Enrollment up to 450 at Zozo

Patrons of Carrizozo school district will have the opportunity to vote January 16 on the construction of school facilities. Following information tells some of the story of need for such construction.

In 1964, Carrizozo school had a staff of 22 people, in 1968 the staff is 28. During the same period, enrollment has increased from 350 students to 450.

According to Carrizozo school people, the last construction project -- Clegg Hall -- was built to accommodate a music department, home economics, cafeteria, library, science and art lab, and one straight classroom. No expansion of grade school was included in this building.

The Carrizozo grade school is carrying the increased attendance now. In the 1965-66 school year grade enrollment was 169, at this writing the enrollment in Zozo grade school is 269. The grade office has been changed into a classroom and one class has been moved to the high school. Rest room facilities in the grade building are not up to the increased load.

This time of year the grade school in Carrizozo would make good use of a multi-purpose room if such were available. A materials center is also needed. The proposed construction would tell these needs, as well as allow for some overflow of space needs from the high school.

Franklin Pierce College directors study proposal

Paul Wrye called President Frank DiPietro of Franklin Pierce College in Rindge, New Hampshire Tuesday and found that Pres. DiPietro has prepared a preliminary proposal which he is sending to Mr. Wrye, one that will be presented to college directors on January 28. The outcome of Franklin Pierce College locating in New Mexico is up to the directors. The college has retained a Roswell lawyer as its New Mexico representative.

District Make-it-with-wool contest to be held January 6

Girls and ladies interested in the "Make It With Wool Contest" should contact fabric shops, home extension offices and home economics departments for entry forms and information. Any girl 10 years of age and older is eligible. In order for contestants to be invited to the free classes in modeling, they must send the application in real soon.

District 8 consists of Chaves and Lincoln Counties. Garments must be made by the person entering. It must be made of 100% wool or fibers accepted as wool, such as mohair, cashmere and camel. This allows 5% (no more) for other fibers. The wool must be loomed, knitted or felted in America.

People entering must read the entry form carefully and follow rules as suggested.

In addition to awards, much value is derived by all contestants. They cultivate sportsmanship, reality for learning to win or lose gracefully. They develop self-assurance through lessons in grooming and posture, and give girls individual confidence in the presence of others. The contestants receive encouragement of higher learning

through college scholarships. They experience the pleasure of creative talents to plan, select and make a beautiful garment and save money over the cost of buying one. They learn about fabrics and fashion which enables them to become a wiser buyer later.

After entry forms are mailed in, the contestants will receive information regarding plans for the day. The contest will be held January 6, 1968, at Goddard High School.

New Mexico had the national winner last January, Margaret Rockhold. She enjoyed a trip to Europe and received a set of luggage. Girls entering this contest should keep in mind to make a garment of new high fashion fabric, and use the newest fashion in patterns. The important feature is to have a garment of high fashion, colorful and youthful. This contest has been approved by the National Association of Principals of Secondary Schools for more than ten years as an educational project. It promotes the use of American loomed wool, one of New Mexico's industries. Fabric shops benefit from the contest, but the contestant derives more than anyone else.

Gas Ass'n. Meets Today

The board of directors of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Ass'n. will meet at 12:30 noon January 4 at the Lincoln County Motors in Carrizozo. This meeting is open to the public.

A meeting is scheduled for January 16th and 17th for the purpose of conducting an appraisal of the potential for future outdoor recreation development in Lincoln County. The appraisal is designed to provide a systematic approach to resource programming and planning by Soil Conservation Districts, Counties, Development Groups and Agencies working in the County. The appraisal will be based on group judgment using a format whereby different phases of the resource are ranked according to their value in Lincoln County. The value of the appraisal will rest heavily on the information provided by those present.

Increased postage rates go in effect January 7 in Zozo

A nation-wide increase in postage rates become effective Sunday, January 7, 1968, which will make most letters -- to or from home -- cost at least 8¢ each.

The post office operates on a cost-per-ounce basis and any questions you may have can best be answered by Postmaster Roy Harman, who is well-informed on these changes.

Postage on first class letters will be 6¢ per ounce or fraction thereof.

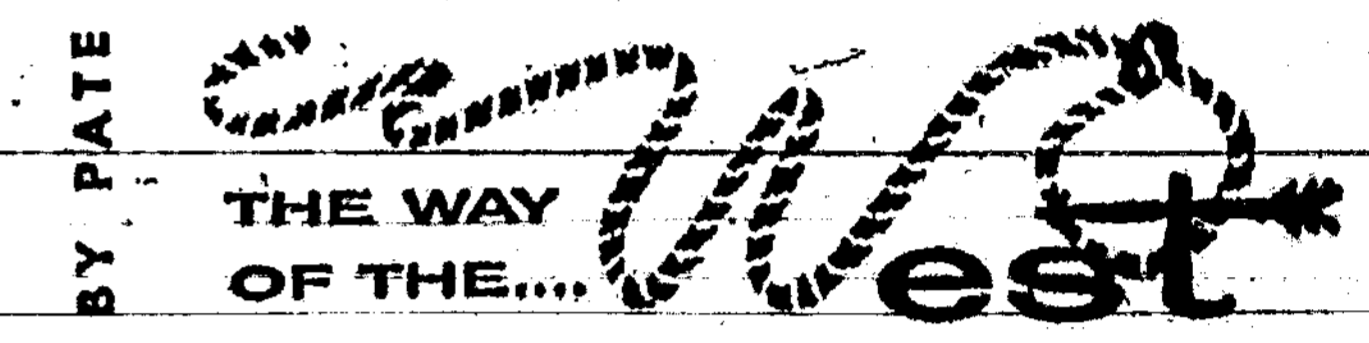
Postal and post cards will cost 5¢ each. Airmail postal cards cost 8¢ each.

A change, which will affect

every post office in Lincoln County, is the discontinuance of the "drop letter" rate which has been used at offices not having city delivery. The new rate schedule provides that letters mailed locally will also cost 6¢.

Second class rates, like mailing an advertising folder, brochure, etc., are 5¢ per piece for 2 ounces or less, 1¢ for each additional ounce. If the Lincoln County News were mailed in bags, as we use for out-of-state mailing, the cost per each would be 8¢.

Third class mail, like greeting cards, will cost 6¢ for the first two ounces and 2¢ for each additional ounce.

Nazarenes gain in 1967

The Church of the Nazarene in 1967 had notable gains in membership, stewardship and in Sunday school enrollment. Also in 1967, participation in the war in Vietnam made its sharpest impact on the denomination. It was reported this week at church world offices in Kansas City, Mo. World membership climbed to a total of 453,187 persons — a net gain of 20,470 over a year ago. Sunday school enrollment increased to 983,525 — a gain of 57,000 over 1966.

Per capita giving was a record \$190.13 — an increase of \$10.43 above the previous peak of \$179.70 in 1966.

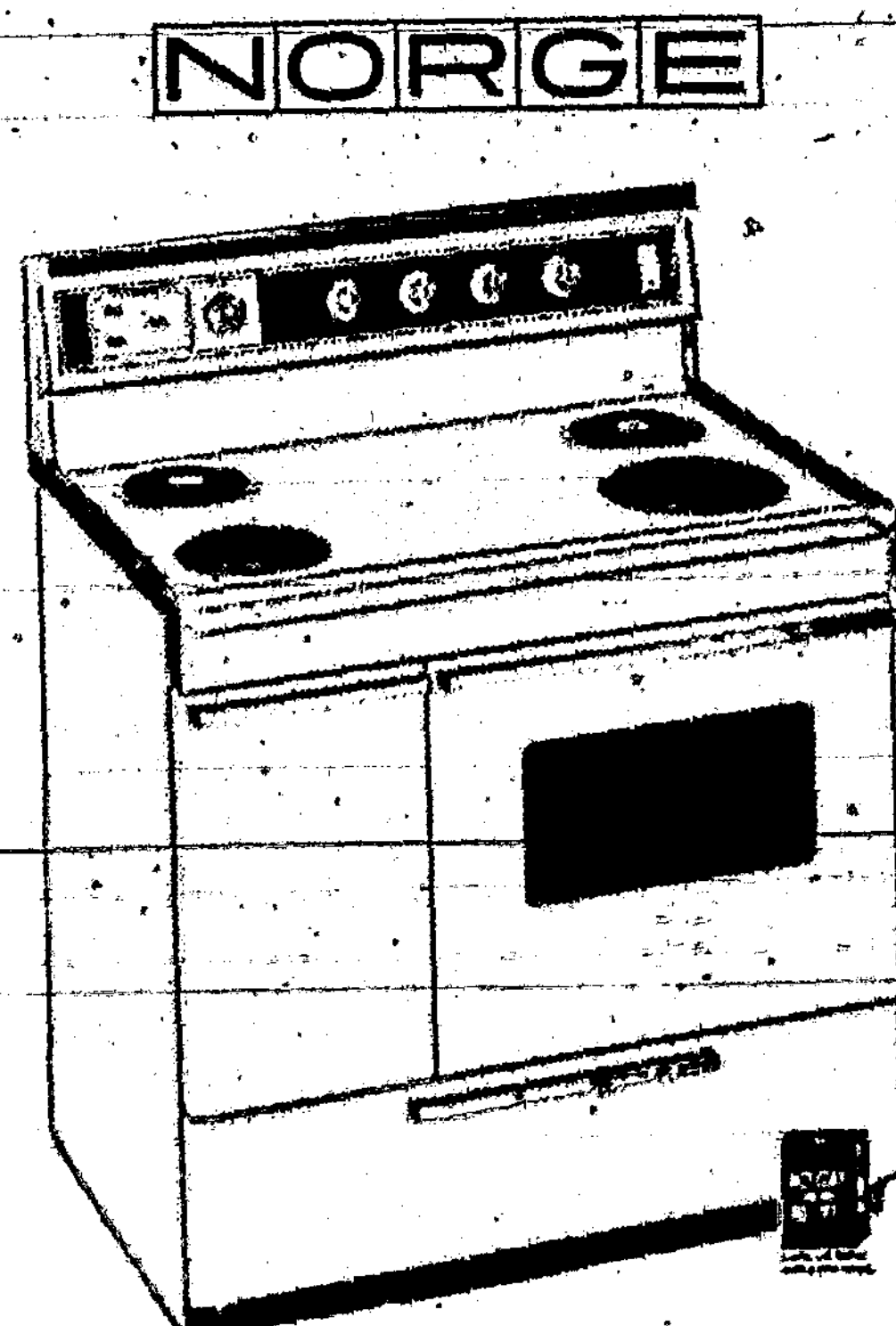
Giving for all purposes reached \$69,792,571 — an increase of \$4,897,102 over 1966.

Mirroring the war impact, the names of seven Nazarenes killed in Vietnam were added to the War Memorial plaque in 1967. This made a total of 16 gold stars on the Vietnam roll. More than 8,000 Nazarene young men in the Armed Forces in 1967.

It appeared likely that the denomination would achieve its goal of one million persons enrolled in Sunday school by the 17th quadrennial General Assembly to be held in June, 1968, at Kansas City, Mo.

The Nazarenes had a net gain of 32 churches which brought the denomination's total to 4,958.

The stewardship gain very likely assures the Nazarene Church of remaining in first place in the nation in per capita giving among all denominations with 100,000 or more members.

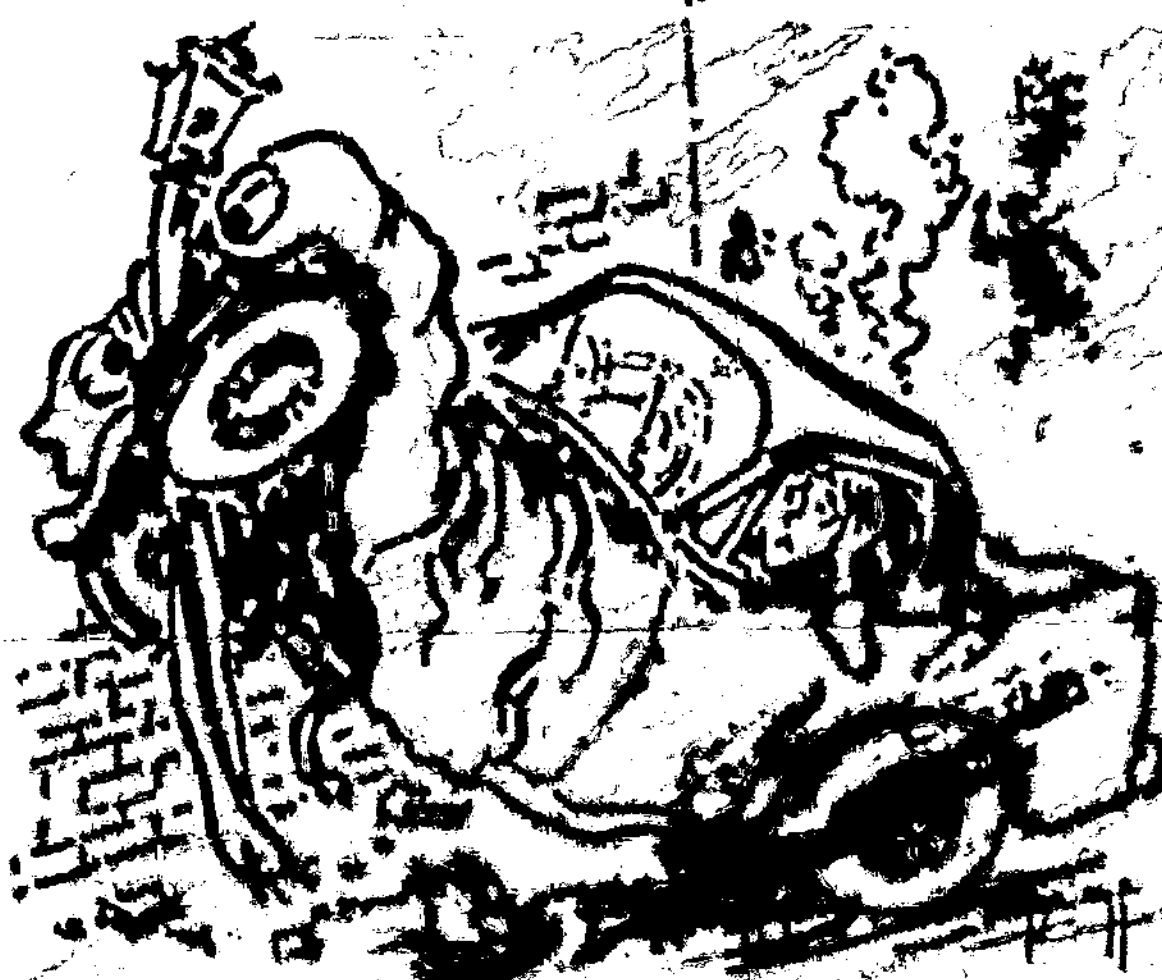

Eugene R. Chavez rescues injured gunner from copter

Pfc. Eugene R. Chavez, son of the late Manuel V. Chavez of Carrizozo, now stationed south of DaNang in Vietnam, was awarded the Soldier's Medal with citation as follows:

Pvt. Chavez was working in his battery position when an armed helicopter crashed and burst into flames 500 meters from the battery area. Pvt. Chavez immediately got into a truck and rushed to the crash scene.

Upon his arrival, he noticed that the door gunner was still trapped in the blazing copter. Disregarding his personal safety he battled his way through the flames with ammunition and rockets exploding all around him. Pvt. Chavez remained at the injured door gunner's side, steadying him while other personnel lowered the individual from the blazing craft.

Demonstrating courage, determination and devotion to duty of the highest order, Pvt. Chavez without hesitation placed the life of a fellow soldier above his own. Pvt. Chavez's actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army, by direction of the President,

and signed by George S. Blanchard, Brigadier General, USA Chief of Staff.

According to his mother, Rock Chavez, Pvt. Chavez is now in Hawaii on his six-day respite and will return to DaNang the 6th of January.

We will use pictures "the second time around" but we want the picture to be a new and different shot of the subject. We will print news that has already appeared in some other newspaper, but we want to be able to fill out the story, add more details so that our readers get a news story worth their reading time.

Being small, we try harder!

It's hard to please all readers all the time, but we do try, mainly by confining our writing and pictures to the doings of people you know. We do insist that our local reporters "run the book" each month so that everyone within phone distance knows we are interested in what they are doing.

It is a great pleasure for us to hear from you about what you like (or don't like) in your hometown newspaper.

The guidelines as set down here are not hard and fast but we'll follow them most of the way as the only means of sending you the "complete message" about your home community.
