## Water in courthouse basement

A sweated joint of half-inch copper tubing under the new section of Lincoln County Courthouse came apart some time Tuesday night letting water flood through a tunnel to the low point which is the furnace room under the courthouse annex (old part) filling this room to a depth of 26 1/2 inches, covering ten electric motors, and completely stopping the heating plant for the entire courthouse.

Luciano Gallegos, Carrizozo plumber, found the break after the flooding was discovered by Moises Sambrano, Courthouse janitor at 7:00 a.m. Wednesday. One small sump pump motor was still running while under water but could not handle the amount of water coming into the furnace room. Both of the new boilers had water in them. What damage may have been suffered by the electric motors would be hard to estimate.

About two inches of water spread from the furnace and old coal room, lowest floor levels under the annex, through all the other rooms largely used for document storage. Edward Penfield had only recently moved all district court records, going clear back to territorial days, from the basement to a room in the district court suite.

Quite a number of old files and boxes of documents are still stacked on the floor in

the annex basement and the bottoms of these stacks got wet. Bob Shafer, commissioner chairman, was inspecting the damage at noon Wednesday and Undersheriff Glen Bradley told him they had pumped water for five hours to clear out the basement.


Insurance coverage was being checked Wednesday noon and repair work expected to get under way that same day.

If you still have your Lincoln County News of October 26 around, take another look at the Citizens State Bank advertisement showing Carrizozo Main Street -- the livery stable on left is building where Shafer Feed Store is now, next building burned down about 1928, next an old phone office still standing next to Paden Drug (drug building not in picture), then the old newspaper office at time Haley was editor, then building where Jack Simpson last had his city produce, and two-story building at far right was bank, now Lincoln County Abstract Co. and Masonic Lodge building.

In the bank advertisement of November 2 showing the Parsons Mining Co. Mills, at Parsons, N. M., there is quite a message that only a few old timers can recall -- the hills and valleys of Lincoln County did not have nearly so much cover and growth as they do now, same was true of the plains of Oklahoma, Kansas, and Texas. Prairie and forest fires and no government controls kept the country looking a lot more open as shown in this old Parsons picture.

Would you believe a person who comes up to you and says all four of your tires are gone? Probably no more than Benny Herrera did when Freddie Vega gave him that message. The Herrera car was parked in front of his house when all four tires were stolen -- the robber has been apprehended.

## Council contracts more water

At their regular meeting Tuesday night Carrizozo town council voted to enter into a water agreement with Bryce and Cleo Dugger for use of water from well located on Sec. 13, Township 75, Range 10 East. Water will be pumped from 145 foot level by electricity with equipment now in place at the well. Price to be paid is \$200 per month or \$4 2/3 per thousand gallons, whichever is the greater amount. Water could be used only in summer months and be a good proposition for the town, was the opinion of councilmen.

Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Willos Hill, was present at the meeting to ask for funds for his department. After considerable wrangling, it was agreed that Hill would put his request in writing for presentation at the next meeting and that the town would do its best to honor the request.

Hill pointed out that all other towns of the state have some basis of putting money in the fire department, usually as a clothing allowance. Hill said that Corona firemen received \$1.50 per call, Vaughn firemen \$2.00, and Tucumcari firemen received \$4.00 per call.

The fire department chief said that the department was down in membership now, with only six or seven volunteers that could be counted on. The annual Christmas party for youngsters put on by the fire department cost \$170 last year, which takes all the department surplus, including money the department earns from fund-raising activities.

Ralph Baroz, substitute town marshal (on duty Friday nights), asked that the town pay his uniform cleaning bill. The council agreed to two clean jobs per month if needed. Baroz told the council that it did not look good for him to be taking bond money from motorists who have received citations -- necessary when the local Justice of Peace is not available. The council agreed that some other method should be found to handle this situation and will ask JP Friday Sherrill to be present for discussion at the next meeting.

Paul Payton brought up the subject of traveler being given citation for making U-turn and this motorist going to Elfred Jones with protest. Jones told the man (who was real mad) that he best pay the fine as the easiest and cheapest way out.

Payton told the council that the marshal should be asked to desist from giving citations for making U-turns until signs can be put up. Councilman Buster Smoot said there used to be one "No U-Turn" sign along US 54 on Central, but there were none now. Town ordinance prohibits making a U-turn, with no certainty on how the ordinance reads.

Discussion of the fourth fire at Florida's place concluded when Mayor Vega told the council that the sheriff was doing something about that hazard.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Leonardo Vega, Councilmen Vernon Peity, Fred Chavez (appointed July 5 to fill Chevo Baca's seat), Buster Smoot, H. Elfred Jones, Nellie Lee Baker, Willos Hill, Ralph Baroz, and Paul Payton. Joe Ventura was absent, due to the death of his half-brother, Speedy Jauregui.

## Aid Stations To Be Established

The Chavez County Chapter of American-Red Cross would like to set up First Aid Stations in Lincoln County during the two weekends of hunting season. This would fall on the 11th and 12th and again on the 18th and 19th.

## No majority in Mora Co.

Mora County was the only county in the state that failed to get out a two-thirds majority in favor of Constitutional Amendment No. 7, to allow absentee voting, and this amendment failed to carry in the Tuesday voting.

Amendment No. 1 to allow use of state funds for loans to aid economic development was voted down in Lincoln County as well as state wide.

Six of the eight amendments did carry state wide with unofficial AP returns as follows:

- No. 2 Deposit public moneys For 34,190 Against 18,173
- No. 3 Geothermal control For 37,232 Against 14,179
- No. 4 Highway commission For 27,790 Against 24,494
- No. 5 Water rights for 31,181 Against 18,927
- No. 6 Judicial discipline For 39,049 Against 11,068
- No. 7 Absentee voting For 41,435 Against 9,244
- No. 8 Property taxes For 37,424 Against 13,318


