Capitan votes sewer project 24th

The Village of Capitan will hold a special election on Tuesday, October 24, to decide whether the board of trustees be authorized to issue revenue bonds in an amount not exceeding \$76,600.00 for the purpose of financing the acquisition and construction of a municipal sanitary sewer system.

The total cost of the project is to be \$120,000.00. Grants of \$12,000 from the Public Health Service and \$32,000 from Farm Home Administration, will make up the difference between bond issue and total cost. Capitan village officials have stated any person who is a registered voter living in the village

limits may vote. There will be no tax assessment to pay revenue bonds and voters do not have to be taxpayers.

The revenue bonds will be paid off by the people who make use of the sewer system in Capitan. Only those people who hook on to the system will be charged a fee.

The polls for the elections will be opened at 8:00 o'clock and be closed at 7:00 p.m. in the city hall at Capitan.

Village of Ruidoso to vote on purchase of Ruidoso Downs

Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd Davis Jr. has given out the information that the Village of Ruidoso is giving serious consideration to the purchase of Ruidoso Downs Race track.

Legal advice is being sought, and the village council may take some action this week, possibly calling for a special election to decide the issue and calling for issuance of revenue bonds.

In discussion with county officials Wednesday the News editor heard several opinions. (1) That the tax money now means a lot to the county and if the race track is ever assessed properly which it will be some day the amount would be even greater. (2) That such business ventures always go better in the hands of private enterprise, political interference can be a hazard. (3) That the Village might well invest an amount like the cost of the race track in a dam to provide more water facilities, the Village is already getting full benefit from the race track.

The news release hit fast, talk is going on today about the

proposition, which is of vital interest to the entire county.

BULLETIN

At a special meeting today the village council adopted an election proclamation for the major proposal which became known Tuesday.

A tentative wording of the election question was released by village officials as follows:

Shall the Village of Ruidoso be authorized to purchase and acquire that certain recreational facility, the leasehold interest relating thereto and all ancillary equipment and facilities located in the Village of Ruidoso Downs and known as 'Ruidoso Downs' with such facility to be used as a municipal utility as defined by law for multiple recreation purposes of the citizens of and visitors to the village of Ruidoso and environs, the purchase price thereof to be paid with the proceeds of revenue bonds of the Village of Ruidoso, secured by and payable solely from the revenue and income received from operations of such recreational facility?"

Freeloaders demand your money

If you grew up in an era when freeloading was a disgrace, it'll be difficult to countenance this: a union of freeloaders demanding your money as one of their rights.

There are 58 "locals" in 31 states with 3,000 to 4,000 dues-paying members. They enlist welfare recipients by promising to "show you how to get more" and to "lobby for more welfare legislation."

Deserving welfare recipients are embarrassed by the sometimes disgraceful demonstrations sponsored by some locals.

Case workers are intimidated by harassment and threats from militant spokesmen for this "union of poor people."

At the recent fundraising convention for the National Welfare Rights Movement in Washington, Director George Wiley described the organization as "representing your people because both its leadership and its membership are your people."

But he did not explain who paid his way to Washington or where the members get the dues which support his organization.

There are goals of these professional parasites which sound outlandish, but which they fully mean to accomplish: free rent, free food, free medicine and a guaranteed annual income for everybody.

And supporting this subsidy for lethargy are several government economists who have always tried to butter poor people on both sides: Leon Keyserling says living above the poverty level should be considered a nationwide universal right.

Walter Reuther wants an immediate 30% increase in all welfare benefits.

As it is, the number of Americans on relief has increased 30% in the past 30 years. In our nation's most prosperous era -- will every metropolitan newspaper bring with ads begging for workers -- relief rolls

continue to increase twice as fast as our population is increasing.

Now 8.2 million are on relief. And while the number of persons on relief has increased 50%, the cost (what you pay) has increased 120%.

Guaranteeing every family \$5,000 a year, as the Keyserlings want to do, would cost you about \$40 billion annually.

What I am about to say may sound like a digression, but I think it pertinent. A Catholic missionary priest, 21 years away from the United States, recently returned from India to Chicago.

He said his mission in India formerly gave food to anyone who asked for it. Then they discovered that the aid program was more fair and more effective when the able natives were required to work for the food: "No work today, no food today."

In this respect, Father Francis Moore thinks he is more enlightened than we are.





Capitan emphasizes sportsman-like driving

Capitan school officials place great emphasis on teaching their students sportsman-like conduct in driving a vehicle. They expect students to learn the mechanics of driving under the instruction of Neil Bergman, but more than that Bergman is teaching correct driver attitude. Mr. Bergman is in his fifth year with the Capitan school system. He graduated from Colorado State College at

Greeley, and Kit Carson high school. He attended special education courses at the University in Denver.

In addition to driver education, Neil teaches industrial arts, and coaches all junior high sports, cross country running to high school athletes, and is wrestling coach.

Wrestling has come in strong in this section of New Mexico the past few years. The Tiger team has been doing well in competition against much larger schools. Coach Bergman had four boys at the state tournament last year, and had three boys in the tournament the year before. Neil was an outstanding wrestler in college.

All sophomore students are required to take driver education at Capitan because that is the age group just preceding a legal driving age. Parents should know that insurance rates are reduced by virtue of their children having taken driver education.

Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer gave Capitan school \$30,000 for the enrichment of their school program -- a new station wagon was purchased with part of this gift. The station wagon is used for driver education, and for school transportation on many occasions.

In the industrial arts program conducted by Neil Bergman they stress mechanical drawing, woodworking, welding, and basic electricity. Most all boys in the Capitan school take at least a year of mechanical drawing, which teaches them to handle numbers and to make plans. A semester of mechanical drawing is taught in both freshman and sophomore years, and coordinated with the science program.

Wrestling is Coach Bergman's first love, but he also likes to hunt and most any outdoor sport. The Bergman family includes three; Neil, Judy and son Aaron.



The Lincoln County News'is in the business of giving service -- in the past year we've had plenty of samples of poor service to spur us on to greater effort.

For instance -- we spent several thousand dollars with an electrician, then could not get him to come back and make minor adjustments, just wasn't worth his time. We're still punching holes in a linoleum covered floor where concrete was poorly filled, those people hurried much too fast to get their money and get out. We still fight the battle of service with people in El Paso who have taken \$700 of our money just for service this after we spent many thousands for their machines, they don't give a damn whether or not their machines run right.

We started doing our own service work on one brand of machines, something that Payton has done for many years, and this has not made us a bit popular with the vendors who

think we ought to pay them to keep their machines running. We waited nine months for service on one type of supplies, a very costly wait. The roof people under contract to Leandro Vega won't come back to finish their job -- Oscar Barnes did it. With the kind of people mentioned above the lesson was -- don't pay in full until the work or installation has proved itself. We prefer to trust people but it hurts at times.

On the other hand we got our money's worth from the heating and air conditioning company Harold Ely works with, the same was true of Jess Garrison who did our carpentry and Oscar Barnes who did our painting. There will always be a place in this working world for people who will give good service and back up their products to the hilt. We have been known to reprint one job twice to get it exactly right -- we like to think we try to give 'service'.

LEGAL NOTICE

Constitutional Amendments to be held on at the Special Election, November 7, 1967, in the State of New Mexico.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #1

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9, SECTION 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW USE OF STATE FUNDS FOR LOANS TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OF THE STATE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Neither the state, nor any county, school district or municipality, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, shall directly or indirectly lend its credit, or make any donation to or in aid of any person, association or public or private corporation, or in aid of any private enterprise for the construction of any railroad, or any other public utility, or for the construction of any canal, or for the care and maintenance of any public building, or for the care and maintenance of any public works, and nothing shall be construed to prohibit the state from creating new job opportunities, decreasing unemployment or improving the state's economy with loans to encourage economic development. Such loans shall only be made in compliance and in accord with the law, and the legislature shall provide for adequate safeguards for the protection of public money for such purpose."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #2

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8, SECTION 4 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT DEPOSIT OF PUBLIC MONIES IN SAVINGS AND LOAN ASSOCIATIONS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 8, Section 4 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Any public officer making any profit out of public moneys or using the same for any purpose not authorized by law, shall be deemed guilty of a felony and shall be punished as provided by law and shall be disqualified to hold public office. All public moneys not invested in interest-bearing securities shall be deposited in national banks in this state, in banks or trust companies incorporated under the laws of the state, or in federal savings and loan associations in this state, or in savings and loan associations incorporated under the laws of this state whose deposits are insured by agency of the United States, and the interest derived therefrom shall be applied in the manner prescribed by law. The conditions of such deposits shall be provided by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #3

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 24 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW LEASES, RESERVING A ROYALTY TO THE STATE, FOR THE DEVELOPMENT AND OPERATION OF GEOTHERMAL STEAM AND WATERS ON LANDS GRANTED OR CONFIRMED TO THE STATE UNDER AN ACT OF CONGRESS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 24 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Leases and other contracts, reserving a royalty to the state, for the development and production of any and all minerals or for the development and operation of geothermal steam and waters on lands granted or confirmed to the state of New Mexico by the act of congress of June 20, 1910, entitled 'An act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the union on an equal footing with the original states', may be made under such provisions relating to the necessity or requirement for or the mode and manner of appraisal, advertisement and competitive bidding, and containing such terms and provisions, as may be provided by act of the legislature; the rentals, royalties and other proceeds therefrom to be applied and conserved in accordance with the provisions of said act of congress for the support or in aid of the common schools, or for the attainment of the respective purposes for which the several grants were made."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #4

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO REPEAL ARTICLE 5, SECTION 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO, AND TO ENACT A NEW ARTICLE 5, SECTION 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO, CREATING A STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT AND REMOVAL OF MEMBERS BY LAW.

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 5 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 14 to read: "There is created the 'Judicial Standards Commission', consisting of two justices or judges and two lawyers selected as may be provided by law to serve for terms of four years, and five citizens, none of whom is a justice, judge or magistrate of any court or licensed to practice law in this state, who shall be appointed by the governor for five-year staggered terms as may be provided by law. If a position on the commission becomes vacant for any reason, the successor shall be selected by the original appointing authority in the same manner as the original appointment was made and shall serve for the remainder of the term vacated. No act of the commission is valid unless concurred in by a majority of its members. The commission shall select one of the members appointed by the governor to serve as chairman. In accordance with this section, any justice, judge or magistrate of any court may be disciplined or removed for willful misconduct in office or willful and persistent failure to perform his duties or habitual intemperance, or he may be retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties which is, or is likely to become, of a permanent character. The commission may, after investigation, it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the discipline, removal or retirement of a justice, judge or magistrate, or the commission may appoint three masters who are justices or judges of courts of record to hear and take evidence in the matter and to report their findings to the commission. After hearing or after considering the report and the findings and report of the masters, if the commission finds good cause, it shall recommend to the supreme court the discipline, removal or retirement of the justice, judge or magistrate. The supreme court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and may permit the introduction of additional evidence, and it shall order the discipline, removal or retirement as it finds just and proper or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for his retirement, any justice, judge or magistrate participating in a statutory retirement program shall be retired with the same rights as if he had retired pursuant to the retirement program. Upon an order for removal, the justice, judge or magistrate shall thereby be removed from office, and his salary shall cease from the date of the order. All papers filed with the commission or its masters, and proceedings before the commission or its masters, are confidential. The filing of papers and giving of testimony before the commission or its masters is privileged in any action for defamation, except that the record filed by the commission in the supreme court continues privileged but, upon its filing, loses its confidential character, and a writing which was privileged prior to its filing with the commission or its masters does not lose its privilege by the filing. The commission shall promulgate regulations establishing procedures for hearings under this section. No justice or judge who is a member of the commission or supreme court shall participate in any proceeding involving his own discipline, removal or retirement. This section is alternative to, and cumulative with, the removal of justices, judges and magistrates by impeachment and the original superintending control of the supreme court."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #5

Section 1. It is proposed to repeal Article 5, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico, and to enact a new Article 5, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read as follows: "There is created a 'state highway commission'. The members of the state highway commission shall be appointed, shall have such power and shall perform such duties as may be provided by law. Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 5, Section 5, of the constitution of New Mexico, state highway commissioners shall only be removed as provided by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #6

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 16 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 5 to read: "In any appeal to the district court from the decision, act or refusal to act of any state executive officer or body in matters relating to water rights, the proceeding upon appeal shall be de novo as cases originally docketed in the district court unless otherwise provided by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #7

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 16 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 5 to read: "In any appeal to the district court from the decision, act or refusal to act of any state executive officer or body in matters relating to water rights, the proceeding upon appeal shall be de novo as cases originally docketed in the district court unless otherwise provided by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #8

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 32 providing for discipline and removal of judicial officers.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #9

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 24 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

The legislature shall enact such laws as will secure the secrecy of the ballot, the purity of elections, and guard against the abuse of elective franchise. Not more than two members of the board of registration, and not more than two judges of election shall belong to the same political party at the time of their appointment."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 32 to read:

"There is created the 'Judicial Standards Commission', consisting of two justices or judges and two lawyers selected as may be provided by law to serve for terms of four years, and five citizens, none of whom is a justice, judge or magistrate of any court or licensed to practice law in this state, who shall be appointed by the governor for five-year staggered terms as may be provided by law. If a position on the commission becomes vacant for any reason, the successor shall be selected by the original appointing authority in the same manner as the original appointment was made and shall serve for the remainder of the term vacated. No act of the commission is valid unless concurred in by a majority of its members. The commission shall select one of the members appointed by the governor to serve as chairman. In accordance with this section, any justice, judge or magistrate of any court may be disciplined or removed for willful misconduct in office or willful and persistent failure to perform his duties or habitual intemperance, or he may be retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties which is, or is likely to become, of a permanent character. The commission may, after investigation, it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the discipline, removal or retirement of a justice, judge or magistrate, or the commission may appoint three masters who are justices or judges of courts of record to hear and take evidence in the matter and to report their findings to the commission. After hearing or after considering the report and the findings and report of the masters, if the commission finds good cause, it shall recommend to the supreme court the discipline, removal or retirement of the justice, judge or magistrate. The supreme court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and may permit the introduction of additional evidence, and it shall order the discipline, removal or retirement as it finds just and proper or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for his retirement, any justice, judge or magistrate participating in a statutory retirement program shall be retired with the same rights as if he had retired pursuant to the retirement program. Upon an order for removal, the justice, judge or magistrate shall thereby be removed from office, and his salary shall cease from the date of the order. All papers filed with the commission or its masters, and proceedings before the commission or its masters, are confidential. The filing of papers and giving of testimony before the commission or its masters is privileged in any action for defamation, except that the record filed by the commission in the supreme court continues privileged but, upon its filing, loses its confidential character, and a writing which was privileged prior to its filing with the commission or its masters does not lose its privilege by the filing. The commission shall promulgate regulations establishing procedures for hearings under this section. No justice or judge who is a member of the commission or supreme court shall participate in any proceeding involving his own discipline, removal or retirement. This section is alternative to, and cumulative with, the removal of justices, judges and magistrates by impeachment and the original superintending control of the supreme court."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #8

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8, SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO RESTRICT VOTING ON ADDITIONAL PROPERTY TAXES OUTSIDE TWENTY MILL LIMITATION TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF TAXING DISTRICT WHO PAID A PROPERTY TAX THEREIN DURING PRECEDING YEAR.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 8, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Taxes levied upon real or personal property for state revenue shall not exceed four mills annually on each dollar of the assessed valuation thereof except for the support of the educational, penal and charitable institutions of the state, payment of the state debt and interest thereon; and the total annual tax levy upon such property for all state purposes exclusive of necessary levies for the state debt shall not exceed ten mills; provided, however, that taxes levied upon real or personal tangible property for all purposes, except special levies on specific classes of property and except necessary levies for public debt, shall not exceed twenty mills annually on each dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, but laws may be passed authorizing additional taxes to be levied outside of such limitation when approved by at least a majority of the qualified electors of the taxing district who paid a property tax therein during the preceding year voting on such proposition."
