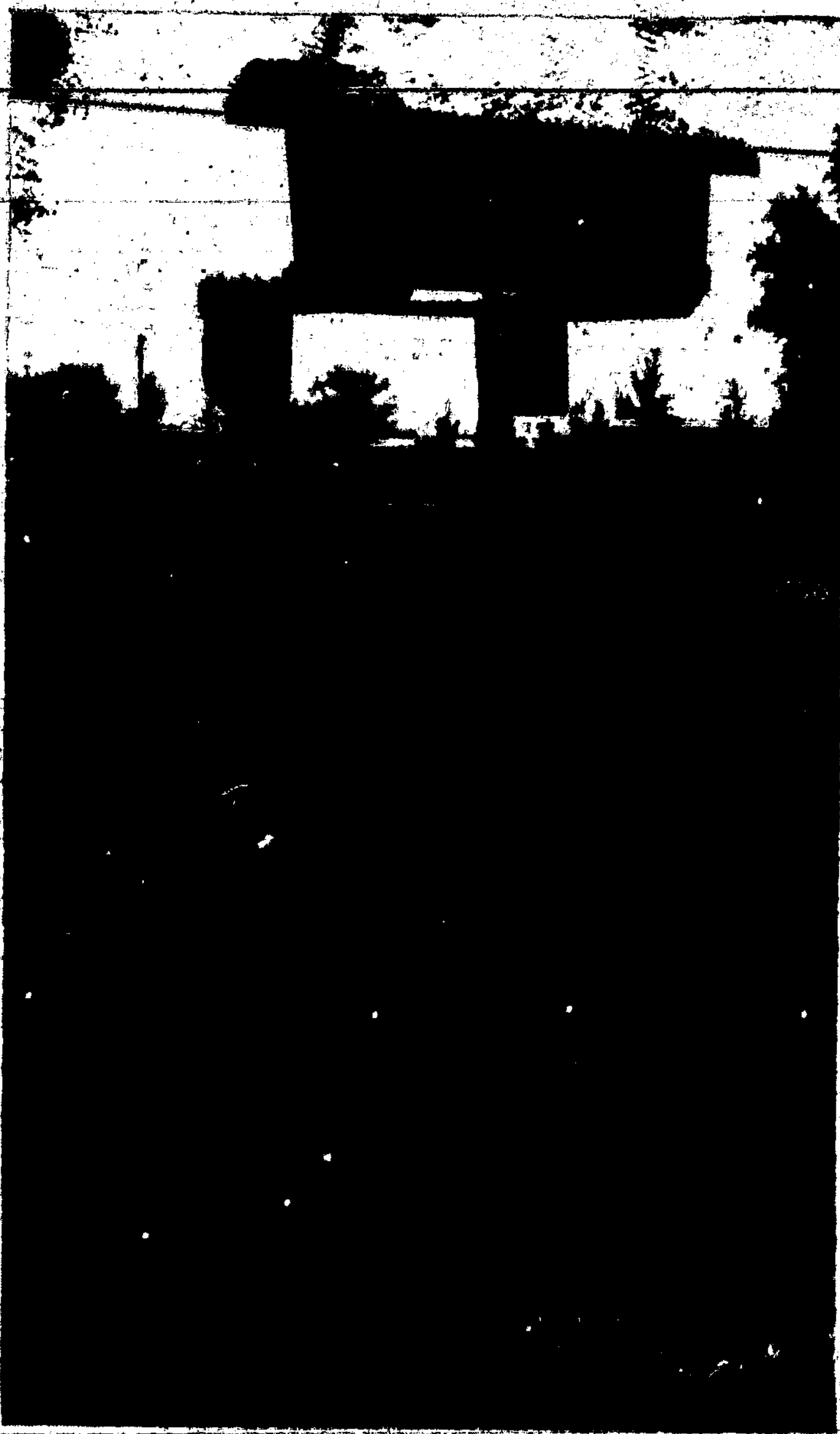

School vote goes two-to-one for

A total of 181 votes were cast Tuesday in the election to decide on a \$150,000 bond issue for purpose of enlarging Carrizozo grade school. The vote was 128 "for" the issue, 50 "against", three ballots spoiled and one void.

"Dutch" Reil honored by Oldsmobile

Lansing, Michigan, in recognition of his more than 25 years as an Oldsmobile dealer; Mr. Vincent Reil has been presented with a special commemorative plaque by Oldsmobile Division of General Motors Corporation. It was 35 years ago, in October, 1967, that Mr. Reil first became associated with Oldsmobile as a dealer.

The presentation was made by Oldsmobile's Dallas Zone Manager, R. L. Hummel, who explained that Mr. Reil is one of 570 Oldsmobile dealers across the country to be so recognized. "Oldsmobile is presenting these commemorative plaques to its 25 year dealers as a further part of the division's 70th anniversary which we marked officially on August 21," Mr. Hummel said.

Around 35,000 cars sold in more than 50 years in business

Tribute is being paid to Vincent "Dutch" Reil this week by the General Motors Oldsmobile Division for his 25 years as Oldsmobile dealer. A great many Lincoln County people, and others scattered all over the country, will be reminded of days when they worked for "Dutch", played poker with him, worked with him in the roundhouse, traded cars with him, bought a Maxwell from him, or just counted him as a good friend.

Buster Walker, now vice-president of Whitfield truck line, once worked for "Dutch". Sonny Smoot was born and raised at City Garage and was car salesman for years. Mrs. Juan Sandoval, Grace Herrera, Frank McBride, Louie Montoya, Richard and Joe Phillips, Ignacio Sedillo all worked for City Garage.

Mr. Reil came to Carrizozo in the early 1900's with his sole possession being a dollar watch which he traded for an English book so he could learn the language. He went to work in the railroad roundhouse, bought a lot in Carrizozo and has been in business in Carrizozo longer than most any other person alive today.

Buster and "Dutch" were figuring on how many new and used cars have been sold in some fifty years. A modest estimate of the new car total would be 17,000 or more, and a used car figure of at least as many, making around 35,000 vehicles handled all told—that's a lot of wheels.

Dutch was not only a good worker for the railroad but is given credit for being the best poker player ever to hit this area and this talent helped him get started in the garage business.

The payroll ledger at City Garage lists Tony Lueras, S. O. Monte and J. W. Barnes, Frank Bello, Richard Chavez, Joe A. Chavez, Leonard Meyer, Thomas Morales and Fred Schlarb (deceased) was their body man for many years.

Cliff Zumwalt was just a lad when the first City Garage was built in Carrizozo by Mr. Reil, this was about 1912. Cliff remembers this garage because some church group held a revival in the garage at the time it was new and before the garage equipment and cars were moved in. Cliff was running errands for the City Garage at that time.

The payroll ledger at City Garage lists Tony Lueras, S. O. Monte and J. W. Barnes, Frank Bello, Richard Chavez, Joe A. Chavez, Leonard Meyer, Thomas Morales and Fred Schlarb (deceased) was their body man for many years.

The list of men who have worked for "Dutch" runs well over a hundred. Frank Adams, now of Las Cruces, was their bookkeeper for years. Most of the Ortiz family -- Sally, Manny and their father worked at this garage as did most of the Means family -- Bob, Ken, Don, Hank and their father. Albert Roberts was working for "Dutch" when Albert was going to high school in Carrizozo.

The 1967 purge of voter's registration has been completed by the County Clerk's office as stated by Lancelust, county clerk. A total of 462 registrations were purged from the voter's list. There are a total of 4,110 voters registered after the 1967 purging.

Buster Smoot came to work for City Garage in 1928 and well remembers that year because it was the period when Chevrolet was changing from a four-cylinder to six-cylinder car. Not all the dates are too clear, but Mr. Reil was a dealer for the Maxwell car, made famous in later years by Jack Benny, this in 1916. He became a General Motors dealer about the same time and has handled their products in the years that followed.

Registered voters include 1,528 Republicans, 2,406 Democrats, 176 Independents. Of the 622 purged, there were 83 deceased and 533 had failed to vote in the last two general elections. The voter's registration board consisted of H. H. Shier of Ruidoso, Mrs. Ervin R. Egle of Corona and Bill Randle of Capitan.

Back in those early days, Alan Johnson and his brother had a garage and machine shop in the building next to Johnnie's Bar and the Johnson brothers made one of the first racing cars in this area, built on a Buick chassis. They were in a famous race of that period from Deming to El Paso.

Official filing deadline 5th

Wayland Hill senior and junior both worked at one time for City Garage and "Dutch" Reil as did Alex Vigil, Marlene Vega, and Red Huffmeyer, who was head mechanic for a long time.

This issue of the Lincoln County News is carrying three notices of elections to be held in Capitan, Corona and Carrizozo. The filing deadline for mayor, council and magistrate positions in all three towns is Monday, February 5, 1968.

Lots of the old timers will remember Dan Bullon, now of Arizona, who never changed his overalls until they got so stiff he could stand them up in the corner. There was one other character on the City Garage payroll who would get so sloshed on the weekend that he could hardly open his eyes come Monday. In those days garages had a pit for working under the car and this alcoholic character would strap his arms up to the underneath side of the car and sleep it off, "Dutch" never knowing he was out cold.

At Capitan four positions are open, mayor for two-year term, two councilmen for four-year terms and magistrate for two-year term. The terms of J. C. Germany, mayor, Bill Randle, Fred Pfingsten, councilmen and K. A. Huey, magistrate, have expired. Holdovers on Capitan council are Jack Shaw and Gerald Dean Sr.

At Corona the terms of Thomas A. Huey, mayor, O. B. Simmons and Earl C. Roper, councilmen, have expired and one vacancy has existed on Corona council making four positions to be filled on the ballot, mayor for two-year term and three councilmen for four-year terms.

Bank growth two million

At the close of business December 30, 1967, the Citizens State Bank of Vaughn, Carrizozo and Estancia, listed total assets of \$7,563,233.92 in its statement of condition which indicates a gain of \$2,383,401.86 since December of 1961, when total assets were \$5,185,838.06.

Johnson Stearns, vice-president of the Carrizozo bank said his bank had savings and certificates of deposit in the amount of \$1,591,318.83. Checking account total in the Carrizozo bank at the close of business December 30 was \$2,031,323.22. In Carrizozo the amount of \$46,856.53 in interest was paid on savings and certificates of deposit during the year 1967. This bank increase over the past few years indicates a rather steady, healthy financial growth for much of Lincoln County.

New oral drug to combat TB

The powerful new oral drug to combat tuberculosis, Myambutol, which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in December and is being hailed as apparently representing a new breakthrough in tuberculosis treatment, has been used and studied since 1964 by doctors at Fort Stanton and later, Fort Bayard, New Mexico's State Hospitals for tuberculosis, according to a statement released by Dr. W. F. Rosenblatt, former medical director of Fort Bayard Hospital and an associate member of the Board of Directors of the New Mexico Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association.

Myambutol, the new drug, has been under evaluation for several years at a number of hospitals throughout the country. Many patients hospitalized at Fort Stanton, and, after its close, at Fort Bayard, were given the benefit of this antimicrobial and it is now assumed that its application saved the lives of some and shortened the duration of hospitalization of many others. In the beginning there were doubts about the harmlessness of the drug but it was found that Myambutol does not hurt the patient, is exceptionally well-tolerated, and is of high efficacy, said Dr. Rosenblatt. Capitan going for pipeline

Capitan Village council held a special meeting Monday night with Tom Mann of Mann Engineering to go over situation of constructing dam for lake within city limits of Capitan. Land for lake site is available, the Game and Fish Department has allotted \$85,000 for building dam leaving cost of ten to eleven miles of eight-inch water pipeline and funding of the pipeline as the major obstacle. Tom Mann is familiar with Eagle Creek and an authority on water rights. The council is asking his help on possible sources of money for the pipeline. Construction of the dam also hinges on Eagle Creek Water Users Ass'n building another dam on Eagle Creek, tentative approval given to this project last fall. The lake would have 30 surface acres of water, dam itself would be in Capitan Village limits and lake would run to the west. Capitan council members are J. C. Germany, mayor, Bill Randle, Fred Pfingsten, Jack Shaw and Gerald Dean Sr.

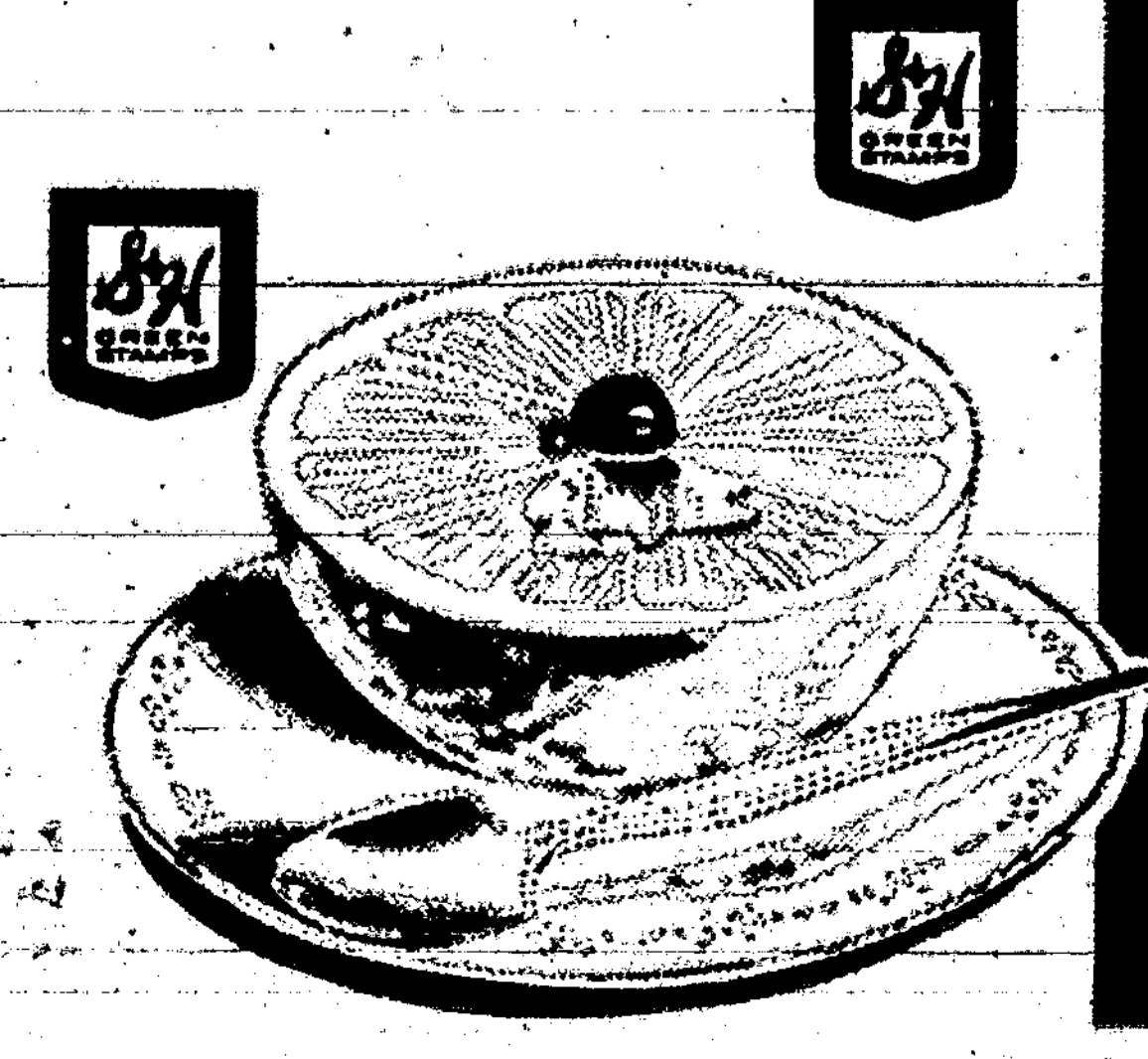

An orderly existence often leads to a dull life and you don't live longer—it just seems longer. Some wise observer said this at one time or another and he sure must have meant it for the folks at The Banner office. Order is something we don't have.

The Stropels had to do a lot of shuffling this week in order to take on the added load of publishing The Protection Post again. The family that purchased it from us on contract ten months ago suddenly decided last Saturday that they would rather draw a regular paycheck than be rugged individualists and work themselves to a frazzle. They told us to come and get it—and we did.

Family-sized weeklies are dropping by the wayside—not so much for lack of income, but primarily because federal regulations on age, hours, wages, with the necessary forms and taxes for cradle to the grave care that extends to all levels of government—has just about dumped more work on a husband and wife than it is possible to bear.

Mullinville gave up the ghost, as far as the weekly Comet goes, just week. The Comet had been published for more than five years at Kinsley. Income was the factor in the Comet demise.

The day will also come when the government and large corporations, who pass on inflation to the public with immunity, such as poverty programs, shoulder harnesses that cost \$3 and sell for \$30, and undeclared wars, which the idiots in Washington use to boost the national gross product, which in turn they brag about—will so instill "momism" in our young people that the family weekly will be as dead as the Dodo.

In this immediate area, the following weeklies can generally be classified as "family" size: The Bucklin Banner, The Spearhead News, Minneola Record, Fowler News, Protection Post.

Except for the young whippersnappers over at Fowler, Jim and Barb Gardner, the three other publishers and their wives are looking for more leisure time which isn't compatible with weekly ownership.

Perhaps all of the blame for the killing off of small town weeklies doesn't lay further than our own hearts. We are in the business because we are strong willed, or stubborn, if you prefer. We all purchased papers that had been established 40, 60, or more years ago. I haven't researched it, but there probably wasn't a piece of equipment in any of our shops less than 20 years old, and the presses were nearer to 50 years old. The generation of publishers we replaced were so tickled to get power to their presses, type from a machine and money to the bank, they never gave a thought to replacing obsolete machinery. They were used to two-bit labor and hours were easier to buy than modernization.

The old timers were printers and also editors. The present generation of owners are publishers and printers—we don't have time, although our hours are just as long, to fulfill our primary purpose—which is editing.

We're too darn busy trying to raise tax money, do the government paperwork and upgrade the printing plant so we can turn out every work to pay for the various welfare programs they think up almost every sunrise in all levels of government.

I get very mad about this when someone, such as the nice family at Protection, has to call it quits. They could have sweat out the future like the rest of us in the business. But is it worth it?

Sideline Note to "In a Capsule"

This comment by Orin Strobel (a Democrat by the way), publisher of Bucklin Kansas Banner tells of a newspaper trend which applies to other kinds of business. — when the founder of the business retires, frequently the small town loses a business, be it printing, grocery, drygoods or hardware. That same week in Bucklin a variety store closed its doors because the owners were tired of the business.

There are a farmer and a county agent in Lincoln County who have some pretty strong convictions about a different way of pruning apple trees in the Bonito Valley.

Three years ago, W. G. "Bill" Shrecengost, who has been farming near the town of Lincoln since 1950, and Lincoln County Agent Ralph Dunlap, with the New Mexico State University Extension Service, attended a national apple growers' meeting. When they returned, they decided to try a different method of pruning on Shrecengost's 80 acres of apple trees.

"The mold-and-hold method demonstrated at the meeting had some good merits, and Bill decided to try the method on his orchard," Dunlap says. "The idea is to mold a tree to a smaller size and hold it there by pruning."

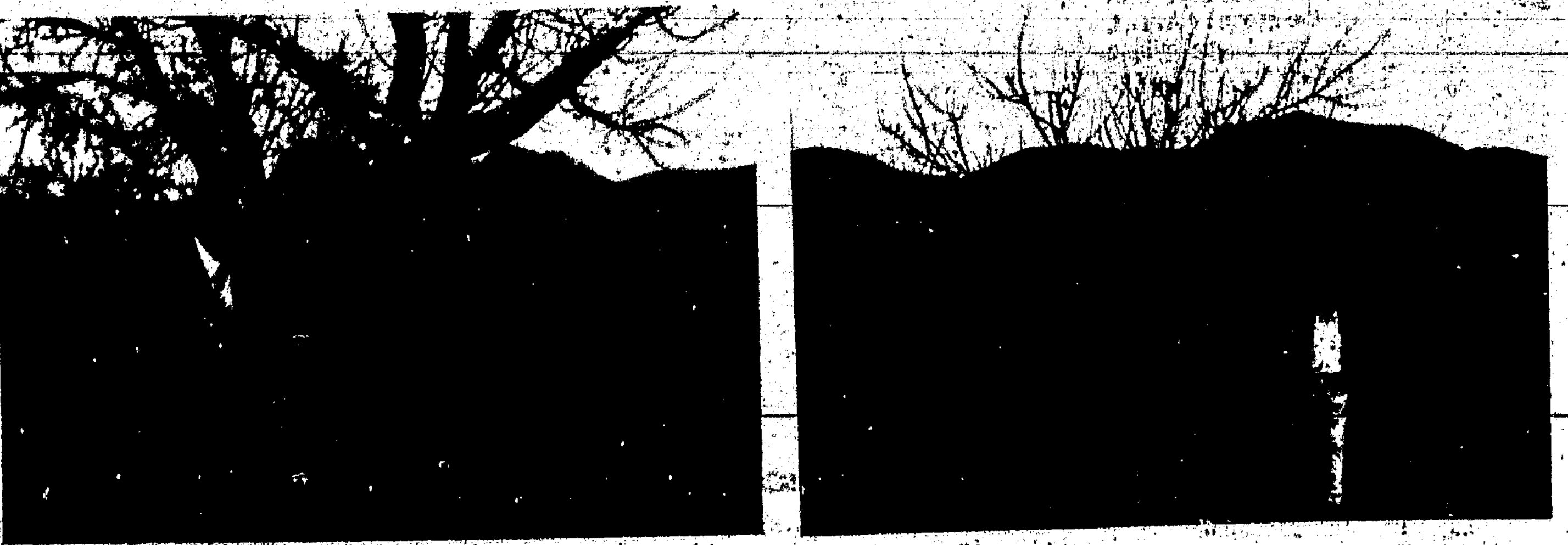
In January, 1965, they started with the trees that were 21-22 years old. Bill began to cut back slowly on the trees, and has reduced the height more each year.

"I'm going to bring the trees down to 12-14 feet so they can be picked from a 10-foot ladder," Bill points out. "With this type of tree, I will get more fruit from inside the tree and save quite a bit on labor costs."

With the smaller trees, spraying and picking will be easier, and less fertilizer in most cases will be required.

By using this method of pruning, the farmer is dwarfing the trees instead of buying and planting a new orchard of dwarfs. A farmer planting a new orchard, and using the mold-and-hold method, could plant one-third more trees. This, of course, would increase his apple production per acre.

"This is the coming line of pruning in new orchards," says Dunlap, "especially among the

commercial growers. About 50 percent of the larger commercial growers in the state are now using this or a modified method of pruning."

The mold-and-hold method has been tried in some northern New Mexico orchards for about five years. A Mimbres Valley orchard farmer, Regis McSherry, has also been practicing a similar method for 20 years.

Each orchard must be pruned on its own merits, Dunlap advises. In time all trees can be reduced to a desirable height.

The important thing is to keep with the same type of pruning, the county agent cautions. Stay with a method and do not go from tree to tree and year to year with a different method, he reminds.

One of the problems in older orchards is the need for more pollination. To combat this problem, pollinating varieties such as the Golden and Jonathan can be interplanted in the present orchard, or commercial

pollination can be sprayed on during full bloom.

"The ideal set-up is to have one row of pollinators, two rows of producers, one row of pollinators, two rows of producers, etc., throughout the orchard," Dunlap explains.

In mold-and-hold pruning, Shrecengost cuts to a side limb or branch. Water sprouts are pruned to remove the fast growing vegetative growth that will not produce fruit. A few water sprouts are stubbed, leaving two or three buds to encourage them to develop fruit buds.

Pruning begins in the Shrecengost orchard in January. All diseased and damaged wood, along with interfering branches, is removed first.

"You need to be almost brutal at times," says Shrecengost. "Some of the best-looking limbs can be the ones that will cause you the most trouble when building a mold-and-hold tree."

Mel Gnatkowski talks about dairy judging

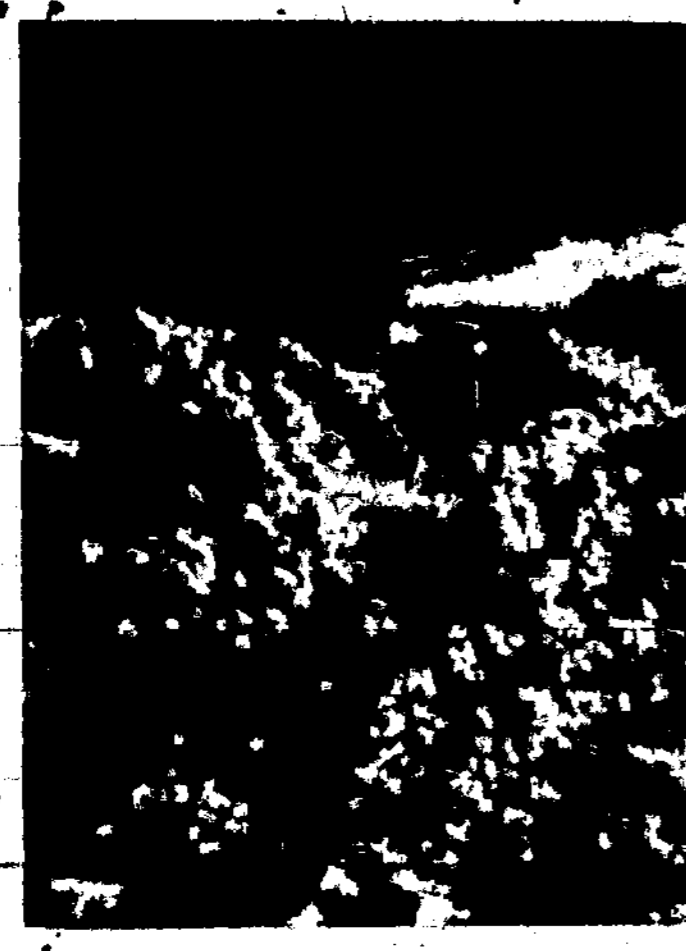
The Corona Maverick 4-H Club held its regular meeting, January 11 in the multi-purpose room of the grade school.

1. Get the "feel" of the road by accelerating carefully to see if wheels spin; or brake gently to see if they skid. Reduce speed accordingly.
2. Increase your following distance. It takes three to nine times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry pavement.
3. "Pump" your brakes to slow or stop—don't jam them on. An intermittent pumping action three to five times per second keeps the wheels rolling and helps maintain steering control.
4. Have good tires with good treads. Better yet, use snow tires which provide half again as much pulling power in snow as regular tires. Studded snow tires offer still more help on icy surfaces.
5. Always carry reinforced tire chains in the trunk of your car for use during severe snow and ice conditions. They provide four to seven times as much traction on snow or ice as regular tires.
6. Keep your windshield and windows clear at all times. Replace streaking wiper blades gone dead from exposure to sun, wind and oily road film. Be sure that your windshield washer solution contains adequate anti-freeze.

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ORDINANCE NO. 31 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING NO. 30 TO PROVIDE FOR THE RAISING OF REVENUES FOR GENERAL GOVERNMENTAL PURPOSES OF THE VILLAGE OF CORONA, NEW MEXICO...

Section 1. Sections 1 through 21 of Ordinance No. 30 are amended to read: "Section 1. AUTHORIZATION. The governing body of the Village of Corona, New Mexico, finding the Village of Corona, New Mexico to be an incorporated municipality under the laws of the State of New Mexico and finding the Village of Corona to be in need of revenue for governmental purposes and the Village of Corona, New Mexico, desirous of availing itself of the provisions of law contained in Sections 14-39-1 through 14-39-5, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1965, Chapter 300, Sections 14-39-1 through 14-39-5, as amended) hereby fixes a municipal sales tax pursuant thereto.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS. As used in this ordinance: A. "Bureau" means the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue, the Commissioner of Revenue, or any employee of the Bureau exercising authority lawfully delegated to him by the Commissioner. B. "Buying" or "Selling" means any transfer of property for consideration or any performance of service for consideration. C. "Contracting" means, but is not limited to, constructing, altering, repairing or demolishing any: (1) Road, highway, bridge, parking area, or related project; (2) building, stadium or other structure; (3) airport, subway or similar facilities; (4) park, trail, athletic field, golf course, or similar facility; (5) dam, reservoir, canal, ditch, or similar facility; (6) sewage or water treatment facility, power generating plant, pump station, natural gas compressing station, or similar facility; (7) sewage, water, gas, or other pipeline; (8) transmission lines; (9) radio or other tower; (10) water, oil or other storage tanks; (11) shaft, tunnel or other mining appurtenance; (12) similar work. Contracting" also includes: (13) leveling or clearing land; (14) excavating earth; (15) drilling wells of any type, including seismograph shot holes or core drilling; or (16) similar work. D. "Engaging in business" means carrying or causing to be carried on any activity with the purpose of direct or indirect benefit. E. "Gross receipts" means the total amount of money or the value of other consideration received from selling property in the municipality, from leasing property employed in the municipality or for performing services in the municipality, and includes any type of time-price differential and receipts from sales of property handled on consignment but excludes cash discounts allowed and taken. In an exchange in which the money or other consideration received does not represent the value of the property or service exchanged, "gross receipts" means the reasonable value of the property or service exchanged. When the sale of property or service is made under any type of charge, conditional or time sales contract, or the leasing of property is made under a leasing contract, the seller or lessor may elect to treat all receipts under such contracts as gross receipts as and when the payments are actually received. If the seller or lessor transfers his interest in such contract to a third person, he shall pay the municipal sales tax upon the full sale or leasing contract amount. "Gross receipts", for the purpose of the business of buying, selling or promoting the purchase, sale or leasing, as factor, agent, or broker, on a commission or fee basis, of any property, service, stock, bond or security, includes only the total commissions or fees derived from the business. F. "Manufacturing" means combining or processing components or materials to increase their value for sale in the ordinary course of business but does not include contracting. G. "Person" means any individual, estate, trust, receiver, cooperative association, club, corporation, company, firm, partnership, joint venture, syndicate or other entity, including the gas, water or electric utility owned or operated by a county, municipality or other political subdivision of the state. H. "Property" means real property or tangible personal property. Tangible personal property includes electricity. I. "Leasing" means any arrangement whereby, for a consideration, property is employed for or by any person other than the owner of the property. J. "Service" means all activities engaged in for other persons for a consideration, which activities involve primarily the performance of a service as distinguished from selling property. "Service" includes contracting and all materials employed in contracting are to be treated as part of the service. However, sales of materials that will be employed in contracting are sales of tangible personal property. K. "Tax" means the municipal sales tax. L. "Use" or "using" means use, consumption or storage other than storage for subsequent sale in the ordinary course of business or for use solely outside of the municipality. M. "Municipality" means the Village of Corona.

Section 3. IMPOSITION. A. There is hereby levied and imposed a municipal sales tax on all retail business and services within the municipality at the rate of one per cent (1%) of the gross receipts of all retail businesses and services within the municipality. Gross receipts shall be measured by the amount or volume of business done. B. The tax imposed by this section shall be referred to as the "municipal sales tax". Section 4. DATE PAYMENT DUE. The municipal sales tax imposed by this ordinance is to be paid on or before the 20th day of the month following the month in which the taxable event occurred. Section 5. EXEMPTIONS. The following transactions are exempted from the municipal sales tax imposed by this ordinance: A. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of the United States or any agency or instrumentality thereof or the State of New Mexico or any political subdivision thereof. Receipts from the sale of gas, water or electricity by a utility owned or operated by a county, municipality or other political subdivision of the state are not exempted from the municipal sales tax by this subsection. B. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of hospitals, infirmaries, or sanitariums and the receipts of nonprofit corporations from the operation of facilities designed and used for providing accommodations for retired elderly persons. C. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of employees from wages, salaries, commissions or from any other form of remuneration for personal services. D. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of growers, producers, trappers or nonprofit marketing associations from selling livestock, live poultry, unprocessed agricultural products, hides or pelts. Persons engaged in the business of buying and selling wool or mohair are producers for purposes of this subsection. Persons engaged in the business of buying and selling livestock on their own account are also producers for purposes of this subsection. Receipts from selling dairy products at retail are not exempted from the municipal sales tax by this subsection. E. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of any person derived from feeding or pasturing livestock. Receipts derived from penning or handling livestock prior to the sale shall be considered receipts derived from feeding livestock for purposes of this subsection. F. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of banks, building and loan associations or credit unions from selling or leasing property or service in the regular course of their banking, building and loan association or credit union functions. G. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts from selling vehicles on which the tax imposed by Section 64-11-15, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, is payable. H. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of insurance companies from premiums. I. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts received as interest on money loaned or deposited, as dividends from stocks, bonds or securities or from a sale of stocks, bonds or securities. J. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts from selling motor fuel or special fuel on which the taxes imposed by Sections 64-26-2 or 64-26-8, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, have been paid and not refunded. K. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts from the isolated or occasional sale of or leasing of property or service by a person who is neither regularly engaged nor holding himself out as engaged in the business of selling or leasing the same or similar property or service. L. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts of public, parochial or private nonprofit schools, colleges or universities received from tuition payments, fees, dormitories or dining facilities. M. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts from selling tangible personal property by any instrumentality of the armed forces of the United States engaged in resale activities. N. Exempted from municipal sales tax are the receipts from the sale or leasing of oil, natural gas or mineral interests. O. When a privilege tax is imposed by the Oil and Gas Emergency School Tax, the provisions of such act shall apply and determine the full measure of tax liability for the privilege of engaging in the business stated in the Act, and no provisions of the municipal sales tax shall apply to or create a tax liability for such privilege. No provision of the municipal sales tax ordinance shall apply to the storage of oil, natural gas or liquid hydrocarbon, individually or in any combination thereof, or to the use of such products for fuel in the operation of a "production unit" as defined by the Oil and Gas Emergency School Tax Act. P. When a privilege tax is imposed by the Oil and Gas Manufacturers Privilege Tax Act, the provisions of the Act shall apply and determine the full measure of tax liability for the privilege of engaging in the business stated in the Act and no provision of the municipal sales tax ordinance shall apply to or create a tax liability for such privilege. No provision of the municipal sales tax ordinance shall apply to the storage or use of oil, natural gas, or liquid hydrocarbon, individually or in any combination thereof, when stored or used by a "Manufacturer" as defined by the Oil and Gas Manufacturer's Privilege Tax Act. Q. When a privilege tax is imposed by the Resources Excise Tax Act, the provisions of the Act shall apply and determine the full measure of tax liability for the privilege of engaging in the business stated in the Act and no provision of the municipal sales tax shall apply to or create a tax liability for such privilege. R. Exempted from the provisions of the municipal sales tax are the receipts derived from the use of all natural gas, or liquid hydrocarbon or any combination thereof as a fuel in the pipeline transportation of such products. S. Exempted from the municipal sales tax are the receipts from dues and registration fees of nonprofit social, fraternal, political, trade, business, labor or professional organizations. T. No provision of the municipal sales tax ordinance shall apply to or create a tax liability for the privilege of engaging in any business by an insurance company or any agent thereof as provided in Section 58-5-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1925, Chapter 135, Section 27, as amended). If any conflict exists between any provision of the Municipal sales tax ordinance and the provisions of Section 58-5-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1925, Chapter 135, Section 27, as amended), Section 58-5-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1925, Chapter 135, Section 27, as amended) shall control. Section 6. NONTAXABLE TRANSACTION CERTIFICATE. A nontaxable transaction certificate by the buyer or lessee shall be in the possession of the seller or lessor for a nontaxable transaction when regulations of the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue so require. The nontaxable transaction certificate shall contain information and be in a form prescribed by the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue. Only receipts or lessees who have a registration number or who have applied for a registration number and have not been refused one under Section 72-13-29 (c), New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, shall execute nontaxable transaction certificates. When the seller or lessor accepts the nontaxable transaction certificate in good faith that the buyer or lessee will employ the property or service transferred in a nontaxable manner, the properly executed nontaxable transaction certificate shall be conclusive evidence that the proceeds from the transaction are not includable in the seller's or lessor's gross receipts. Section 7. DEDUCTIONS. In computing the municipal sales tax due: A. Receipts from selling tangible personal property that will become an ingredient or component part of any manufactured product may be deducted from gross receipts if the sale is made to a person engaged in the business of manufacturing who delivers a nontaxable transaction certificate to the seller. B. Receipts from selling tangible personal property for subsequent sale either by itself or in combination with other tangible personal property in the ordinary course of business may be deducted from gross receipts if the sale is made to a person who delivers a nontaxable transaction certificate to the seller. Sales of materials that will be employed in contracting to persons engaged in contracting are not sales of tangible personal property for subsequent sale for purposes of this subsection. C. Receipts from leasing tangible personal property for subsequent leasing in the ordinary course of business may be deducted from gross receipts if the lease is made to a person who delivers a nontaxable transaction certificate to the lessor. D. Receipts from selling a service for resale may be deducted from gross receipts if: (1) The sale is made to a person who delivers a nontaxable transaction certificate to the seller; (2) The value of the particular service is stated separately in the buyer's charge for the subsequent sale of the service; (3) The subsequent sale of the service is a transaction taxable under the municipal sales tax, and (4) The subsequent sale is in the ordinary course of business. Receipts of persons engaged in contracting from performing contracting work are not receipts from selling a service for resale for purposes of this subsection. E. Fifty per cent of the receipts from performing a contracting project may be deducted from gross receipts. F. Receipts from the sale of or leasing of real property, other than the receipts from the sale or leasing of oil, natural gas, or mineral interest exempted by Section 5 (N) of the municipal sales tax may be deducted from gross receipts. No receipts received by hotels, motels, rooming houses, camp grounds, guest ranches, trailer parks or similar facilities from lodgers, guests, roomers or occupants, shall be considered receipts from leasing real property for purposes of this subsection. G. Receipts from selling tangible personal property, other than non-fissionable metallic mineral ore, to the United States or any agency or instrumentality thereof or the State of New Mexico or any political subdivision thereof may be deducted from gross receipts. Receipts from selling tangible personal property, other than non-fissionable metallic mineral ore to the governing body of any Indian tribe or Indian pueblos for use on Indian reservations or pueblos grants, may be deducted from gross receipts. H. Receipts from transactions in interstate commerce may be deducted from gross receipts to the extent that the imposition of the municipal sales tax would be unlawful under the United States Constitution. Receipts from transmitting messages or conversations by telegraph, telephone or radio, other than from one point in this municipality to another point in this municipality, may be deducted from gross receipts. Receipts from transporting persons or property under a single contract from one point to another in this municipality may be deducted from gross receipts when such persons or property, including any special or extra service reasonably necessary in connection therewith, is being transported in interstate or foreign commerce. Receipts from transporting for hire persons or property by railroad, motor vehicle, air transportation or any other means, from one point within the municipality to another point outside the municipality may be deducted from gross receipts. J. Receipts from selling feed for livestock or poultry, seeds, roots, bulbs, plants, fertilizers,

insecticides, fungicides, or weed-killers applied to land or water for irrigation purposes may be deducted from gross receipts. Receipts of auctioneers from selling livestock or other agricultural products at auction may also be deducted from gross receipts. K. Receipts from warehousing grain or other agricultural products or from threshing or cleaning agricultural products, including the ginning of cotton, may be deducted from gross receipts. L. Receipts from selling tangible personal property, other than metallic mineral ore, to nonprofit schools, colleges, universities, hospitals, religious or charitable organizations, who employ the tangible personal property in the conduct of their regular educational, hospital, religious or charitable functions may be deducted from gross receipts. M. Receipts from selling tangible personal property other than metallic mineral ore, to banks, building and loan associations or credit unions who employ the tangible personal property in the conduct of their regular banking, building and loan association or credit union functions may be deducted from gross receipts. N. Fifty per cent of the receipts from the agricultural implements, farm tractors, airplanes, and other equipment not registered under Section 57-2-7 or Vehicle Code, may be deducted from gross receipts. Any receipt under subsection N shall be subject to the provisions of Section 10, UNLAWFUL TO ADVERTISE TAX NOT A PART OF PRICE. It is unlawful for any person to advertise that any tax imposed by the municipal sales tax is not an element of the price of the property or service sold. Section 8. COST OF ENFORCEMENT. As reasonable compensation for the enforcement and collection of this municipal sales tax, the Bureau of Revenue may deduct an amount not to exceed three per cent (3%) of the tax actually collected by the Bureau of Revenue. The Bureau shall remit to the municipality the municipal sales tax collected less the administrative cost aforementioned not later than the twentieth (20th) day of each month following the month in which the tax was collected, which remittance the treasurer of the municipality is hereby directed to deposit to the credit of the special fund of the municipality. Section 9. DUTY OF ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT. Any municipal sales tax imposed by this ordinance shall be enforced and collected by the Bureau of Revenue pursuant to the provisions of the New Mexico Administrative Act, Sections 72-13-1 through 72-13-22, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1965, Chapter 248, Sections 1 through 22). This ordinance shall be amended from time to time to conform to the provisions of the Administrative Act. The tax collected by the Bureau of Revenue shall be deposited to the credit of the special fund of the municipality. Section 10. PENALTY FOR VIOLATION. The provisions of the Administrative Act, as amended from time to time, shall apply to and govern all persons subject to the tax imposed by this ordinance, except that the criminal penalties set forth in Sections 72-13-05 through 72-13-09, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1965, Chapter 248, Sections 73 through 75) are restricted to fines not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300.00) or to imprisonment not exceeding ninety (90) days and may only be enforced by civil or prosecution before a municipal judge of the municipality, and each day and/or instance of violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. Section 11. TAX ADMINISTRATION ACT. Copies of the Tax Administration Act shall be on file in the office of the Clerk of the municipality. Section 12. REPEALING CLAUSE. All ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed; provided, however, that the date of repeal of such ordinances shall coincide with the first date of allowable collection under this ordinance and not until such time. Section 13. SAVINGS CLAUSE. The municipal sales tax imposed by this ordinance does not apply to any taxable event that occurred prior to the effective date. The payment, collection or enforcement of taxes, the liability for payment of which was incurred by reason of events occurring prior to the effective date of this ordinance, is to be accomplished according to the provisions of the applicable ordinances previously in force in

every manner as though this ordinance had not been passed and adopted. Section 20. EMERGENCY. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the grounds of urgent public need. It is therefore to become immediately effective upon publication as provided by law. Section 21. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be effective on and after Dec. 29, 1967.  Myambutol is now mainly recommended for re-treatment of patients who have failed to respond to conventional drugs like INH, Streptomycin and PAS. Dr. Rosenblatt stated, but it would come as no surprise to doctors who have used the drug if it did not eventually replace the use of PAS and/or Streptomycin in first treatment of tuberculosis.
 Myambutol is included in the out-patient drug program administered by the State of New Mexico at Fort Bayard Hospital.
 Dr. Rosenblatt participated in a conference held in St. Louis, Mo., on December 9, concerning future studies of another anti-tuberculous drug, Isoxy. This antimicrobial has been widely used in Europe for several years and is there considered a valuable tool in treating tuberculosis.
 In the United States, Isoxy was evaluated by several hospitals, including Fort Stanton and Fort Bayard, but the results were non-conclusive. The evaluation program was discontinued early in 1967.
 More recently there has been renewed interest in this drug, especially when it became obvious that the drug preparation used in the preliminary evaluation in this country differed from the one used in Europe. Therefore, plans were discussed at the St. Louis conference to re-evaluate Isoxy under more favorable circumstances.
