Dear Eleanor and Paul,

Imagine how excited we all were to find stacks of Christmas cards, letters and four Lincoln County News papers on Sid's desk when we returned from three weeks vacation in South Africa and Rhodesia. We had such a delightful time learning the news from home. Perhaps 10,200 miles isn't the farthest your paper travels from Carrizozo, but what a delight it is appreciated more than anywhere else!

We spent one week looking at the country in South Africa, mostly around Pretoria. Their history is very much like that of our pioneer days in the American west. It was a surprise to learn that there is a shortage of beef there and the meat we saw and ate was inferior to Kenya beef. Farming is a different story -- what a variety of fruits and vegetables!

From South Africa we went directly to Victoria Falls in Rhodesia. When we came back from there in 1964 we never really thought we would see the Falls again so it was a bonus to be able to take the children this time. It is truly one of the Seven Wonders

of the World! We spent the last two weeks on the ranch of the friends we visited before. There we hunted, fished and worked cattle -- had a grand time.

The children will be returning to school January 15. Floyd and Cindy go to Nairobi and Jim and Sherry just a few miles out of Nakuru. They have gotten used to the boarding school system now and are doing well indeed.

People say that Kenya is a timeless place to live -- how right they are! It's hard to believe that we are starting our second year here. It has been an exciting, relaxing year of life but we still miss Lincoln County. I guess there's no place like the good ole Southwest and it gets in your blood!

We think of everyone there often, and send our thanks for the thoughtful cards and letters. We wish you and all the folks in Lincoln County a very prosperous new year and hope that the weather will be kind to you and the cattle and sheep prices the best ever!

Phone use continues up from 578 to 601

Boyd Harper, local manager for Mountain States Telephone, told the News this week that the number of phones in use in the Carrizozo area has shown a steady increase from 578 in 1966 to 601 at the end of 1967 and Mr. Harper said they have added two or three in the 1968 year.

The number of telephones in the United States rose to 98.8 million in 1967, the 100 millionth telephone was installed during the past year. For comparison, the capital city of Russia has 860,000 phones for its 6 1/2 million citizens, a ratio of 13.1 per 100 population. New York City has 67.1 per 100 population.

Language specialist visits school

Henry Pascual, foreign language specialist with the State Department of Education was in Carrizozo Tuesday, January 23, to work with teachers and to hold a workshop Tuesday night at 7:00. The program was planned by the staff of Carrizozo school as an in-service training program. Mr. Pascual visited the Miami Linguistic Program as operated by Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Gormany in the elementary school. He had a large part in pioneering the program in the United States. He also works with Miss Romero on the high school level. The theme of the visit and workshop was

"The Learning Problems of the Bi-Lingual Child." In the three years with Ford Foundation and the extensive reading program, much stress has been placed upon the improvement of communication for all students. The Miami system is aimed toward getting students who have spoken mostly Spanish changed comfortably over into English and maintaining and improving his primary language. The work-study program at Carrizozo High School is ready to go into operation. The program had been held up by lack of federal funds. The Shop Skills class of Mr. Sadler, the Home

Ec. Skills class of Mrs. Lawson and the Business Skills class of Miss Dooley are now ready to go into part-time learning and part-time earning. Work stations will be needed for some of the students and visits are being made to set these up. Anyone wishing to take part in the program is asked to contact the school. The students are allowed to work 44 hours per month at \$1.00 per hour. This makes it much easier for a student to stay in the main stream of school and pay his bills. An attempt is made to place these students during the summer and on into an occupation. This is

part of the Career Selection program which Carrizozo is helping pioneer in New Mexico. Superintendent Glen Ellison and counselor, Jake Hawkins, are to appear on the spring program for counselors at N.M.S.U. February 16 to report on this project.

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Horse at good trot kept up

Cleve Brown of Corona has vivid memories of days when the first auto mail contract in United States was left for carrying mail from Chaves to Torrance County. The car used on this route is shown in the picture, a 1907 two-cylinder Buick. As Cleve remembers the vehicle it was a chain drive, right-hand steering and used carbide lights. There was no top, no windshield and no doors. The crank for starting the motor was in middle of car. In talking to News reporter Zeilpha Keykendall, the early

1900's were remembered as days when Mr. Brown frequently rode horseback along side the mailcar and kept up with his horse at a good trot through the range country around Corona.

The drivers and their passengers would leave Roswell in the morning and make it to the halfway house (later to become present headquarters of Armstrong Ranch) for lunch. The trip from Torrance would take most all day as the auto only made about seven miles per hour.

in the fellowship hall of the church. The couple will be at home in El Paso until further notice from the service. The parents of the couple and family members were all present.

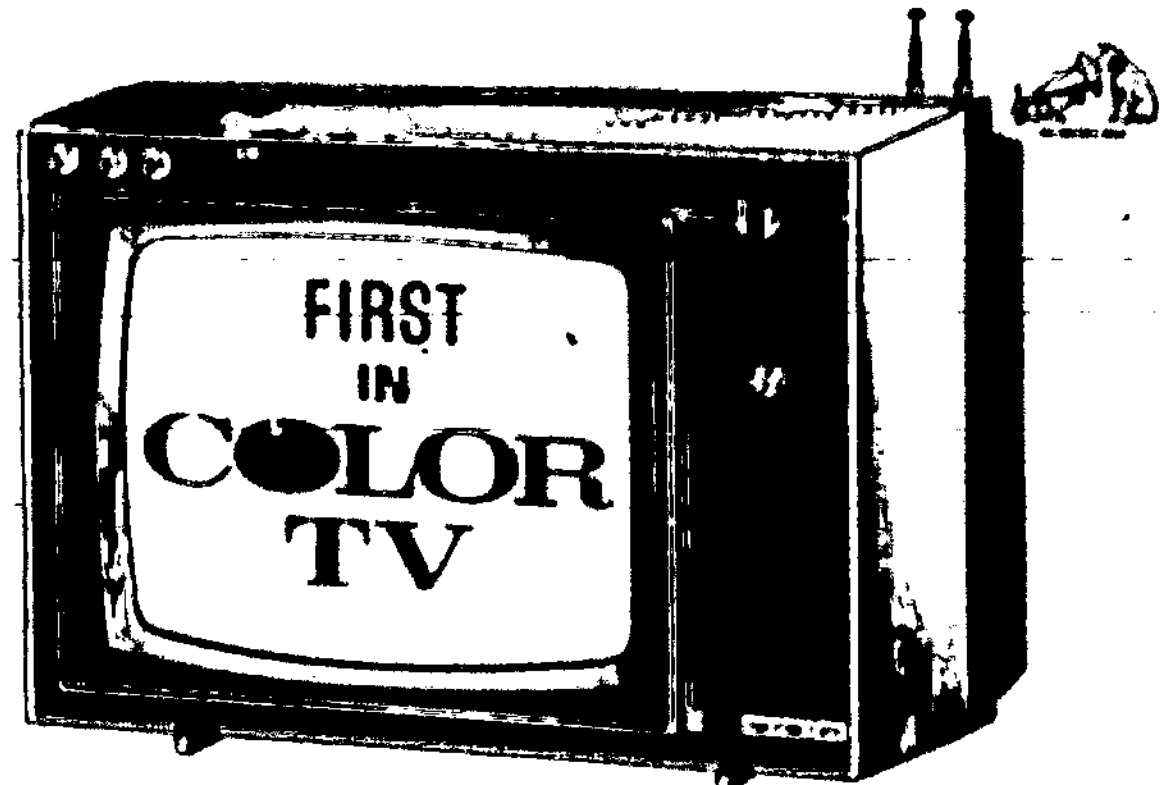

County Agent News

Pounds of calf per cow and calf weight to cow weight were two terms receiving emphasis at the Animal Science Workshop held for County Agents last week at New Mexico State University. The results of experimental trials over the country were summarized for the group. These results were often different from different areas. I came home with a notebook full of information and I will try to highlight various things for you during the coming weeks. . . . Stillbirth implants of 12 or 15 mg. in the ear of sucking

calves will increase weaning weights and usually not effect feedlot gains.

Range grasses sampled at Fort Stanton from September 1966 to August 1967 were low in protein during the winter. Two lots of 2 year old heifers fed 1 pound and 2 pounds of cotton seed meal pellets were calved this last spring. This supplement was fed from January into May. The heifers receiving two pounds of supplement weaned a 40 pound heavier calf and had a higher calving percent. This was just one year's results but I feel that the difference in calving percent of 63 and 81% will not be as large over a period of years.
