## Gift is big help to school

### Darling, Mayfield receive contracts

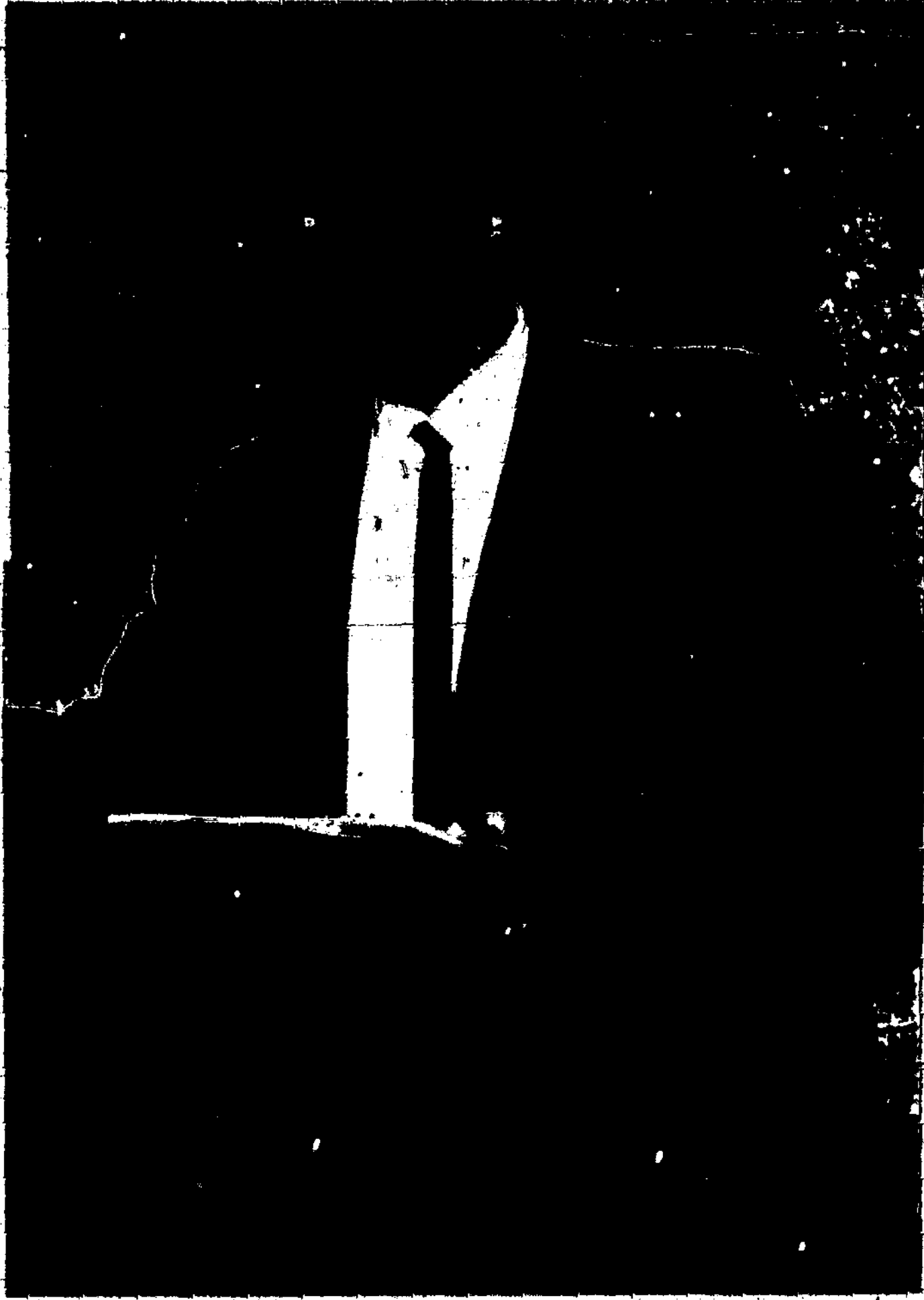
Capitan school board, meeting last week, deposited in local bank \$25,000 of general operations money, \$8,750 of bond issue money, plus \$1,200 of special building fund money left from grade school construction. These monies will draw at least \$800 interest to be credited to the several funds.

Capitan school received incentive payment, teacher qualification payment, and year's service distribution of money from state in January. These funds will be used to meet summer teacher payrolls.

The board issued new two-year contracts to Supt. Darling and Prin. Jack Mayfield. Purchase of two electric stoves, refrigerator, dishwashing machine was authorized. Mrs. Annie Petree will return to work in school cafeteria February 21. She has recovered from fall earlier in the school year.

Accreditation of junior high schools was discussed. Dr. Bonner Crawford, chairman for state of North Central Ass'n, had sent letter requesting information whether the Capitan school board would be interested in junior high accreditation. The board wants more information.

Attending this school board meeting were Herbert Lee Traylor, Herman Otero, George McBride, Warren Harris, board members; Joan Pumphrey,

secretary; Jack Mayfield, principal; and Supt. Duane Darling. Board president Zane Leslie was ill and unable to attend.

## Zozo Scouts keep busy

Wayland Hill, Jr., Scoutmaster of Carrizozo Boy Scout Troop said last week that his boys have lots of things going. Last year, in addition to regular meetings and training programs carried out, the Boy Scouts put in several days cleaning up the Carrizozo Cemetery.

An awards banquet is in the making, planned for early spring and a time when special recognition will be given to local boys for their work in Scouting.

Wayland said he would like for the Scouts to have a rifle and archery range and was prospecting an area west of town on land owned by the town. A rifle has been donated to the Scouts and they plan to acquire archery equipment and more rifles.

Scout meetings are held each Monday night for 19 boys in the former telephone building, now Scout headquarters. Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer have bought this property and make it available to the Boy Scouts as well as paying all utility bills.

Duane Darling, superintendent of schools at Capitan, speaking to Carrizozo Rotarians about the proposed foundation program of equalizing aid to schools, said that a gift of \$20,000 from Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer of Carrizozo was the only thing that kept his school system out of bad trouble last year.

Supt. Darling said that school systems like Alamogordo with hundreds of thousands of dollars of federal impact money, do not need, nor particularly want to be equalized, but that many small schools of the state barely have sufficient funds to operate and Capitan schools need added funds.

Quality education is "Better than average," said Supt. Darling.

Capitan is almost completely surrounded by Lincoln National Forest, mighty beautiful country, but does not produce any tax money for school operation. This situation might be compared to schools in Lea County where they have lots of oil and spend almost twice as much for school operation as is spent in Lincoln County.

The Capitan school budget for 1967-68 year was passed around for Rotarians to view. It shows a total of \$28,401.00 in local resources, \$20,000 from the Spencers.

Supt. Darling expressed his tax philosophy as including income and sales tax and equalization of property tax to afford chance to build and move forward. He said that 33 1/3 rd assessed valuation could be fine, but that in some counties a 16% valuation might be greater, depending on the way property was appraised.

The New Mexico School Administrators Ass'n. has endorsed the foundation program approach to meeting the educational needs of all children in the state. A foundation program "basically takes" into consideration the amount of money for school purposes received locally, the amount of federal money received -- then the state will add sufficient funds to put each school on a reasonably close-to-equal basis, at least as far as teacher-pupil ratio is concerned and other normal school costs.

## Gabriel Chavez severely burned

Gabriel Chavez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Chavez was burned Saturday when fire broke out in the home of Mr. and Mrs. R.C. Wells, south of Carrizozo.

The fire started when the boys, Gabriel Chavez and Gerald Wells were attempting to start a fire in the Wells' fireplace. Gasoline which had been poured on the logs had spilled on the floor and when ignited spread rapidly in the living room burning the couch and television.

The two boys extinguished the fire before firemen arrived. The blaze had done considerable damage to the Wells' living room fixtures in the way of smoke damage, along with the burning of the television.

Gabriel Chavez was burned on the lower legs and was admitted to the Lincoln County Hospital where burns were classified as second degree burns. No injury was reported on the Wells boy. Gabriel is reported doing fine and will be returning home from the hospital sometime this week.

## Commission plans Lincoln tax auction

The County Commissioner's convened at 10:00 a.m. for a regular monthly meeting. A letter was received by the commissioners from New Mexico State Tax Commission was read wherein it was stated that the State Tax Commission is planning an auction sale of Tax Delinquent Property in Lincoln County. Before they can proceed they need the permission of the County Commissioners to advertise and possibly accept bids for less the amount of Advalorem taxes due against some of the property. After discussion of this matter the Commissioners deemed this advisable and instructed the county clerk to write to the State Tax Commission giving their approval of same.

The Ruidoso Garden Club will meet Tuesday, February 20, at 2 o'clock in the Ruidoso Woman's Club building.

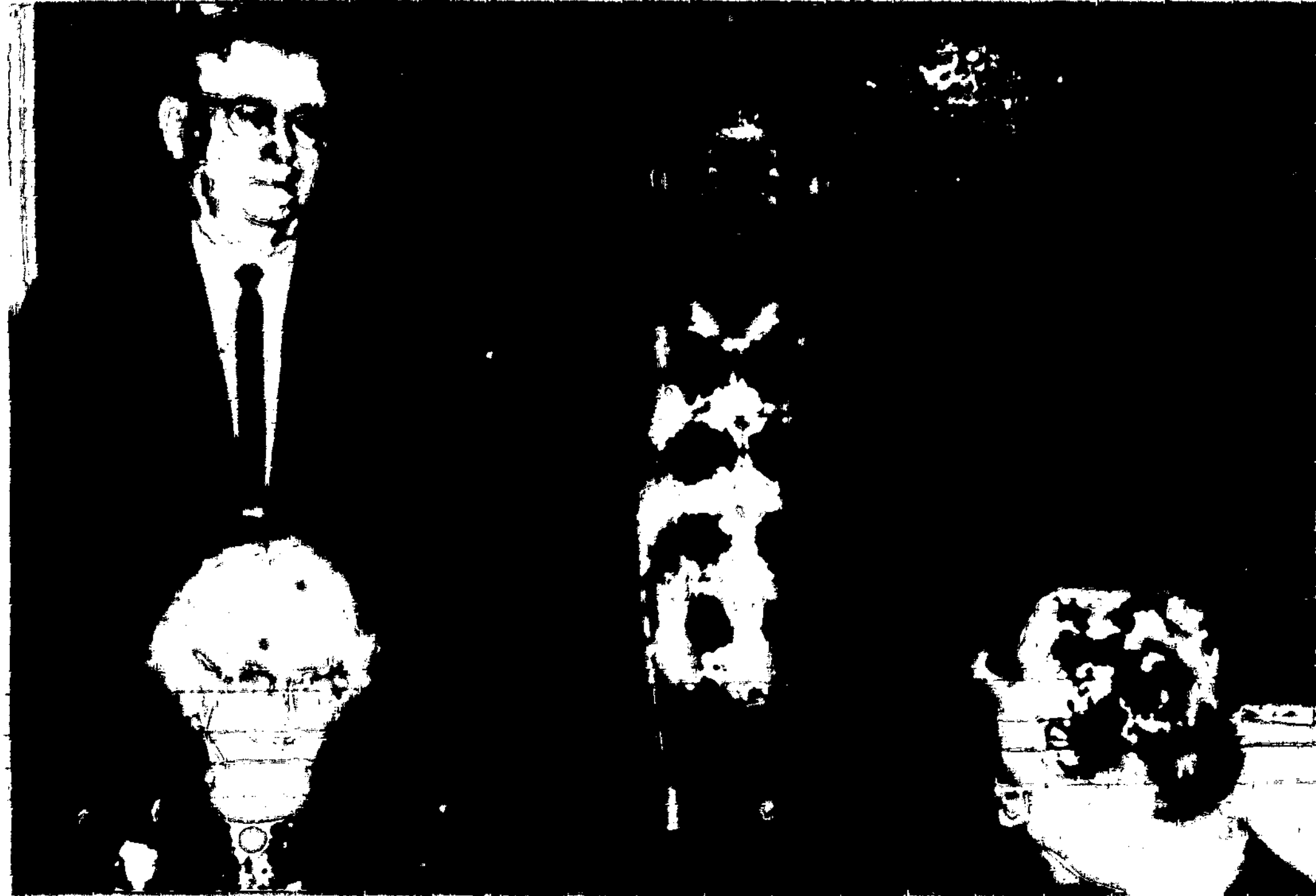
Mrs. Roy Lare, A. C. Abbott, J. E. Riddle, and Beatrice Ebers will be the hostesses.

## Residents find they can receive social security

Four Carrizozo residents are surprised and pleased to find they will be able to receive monthly social security benefits even though they are still working. Mrs. Estella E. Withers had never inquired before because she said she had not been able to go to visit the district office in Roswell. She was not aware, she said, that a representative comes to Carrizozo every month to assist people with social security matters. She inquired for signing up for medicare and found that she not only could be eligible for both the hospital insurance and the part that helps with doctors bills, but would get regular monthly payments as well. She had never done any work covered by social security, but qualifies under the special provisions for people who were 72 before 1968, and who do not receive monthly payments from some other source. She was able to sign up late for medical insurance because of the open enrollment period for those people over 65 who missed their first chance.

Mr. and Mrs. Leandro Vega, Sr., also discovered, when Mr. Vega came in to sign up for medicare, that they could qualify for monthly payments. They will receive about \$600 for 1967, and approximately \$1200 for 1968, according to the estimate of Adele B. Cole, the social security representative for Carrizozo. Mr. Vega said he had no intention of retiring—he will continue to operate his feed store, but because the amount an individual can earn and still be considered to be retired has been increased, he and Mrs. Vega will get substantial sums. Some of their benefits will be

withheld, but the additional income which is exempt from income tax will be very welcome, Vega said. The Social Security had found his name on their records, which showed he was old enough for medicare, and had not yet enrolled, and wrote him a letter inviting him to qualify for benefits. This is a regular program to insure everyone who is old enough to sign up.

Austin Wooten will soon begin receiving regular social security checks, although, he, too, has no plan to stop work. His payments will begin with the month of his 72nd birthday, because of the rule that an individual gets all benefits after that age, regardless of his earnings. Wooten had been on the rolls for medicare benefits since that program was effective, so his payments will begin automatically. As long as he continues to work, his record will be reviewed each year to give him credit for additional earnings, which will in turn increase his monthly payment. This is done automatically for everyone who has applied for monthly benefits, Mrs. Cole said.

Mrs. Cole added that there are several other individuals in Carrizozo who would probably qualify for payments if they would file an application. She invites anyone who has a question about their eligibility to contact her the first Friday of each month at the Lincoln County Courthouse. All social security records are confidential. However Mr. Wooten, Mrs. Withers, and Mr. and Mrs. Vega gave permission to have facts about their cases published so that other people in Carrizozo might become acquainted with social security benefits.

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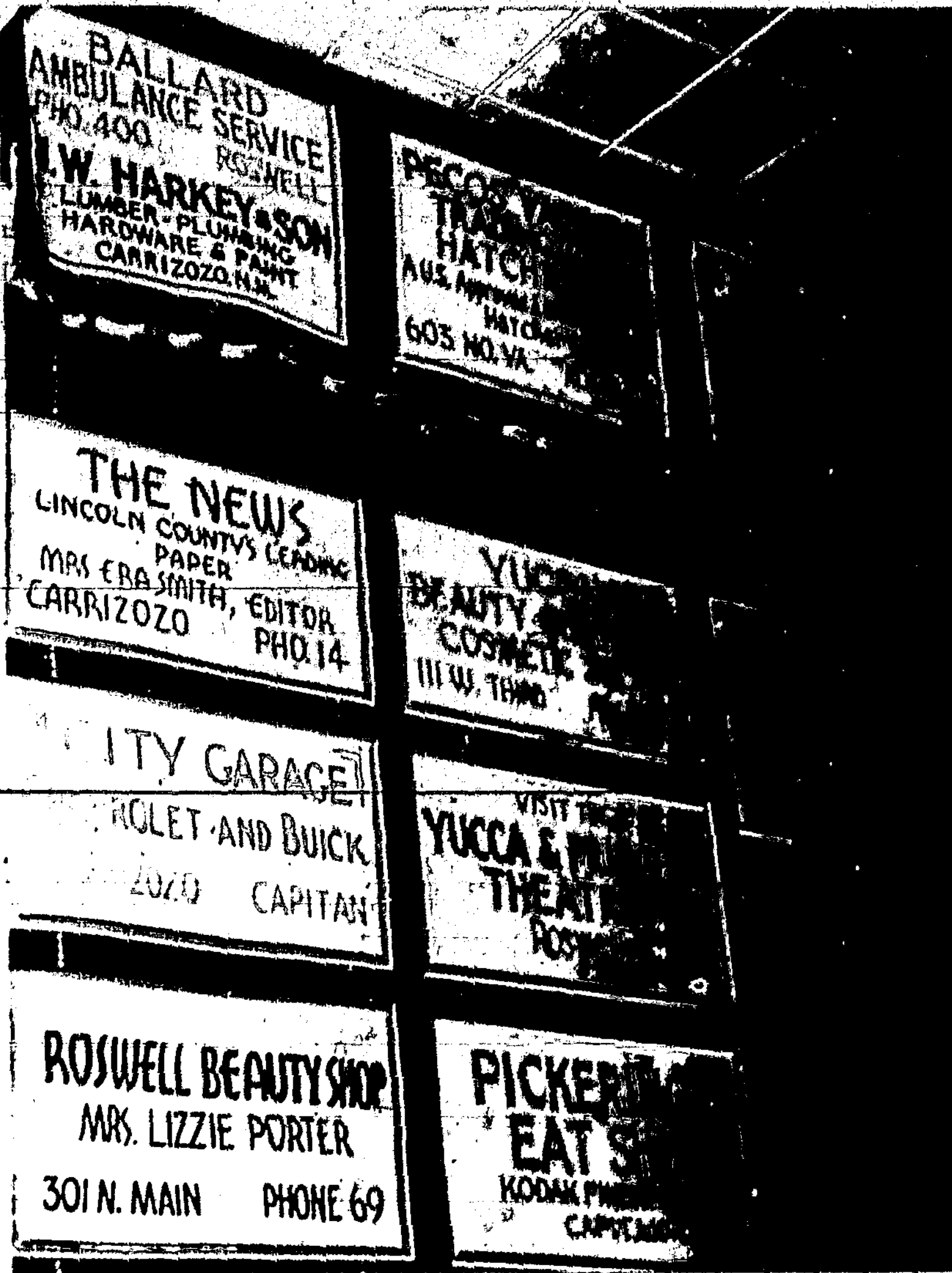
