easy way to generate a newspaper full of local news other than a lot of hours on the job.

This situation makes for a live local newspaper if the people will do their job properly. . . It's a kind of thing that will always be done locally, in Carrizozo, in Tularosa, in Estancia, so long as these towns have enough business to support a newspaper. Assembly-line type of news is not for the weekly newspaper.

This steering committee is composed of members elected from each of the soil conservation district boards, together with project sponsors from legal entities or agencies having authority to sponsor project activities.

In Northern New Mexico this type of an organization has been responsible for the successful completion of numerous development projects which have provided employment for hundreds of people in addition to aiding in the preservation and sound use of all natural resources. Technical assistance

will be available from federal agencies in the area. Individuals and organizations with projects and ideas are encouraged to become members of this steering committee. The Dell City group has requested assistance in their project to bring a road from Dell City north into the mountain area which would greatly facilitate travel that now has to go hundreds of miles out of the way to gain access to our recreation areas. Bert Pfingsten of Hondo was elected chairman. Robert Bell of Weed vice-chairman, Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo Secretary-treasurer. Another meeting is scheduled for October 19th with meeting place to be announced later, to adopt by-laws and proceed with accumulating information and data on projects that could be completed and/or expedited through the combined efforts and assistance of this steering committee.

## Complaint filed against SP railroad

The New Mexico State Corporation Commission filed a complaint September 29 with the Interstate Commerce Commission against the discontinuance of passenger train service on the Golden State Limited operated by the Rock Island and the Southern Pacific Railroads. If service is cut off, it would mean the end of rail passenger service in the New Mexico towns of Tucuman, Santa Rosa, Carrizozo, Tularosa and Alamogordo.

The State Corporation Commission maintains that passenger train is actually making money and is not as the railroad contends, running at a loss. They maintain that even the companies' own exhibits show that over 11,000 passengers rode the east and westbound schedules of this train during the month of July, 1967. Using these figures the Corporation Commission further contends that this route is a public convenience and necessity for over 135,000 persons annually.
