FOUR POINTS CARRIED OUT WOULD BE BIG HELP FOR LINCOLN COUNTY STUDENTS

Education gets positive routing

All schools of Lincoln County had representatives at the conference held in Carrizozo November 15-16 with Mr. Rowan Stutz, director of Western States Small Schools projects under a Ford Foundation grant, as director and speaker.

A four point program was discussed and posed as a plan to make the most of education for each youngster in our school system:

1. Preparation for college entrance.
2. Preparation for technical training.
3. Preparation for obtaining a job.
4. Preparation for seeking a job.

The number of students planning to go to college will vary a lot from year to year, 30 per cent some years, and maybe as many as 70 per cent the next year will plan for college, averaging out maybe 40 per cent from year to year.

A big problem in any school is preparing students who indicate they intend to go or want to go to college -- well enough so they can stick. Now about 50 per cent of all students in college flunk out or drop out by their third year, which is a financial loss to parents and a setback to youngsters.

In some instances, by means of grading and guidance, the student (and parent) need to get

the message that college is not the right direction -- but this is not a hard and fast rule. It is the duty of the school to attempt to show the college-bound students how good a record they will need in high school in order to pass in college.

Preparing a student for technical training could span the full range from doing auto service to computer programming. The number of jobs requiring technical skills may not be increasing but the abilities required to handle the best paying technical jobs take more learning now than a few years back. Lincoln County teachers want to make a trip to Roswell to see the new technical branch

of Eastern University at work. Vocational training has been a "talked about" function of high school teaching for many years, but it is expected that more emphasis will be put on this field -- especially for the youngsters, who indicate they will not go to college.

This situation exists in Lincoln County -- where ten or more young people from each graduating class will not get jobs, will not go into Armed Forces, with result that they loaf around town. In a few instances the youngsters become adults and are never gainfully employed.

A part of education in the future will be preparing students for seeking jobs. Let's presume that

all high school graduates have much the same skills, then those who know best how to obtain a job, will wind up being gainfully employed.

A part of preparing a student to seek a job is to acquaint them with what is going on out in the world. School people in small towns use the phrase "out migration" which means that grads from the small school have to go to the large town to seek work, and this is generally true; living in Carrizozo, where people know each other pretty well, is a lot different from living in Amarillo, Denver, or Chicago where you probably won't know your next-door neighbor.

There will be a portion of many graduating classes who will find it difficult to get a job, either because they are not prepared or do not care. These youngsters will be out of work during periods of their life. A school can prepare them in some measure for the possibility that work will be scarce or part-time at best. Many foreign countries have for years followed an apprentice program where youngsters at age 14 start on-the-job training with reasonable assurance that they will have a job when their apprenticeship is complete. In this country, the thinking has been to keep them in school until they are 18-year-olds, then kick them out in the world to shift for themselves.

Lincoln County school people think there is a better way. The two-day conference last week in Carrizozo was a refreshing approach to old problems and education in Lincoln County should follow some new routes in the future -- all planned to help our young people find a place in this world.

Leota has interest in youngsters

Mrs. Leota Pfingsten, teacher in the Capitan school system, has always had a special interest in young children. As a result she has chosen to teach primary grades for the last fifteen years. Mrs. Pfingsten is a graduate of New Mexico Western University. She holds a B.S. degree in Education with minors in English, psychology, social science, art, and music.

She is an individual with well-rounded interests, noted for her resourcefulness and efficiency. Her judgment is respected and her services are sought in many areas. Mrs. Pfingsten is an original thinker. She devised her own phonics method of teaching reading long before it became an established practice in basic reading systems. She uses many visual aids, commercial and original, and strives to improve the quality of her teaching by travel, new ideas, and courses in improved methods of teaching.

Mrs. Pfingsten puts her "whole self" into anything she undertakes, whether it is a large or small task, and radiates enthusiasm, interest and deep concern for whatever is at hand. She is a sincere, conscientious and dedicated educator who finds time to do well any task she accepts, and she accepts many important undertakings at the same time.

That Mrs. Pfingsten is a success in her chosen field has been proven by many of her former students returning to express their thanks for her understanding, encouragement, and discipline with which she forced them to think and achieve goals which they felt were beyond their reach.

Mrs. Pfingsten was chosen by the Capitan Women's Club as their candidate for "Teacher of the Year" in 1958 and was again candidate chosen by the Capitan Teachers Association in 1967. She served on the Executive board of S.E.N.M.E.A. from 1965 to 1967.

Mrs. Pfingsten is a member of Beta Nu Chapter of Zeta Tau Alpha, Eta Chapter of Alpha Delta

Kappa (International honorary teachers sorority of which she is now state president). She is a member of NEA, NMEA, CTA, Friends of Lincoln County Museum, president of President's Advisory Committee for ADK, and a member of the PEO sisterhood.

When asked her philosophy of education, Mrs. Pfingsten replied: After years of study in the field of education and fifteen years of teaching children in the elementary grades, I am convinced that the philosophy of education which I attempt to practice can be stated in the following paragraphs.

Each child should have an inherent right to develop according to his ability. He has a right to expect from society an environment that will contribute to his well being, and even as a small child he should be trained to realize that he is able to improve the environment. The home should give him many of the experiences and materials that will supply him with physical needs. What the home fails to give must be supplied by the school, the community organizations, and civic groups.

The family life should give the child the satisfaction that comes from being loved, wanted, and respected. It should instill the feeling of security and the joy of successful endeavor in patterns set for him. The school should continue in this respect what the home has begun; or, if the home has failed, then the school will need to supply many more experiences with these (Continued on page 2)



purposes in view. Life should be a joyous experience wherein we enjoy freedom but accept the responsibilities that go with the freedom of a democratic people.

Education should train one so he will be able to maintain economic security but not place excessive value on materialistic things. Along with the development of skills in intellectual growth, there must be accepted emotional controls, and a spiritual life that keeps one in harmony with the better way of life.

With the learning experiences of plan for second graders, both academic and social, he will not be one-sided in his interests and growth. He will live a more serene life and have fewer stresses and tensions to combat. It is not so much what one learns, but the use that the learner makes of it in helping him adjust to the social order, that is important from the viewpoint of a curriculum builder.

Every child is born with the power to create. Self-expression can come from the child at any age if he is stimulated to feel the urge to give it utterance.

The law of life is toward expression. The plant expresses itself in bud, flower and seed; the animal in offspring. Man, alone, may express himself in ideas, and in proportion to his ability to give such expression to his ideas he finds satisfaction in life.

Every child enjoys exercising his natural impulses to create through investigation and communication. The teacher with an insight to the needs of the child will accept the theory of growth through self-expression and self-activity. If I can stimulate a child in some way to see the world about him -- things, people, events -- freshly and clearly, I will help enrich every day of his life and create a thirst for learning.

All of us are looking for yet another way of helping the child expand and grow. He comes to us with needs, interests, and enthusiasms and looks to us for assistance in realizing their fulfillment. We, in turn, want to do all we can to help him realize his potential. This is why the new teaching trends and improvements in elementary materials are so exciting. Here in Capitan we are constantly trying new methods of instruction and new aids to teaching. Some have been very good and we have added them to our system. Some we find less effective we replace.

This year we are using the Science Reading Associates series from grades 2 through 9. This is in addition to our regular reading program. If there is any one subject emphasized as much or more than reading in our school, I would say it is phonics. We have a very strong program in phonics as all of our primary teachers believe phonics to be the key to reading, spelling, and ultimately to the whole curriculum.







 He says again: 'Good fences make good neighbors'







Diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, measles occur in state

"We are still trying to get some of the school children immunized who should have done this before the school year started," Dr. G. K. Fair, District Health Officer for Lincoln County stated today.

"While immunizations against tetanus, diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, and smallpox are required for attending school, it is hoped that children will also be protected against measles. This dangerous disease spreads, mainly, thru school systems. The measles season is about here."

In New Mexico, cases of diphtheria, whooping cough, and polio have been reported in recent years. Measles is also fairly common, claiming the lives of several children in the state each year. Many others suffer complications that leave them damaged permanently. Encephalitis, or "brain fever", may cause retardation or personality disorders, others are left blind or deaf. Pneumonia due to measles is especially deadly to infants.

Dr. Fair said that parents should contact their regular doctors to be sure all their

children have had these inoculations. After the initial immunizations, regular booster schedules should be kept throughout a lifetime since immunity "wears out" in time.
