Contests at Capitan and Ruidoso

"Shorty" Stoneman for mayor of Ruidoso

With a few days yet before filing deadline for town and village office, a race for mayor has developed in Ruidoso and Capitan will have three council candidates and two mayor candidates to fill vacancies. Just before noon Wednesday Corona needed more candidates and there were no contests in Carrizozo.

G. H. "Shorty" Stoneman, well known in Lincoln County, manager of Keech Gas Co. and former mayor of Ruidoso, filed Monday for the position of mayor. Four years ago Stoneman was the winner in the mayor contest, two years ago Lloyd Davis, Jr. won the race, the 1968 mayor race is a sort of runoff.

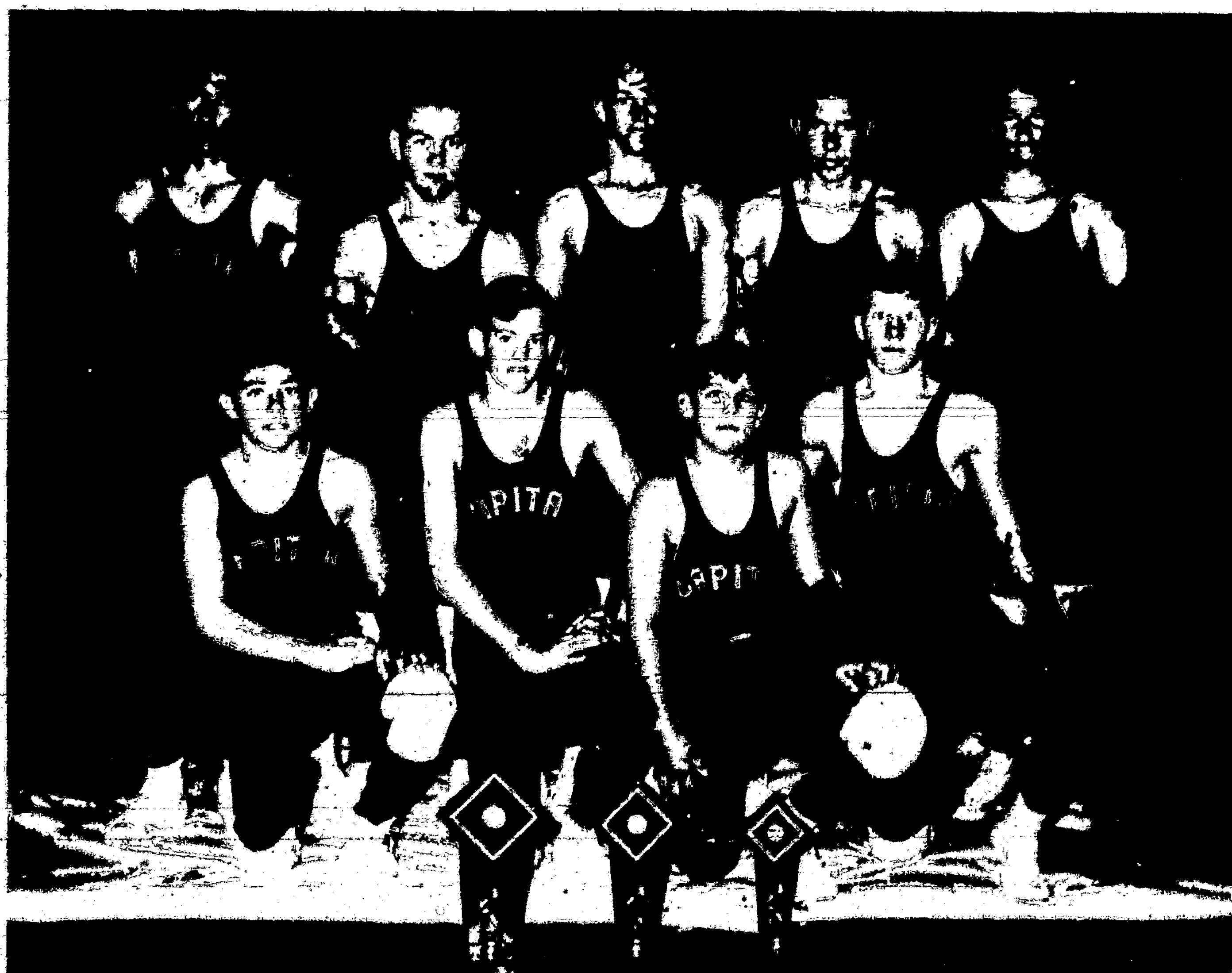

All four games, involving Western Athletic Conference teams, will be televised live and direct, and can be seen only on KOAT-TV, Channel 7, Albuquerque. Gene Osborn, of KDEF radio in Albuquerque, the voice of the Lobos, will be the play-by-play announcer for all four

games which are: UNM versus Arizona State on Friday, February 2 from Tempe. UNM versus University of Arizona on Saturday, February 3, from Tucson. UNM versus Brigham Young University on Friday, February 16, from Provo, and UNM versus University of Wyoming on Friday, March 1 from Laramie. Each of the four games will be preceded by a pre-game "locker room" show at 7:30 p.m.

At Capitan, there are two council positions open. Herbert Lee Traylor, Herman Otero and J. P. "Bill" Randall have filed as candidates for the Capitan council. Valton Hall and N. G. Grantham are candidates for mayor of Capitan. K. A. Huey is the lone candidate for police magistrate. Reported Lucille Smith, village clerk. Holdover councilmen at Capitan are Jack Shaw and Gerald Dean, Sr.

The Village of Corona has been operating with three councilmen, for several months: Leon Erramonce, the holdover, and O. S. Simmons and Earl Roper, whose terms expire, along with Mayor Tom Huey, Wednesday morning. It looked like Corona might get down to one councilman. Thomas H. Huey had filed for mayor, three council positions were open, according to Gertrude Allen, village clerk.

There has been one change since a slate of candidates filed in the Town of Carrizozo. Siegfried Lessau withdrew as candidate for council and Joe Light filed to fill the slate of Johnson Stearns for mayor, C. D. May for council and Austin Wooten for police magistrate, was the report from Clerk Nellie Lee Baker, Wednesday.

Monday, February 5, at 5:00 p.m. is the filing deadline in most instances.

Series of residence thefts started about January 15

Choncho Morales, Carrizozo town marshal, reported to the News Wednesday that there was no connection between series of early evening thefts from Carrizozo homes and the apprehension of robbers who broke in the Nike and hauled off considerable liquor.

J. E. Thornton reported that he left his house about 6:00 p.m. expecting to be gone only a short time. He returned at 7:00 p.m. and in the meantime robbers had been in the house and made off with \$200 in old-type 50c pieces and around \$77 in silver. They had entered through the back door.

Mrs. E. S. Eaker left her house to visit her mother, only a short distance, Mrs. Eaker told Marshal Morales that she noticed the front porch light go out from her mother's place, but thought nothing of it, just kids probably. When she returned home the back door was open and the color television set missing.

Several other families have told friends of thefts and missing articles but have not made reports to local officers — they should report because catching the robbers is important and any kind of evidence might help.

One family has lost money, another canned goods, another a watch, another a television set, another a camera, another money and green stamps. It all adds up to rather extensive haul.

Marshal Morales thought it could have been local youngsters but whoever the parties are they are operating smart for the time being. He advises that Carrizozo people leave porch lights on and doors locked when they leave home especially in the evening.

Water Board says "Start work"

The Eagle Creek Water Users Ass'n. held a special meeting Tuesday night with Tom Mann, engineer from Roswell, and after going over money situation in relation to proposed dam, the board told Mann to take steps to get work under way.

The Association has \$108,000 available now which will be used to repair existing diversion dam, replace 16-inch water line to Alto Hill and run new 8-inch line to Peters Hill.

The state engineer has asked that a large spillway be included in dam project which will run total cost to \$400,000 and the Association will ask for extension of time to finish the job.

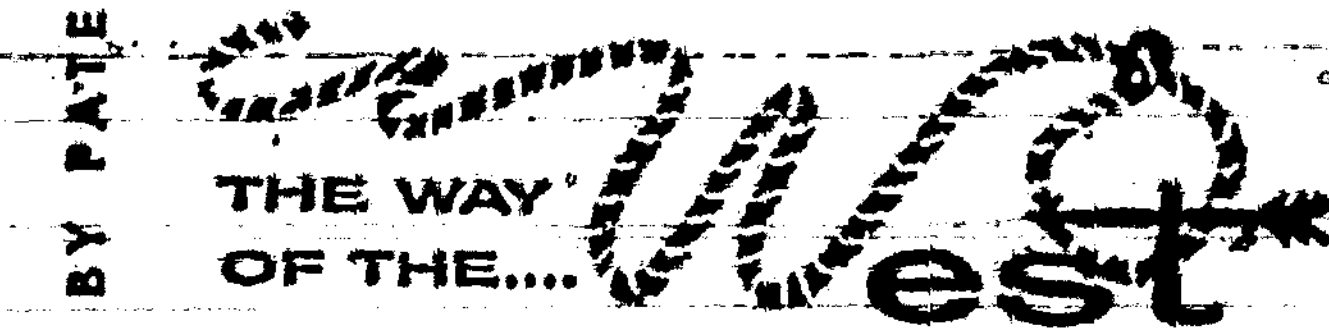
The proposed lake at Capitan hinges on construction of this dam.

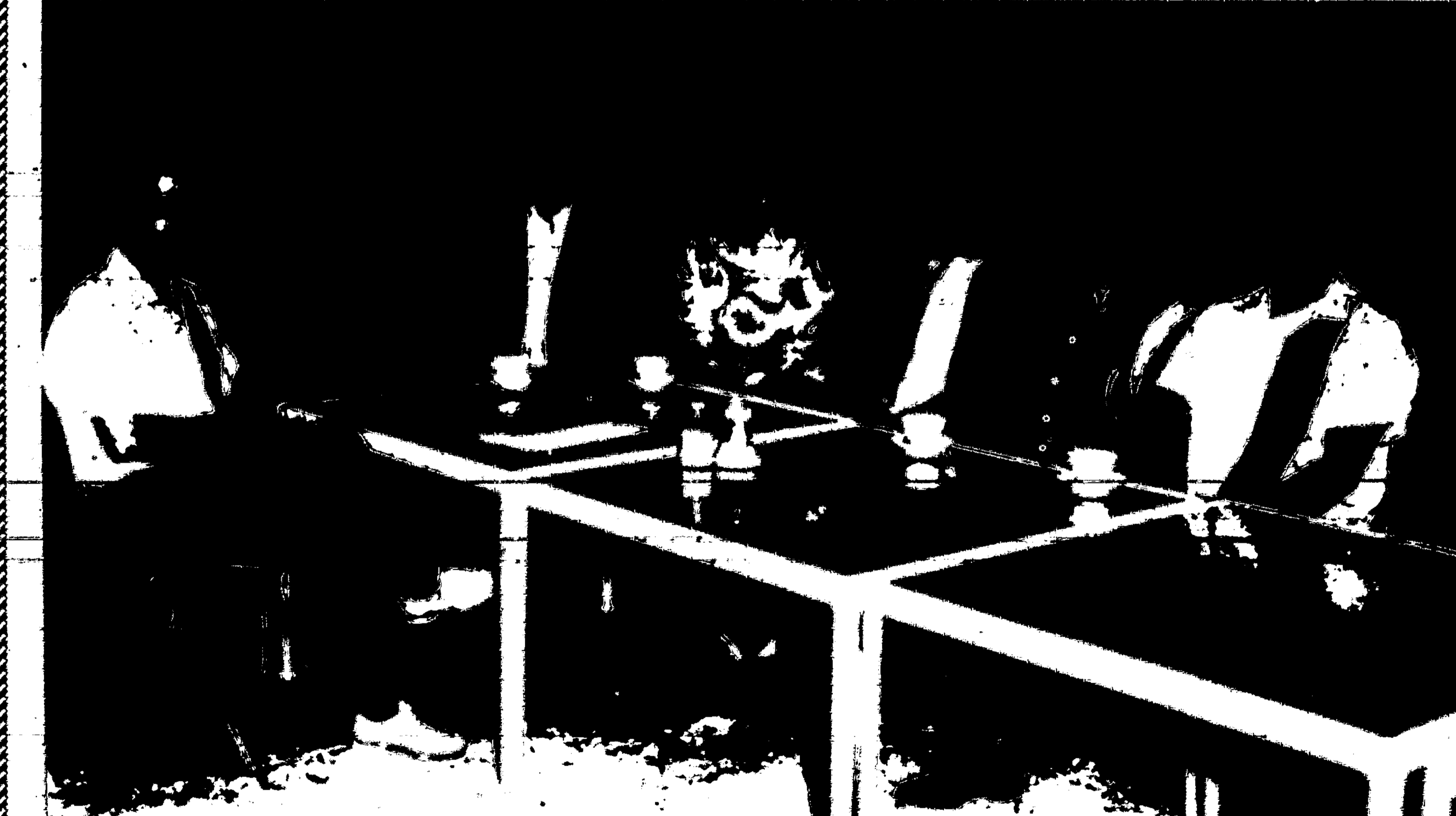
