

THE KID'S FIRST ESCAPE

The story of the dramatic last escape of Billy the Kid from the jail in the Lincoln County Courthouse in 1881 has been written many times; the earlier escape of The Kid from the pit *carcel* in Lincolntown is not so well known. The pit *carcel* was built in 1877 by George W. Peppin, a local contractor, who later became sheriff. From all that can be gathered it was a hole in the ground measuring 10 feet by 20 feet and lined with cedar logs. The jailer's house was built of stone and adobe, same size, over the pit and divided into two rooms. The only entrance to the pit was through a trap-

door in the floor of one of the rooms. This made a dark, airless and near escape-proof cell.

Billy was 18 years old at the time he was jailed as a result of an argument with the cattle baron, John Chisum. His escape was made with the help of friends who, one dark night, rode over the mountain trail from San Patricio.

"Open the jail or we will kill you," yelled one of the riders.

The horsemen leveled their guns at the jailer who unlocked the trap door and allowed Billy to come out. (Continued on page 4)

Carrizozo Lions Club summarized their activities of past year, total of \$387.00 given to help community things. Natural gas lines were run to Nogal fire department, first to be approved on the Capitan-Carrizozo system.

At Capitan, Paul Jones, John Schuster and Herbert Traylor for election on February 7. News of January 19 plagued with classic, division of "classroom" reports Pale.

From Sixth Grade Dispatch, we are sorry to hear that Charilo Knoblock, a hamster, passed away the night of January 27 after many happy days. Carrizozo will add 5200 feet of new sewer line. Glen Bradley resigns, will be candidate for Lincoln sheriff

The decks are being cleared for a primary election contest between two Republicans seeking office of sheriff in Lincoln County with resignation of Deputy Sheriff Glen Bradley, effective January 1. Bradley first came to Lincoln County January 1 of 1937 and worked as foreman for the Titworth Co. for 12 years managing what was then the largest apple orchard in the state, located in the Hondo Valley.

He won election to office of Lincoln County Sheriff in 1952 and served four years. Following this public service, Mr. Bradley was elected to the legislature, served during the 57th session and was minority floor leader during the 59th session.

Glen Bradley was again elected as Lincoln County Sheriff in 1961 and employed Leandro Vega Jr. as his deputy during the following four years. Bradley supported Vega in his run for sheriff in 1964 and has served as deputy during the past three years with Leandro Vega as sheriff. Bradley made his intentions known early this year that he would seek election as sheriff and would file for this office July 1, 1968. When Ernest Sanchez, also

a deputy sheriff under Vega, announced that he was a candidate for sheriff, that made one too many deputy candidates and Bradley's verbal resignation was the result.

Mr. Bradley will maintain his home in Carrizozo but will start working for Bert Pfingsten at his orchards in the Hondo Valley after the first of the year. Mrs. Bradley will continue as cook for Lincoln County prisoners until January 1.



Billy mounted and off they rode, back up the trail to San Patricio. The jailer sounded the alarm but none of the townspeople cared to saddle up and go chasing a gang of fast-shooting, hard-riding desperadoes in the dark. There is no record of his being caught and put back in jail at this time.

The pit was used for only a short time as the town jail. Many of the citizens felt it was a deathtrap because it was below the level of the acequia and in a heavy rain would flood. The jail was re-located in the Murphy-Dolan Store, the place from which Billy made his more famous escape.

This account of Billy's escape from the old pit carcel is based on a tape recorded interview with Mrs. Amelia Church nee Bolton who, as a little girl, lived in a house across the road and about 200 yards from the jail. (From Robert N. Mullins' "A Chronology of the Lincoln County War.")

The old pit carcel is gone — no trace left — only a small State historical marker points out the place where it once stood. ●

JUDGE EDWARD TRIVIZ ON BENCH IN CARRIZOZO

In the case of State of New Mexico vs. Juan Henry Sanchez for aggravated burglary being held December 26 before Judge E. Triviz of Las Cruces in the Carrizozo Court House, Sanchez was found guilty only of burglary and was sentenced to not less than one nor more than five years in the State Penitentiary. Attorney H. Elfred Jones was appointed by the court to represent Sanchez. State of New Mexico vs. Cosme Montoya Jr., also known as Johnny Montoya or Juan Benavides Montoya of Ruidoso Downs. He appeared before Judge Triviz on December 26 and entered a plea of guilty to involuntary man slaughter and sentenced from one to five years in the State Penitentiary. Montoya was represented by the court-appointed lawyer, Charles Durrett of Alamogordo.

Concerning the same crime, Melton Sanchez Jr. was charged with tampering with evidence. Sanchez and Montoya entered their pleas of guilty on December 5 and Triviz requested a presentence report before sentencing them on December 28. Sanchez withdrew his plea of guilty and requested a trial by jury, which trial is to be set at a later date by Judge Triviz.

The trial concerns the murder of Earl Southern of Ruidoso Downs on October 5 of this year in Ruidoso Downs.

operation, financial risks involved and requirements of capital, technical skill, and management ability. Farms are getting larger, more specialized, and capital requirements per farm are growing. Both technology and economics are responsible for the increases in farm size and capital investment. Technology makes it possible for the farmer to enlarge his operation, and economics makes it necessary.

This big switch has changed the emphasis on qualifications needed by a successful farm or ranch operator. It's placing a premium on management and record keeping. Use of modern methods calls for a high degree of technical knowledge and skill. The successful handling of large capital investments in the face of rising production costs, uncertain product prices and weather conditions, and other risks requires expert business and financial management. This has eliminated any guessing.

Farmers of today must have facts upon which to base decisions. They can no longer continue to guess about their business affairs. Only accurately kept farm records will furnish the information needed to make sound management decisions and help the individual survive in an increasingly competitive agricultural world.

"Trunk Deeds" are one of the big problems in obtaining a clear or marketable land title in some areas of Lincoln County. The practice of early settlers of keeping the deed in a trunk in the family home gave rise to this term. In the trunk it was often lost or destroyed by fire or flood. The deed was never recorded in the county courthouse.

A broken chain of title is the result of an unrecorded deed. Unless ownership can be proven

Roundup

Dates of two livestock events at New Mexico State University were announced today. The Livestock Feeder's Day Program will be held Feb. 26, and the Cattle Grower's Short Course will follow on Feb. 27-28.

Feeder's Day will highlight the latest experimental work on ration and management practices in the feedlot. The Short Course will feature current information on management practices to improve livestock produced on the range.

The theme of the Cattle Grower's Short Course this year, Producing for the Feeder and Packer, will help to focus attention on this aspect of cattle production in New Mexico.

Farmers and ranchers that have purchased machinery and other equipment during the last year may be eligible for investment credit. The investment credit provision was suspended Oct. 10, 1966, through March 9, 1967.

Qualified investments after that period may be eligible for a maximum of seven percent reduction in the taxpayer's liability. To receive maximum credit, the eligible property must be held not less than eight years. Property with a useful life, as

much as four years, will qualify for a lesser credit.

Further information on this and other provisions of income tax regulations are available in the 1968 Farmer's Tax Guide. Copies are available at the county agent's office in Carrizozo.

If ever there were a time when farming operations in Lincoln County could be carried out with hit-or-miss guessing, that day has passed from the scene. Farming in New Mexico, as in all parts of the nation, has dramatically developed into a highly scientific business operation.

The commercial family farm today is a business venture comparable to that of many business firms in the city in size of
