## Released time program has choice of activities

An experiment on a small scale in the field of pure education gets underway today at Carrizozo when students in grades seven through twelve take their choice of ten activities for a "released time" period from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Supt. Glen Ellison coming on this new program said that it is being tried on a much broader scale in many schools over the country. No credits will be given, and no grades will be recorded for the released time activities. The entire program is voluntary. Students have the early part of the week to select a released time activity and Thursday morning they commit themselves to the activity of their choice and roster in then made up so that teachers will know how many and what students to expect.

The list of ten released time activities and teachers are listed here:

- Sluggo, Boyce Home Economics for boys, Lawson
- Commerce, Dooley Hand loading, McCollum and Sadler
- Library, Milburn Study Hall, Harris and Laabs Art, Milburn, Hawkins, Percy Math, Lawson, Simpson Mechanics, Means Religion, choice of church Grades 1 through 6 will start a released time program next Tuesday, following much the

same pattern only with more guidance and different program of activities.

All students are expected to carry a full load of school work which is five subjects and one activity in Carrizozo school.

The basic theory of the released time program is to offer the advantage of teaching and subject matter that is extra or in addition to the normal school curriculum. All students get to take their choice of activities offered. Boys going out for athletics report at 4 p.m. after the released time activity is complete.

Jack Mayfield of Capitan, president of Class C Football League in New Mexico, has called a meeting of all Class C schools for 1:00 p.m. Wednesday November 8, in Corona. Coach Lewis Stratton is cooking dinner for the visitors.

Letters were being sent to school officials in Capitan, Cloudercroft, Corona, Dulce, Melrose, Mountainair, Navajo Mission (10 miles west of Farmington), Reserve, Roy, Tatum and Vaughn, Reserve, Mountainair and Navajo Mission are new in the class.

Mayfield said he would be open to all suggestions, that the problem would be convincing all schools that the best suggestions was best. "Don't be surprised at anything that may happen," said Mayfield, "it might be that Class C football teams will have to plan to spend the night on the reservation or elsewhere when they travel a great distance for a game."

## DDD calls charge cut

Reduced rates and a new economy calling period for long distance telephone calls went into effect Wednesday, November 1, Boyd Harper, local manager for Mountain States Telephone said today.

This will be the 22nd major cut in rates since coast-to-coast service was inaugurated in 1915.

The new economy calling period has been established for Direct Distance Dialed (DDD) calls between midnight and 7 a.m. The rate for the first three minutes is 75 cents or less for a call within the continental United States, except Alaska.

The present night and Sunday station-to-station rates will also apply all day Saturday and will be advanced to start at 7 p.m. instead of 8 p.m. on weekdays. A three minute station-to-station call anywhere in the continental United States, except Alaska, during the evening period of 5 to 7 p.m., will be lowered to \$1.25, a reduction of 25 cents.

Some person-to-person rates will also drop. The lower night person-to-person rates will be extended to apply all day Saturday and Sunday instead of from 6 p.m. to 4:30 a.m., Harper concluded.

## Airport lights up to finance board

Carrizozo, along with Albuquerque, Roswell, Las Vegas, Farmington, Tucuman, Clovis, Alamogordo, and Las Cruces, is on a regular air taxi route for delivery of mail to sectional centers.

Carrizozo is the only airport on the route without night light facilities.

Bob White, son of the late Don White of Ruidoso, State aviation director, told the News Monday that the aviation board has approved Carrizozo's application for \$5,000 which has to be approved by the state board of finance meeting November 14.

If the board of finance OK's the \$5,000, it will be used as matching money for federal funds and the sum total be spent equipping the Carrizozo airport with lights.

Mr. White said that the Carrizozo airport with lights should get lots of business and that "An attended airport with fuel" was desirable listing on aviation maps. An attended airport indicated one where fuel is available and someone there to take-care of business. The town council talked about having town employee live at airport when this project was first discussed.

### Racing Association loses \$15,000.00 suit

## Cloudercroft plays champs

The Cloudercroft Bears sort of wrecked the smooth course of selecting a District 2C football champion by beating the Capitan Tigers 35-0 on the Cloudercroft field Friday. The Bear win made a three-way tie between Tatum, Capitan, and Cloudercroft.

No score in the first quarter; then the Bears tallied 14, 14 more in the third, and threw in one more TD in the fourth quarter for a clincher. James Haynes, Robert Cope, Mike Mills and Charles Housinger did the goal crossing for Cloudercroft, and the Bears were running for the extra points in each instance. The election of Cloudercroft was some automatic, not that they didn't earn the right. Roy beat the socks off Tatum this year and did the same to Capitan last year, and the Tigers were hardly in the race after a 35-0 loss to the Bears.

## Eight issues to be resolved Tuesday

New Mexico voters have eight constitutional amendments on the ballot they will be handed at the polls in Lincoln County next Tuesday, November 7.

Short explanations of each amendment follow:

**Amendment No. 1**  
Passage of this amendment would permit the state to make loans to encourage economic development by bringing Economic Development Act into operation. This law creates Economic Development Authority of governor, commissioner of banking and three members appointed by governor.

**Amendment No. 2**  
If passed this amendment would increase number of depositories for public funds to include savings and loan associations.

**Amendment No. 3**  
The News has in the past printed article about geothermal resources. This amendment if passed would put geothermal steam and waters under state control much the same as minerals.

**Amendment No. 4**  
This amendment creates a

highway commission to be appointed by the Legislature, and hands most former commission powers to the Legislature.

**Amendment No. 5**  
If passed this amendment opens up court cases involving water rights so that district courts may hear such cases from the beginning without regard to what may have been said in hearing before state engineer.

**Amendment No. 6**  
Passage of this amendment would create a judicial standards commission and provides that any justice, judge or magistrate of any court may be disciplined or removed.

**Amendment No. 7**  
It states "The legislature may enact laws providing for absentee voting by qualified electors."

**Amendment No. 8**  
Would allow laws to be passed authorizing tax levies in excess of 20 mills only when approved by at least a majority of qualified electors.

# New Mexico's Fall hunting into high gear

Most of southern New Mexico's fall hunting seasons get started in November. Surveys by Department of Game and Fish fieldmen indicate that this will be a banner year for all of New Mexico's game animals.

The first hunt in November will be the sandhill crane. The year's crane season will start on Saturday, November 4, and run through January 2. The bag limit will be two per day, four in possession. At the present time there are about 15,000 cranes on Bitter Lakes National Wildlife Refuge near Roswell. Many other cranes can be found up and down the Pecos Valley. Veteran bird hunters consider the sandhill crane to be one of the

most sporting birds in the United States. Most hunters take the crane over decoys or pass shooting.

On November 11 the south deer hunt will start. The season will run through November 19. This year's bag limit in the south is one fork-antlered buck. Hunters having either-sex validations may take one deer of either-sex in the areas assigned. All of the either-sex validations have already been issued through a public drawing. Pre-season surveys indicate very high deer populations from the Capitan south through the Guadalupe Mountains. Most deer areas are open for

bear and turkey during the November 11-19 season. Consult the Big Game Proclamation for specific areas and information on bear and turkey hunting.

Two other seasons open also on November 11, the central flyway duck and goose seasons. The duck season will run through January 7, while the goose season runs through January 14. The Pecos and Rio Grande Valleys have a fair fall population of ducks and should offer waterfowl hunters some enjoyable shooting. Most of southern New Mexico's goose hunting can be found in the Pecos and Rio Grande Valleys. Normally about 3,000 snowgeese winter in the Arisaca area. The flock has very little hunting

pressure and should provide some good shooting. Geese in the lower Rio Grande are scattered throughout the valley. For more information on waterfowl bag limits contact your local license vendor or the Department of Game and Fish offices in Las Cruces or Roswell.

New Mexico's most liberal quail season in history will start on November 25. Quail hunters will be permitted to take 20 birds per day and have 40 in possession. The season will run through January 7. Southern New Mexico's 1967 quail crop is one of the best in recent years. The liberal bag limit was brought about when Department researchers found that only a

small percent of the fall quail populations was being harvested by hunters. They also determined that weather was the major thing affecting quail population. Both 1966 and 1967 have had ideal weather conditions for a large quail hatch, thus the large population and high limit.

Those hunters wishing to take a crack at pheasant will have the opportunity to lower the old shotgun on cock ringneck and whitewing pheasant on November 25 and 26. For more information on bag limits and areas open to pheasant hunting consult the 1967 Bird Proclamation.

Sheep Deadline Nov. 30  
Hunters wishing to hunt

Barbary sheep during the January 6 through 14 hunt in the Hondo Valley near Roswell have until November 30 to apply for the license. Those interested should apply on form B-1 and have it in the Santa Fe office before 5 p.m. November 30. Hunters who held a Barbary permit for the March, 1967 hunt are not eligible for this hunt.

Thirty public permits will be drawn. The cost is \$20 for residents of New Mexico and \$100 for non-residents.

### Archer Takes No Chances

A hunter participating in a bow hunt during a season limited to bowhunters, was checked in the

field shortly after taking his deer. An arrow was sticking in the back's side, but close examination revealed that the hole had not been made by the arrow. It was made by a .22 caliber firearm. A .22 caliber pistol was found behind a nearby tree.

The hunter admitted that he had had very little experience with bow and arrow and did not want to cripple a deer and let it get away. So he shot it with the pistol and later stuck the arrow in the bullet hole. The judge was greatly impressed with the hunter's humane attitude. He assessed a \$50 fine and costs. All fines go to the school fund of the state.





## Upper Hondo is 1,063,946

The Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD) is a unit of state government. It is organized by the local farmers and ranchers who elect a governing Board of Supervisors to direct a program of soil and water conservation in the area determined to be the district.

When the SWCD signs an agreement with the Federal Government, the Soil Conservation Service is sent in to give technical assistance to the SWCD and its cooperators.

The Upper Hondo SWCD was organized June 27, 1941 by a group of farmers and ranchers who were interested in the future welfare of their district. The present size of the Upper Hondo SWCD is 1,063,946 acres. There has been, to date, a total of 208 farmers and ranchers that have signed a cooperative agreement with the District making themselves eligible for the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service.

The present Board of Supervisors for the Upper Hondo SWCD consist of Bert Pfingsten, Ernest McDaniel, Charlie Jones, and Jack Higgins.

## Do Zozo parents want to support a boys' club?

Antonio DeMarco, who has spent a lifetime training prizefighters and is now devoting his time to guiding young men to a better life, is in Carrizozo this week to find out if there is sufficient interest to warrant starting a boys' club here.

Mr. DeMarco has a certificate of appreciation for outstanding service in support of the boys' club movement, signed by members of the national board, the chairman being Richard Nixon. He has a letter of thanks from James Love, consultant to the president on physical fitness.

During his years as trainer, he worked with 18 world champions, then decided to dedicate the balance of his life to helping boys. Mr. DeMarco is 78 years of age but still gets out each morning to run and exercise.

Eddie O'Brien has offered use of the Nike Hall and is asking people to contact him if they are interested in supporting a boys' club in Carrizozo.

Mr. DeMarco has brought considerable sports equipment with him to Carrizozo, and this equipment may be used by the boys at no cost whatsoever. Mr.

DeMarco does not expect pay for his assistance. Such sports as boxing, wrestling, judo, karate, weight lifting would be taught with professional supervision. Mr. DeMarco stressed the fact that boys in the club would be expected to conduct themselves like gentlemen and good sports, not only in the club but outside as well.

### Cook says administration is coddling the rioters

Schuble Cook, Republican candidate for U. S. Congressman, today charged the Democratic administration in Washington with "coddling the rioters throughout this country."

Speaking at a luncheon of the Otero County Federated Republican Women in Alamogordo Wednesday noon, Cook said, "It is not a pretty sight we have seen in riot torn areas of this country. We have seen so-called citizens turn liberty into license, respect for law into defiant disobedience, and responsible freedom into irresponsible indulgence."

"I went on to say, 'The present administration and its rubber stamp responsibility from this state are taking effectively no action against lawless creeps and hoodlums who kill and loot just for kicks. They have ceased to have vision and have turned the great society into a sick society.'"

In his closing remarks, Cook noted that the methods for curing the big city ills lies not in indiscriminately pouring large sums of tax dollars into these problem areas, but in attempting to alleviate the basic causes of the problem. He felt the slums are not the cause of the unrest, but rather a symptom of the basic problem.





## REA borrowers pay \$3 billion

During the first eight months of 1967, rural electric and telephone systems made payments on their Government loans at the rate of more than \$1 million every working day, and passed the \$3 billion mark in their total payments on loans, the U. S.

Department of Agriculture reported today.

The \$1 million-a-day cash flow into the U. S. Treasury represents the highest level of principal and interest payments in the history of the Rural Electrification Administration's loan program. It is attributed in part to the joint effort of REA with its borrowers to help minimize the net cash demand on the Treasury by making payments on REA loans ahead of due dates.

Interest and principal payments of \$203 million for the 8-month period increased total payments made by REA loan funds they have invested. The payments over the life of the two programs include \$324 million paid ahead of due dates. During the last eight months, this balance of advance payments increased by \$38.2 million, as compared with a reduction of \$4.7 million in the balance during the preceding eight months.

This willingness of the rural electric and telephone systems to step up their payments and help relieve current pressures on the U. S. Treasury serves to emphasize the close working relationship in these two programs of rural people and their Federal Government, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman commented. "Basically, the relationship is a two-way street. Money is loaned by the Government and is returned with interest. The net result is that millions of rural people benefit from the advantages of electric and telephone service.

It is also a tribute to electric cooperatives, which since the beginning of the REA program in 1935 have carried the burden,

with great success, of electrifying Rural America. This has special significance at this time since October is National Co-op Month.

"Electric power and modern communications," he continued, "are essential tools for industrial and recreational development in rural areas. These tools would not be a reality in rural areas today without the dedicated efforts of the men and women who put the REA loan funds to work in tackling a job that many thought was impossible."

"This determination," the Secretary added, "has led to the increasing role of REA borrowers in stimulating economic development vital to rural-urban growth balance. A measure of this growth is the increasing number of commercial and industrial loads served by the rural systems. In calendar year 1966, these loads increased by more than 14,000 over the previous year."

During the 32-year history of REA, electric borrowers have repaid \$1.5 billion in principal as due, paid \$883 million in interest, and banked with the Treasury \$310 million ahead of schedule for a total of \$2.7 billion. This is compared with \$5.4 billion REA has advanced them on loans.

Telephone borrowers, by August 31, had repaid \$145 million on principal as due, paid \$125 million in interest, and banked with the Treasury \$14 million ahead of due dates for a total of \$284 million. This is compared with \$1.2 billion REA has advanced them on telephone loans.

Losses in the rural electric

program total \$44,478-- or eight ten-thousandths of one per cent of the loan funds invested by the borrowers. The losses came about in the 1940's through foreclosures of loans to a power company in North Carolina and to a cooperative in New York.

"There have been no losses in the 18-year-old rural telephone loan program. The agency has financed about 1,100 rural electric systems and 866 rural telephone systems. Together their services reach some 25 million persons in rural areas.




